# San Diego's Beloved Magician Jack White Dies

Leaves a Legacy of Magic Memories

Jack White was many things in his celebrated life, but members of IBM Ring 76 knew him best as A Magic Lover, A Mentor, A Collector, A Performer, and A Friend. Jack held every office in the club, from President to Newsletter Editor to Fresh Popcorn Maker. For decades he hosted magic club meetings in his own private magic museum, hidden in a storefront off University Avenue behind a sign called "Woofle Dust Inc.".

Jack rose to the highest ranks in magic, becoming President of the International Brotherhood of Magicians. That is the year he showed his greatest courage, when severe health issues put him in a wheelchair. Jack became the first sitting President of a world magic organization, and he still fulfilled his duties with charm and commitment. In the years that followed, Jack continued to travel and maintain his magic friendships.

Jack Richard White was born April 1, 1939; he died on Oct. 30, 2020. (Link to Jack's Obituary)

Back in the day, IBM Ring 76 meetings were a place of enchantment during the era of Jack's Magic Clubhouse. Parking sucked, but once you entered the accordion-style riot doors, the place was utter magic.





There was a stage on one end with chairs for more than 50 people. Magic posters and western posters covered the walls from floor to ceiling. A library was hidden upstairs. A workshop was tucked away in the back. As you entered, there was a large wooden bar for bar magic. Behind the bar, which never served alcohol, were drawers filled with magic gags and gimmicks.


Jack's Museum was world-famous. Everywhere you could see glass display cases filled with rare antique props. There were also toys, trains, circus props, and a few arcade games. Jack took great pleasure in his toys. If he saw you staring at something, he'd take it out of the glass case and let you play with it. He loved sharing the history of his props, and their complicated secrets. The place was a wondrous repository of magic history. A <a href="YouTube video">YouTube video</a> captures the images from that time: .

Jack was a classic vaudeville-style performer. He was well at home with colorful props and chestnut one-liners. His patter were so well-honed, and he was so believable, that he could get away with anything. For his last standing show for IBM Ring 76, he did a magnificent card stab complete with Bob Ingalls in a Monkey Suit. Jack adored the spotlight. And he always drew heavy applause, because he knew how to entertain an audience.

Jack was the only child of his father Richard White, and his mother Ellen. When Jack was born, his Grandmother wrote his first name as "Jackie" on the birth certificate, much to the horror of his parents. His Grandma had a way with names. Her kids were named Otha, Zelfa and Alpha. (Jack's Mom changed her name from Alpha to Ellen later in life.)

Jack moved to Oceanside, California, when he was eight years old. He described himself as a big kid, but not very coordinated. He enjoyed beach volleyball. When he was young, he had a crush on a certain girl at school. One day, he went to the movies, and by accident, she sat in the row directly in front of Jack. During the movie, Jack was distracted by a loose tooth in his mouth. While Jack was playing with the loose tooth, flicking it back and forth, the tooth accidently dislodged and flew out of his mouth. Jack was mortified when the flying tooth landed in front him, straight down the back of the shirt of the girl he had a crush on.

Jack liked telling stories, especially those that made him look bad. When he was in the military, he was assigned to a Press Group to cover the funeral of General Douglas McArthur. Jack and his crew drove

to Washington the day before, so they could set up and be ready for the important assignment. As soon as they hit town, Jack and his fellow soldiers went to a restaurant to get some food. When they returned to their car, they were horrified to find all their equipment had been stolen. Cameras, lenses, microphones, film, everything was gone. To make matters worse, all the local rental equipment was already rented out by the world press for the big event. Working all night, he managed to borrow some cameras and film, and other things, and somehow managed to cover the event and put together a film that satisfied his bosses.

Jack was best known in San Diego as a broadcast journalist, the lead anchor on the most popular local nightly news. For decades he was the Walter Cronkite of Southern California. His voice was deep and warm. His manner was always relaxed, almost statesman-like. Wherever he went, people came up to shake his hand. He was always gracious and kind.

The most powerful force in Jack's life was his wife Lynn. One of his favorite movies to watch with her was the 1957 film "Love In The Afternoon" with Audrey Hepburn, Gary Cooper and Maurice Chevalier. Jack enjoyed westerns such as "High Noon" with Gary Cooper, and movies with actor



Randolph Scott. He had a wide range of musical tastes, but preferred Dixieland later in life. He was a Charger fan. His enjoyed his cat named Cricket. And he loved going out to eat.

My favorite Jack White story relates to his work as a consultant on the movie "Anchorman". One day Jack was dining in Old Town with Will Farrell and a few other folks. A fan approached the table, gushing, and asked for an autograph. Not from Will Farrell, but from Jack White. The fan completely ignored the movie star. After the encounter, Will leaned over to Jack and asked, "Did you set that up?" Jack had to smile at that moment, because in San Diego, he was still the biggest celebrity in town.

