
# IBM INTEREST IS REALLY PICKING UP IN S. DIEGO

# AUGUST MEETING (continued)

The short business meeting highlighted the tremendous contribution of member Frank Syren. Frank has some great ideas for improving MAGICUR-RENTS, and a beautiful desk-top-publishing program which will do incredible things for us.

The Orange County Magic Club's August Swap Meet was announced, and travel arrangements to the September Ring 76/Ring 96 Exchange Banquet/Dinner Show were discussed.

Joe Bertuzzi, California Territorial Vice President, took the floor and shared some of the thoughts and tentative plans for the up-coming Sixty First IBM Convention in July'89, stressing that the more early registrations we get, the better the entertainment budget. He also presented several ideas for local Ring support of the convention and announced a visit by the Convention Committee in January. Joe fielded many questions about the convention, and I promptly ran out of Convention Applications during the break. REMEMBER - the Convention fee is sixty dollars for members and eighty five dollars for non-members (which includes IBM membership and a year's subscription to the linking ring). Joe then took a moment to announce the three newest IBM Territorial Representatives from our area and presented formal certificates to George Edwards, Jim Riley, and Mike Stilwell. Three perfect choices since all are avid magic supporters and dedicated IBM'ers.

Mike Stilwell conducted our monthly

raffle with over twenty great prizes which included a vintage bottle of Napa Valley's finest (a visitor type prize which got away from me in spite of a twenty buck investment in raffle tickets - WELL IT WAS A COLLECTABLE!), and some of the newest items from his Bumper & Company line.

Your Favorite Trick or Routine night entertainment started with SE.4 WORLD magician Steve Sloan doing Quadriflex, a mismade folding bill effect which he did cleanly and to perfection. Steve also gave us a nice mini-lecture on paddle trick adaptions, which he uses to great success with children and adults, on the street on a daily basis. He employs Craft-Stix, felt tip markers and glue to create on-the-spot paddle tricks using topical themes from video games, Saturday morning TV shows, movies breakfast show and commercials. Another example of fresh insights applied to old props. He drives the kids nuts with his COOTIE paddle, which he can change almost hourly as he goes his rounds at SEA WORLD. Joe Mystic did a beautiful version of Bottleneck, a bottled silk escape which is over twenty five years old and not seen that often. Joe uses an extra large drinking glass, vice the Hottle bottle, and two large contrasting silks to create a very nice mystery.

Loch Crane gave us a lengthy, but fun, Cards Across effect, complete with sound effects and much audience participation.

Cal Mayers showed us more of his card work with a somewhat confused, but entertaining four chosen card effect involving two aces and two jokers with a turnover revelation which finally worked. It elicited lots of criticism, constructive and otherwise, but it was well-intentioned and lots of fun - WELL, what better place to PRACTICE!

Local and sole magic dealer, Brad Burt, brought us another hot item from his shop: his very new age Cystal Prism card revelation, which can display not one, but three different chosen cards. Very classy, and very appropriate to the times - Well, I think so. I bought one the next day, and it's not even a collectable.

Old friend, and mentalist, Paul Barton, performed a hi-tech, and very skillful, elevator card effect with

red sixes and red eights; clean, straight forward, and with many a gasp at the finish. Nice, very nice!

Terry Runyon, one of our guests from the North County group, did a very workable presentation of the classic Capper, Silver, Brass Cain Routine, nicely shortened and very slick. Newcomer, Wayne Albert, drew a few initial Ho-Hum's when he announced his Houdini Mail Bag, but had most of us on our feet at the end of a very showy, quick and effective escape from a modern-day, regulation Mail Bag; right under our noses and behind his own very functional/portable screen - IT WAS GOOD and fooled many. Instant IBM Qualification for another example of a classic big stage trick gone Clase-Up. WELL DONE Wayne! Come back and bring more.

Jim Riley did his very droll and funny version of the Caveney Linking Coat Hangers with his own bits and many granners thrown in. (I guess you can come back too, Jim.)

Dave Lambert did a mini-lecture on Uri Gellerism and proceeded to fool us, a la Randy, with watch hand turning, spoon bending and spoon melting. Very

nicely done!

Art Judge gave us an improved version of his *Installation Dinner* rope routine with sliding and vanishing knots, and a beautiful cuttrestored finish which brought a few OOOH's and AAAH's.

Mark Dimenstain showed us a new COSMAR MAGIC item: a feather plume to silk item which looks great.

Mike Stilwell blew us away with a very, very clean and impossible double-deck prediction and reversed card revelation, which is NOT on the market.

Dick Dale brought his pet skunk, Orea, who does funny/corny impressions as Jaws, Kathy Rigby, Michael Jackson, et al.

Lastly, guest James Swoger, who has moved to California from his House of Enchantment in Pennsylvania, did some incredible open-hand coin manipulation which brought many a gasp. THANKS JAMES and WELCOME to California; it was an extra nice finish to another great meeting.

# Personality of the Month



For our new feature, PERSONALITY OF THE MONTH, it is fitting that we have chosen one of our most senior and most venerable members. He is also one of the most colorful, which was no small factor in our making the selection. George Edwards is a genial, sly wizard who has captivated just about every one of us at some time or another, whether with his ring on the rope or, perhaps, his unusual and fiendishly clever four ace routine. George believes what his first teacher and long time friend taught him long ago. "The method is unimportant. It is the effect that counts, and however you achieve it doesn't matter." (Short of mayhem we suspect.) It is with the source of that quote that our story begins.

