

Jeffrey Marcus, 67, magician, hypnotist, dies from COVID-19

Jeff Marcus was 7 when his father gave him his first set of magic tricks, a gift that turned into a life passion. Growing up in suburban Chicago, he started putting on magic shows for family and friends at 10 years old. He spent hours fooling his younger brother, Mark, and their friends with card tricks, hocus-pocus charm and sleight-of-hand maneuvers.

That love of magic eventually led him to a 40-year career entertaining thousands in Southern California. Marcus, who mastered the art of stealing watches as a magic trick, was also a practicing hypnotist and professional clown who performed at events like the





Mother Goose Parade. He was a regular entertainer at private corporate events, at local schools and at the San Diego Zoo, Sea World and at the San Diego Fair/Del Mar Fair.

Unable to perform for crowds for many months because of COVID-19 restrictions, Marcus, who lived in Alpine, traveled in December with his wife, Peg, to see her children and grandchildren in Ohio. While on vacation, Jeff Marcus contracted the novel coronavirus, and passed away on Jan. 18, less than three weeks after being diagnosed, in a Toledo, Ohio, hospital. He was 67 years old.

Peg Marcus said that her husband lost his sense of taste and smell on Dec. 20, was tested for Covid-19 on Dec. 26, found out he was positive on Dec. 30 and was hospitalized on Dec. 31. She said that while her husband was a big man who had sleep

apnea, and was pre-diabetic, he had no other health complications.

"Jeff was one of those guys who would do magic for anyone at anytime, even if it was for a waitress at Denny's at 3 a.m.," said his friend, fellow magician Jeff Jay Smith, who lives in Indiana. "Jeff had an encyclopedic knowledge of magic with a reverence for the old timers and patience for newcomers. I had done magic as a young child and when I picked it up again as an adult, he encouraged me, gave me guidance and helped me become a professional magician myself."

Jeffrey Kimball Marcus was born Oct. 30, 1953, in Midland, Mich., to Stanley Allen Marcus and Beverle Fern (Horwitz) Miller, moving to Chicago with his mother when he was 2. Marcus moved to San Diego in January 1974 to major in telecommunications at San Diego State University.

While attending SDSU, he met his first wife, Sheila Albee, and the two married in 1979. Following a divorce, he married Peggy Ellen Mosley in 1989, and became a stepfather to Peggy Marcus's three children. The two lived in Santee for nearly 30 years, then moved to Alpine in 2016.

"Jeff loved people, most of all our family, and he never met a stranger," Peg Marcus said. "He was excellent at complimenting people, never failed to thank a veteran for serving our country, and frequently gave money to homeless individuals. I suffered from depression most of my life. Even though Jeff didn't fully understand, he did everything he could to learn about it, including taking classes through NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness. Always supportive and ever my champion, he stood by my side always."

Marcus was a longtime member of Hollywood's Magic Castle and the International Brotherhood of Magicians (IBM) Ring 76. He was also the Territorial Vice President of IBM. His friend Smith said that Marcus liked to travel every summer for the annual Magic Festival in Colon, Mich., known as the "Magic Capital of the World."



Smith said that even though the conference was cancelled last August because of Covid-19, he met Marcus there, and the two went to magic shops and "very respectfully" visited the Lakeside Cemetery in Colon, the final resting place for more than 30 magicians.

Local performers were also saddened by the loss of their colleague in the magic world.

"Jeff was a true professional and always a presence as a stand-up performer," said magician Dana Law of El Cajon. "He did a lot of corporate work and was extremely talented. And he was such a nice man."

Mark Miller, Jeff Marcus's brother, said he was glad the two became closer and saw each other more often when Miller moved from the Midwest to Arizona about six years ago. He said the void runs deep and that he will always remember his brother



as a kind man with a big heart, who always looked out for his little brother.

"I remember as kids we would get about 10 to 12 friends and go to Wrigley Field to see the Cubs," Miller recalled. "And they would always get rained out, so we would come back to the house and Jeff would put on a magic show. All my friends would say it was so cool. And I hated it! Of course when I became older, I would come to appreciate it so much. He was a great magician and a great performer. The magic world lost a great one."

Marcus was preceded in death by his father, Stanley Marcus, and leaves behind his mother, Beverle Miller; brother, Mark Miller; sister, Jennifer Marcus (Rajnik Raab); wife, Peg; stepchildren Dawn Burnett (Mike Birky), Dashelle Cranker (Mark) and Stan Applegate; six grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; two nephews and one niece.

Marcus's funeral was held on Jan. 25 and he was buried near his father at Westlawn Cemetery in suburban Chicago. No dates have been set but Peg Marcus said one or more celebrations of life for Jeff Marcus would be held in the near future.

This quote is from a website which considers this time period to be the "golden age of magic," coincidentally titled www.goldenageofmagic.com,

An argument can be made that, due to the high quality of so many of the recent top magical performances, we are in another golden age of magic.

Not only are there baffling, and more importantly, entertaining, magic acts, there are a lot of them. And featuring magicians from all over the world. With the use of the Internet, we can watch them from the comfort of our homes anytime we want. But with so many, how do you find the cream of the crop? That was the task for Joe Mystic for our January meeting, our first meeting devoted to showing videos of stellar magic.

