in poor health for many years, but that did not stop him from practicing and performing and writing/ posting his blunt opinions on any topic, magic or otherwise, to anyone who would read them. As we all learned the hard way, do not ask Bob Pozner for an opinion unless you REALLY mean it.

According to Ring 76 Icon Jack White, Bob discovered magic at the age of 32 when he visited the Magic Castle and watched Ron Wilson's close-up act. Almost immediately after that, Bob purchased a deck of "Fako" cards and color-changing knives from Chuck Martinez' Magic Shop on El Cajon Blvd. It was there in the shop he met lifetime friends J. C. Wagner, Magic Mike Stillwell, Jeff Marcus, and others. It was Magic Mike who took Bob under his wing and gave Bob a rigorous grounding in magic.

A lifelong San Diegan, Bob was a graduate of SDSU with a BS in Chemistry in 1964. After serving in the

Navy, Bob worked for Rohm & Haas, and Hydronautics as Quality Control and eventually Lab supervisor. Married twice, he has three sons. Bob devoted what spare time he had in the evenings honing his sleight-of-hand and eventually performing professionally with regular gigs at local establishments like Marco's Magic Bar in Coronado, Crystal T's Emporium in Mission Valley, the Magic Lounge on University Ave, and finally a two-year stint at the La Jolla Country Club. He had a reputation for always being dressed to the 9's and performing mostly sleight-of-hand magic flawlessly. Bob was a contributor to Ring 76 in so many ways; former Board of Directors member, Ring librarian, and consistent participant in the "teach-a-trick" nights and close-up competitions, which he won in 2001 and 2007.

When I first met Bob in 2004, he was the irascible old-timer at Ring 76 meetings, where he had been a member since 1973 and achieved Lifetime Member status in 2005. Bob did incredible coin magic and was no slouch with cards. Bob's "Signed Card from Empty Card Box" was particularly dazzling. His delivery was quirky, mostly because he was deaf and shouted to hear himself and he had a raspy voice caused from a lifetime of smoking; his head of thick unruly hair was a built-in distraction, and his smile and twinkling eyes were mesmerizing.

In 2012 I asked Bob if he would be willing to give me lessons in sleight of hand. He responded "Maybe" and asked me to come by his apartment and "show me what you can do." The first lesson cost me \$50, and the very first thing that happened was pure Bob Pozner. He asked to see my coins. I proudly pulled out my eight Kennedy half dollars, and Bob immediately wrinkled up his face and shouted "Jeez those are too small! Get some real coins!"

I spent over two years meeting with Bob once or twice a month for an hour or two. I can tell you Bob has forgotten more magic than I will ever learn in my lifetime, and he was a demanding teacher who insisted his students share the same passion for magic and daily practice, or the lessons weren't worth his time. We continued to meet and share magic over a Carl's burger or Church's fried chicken occasionally and I would help him do grocery chores as he needed, or we would swap "war stories" about environmental science and lab analytical projects in our pasts, but magic was our mutual love.

Bob was unflinchingly honest and "in the moment." He recounted one night in the Magic Castle:

"Larry Jennings was doing a coins across routine in the Closeup Gallery that had me completely baffled. I got in line right after leaving the show to see him do it over and over. Finally I figured out his method in the middle of his third performance and I shouted 'I GOT IT!' – ruined the show for everyone else in the room, and I learned to keep my mouth shut."

Bob was a great friend and teacher to me because he shared his experiences and thoughts without filter and wanted all of us to learn from his mistakes as well as his triumphs. Bob was uber intelligent and a wonderful scientist, as well as magician. I am a better person and magician for having spent time with The Wizard of Poz, and his enthusiasm for disciplined practice and rehearsed polished sleight-of-hand lives on in many of his Ring member friends' routines. I will always use BIG coins, Bob. I promise.



Bob passed away from a combination of emphysema and diabetes. He was 84.

