#### New Competition Rules

Political infighting, biased reporting, long and pointless speeches, cutthroat maneuvering behind

the scenes. But enough about the last Board meeting, time to move on to some positive news.

At the August Ring Meeting, the membership voted to continue examining our current Contest Rules and Procedures to see if there were adjustments that could be made to raise the standards. Many good ideas were presented during the spirited business portion of the meeting and Board took them all into account.

Salomon A. Barajas, Jose A. Sanchez & Syd Segal came up with changes to the judging system which the Board feels addresses the issues that have arisen in recent years. They presented their proposal at the last Board meeting and that aided the Board in moving forward on the issue. It is a balance between the professional judges that are used in I.B.M. Competitions, and the Membership judging that Ring 76 uses now. It eliminated the need for a two-tiered contest, making judging of the individual's skills and presentation the cornerstone of the competition.

The Board is still working on specific details; however the final policy will be in place, and published, well before the Close-Up Competition in February of next year. Keep watching your newsletter for more details.

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# The Gimmick is elusive but desirable

The Gimmick Magizette, in this reviewer's opinion, is quaint, nostalgic, personal but is not faithful to the title. That being said, it is also precious, informative, entertaining, and, it is recommended. Magicians all over the world should subscribe.

If we understand 'gimmick' to mean a special feature which 'stands out' from its contemporaries, that may mean what Solyl, the Editor and Publisher, intended. His publication is different. But magicians think of 'gimmick' as a device to manipulate appearances so that what the audience sees is different from reality. The origin seems to have been conning via a gaming wheel gadget which was favorable to the 'house'.

Instead the Gimmick Magizette is a charming, often exotic, collection of wisdom, personal favorites (maybe having seen the light of publication previously) and in these days of climbing prices for one trick DVDs it is a bargain. Somewhere around \$2.00 per issue (a downloadable PDF) ordered from www.lyberry.com is easy and available.

With over five decades of experience "Solyl" Kundu is a much admired magician's magician. He has been active in the International Brotherhood of Magicians as Territorial Vice President for India, judging magic acts at conventions. He brought 'Table Hopping' to India. His style is 'humorous' and is at ease at children's parties and his preference on the stage where he amazes audiences with classic effects as well as original illusions. Author of several books dealing with magic, he began writing and editing a two page photocopied publication years ago which has since morphed, happily, to this, his latest effort: Gimmick

MagiZette - an exclusive Indian publication. Gimmick MagiZette was greeted by magicians world wide and his subscribership quickly to rose to 200. Nicknamed a 'Dovician' which refers to his contributions to Ian Adair's Encyclopedia of Dove Magic. On the wing, he has performed around Solyl's wide experience in the



magical arts puts him in a strong position for knowing what magician's thirst for in written material. Take a bow, Solyl, for a fascinating series: Gimmick MagiZette from India!

What follows are some abstracts of the first few issues so that interested magicians may taste the flavor of the texts.


An early issue of Gimmick MagiZette begins with advice from Grandpa Chet (?) on the dos and don'ts of performing magic. In fact, the changing styles of performers is encompassed in an era where it is was good fun to make a monkey out of a spectator, and use spectators as unpaid assistants to hold your linking rings or other apparatus to a style which respects the spectator more.

I would have thought the MagiZette would have been devoted to 'gimmicks' or gimmickry but in large part it is not. In fact, in this issue I didn't discover any gimmicks. If you consider the mechanism behind Slydini's torn and restored newspaper a 'gimmick', you have what you paid for.

On the other hand, if you are in to nostalgia, you will have the opportunity to read an offering from Aldo Colombini and for Ring 76 San Diego older members who were around in the days of the brick and mortar magic emporiia Brad Burt writes a column.

Guy M. Townsand writes 'Some Thoughts on 'Wild Deluxe' by Aldo Colombini. Unless one is familiar or has access to this effect, Townsand's advice will be

diminished by unfamiliarity. A summary describing Colombini's effect would have been helpful as well as a reference to where one might review the original article. Guy Townsand takes pains in describing the Elmsley and the Jordan Count but his referring back to the photos which accompany his submission are confusing. The Editor, Solyl Kundu, in an afterwards commentary observes that while he himself, Solyl, is not passionate about 'finger flicking' he didn't apply the editor's pen to Townsand's article and printed it as written adding his, the Editor's, hope that it was useful to the readers.

Other luminaries e.g. Sam Dalal a famous Indian magician flavor this publication. As well as bits of history i.e.the creation of Pakistan by the British.

In this issue, the editor offers several card effects (alas the lack of illustrations is a negative feature and where there are illustrations they are small and unrevealing.

The third in the series begins with an article featuring IBM Ring 76's Loch David Crane Reference is made to his book 'Captain Kirk and Star Tricks'' Loch shares his zest for creativity and originality. For example, as his audition for membership in The Magic Castle (back in the 1960s) the admission committee applauded his originality when he performed The Professors Nightmare with dog leashes instead of rope.

A section is devoted to the 'Grand Old Gentleman of how magic is performed in one of the most exotion Magic - Asok Roy". For those who base their places in the world, India. Magic from Spain written with benefit of Google translation is offered by Iurgi Sarasa. He refers to Juan Tamariz who is familiar to American magicians.

Gorra Datta another Indian magish writes about a 'New Balloon Penetration''.

Clever. 'Clear Prediction' utilizes business cars (Sukesh Patnaik.

'Aces-Anwich' is a punny offering of Aldo Colombini.

'In writing' by Karl Fulves, a favorite writer of mine, describes a trick with three coins. The Columbini and Fulves have been 'lifted' from those authors previous published articles with blessings.

Comedy Newspaper Restoration (another Indian contribution) Kakinada Sreenivas.

Not being familiar with Indian names is daunting. This does have a gimmick - a concealed magnet.

Then there is a column where current, authentic and inspiring notices may be conveyed to magicdom. There are many many colorful photos of Indian magicians at play and invitations to diverse conventions (being only English speaking might be a problem but it would also be an adventure).

Although this reviewer has a slight problem with the deceptive title of Gimmick MagiZette, it is of little moment. After all isn't that what magicians are all about 'deception'. The content is certainly not exclusively about and the utilization of gimmicks in magic, but readers will appreciate the casual style, the illustrations (especially the colorful photos of Indian magicians and events) and the opportunity to see how magic is performed in one of the most exotic places in the world, India. On one of this reviewers seven, who in the street and at our feet spread out a somewhat the worse for wear a towel on which he proceeded to perform an excellent Matrix followed by a superb Cups and Balls. One cannot beat the friendliness of the Indian folk and their ability despite poverty, disease and other hardships.
