October's Spooky Magic One for the Tombs

The Ring 76 meeting on October 9th was a performance night and the theme of the evening was "Spooky Magic."

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by President Josh Sherwin.
Thirty-one members and five guests were in attendance. The business meeting was brief: Next month's lecture will be Robert Baxt, Mark
Booth talked about the Holiday
Banquet Chili Cook-off, and the Ring was reminded that we are redesigning the Ring logo and are welcoming member input.



With that, the meeting was turned over to the Vice-President of Entertainment, Magic Mike Stilwell.

The first order of entertainment was an audition for membership by **Robert Budz**, who told of his early introduction into magic, his loss of interest, and his reintroduction to magic much later in life. He shuffled a deck of cards face up and face down, then removed the aces one at a time. He placed an ace face down on the table and changed it into another card with a wave of his hand. He did the same with the other aces, then, with a tap of his fingers, all the cards faced one way, except for the aces. At the conclusion of his act Robert was escorted out of the hall, the membership



voted, and Robert was made a member. Congratulations, Robert!

Nick Benevento was the first performer whose mystic ropes of two colors linked together and then magically separated with the appropriate incantation.

Steve Rowin was next on the stage in appropriate seasonal garb. He told of the historic Salem Witch Trials and his relationship to them. He produced an amulet that was capable of finding vampires. He called a

member of the audience (Gary Dismukes' daughter Katrina), who chose others from the audience. Steve then demonstrated how to identify the Nosferatu. Cards were given to the volunteers, who switched cards at will with other audience members. Katrina then took the amulet and gazed upon the group until she felt the vibrations. She only felt them when looking at Alvin Revilas. Sure enough, he was holding the vampire card and all the other cards were blank. Alvin received a coin 3D-printed just for the occasion.



Mark Booth told a story of a magician who belonged to a magic club and had a card trick which he wanted to make spooky. Laurie Pearson came up to help Mark. Each party shuffled a deck of cards

and did a you-do-as-I-do series of operations. After each step, they used bony little arms to press a button which caused a screech. After magic moves and magic gestures came the



revelation that both parties had produced the same card. He succeeded in making a card trick spooky.

With these on the table, Ms. Charley tried to contact the spirit of her friend to identify a selected card. Being spooky magic night, Ms. Charley's friend lent a hand and the card was identified.

Callahan from the Dark Side, in a black and red

robe, was our next performer. He appeared on stage known to all of us as Callahan from the Light Side but for tonight's performance he is Callahan from the Dark Side. He called on



Susan to once again assist. Fuego, the dragon of fire, appeared on Callahan's hand and addressed Susan asking for a pure thought. With a deck of cards split into body and soul and

the pumpkin head of the Halloween beast, Callahan from the Dark Side eventually found the card that Susan had chosen behind the glass of the rectory door.

Max with an X was next on the bill. He talked of a frail man

who was so weak that all he could do was put a key into his hand and watch it roll, which he demonstrated. Max then placed a blank deck into his pocket. He selected a woman who said her name is Alexa. He reached into his pocket and pulled out a card with Alexa printed on it. Again and again, as



people called out name, he produced a card which had that name on it. Max explained that the frail man asked for a bell to be tied to one of three ropes attached to a wooden block. This was to allow the spirits to answer questions. Max held up the block with the ropes and bell and the spirits answered with a ring of the bell, as well as moving the bell from one rope to

another.

to draw three X's. He then lit an electric candle and invoked voodoo but the spirits were against him and the



effect did not work. All magicians know of uncooperative spirits.

Vic Terrific was the last performer of the evening. After wishing everyone a happy Columbus Day he gave a PSA about candy, making sure it was well sealed off, as in his case it would turn into a Rubik's

Cube. Vic tried to produce a dove from an inflated paper bag but the flying feathers indicated it did not work as planned. He then inflated a balloon and had the spectators make a gun with their fingers. After the count of three, they said BANG! But again things did not work out as planned, to the amusement of the audience. Susan, it turns out, drew a card that said "Bat," and Vic pulled a big bat balloon from behind the curtain.

As this was a performance night, members voted on who they thought to be the best of the evening.

The meeting was then adjourned. Our next meeting will be on Monday, November 13th, and will feature a lecture by Robert Baxt. See you there.

Welcome to Ex Libris, my monthly newsletter article about the IBM Ring 76 Library in San Diego.

'Ex Libris' (Eh-cks LEE-breese), means 'From the Book.' Generally, you will see this term used on bookplates to denote that it came from the library of its owner. For example: "Ex Libris: Gary Salisbury."

Someone recently asked me, "What is the Ring 76 Library?" I responded, "It is currently over 1,000 volumes of magic books and over 2,000 magic magazines, all available for check-out. It is 180 magic audiobooks, 2,176 magic instruction videos, 25 full length magic movies, five albums of magic music (some royalty free), 1,719 magic performance videos (many classics), 10 podcasts (that we co-host), 13 magic TV series, a photo warehouse (where we will save all our Ring 76 activity photos) and all this is available for streaming from the Ring 76 Magic Media Server. It is also a museum for a collection of historic Ring 76 memorabilia from one of our founders, Honest Sid Gerhart. It is a magical learning source unparalleled in the entire IBM organization and it is funded totally from donations and fundraising efforts that I have engaged in for you."