Performing Magic with Impact in the Age of Zoom

Magic performance has undergone significant change in this year of the pandemic. Magicians have had to adapt to new performing circumstances and situations as many in-person performing opportunities either moved online or dissolved.

And yet, people in the world need magic! They need the deep pleasure of astonishment. They need to be reminded that the impossible is possible. They need the experience of joy and hope that magic provides.

In this online lecture, created especially for I.B.M. Ring 76, I will perform and teach at least SIX strong pieces of magic from my professional online repertoire. Each of these routines will allow me to share "practical ideas" about how to perform magic that creates great impact on our audiences, whether we are in person or online.

You will experience and then learn visual magic, mentalism, and highly interactive magic I have created for ZOOM. Along the way, I will share essential insights from the Magic & Mystery School about performing magic that is meaningful.

Bio

Larry Hass, Ph.D., is the Dean of the McBride Magic & Mystery School in Las Vegas.

Larry has performed his astonishing, artistic magic around the world at theaters, universities, magic conventions, public conferences, and corporate events. He performs regularly in Las Vegas and at the world-famous Magic Castle in Hollywood,

California. In 2019 he premiered his full-evening theater show to great acclaim: Magical Life: An Evening with Larry Hass.

Having authoring over fifteen books and videos for magicians, Dr. Hass is considered a world-leading teacher of magic and a pre-eminent philosopher of the art. His celebrated publications include, Eugene Burger: From Beyond (2019), Teaching Magic (with Eugene Burger, 2017), Inspirations: Creating Magic Out of Tricks (2015), The Show Doctor (with Jeff McBride, 2012), and Transformations: Creating Magic Out of Tricks (2007). Larry Hass's visionary approach to magic has been featured in leading international media, including the New York Times, USAToday, The Chronicle of Higher Education, on National Public Radio and the Discovery Channel, and in his recent TEDx Talk, "What Is the Art of Magic?"

With this passing the Ring has had the benefits of inheriting many lives worth of magic props, books, routine and instruction manuals, and memorabilia. Your Board, and other volunteers, have worked to sort, catalog, and reconstruct a lot of these treasures and present them to the Ring for further enjoyment. It has been an honor, a pleasure, and a responsibility they all take very seriously and will continue to do so. They all deserve our thanks.

We are all given a measured span of time on this earth and it will come to an end for all of us. I do not mean to be morbid or even seasonal with this revelation, it is just a fact. We will have treasures of our own to donate one day and for the benefit of the Ring members then who must take possession of them, I would like to make a request of all of you now. With the time we have now because of the continuing quarantine, it may the best time to

do our own cataloging and assemblage of our magic inventory so that at the proper time the next generation will have an easier time assessing the value of our collections. I would like to urge you to take an hour or two every week to find the instructions for that prop you use (or have not used in years) so that when the box is opened someone will know what it is and what it is supposed to do. Help them see the box of treasures and not the box of unrelated pieces of an unknown puzzle. We are the luckiest generation to date in that we can find the instructions for props we bought and used a half-century ago. We can even start an online request site asking for the original routines for Temple Screens, and Symphony of Silks. We can take pictures of the props as they should look and not how future "archaeologists" can only imagine them. We can help the next generation of Ring members remember this generation's fondest memories.

As I said, I am not trying to be morbid or anything, I am just saying that we should take time to preserve our treasures. It will be the difference between passing them along and tossing them out.

Ring76 Meeting

Monday October 12, 2020

In Cyberspace

The Ring 76 October meeting was our traditional evening of spooky magic. And, as a performance night, the votes counted toward the performer of the month and performer of the year.

President **Richard Ustick** called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. There were 24 members

online. **Richard** suggested we continue with the newsletter challenge, and he reminded members about the **Larry Hass** lecture next month, called for any suggestions for the December meeting, and asked for any announcements. **Matthew King** announced the success of his first in-studio corporate show and looking forward to opening his magic shop.

