BASIC TRAINING

The title is deceptive. It is not, in fact, a military manual. Rather it is an essential approach to becoming expert in sleight of hand.

Perhaps most I.B.M. members are also members of S.A.M. In which case, they might have noticed and enjoyed a special column devoted to an introductory course for beginners interested in sleight of hand. It turned out to be more, much more. Ian Kendall was the host. He flavored the 36 lessons with two e-books that he wrote. Michael Close accepted the editorship

of M.U.M. in 2008. He declaimed that magic secrets are available via the goggle of electronic devices but it fails to address how to learn something i.e. pedagogical. Compared to music which is rich with preparatory and instruction, magic is dearth with such valuable educational tools.

Michael Close attempted to refine the instruction in his various Workers pamphlets. In 2005, while lecturing in Edinburgh, Close chanced upon Ian Kendall who shared his thinking about

teaching methods for magicians. Kendall's column entitled 'Basic Training' won appreciation and awards, Lesie Guest for achievement in writing. Now all magicians can have access to all 36 columns plus.

Dial up www.LuLu.com and you can order (\$48.06) this Perfect-bound Paperback of 249 pages (8,26 wide x 11.69 tall) with Black and White photographs. If your approach to learning magic is to glom on to the secret and go on to perform, you need this book desperately. The author has blended the many aspects of teaching he has learned and applies it to magic instruction. He dissects the four stages of learning into: rote, understanding, application and correlation. Don't be put off by this 'jargon'.

Kendall begins by telling the reader that he observes Vernonesque maxims i.e. 'be natural' and 'use your head'. His initial offering is 'The Ghost Count' better known as "The Elmsley Count". The reader may well ask, "Isn't this an archaic way of instruction....what about DVDs and iPads?" There is one fault: the diligent



student will not break his back but he/she may break the back of the spine of the book. It is a logistical feat to wedge the pages open so that the student can follow the text, while practicing the sundry moves. But

a used book is a good book.

Onward: The Double Lift; The French Drop; Physical aspects of performing, posture, projecting your voice; Card Controls - Selections, Multiple Cut, Spanish and Simple; Jordan Count, Vernon thru the hand, Buckle turnover, Twisting; False Transfers -; recalling Anneman's 202 methods of forcing, Kandall launches into careful exposition of the facets of successful forcing; aspects of the Hamman Count and beyond; Aspects of the Boy Scout motto "Be prepared" applied to the

signed card and general advice; Using ambidextrous talents to deceive; Overhand slop shuffle leads off this chapter and more than full deck control, riffle wonderments; If you are all fingers, consider a Thumb Tip and Ian tells you what to do with it.; Elegant advantages of the Hindu Shuffle; Chop Chop Chop Chop Cup - Paul Wilson's variants as compared to Ian Kandall's; Sea shells Not!, Coin shells, Yes! Utilizing this useful gimmick is subject of a chapter; Venues: Street, Strolling, Functions, Restaurants, Formal Close Up; Shaping your repertoire to the performing environment and the definition of a professional (Sammy Davis) 'doing a good job even when you

don't feel like it.; A dissertation on the Ambitious Card effect; If you know twenty ways to control a card but only one way to produce it, you are said to know only one trick but the reverse will give you a repetition - Hugard and Tenkai moves only a small sampling of what this chapter contains; Anatomy of the muscles of the hand and the classic palm; Two in the hand, one in the pocket - a three ball routine; String the magician up! Three unequal ropes; Many ways with one way decks; Mastering Stars of Magic Vernon's Spellbound; Card changes changed including Rub a Dub; What do you with a Stacked Deck which you have managed to maintain; This chapter is Knot for you.; Don't drop the ball juggling; Now you write about this? The Classic Force; The familiar charge: "Its up his sleeve." It is true but how.; Card to pocket variations; You won't find this in a gym - the muscle pass.; Have only one coin? Here is what to do with it.; Adaptability You have to read this to understand; Final (not really) thunks (thoughts) and on and on, at the bottom of the book, "The Top Change."

This is an encyclopedia of experience. "Professor" Ian Kandall has shared hints, recommendations, cautions, encouragements, gleaned for his own magic life story. It is valuable compedium to be studied, tasted, digested.

Dr. Joel Moskowitz prescribes this for the want-to-be magician, and even for the professional in the art of wizardry. Rx Rx Rx Rx Rx (5/5)



Request for Feedback on Ring 76 Contests


The 2011-12 Board has had many discussions over the course of the past year regarding our Close-Up and Stage Competitions. One result of these discussions has been to codify the rules and procedures under which our contests have been conducted.

There are two topics that have been discussed at length and we would like your feedback regarding these ideas. What would you, the membership, like to see?

First topic: Should We Change the Judging?

Its been suggested that we could use a more sophisticated scoring criteria for judging than the simple "every member votes for who they like." Contestants would be rated on various aspects of their performance and the best overall score would win.

An advantage of such a scheme would be that the performers would get better feedback on their act. A disadvantage is the increased complexity that such scoring would entail.

One possible implementation would be to follow the IBM contest model with a panel of judges that chooses 1st, 2nd and 3rd choices. A Peoples Choice Award would also be selected by simple vote of the audience.

Second Topic: Should We Have Two Divisions?

Suggestions have been made to the Board that perhaps we should have separate divisions in our Close-Up and Stage Competitions. The divisions would be "masters" and "hobbyists". The idea is that those new to magic, or who perform only as a hobby, might not feel they can compete with the more accomplished members of the club.

We do not yet have a working definition of "masters" and "hobbyists," but it may fall along the lines of those who have previously won one of these contests, and those who have not. Thus, the winner of the Hobbyist class would move into the Masters class in future competitions. There have been other possibilities also discussed as well. There has been a lot of discussion whether members could choose to promote themselves to the Masters division if they wished to compete with the best.

So what you think?

Either of these changes would be a significant change over what we have done in the past. While these are things that we are considering, neither is something that we would undertake lightly nor would we do so without your input.