Funding & Expenditures-----ON GOING



Escape!: The Story of the Great Houdini

Who was this man who could walk through brick walls and, with a snap of his fingers, vanish elephants? In these pages you will meet the astonishing Houdini—magician, ghost chaser, daredevil, pioneer aviator, and king of escape artists. No jail cell or straitjacket could hold him! He shucked off handcuffs as easily as gloves.





In this fresh, witty biography of the most famous bamboozler since Merlin, Sid Fleischman, a former professional magician,



enriches his warm homage with insider information and unmaskings. Did Houdini really pick the jailhouse lock to let a fellow circus performer escape? Were his secrets really buried with him? Was he a bum magician, as some rivals claimed? How did he manage to be born in two cities, in two countries, on two continents at the same instant?

Here are the stories of how a knockabout kid named Ehrich Weiss, the son of an impoverished rabbi, presto-chango'ed himself into the legendary Harry Houdini. Here, too, are rare photographs never before seen by the general reader!

HISTORICAL MAGIC TIDBITS

Houdini in San Diego

A vaudeville act that is without its equal in the world today has been secured for the Grand Theater. Harry Houdini, the noted handcuff and jail breaker, will give exhibitions of his skill here. -- San Diego Union, Oct. 5, 1907

In the fall of 1907, Harry Houdini, soon to be known as the world's greatest magician and escape artist, came to San Diego to display his skills before crowded theater audiences. It was the era of vaudeville in America and Houdini was a rising star in the popular variety entertainment field.

At age 33, Houdini was a show business veteran but fame had come slowly. After years of meager success as a magician in dime



museums and circus sideshows he began experimenting with escape stunts in the late 1890s. After a triumphant tour of Europe in 1900 he returned to America as a proven escape artist, able to defeat any form of confinement including handcuffs, leg irons, jail cells, and straitjackets.

Touring with the popular Orpheum vaudeville circuit, Houdini came to Southern California in September 1907. A successful three-week tour in

Los Angeles made him "the talk of the northern city." A new act featured a challenge from the U.S. Postal Service. Mail officials secured Houdini in an oversized leather mail pouch, fastened with government padlocks. The escape artist quickly foiled the locks and escaped, in full view of the audience.

A more spectacular feat was performed outdoors before an estimated 5000 spectators. With his legs in chains and his hands manacled behind him, Houdini leaped from the roof of a pavilion into the reservoir of Westlake Park (known today as McArthur Park). After two minutes of suspense, Houdini bobbed to the surface free of his shackles.

A similar stunt was promised for San Diego, when the newspapers announced that "the Handcuff King" was coming to the city for a three-night engagement at the Grand Theatre on Fifth Street. Advertising proclaimed that Houdini, "absolutely the greatest act in vaudeville today," would "dive, handcuffed, from top of Spreckels' bunkers" into San Diego Bay at the foot of G Street.

The Houdini show at the Grand began on Monday night, October 7. In addition to the star attraction, the show offered "the usual good bill of vaudeville." The warm-ups acts included a "clever monologist" who sang and told jokes; a "champion trumpeter" who drew applause for his patriotic numbers; and music and comedy from the Gilman sisters.

Following the other performers, Houdini took the stage for a one-hour performance. Before a sellout crowd, Houdini began his act by demonstrating how simple handcuff escapes were performed. He

Will dive, handraffed, from top of Spreekels' bunkers Manday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Prices-50c, 75c, \$1.00 and \$1.50. then invited a committee of local police and county officials to take part in his show.

Police Chief William Neely and three of his officers, along with District Attorney Lewis Kirby and several county officials, mounted the stage. Using San Diego police property, "they manacled the magician's hands and feet with cuffs, leg irons and shackles of every description, then guarded the tiny cabinet in which he

released himself." It took Houdini six minutes to free himself of every shackle.

Houdini concluded his show with the "stellar act of the evening," a straitjacket escape in full view of the theater audience. Four policemen strapped the jacket on and "exhorted themselves to the upmost in drawing up all of the buckles as tight as they could be drawn." As the audience shouted, "He'll never get out of that!" and "They've got him now," Houdini writhed and twisted until he managed to raise his hands above his head and unfasten the buckles. An uproar of applause greeted him as he threw off the jacket.

For the final night of the engagement, Houdini invited four employees of Marston's Department Store to nail him in a shipping case and then nail ropes around it. As usual, the magician escaped with apparent ease.

Regrettably, Houdini left town without performing the advertised underwater escape in San Diego Bay. For reasons unknown (or at least unreported), the plan for a handcuffed Houdini to jump from the Spreckels wharf into the bay never occurred.

In the next few years, the fame of Harry Houdini grew quickly as his escape acts became more challenging and "death-defying." He became the highest paid act in vaudeville and eventually created his own, hugely successful evening show. Houdini never performed again in San Diego and died on Halloween in 1926, of acute peritonitis, at age 52.





New Logo Design Sought

Perform a magic trick for the audience, including two pre-selected judges. The judges then put their heads together for a brief time to come up with the most likely method of how the effect was

accomplished. If the judges are incorrect, you have fooled them and you win a beautiful plaque created by our own Gary Salisbury. If the judges are correct and you did not fool them, you pay \$100. Ok, just kidding about that part. The point is you can win something and there's no risk to lose anything!