First VP of Entertainment, Greg Wauson, congratulated Sherry Luft as the winner of the newsletter challenge and was awarded an Amazon gift card. Greg reminded members about the Larry Hass lecture. Greg explained the voting process for the performer of the month, and the Amazon gift card award. Greg told us about a story he read in The Linking Ring which he felt was inspirational, and he reminded us about the brotherhood of magic.

Our first performer was **Bob Meigs**, who told a great story about a levitation performed by Maskelyne. Bob spoke about making a light bulb float, and then demonstrated it, while showing that there was nothing connected to it! He explained his science magic using reverse magnetism for a levitation. Then, with the flick of the wand, the lightbulb lit up.

Then **Matthew King** indicated he would perform a signed card to mouth routine since germs are "spooky." A signed card vanished from the deck. He

then pulled a pumpkin out of a briefcase, and a card was folded up in the pumpkin's mouth, but it was incorrect. He reached back in the briefcase and pulled out a severed head, with the signed card folded up in its mouth!

Next up was **Laurie Pearson**, who presented a video of her performance. Her sleight of hand involved unbelievable morphing of a \$2 bill. She folded it up, made a magical gesture and turned it into two \$1 bills! Next, she folded them back up, blew on them, and they turned back into a \$2 bill, which she showed on both sides.


Greg Wauson then introduced a special guest Jerry Langford, a DJ and magician from Orange County. Jerry shared a video of his performance of

Jim Pace's "The Web," the world's scariest card trick, in which a spider appears on the back of the volunteer's hand. He scared a woman with it, to all of our delight!

Greg Wauson was next up and showed a prediction and an orange paper printed with numbers 1 through 9. Volunteer **Mike Stilwell** chose three of the numbers, added them and the sum matched the prediction. Greg revealed the secret to this number

force which can be used as a utility item or an impromptu effect.

Following Greg was **Craig Blackwood**, who showed an empty picture frame. He had **Greg Wauson** think of a card and Craig revealed a "52 on 1" gag card. He then asked Greg to name another magician present, and he named **Jeff Marcus**. Then he asked Jeff to think of something that repulses him. Craig amazed

everyone when he turned around the frame and there was a photograph of Jeff Marcus as a child, wearing a cowboy hat, and a picture of melons, which repulses Jeff!

Next up was **Mike Stilwell**, who spoke about meeting magician Peter Chu in Hong Kong at his magic shop. He performed a Peter Chu jumbo card effect involving three aces, which he placed face down, removed two of them and asked which ace remained. When people guessed the ace of diamonds, he revealed the remaining card said "STUNG" and when asked to turn it over, the other side said "STUNG AGAIN."

The next performer was **Mark Booth**. He showed two Rubik's cubes, mixed one up without looking and Greg told him when to stop. Mark then mixed the other without looking and Greg said to stop. Then Mark gave Greg the option of which cube for him to solve. Mark put it above his head and, without looking, he solved it! He then put on a blindfold, mixed up the cube, tossed it around to lose track of it, and then had Greg tell him when to stop. Again, Greg had a free choice of which cube to solve. Mark put the selected cube over his head and twisted it around until he felt he was done. However, even more miraculously, it turned out that the two still-mixed cubes matched perfectly on all sides!



Jeff Marcus then shared a PowerPoint presentation about his recent trip to Colon, Michigan. He told about the history of the town and his trip to Abbotts Magic Company, known to magicians around the world. Jeff shared the photos he took of the town, including stars in the sidewalk similar to the Walk of Fame in Hollywood. He also showed photos of Fab Magic Co., and Sterlini Magic shop and the small theater located inside. Then he showed the cemetery and various headstones of famous magicians who are laid to rest there. This very nice tour put into perspective a quaint town we've all heard of but few of us have visited.

Greg recapped the performers of the evening and asked for people to email their votes for the performer of the month.



As a bonus, **Mark Booth** shared his screen and showed the Facebook group Magic Collectors Corner. He highly recommended it to members, as it is filled with historical magic. There are tons of great tidbits in the group and the previous episodes are available to watch online.