He requested Ring 76 members to submit links to their favorite magic videos. Joe sifted through those performances, kept those which made the cut – in his opinion - and then added many of his own favorites. The result was some of the best of the best, which made for an enjoyable time for those members and guests who attended the Zoom meeting.

First up was Sean Farquhar on "Penn and Teller's Fool Us." His sealed deck containing Penn's signed, chosen card was an absolute mind-blower and was strong enough to be a fooler to Penn and Teller. Next was Lea Kyle on Fool Us, who performed an incredible quick-change act. It didn't fool Penn and Teller but it was still a stunner.



Then it was Eric Chien's turn from "Americas Got Talent." He seemed to be somewhat stage-struck initially but calmed down as he went along and turned in a terrific closeup performance where cards turned color, disappeared and changed into coins. It was a very clever act, unlike any other.



Then back to a Fool Us contestant, Kostya Kimlat, who is a close friend of Ring 76's own Josh Sherwin, who recently moved to Florida. He wowed everyone with a very smooth and deceptive card trick which certainly took years to master. The same can be said of Richard Turner's poker dealing performance which was next, also from "Fool Us." They didn't tell the audience but Mr. Turner is almost completely blind, which made his piece even more impressive.



David Copperfield performed the Floating Rose effect from one of his TV specials from the 1980s. I submitted this as my all-time favorite magic trick. It's



got everything: a simple plot (a napkin floats and animates, then is folded into a rose, which also floats and changes into a real rose), cool music, a lovely volunteer assistant and it's done completely surrounded by the audience. It definitely has the Copperfield touch. The quality of this video is not good but the strength of the performance more than made up for it.



Eric Mead on Fool Us showed how sleight of hand should be done, with his rendition of the classic cork and cylinder mystery. It was beautifully done and was a fooler. Alexandra Duvivier, also from Fool Us, fooled her hosts. Mark Booth pointed us to a behind-the-scenes YouTube clip which showed she initially didn't fool them, left the stage but the judges determined Penn and Teller's explanation was not complete enough so she had fooled them after all. They actually called her back onto the stage to refilm the ending, under the guise of a "technical problem" and she was surprised when they announced she did fool them.

Next up was the FISM performance of a Japanese magician named Den Den. Joe Mystic and Mike Stilwell saw this highly skilled card and paper crane manipulator perform at the Magic Castle and agreed his act was the best they had ever seen. The video quality was not up to snuff, but the magic



quality again made up for it. Then back to another Fool Us contestant, Danny Cole, who demonstrated a stack of wooden blocks had the ability to suspend in mid-air. This was a fooler not only for Penn and Teller but also for everyone else who saw it.

Paul Gertner was the first person to be asked to



appear on Fool Us three times. On this performance, he showed incredible skill by impossibly finding five people's selected cards on the top of each of five piles. As a kicker, he also revealed the bottom cards formed a straight flush. Next, the FISM entry by Rick Merrill stunned everyone with silky smooth sleight of hand which had no visible moves. A sharpie, pencil and coin visibly appeared, disappeared and changed



into each other. And this was without his wearing a jacket. This phenomenal performance won him first place in the international competition.

The last magician was Shin Lim. His ability to astonish people with a deck of cards has made him a household name and he consistently wows



magicians also. There have been 64 million YouTube hits of his first appearance on Fool Us. On this second performance he made the aces and queens visibly appear, disappear and the backs of the entire deck changed from red to blue, then became white and imprinted with "Did I Fool You?". The deck instantly appeared back in the box, then disappeared. What else to say about this? It was another fooler.

The feedback we received from our first video night was very positive. We found many more videos of top notch performances but didn't want to go on too long in one meeting. This is in keeping with the real first rule of magic: Always leave the audience wanting more.

You're going to have a lot of fun and you'll learn some practical magic you can do right away! Your show goes to a whole new level when you add in the funnies, a hilarious callback and end in a big way.

Matt Fore is a full-time comedy magician who has served as the main stage performer for corporate, association and faith-based events around the country for more than twenty-eight years. He has performed for Carnival Cruise Lines, the Magic Castle and has appeared on several national TV shows including The Crook & Chase Show on TNN, Fox Sports and

Swan's Place on Odyssey. He has also performed and lectured at numerous magic conventions.

Matt is the creator of "Killing It Onstage – How to Slay Your Audience with Comedy, Gags, Lines, Structure, Callbacks, Segues and a Big Finish," a course designed to help entertainers take their shows to new heights and is the founder of *The Entertainer's Marketing Academy* used by magicians around the country to grow their businesses step by step. In addition, Matt is a contributor to Success.com, Entrepreneur.com and is the author of two books, *The Five Essential Elements - A Simplified Road to Success* and *The Truth Shall Make You Laugh*.

Joe indicated that the balances match in the bank with the records.

Sergeant-at-Arms Report, David

<u>Chiu</u>: **David** indicated we had 19 members at the January meeting, with no guests present.