## Vi Freeland

Vi Freeland was a Lifetime Member of Ring 76. She recently passed away at the beginning of November. The following article was written in 2005 when she was honored with a Lifetime Membership.

Vi Freeland, was born into a magical family. As a little girl she watched her father George levitate and cut her mother Clara in half, and of course put her back together again. By the tender age of four, Vi was in the act, appearing from an empty dollhouse. The show was called "The Dixie Valley Road Show." It toured southern states mostly, setting up in tents just

outside of a town or at county fairs giving their shows. In one rural community, George's magic was so effective that the town's people believed the magician was really Satan in disguise. That night an angry mob descended on the tented show grounds with torches and burned the show to the ground. George heard the mob coming, and he and his family escaped the violent attack unharmed, but it put an end to the touring magic show.

After that the family moved to Colton, California, where they opened a restaurant that became a Southern California landmark for years. Known as "The Derby House," Southern fried chicken was the most famous item on the menu. Movie people from Hollywood found their way to the restaurant,

turning it into a popular eatery in its day. It was there, at the restaurant, during World War II that Vi, working as a waitress, met a charming Army Air Force Captain, Robin Freeland Sr., who did magic tricks on their first date.

After the war, Vi and Robin were married. Robin revived his interest in performing magic and for a time Vi worked as his assistant. Later she would join an emerging group for women magicians known as Magigal's. Vi created a dove act for herself that would go on to win five trophies at various magic conventions.

When their oldest son Robin Paul was four, he began doing magic and Vi assisted him in his act well into his teen years. The Freeland's moved to San Diego from Seattle, Washington, in the mid 1960s. Vi attended her first Ring 76 meeting in the basement of the Baptist Church on 5th Avenue. She already knew Pat Hannum, Olive Edwards, and Helen Gerhart from Magigal's meetings. She quickly became part of the San Diego magic scene. Vi and her son Robin both award winners at a magic convention

Over the years as an active member of Ring 76, she has taken part in Ring programs and worked on convention committees and well as mentored, encouraged and given advice to young magicians on their way up. She is an IBM Excalibur member and is still thrilled by a good magic act. For more than 30 years, Vi has been active in local real estate sales in San Diego County and still today keeps her hand in the business.

# Greg Wauson Remembers Bob Pozner

Bob's students considered him an excellent sleight of hand teacher. When he taught Greg Wauson one lesson in coin magic, one of the effects was the beautiful and magical bare hands production of six silver dollars. By the end of the lesson Greg could perform it, but it would take some time to get it performance ready. Bob emphatically made the case of using silver dollars instead of half dollars. "The audience needs to be able to see the magic", he said.



Greg was convinced, although the silver dollars felt like dinner plates compared to the smaller coins he had always used. Bob then presented Greg with the silver dollars, not as a gift, but as a loan. Greg agreed to also pay it forward by "loaning" the coins sometime in the future to another younger magician who would make this same agreement. By this generous act, Bob was investing in magic for future generations.

# Ring76 Meeting

Monday November 9th, 2020

#### In Cyberspace

President **Richard Ustick** started the meeting at 7:05 by welcoming everyone. 26 members and guests were present, including former Ring 76 president **Rick Bruce**.

Richard announced that **James Kellogg** is performing magic shows at the Illusions theater in the Gaslamp area of San Diego.

**Craig Blackwood** announced he and **Paul Draper** are performing a magic show for a fundraiser on November 20.

A 90 second tribute to **Jack White**, which was created by a TV channel that Jack appeared on for several years, was shown.

Territorial Vice President **Jeff Marcus** presented a broken wand ceremony for three long-time members of Ring 76 who recently passed away: Jack White, Bob Pozner and Vi Freeland. The single presentation included his breaking of one wand. A moment of silence followed the ceremony.

Richard shared that comedy magician **Dana Daniels** will entertain us at the December meeting and the

January meeting will feature videos of our favorite magicians.

Richard Ustick then handed control of the meeting to the vice president of entertainment, **Greg**Wauson. After some brief introductory remarks, Greg introduced our main feature of the meeting, a lecture by renowned magician **Larry Hass**. Larry spends several weeks in residence in Las Vegas teaching master classes with Jeff McBride as the dean of the Magic & Mystery School and is the founder and publisher of Theory and Art of Magic Press, which specializes in thought-provoking magic books and professional routines by world-class magicians and wise teachers of the art.

Larry presented a fascinating lecture titled "Performing Magic with Impact," during which he presented several effects, reviewed his thinking behind them, shared why he developed those particular pieces and offered tips on presenting them effectively. Most of the material was applicable to Zoom performances, since that is the environment in which most magicians are currently entertaining. Larry entertained and taught us effects with silks, a spot card, an appearing shot glass, playing cards and an effective audience participation item using only the spectators' arms, wrists and hands.