George's father was in the British army during the first World War when George was born. The year was 1916 and the place was Liverpool, England. Shortly afterwards George's father was wounded and sent to a hospital in France. In the next bed was a man who would change George's life. His name was Dick Pitchford, and he and Mr. Edwards became good friends although, as often happens, they lost contact with one another when they were "demobbed".

It was many years later, when George was about eight, that Dick Pitchford turned up again. Mr. Edwards, who had opened a pub in Liverpool after the war, had taken his wife to the theater. There was a magician on the bill who turned out to be non other than Dick Pitchford, Mr. Edward's old war buddy. Naturally Edwards went backstage to meet his old friend, and of course, invited him home. Thus did George meet Dick Pitchford.

From then on whenever Dick Pitchford played Liverpool, which was a regular stop on the music hall circuit, he stayed at the Edwards'; becoming, in affect, a dear relative. In fact, little George always addressed him as "Uncle Dick". Uncle Dick became particularly fond of the boy and undertook to teach him a few tricks. Is it any wonder that such a bright and imaginative boy quickly became a student of magic?

Later on Pitchford went to Australia and, as George said, "kind of disappeared out of our lives.

"Years later he resurfaced," George continued," but of course he wasn't Pitchford anymore. He was Cardini. In the meantime I had gone off to sea, and New York was like a second home to me, and he was living in New York. Of course he wasn't there vey often. Whenever he was, though, when I was in port, I used to visit with him. After the second war when he was getting older and not traveling so much I used to visit with him quite often. It was amazing the people I met there. There was Dai Vernon,

Mr. Craig, and you name 'em. Everybody went to Cardini. He never went to anybody."

George was a good student in school. He didn't abandon all else to concentrate on magic, as many of us have done. He attended the Alfred Street School for the primary grades and Saint Margaret's Higher Grades School for the upper grades. Naturally, he frequently entertained his fellow students with magic, but he also found time to play soccer for Saint Margaret's.

He didn't forget magic, however, soon seeking out the local magic shop, an establishment on Moor Fields Street in Liverpool known as the WIZARD'S DEN. There was a club associated with the shop, also known as the WIZARD'S DEN, which became the first of George's many magic clubs.

In his last year at Saint Margaret's he passed the qualifying exams and was accepted for admission to Oxford University. However, since he was only fourteen, he would not have been able to actually enter for four years, when he became eighteen. To fill this hiatus George announced to his family that he would "like to see the world."

"If you're going to see the world you might as well get paid for it," said his father, and contacted a friend with the Cunard Line where Mr. Edwards had worked before the First War. Thus came about the second major event in George Edward's life. He went to sea as a bell boy on the Cunard Line's Samana.

The course of the boy's life was set. He spent thirty two years with the Cunard organization, rising from bell boy to Chief Steward on the first Queen Mary, supervising one thousand employees serving sixteen thousand meals a day. As Chief Steward he wore three stripes on his sleeve.

In 1947 George and Olive Mary Wood were married and the couple set up

housekeeping in Liverpool. In 1949 they were blessed with a baby boy, Robert Andrew, and in 1956 their daughter, Diane, was born.

In the course of his career George circled the world eleven times, attended and graduated from L'Ecole De Cordon Blue in Paris, attained a fellowship from the Hotel and Catering Institute in London, became an associate of Societe de Gastronomes, Paris, and a member of the Guild of Sommeliers, Paris and London. During World War II he served in the Scottish Highlanders.

In 1962 George decided that the future of the great liners was dismal. Why should people take five days to cross the Atlantic when the great jets could make the trip in a few hours. He had visited San Diego in his travels and knew that "we have the greatest climate in the world." Olive had a sister here, and the family visited with her while George got established in America's finest city.

Now retired, George has been an outstanding Restaurateur and Chef de Cuisine in San Diego, serving in several fine clubs such as the San Diego Yacht Club, the Southwestern Yacht Club and The Singing Hills Country Club in El Cajon. He has also served as executive chef in several well known restaurants in the area. Unfortunately, many commercial establishments have been willing to pay George a generous salary to set up their restaurants, create their menus and establish a clientele. When business was booming, however, they often sought to enhance profits by hiring a less expensive chef to replace George. They always retained the menus though.

George has been a faithful member of Ring 76 since 1969. Only Jim Riley precedes him in seniority. He has held every office in the ring, some several times - he can't remember all the years. In addition to Ring 76 he is a member of The Order of Merlin, the exclusive Magic Circle in London and the even more exclusive Inner Circle,

the International Guild of Predidigitators, the Supreme Magician's Club, and The Invisible Lodge.

Most of his magic is performed for charitable organizations these days. He loves doing close-up magic and magic for children. A paticular favorite of his is the Special Olympics where he did a show recently.

George has not been alone in his service to Ring 76. Olive is also a member and has served as Second Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor and Ring Report correspondent to the Linking Ring. She also served as President of the Magigals Chapter which was once sponsored by Ring 76.

Diane Edwards was active with the Junior Magicians when she was a child and once won second prize in the Junior Magician of the Year contest.

Altogether a very magical family!