Library Report and Discussion, Gary

Salisbury: Gary donated a few audiobooks to the library/Plex server. There are 13 items out on loan and are pending the end of the Pandemic. Gary has been asking for book/video donations from magicians in online magic groups, and Lynn Stedd may have some items of Jack White's to donate. Gary also talked to Brad Burt about donations of books/videos. He asked for a consensus on opening the Plex Server to club members. David Chiu asked for any input as to navigation. Gary showed a diagram of the projected library and shelving, and he informed the club of a \$300 donation he received to be applied towards any expenses incurred on the library project or construction.

First VP of Entertainment, Greg Wauson: Greg and board members enjoyed the YouTube videos at the January meeting, and he would like to see some more attendees present at the next one. A thought for a future meeting is to play "Fooler" magicians from Penn and Teller, and then have a conversation or make guesses as to how it was accomplished. Board members liked this idea of collaboration.

Second VP (Membership), James Thayer: We have dropped to 53 members due to the unfortunate passing of lifetime member Jeff Marcus.

OLD BUSINESS

Richard Ustick thanked **Joe "Mystic" McGrievy** for helping with the January meeting, and he did a wonderful job managing videos.



NEW BUSINESS

Matthew King discussed the donated magic items he received which Robert Vinson had been storing. He showed a list and photos of the items inventoried so far and thanked Mike Stilwell for helping to organize, identify and photograph some of it. We discussed offering them to members first via the newsletter and e-mail before advertising on public auctions. Richard Ustick reminded the board he has the movie monster cutouts to sell, too. 



MAGIC BOOK REVIEWS

Here are reviews of the two audio books I donated this month from Goodbooks. Both of these audio books are on the PLEX server so you can listen to them on your smart phone.

Carter Beats the Devil (Audio Book)

by Glen David Gold

Charles Carter—a.k.a. Carter the Great—is a young master performer whose skill as an illusionist exceeds even that of the great Houdini. But nothing in his career has prepared Carter for the greatest stunt of all, which stars none other than President Warren G. Harding and which could end up costing Carter the reputation he has worked so hard to create. Filled with historical references that evoke the excesses and exuberance of Roaring Twenties, pre-Depression America, *Carter Beats the Devil* is a complex and illuminating story of one man's journey through a magical—and sometimes dangerous—world, where illusion is everything. (I love this audio book and recommend it highly.)

The Magician's Tale (Audio Book)

by David Hunt

When the police find the decapitated head of a young man with the body nowhere to be found, they are stunned. They begin to piece together the clues and soon find out that the head belongs to Tim Lovesey, a handsome prostitute who worked in the seedy section of San Francisco called Polk Gulch. In this sexually charged never-world, the police prefer to look the other way and chalk this up as another bizarre crime in an equally bizarre area of town, setting the premise for *The Magician's Tale*, one of the summer's most chilling thrillers.





Kay Farrow, a professional photographer who was working on a photo book about the hustlers in the Gulch, is the only person who seems to care about the grisly murder, and she proceeds to investigate further, hoping to get to the bottom of this strange crime. Kay, an achromat suffering from an extreme color blindness, possesses a unique vision that informs her world as well as sharpens her skills as a talented photographer.

During Kay's quest for justice, the search takes her back in time to an unsolved serial murder case. This case has many similarities to Tim Lovesey's murder, but the police proceedings are what strike closest to home with Kay. Her father was one of the officers on the case and due to police mistakes the case was never solved, resulting in Kay's father getting ousted from the police force. Kay's further investigation of the murder takes her to Tim Lovesey's "uncle," who tells her the interesting tale of Tim's magician past. Kay learns more about Tim's mysterious history and discovers how he was teamed with his twin sister in a magic act that lasted for most of their childhood.

Risking her life and everything she holds sacred, Kay must sort through the riddles of the past and present before she can uncover the truth in Tim's death. Along her search she faces potential mental and bodily harm as her colorless vision shows her shades of lust, greed, jealousy, and desire.

WHAT'S NEW AT THE LIBRARY?

Soliciting Library Donations On-line:

IBM Ring 76 Magic Media Server:

The IBM Ring 76 Magic Media Server project is one where we will have all the magic videos we legally own available to members for streaming via a PLEX media server. At last count, we had over 1,200 instructional and performance magic videos that will be available for viewing on the server.

The IBM Ring 76 Magic Media Server is up and running so if you would like to try it out, send an email to: librarian@ring76.com with your real email address (not your ring email address) requesting access. I will send you a PLEX invitation, which you will need to accept, in order to gain access. People who have tried it say it is nothing less than FANTASTIC!

Process:

Step 1:

1) Please provide me with your real email address and I will send an Invite to Join and Connect to the Plex Server. When you create your PLEX account access you should use the same email address.

Step 2:

You will receive an email inviting you Join view the IBM Ring 76 Magic Media Server.

Step 3:

Click on the link in the Invitation, "I accept the invitation"

You will then be at the Sign-In page:

If you have an existing account, you can use it to log in.

You can view from your PC, or you can also Install the Plex App and view from your smart device. You can also do both. The smart device would be useful for listening to audio files on the Plex server.