He reviewed the history of each, including the evolutionary steps and the improvements that Larry has added and, where applicable, pointed us to the books which describe the basic routines. His comments to improve our effectiveness as performers were helpful, since he knows we want to be magicians, not trickicians. Some of these points were learned from his own experience and some from masters like Jeff McBride and Eugene Berger, with whom he has been associated for many years. He also touched on the use of backdrops, microphones and cameras and showed us it's not necessary to spend hundreds of dollars on these items for a first-class performance.

He stayed around after the lecture to answer questions and talk magic. The meeting ended at 8:45.

## Larry Hass Lecture

#### A Review

Review of Larry Hass Lecture "Performing Magic with Impact"

For our November meeting, Ring 76 was treated to an entertaining and informative lecture by one of the premier thinkers in the field of magic, Larry Hass. Mr. Hass was a philosophy professor for several years, before becoming a professional magician 11 years ago. This background has served him well in his magical performing and writing endeavors and also as the dean of Jeff McBride's Magic and Mystery School in Las Vegas. His clear thinking was evident in the effects he presented, each of which he performs professionally. The Ring 76 board agreed not to record the Zoom meeting, which allowed Larry to show us at least one item which he has never previously performed for an audience.

Larry said "impact" is the single most important word magicians would want to describe their magic. We all want our magic shows not only to be entertaining but also to have an impact on our audiences. Puzzles do not deeply entertain an audience, but magic effects can, depending upon how they are presented. He also



made a distinction between performing magic vs. tricks:

Magic: meaningful, impactful, transformational

Tricks: momentary, puzzling, forgettable, superficial

We want to be magicians, not trickicians.

He opened with a brief routine he calls "A splash of color," in which he magically produced a red silk and a card. Then a full shot glass of southern tea appeared out of nowhere. He said the southern tea plays especially well in Memphis, where he lives. Larry gave us some tips when producing items to avoid "tells," including one from Juan Tamariz. The details he taught regarding the shot glass production were learned by experience from hundreds of performances.

Next was a spot card effect, which was a signature piece from one of his mentors, Eugene Burger. The spot card is a classic of magic because it packs small, plays big and has multiple surprises. Merv



Taylor first produced this item in 1948. This particular version is a real fooler to magicians familiar with "What's Next" since it uses two different methods. The chapter in Larry's book, Eugene Burger: From Beyond, has a complete description of the presentation and includes directions on how to make the card. Larry has found it is best to construct it using an older version of jumbo cards since new ones are too thin. He offered ready-to-go spot cards for sale to those of us who are not adept do-it-yourselfers.

He then performed and taught his version of Juan Tamariz's Paradise Recovered. This effect with seven playing cards seems like it would be a hit for inperson shows and especially effective for Zoom shows since the audience makes many of their own decisions with the cards and yet winds up with the desired result. Larry brought meaning into this effect by representing unwanted parts of our lives with certain playing cards and keeping the most significant part of our lives with one playing card. For an inperson show he puts seven playing cards into a small envelope, and attaches a tiny Sharpie, for each audience member.

Next was his "Albert Einstein card trick," another audience participation routine with playing cards. Each spectator memorizes a card, then mixes the packet and turns various cards face up or face down. Cards are discarded and after all the decisions the remaining card is the memorized one! Although the theme of this trick is different from Paradise Recovered, it is not advisable to present both in the same show since they are both packet tricks with the audience making decisions with the cards.

Larry also had helpful ideas for effective Zoom presentations. First are the aspects which include how you appear and sound, including backdrops, lighting, cameras and microphones. Then he covered the need to keep your energy level up and shared tips on how to do this. Additionally, he reminded us to keep our props and hands within the field of view.

He showed the wrist twist game, a fun audience participation effect. He has everyone in the audience stand up and put their right hand out, palm up. He then has them turn them palm down. It's the wrist which makes this possible, otherwise it's impossible – or is it? He showed us a fascinating way to do that with many arm movements he walks the audience through, winding up with all palms face down.

Just before wrapping up the lecture, Larry pointed us to his website, <a href="www.theoryandartofmagic.com">www.theoryandartofmagic.com</a>, as a place to obtain his books and recommended chapter 4 in Juan Tamariz's Magic Rainbow book as one of the most important chapters in all of magic. For his closer, he presented Wisdom, an oil and water effect which fools the audience, although it's performed in their hands. It appears in Juan Tamariz's Verbal Magic book, which contains many routines which play well for Zoom shows.

Larry's lecture provided many useful ideas and was filled with entertaining and informative effects. He achieved his goal of helping us make our own performances more impactful.


