Personality of the Month

It is appropriate that we honor the president of our Ring early in this series,; particularly since he has been with us only a little more than a year and a half, and many of us have had little chance to get to know him. Of course we know he is a charming, skilled, and very professional entertainer; but, to my pleased surprise, it turns out that he has had a most amazing and varied career.

Dick Dale was born in Duluth, Minnesota on November twenty second, 1939. The family soon moved to Waukesha, Wisconsin where his father founded Date Cherrolet Dick grew up in a household where

automobiles and automobile sales was the bread of life. His interest in magic sprouted early. His mother says he was five although Dick's earliest magical memory is three years later. In any case his father, who had a fledgling interest in magic, often brought home pocket tricks and novelties to intrigue his precoclous son. The bug bit.

At the age of eight the youthful presdidigitator organized and promoted a neighborhood circus which garnered newspaper coverage, was well received, and *made a profit* As he recalls, he performed the *EASY HAT LOADER* and the *MILK PIT-CHER* in the show.

The Great Blackstone came to town the next year, and Dick was taken to see the Master at the Riverside Theater in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Thus was the seed - planted earlier by his father and the pocket tricks - nurtured and set. To this day he can remember details of that show.

There was no magic club in Waukesha, but there was a magic store, BOB'S MAGIC SHOP, later to become AEST FOR FUN. The proprietor, Don Lamb, became a good friend and remains so to this day. It was his guidance that led Dick to the magic suitable for his age and experience.

Then, to put it in Dick's own words, "Somehow I got connected with Lawton." Don Lawton lived in Wisconsin In those days. He later moved to St. Louis, and then to L.A. to become a host at the castle. Dick says, "His humor was my kind of humor - the corny, and the puns, and the plays on words and all - that's why I appreciate him so much. I've got his books. I've got his video tape. We've corresponded over the years. I've got a Lawton file that I treasure." This was the third major influence on Dick's magical life.

in 1957 he graduated from Waukesha High. He had worked at his Dad's dealership after school and during vacations, and it was natural that he should have developed an interest in GENERAL MOTORS IN-STITUTE, later known as GMI, in Flint Michigan.

Despite the common misconception that "any dealer's son can get into GM, the college was independent and maintained high academic standards. However, Dick was an excellent student and was easily accepted. GAM used a cooperative program whereby students spent work periods in an industry related to their discipline, interspersed with their academic studies. As a result it took a chronological five year period to complete four years of academic work. The benefits are obvious, not the least of which was the regular salary earned. Dick's assignment was to the Chevrolet Division of General Motors. He was to spend the next nine and a half years there.

in Flint Dick had his first opportunity to join a magic club, the FLINT MAGIC CLUB, an offshoot of which was RING 36, THE H. LEONARD EVA RING. Dick says, "Leonard was the dean of Michigan magicians. He would be like Al Knox was to San Diego. He was a very

dear friend who has since passed away. I have most of his magical estate." Dick remained an active member of Ring 36 until he came to San Diego, nearly thirty years later. He served two terms as president, the last one in 1986, just before he left. If you will look at the March, 1987 issue of THE LINKING RING you can read of the sorrow with which Ring 36 bid him farewell. As was implied above, Dick remained with Chevrolet after graduating with honors from GMI in 1963 with a BS in Industrial Engineering. His progress was nothing short of meteoric. He started on the production line and rose to become the youngest General Foreman in the history of the company. But the relentless, grinding repetition soon became boring to a gifted, imaginative individual like Dick. His interest in magic never slackened, and by this time he was working professionally; but he had other interests as well. With his entire life closely ailied to the automotive industry he naturally was interested in cars: working on cars, driving cars, and finally racing cars. There was a race track in Flint, and he began working in the pits and driving race cars. In the Indys type races the pit stops are of crucial importance, and Dick's specialty, as a pit man, became fuel. "We got so proficient we could load forty gallons of fuel into a car in sixteen seconds." Dick rarely uses the pronoun "I". In all, Dick spent sixteen years involved in this activity, serving drivers such as Dale Earnhardt, Richard Petty, and the Unser brothers, Bobby, Jerry and Al. He also found time for some drag racing and, another significant activity, slot-car racing.

Most of us don't even know that slot-cars were ever important enough to engage adults in racing them professionally. Dick traveled all over the country doing just that. What's more, he and a partner opened two hobby shops primarily devoted to slotcars. Starting out as a part time business, the shops grew until Dick was finally able to leave General Motors.

The shops prospered for several years, and then the partners saw that interest in the fad was slackening. They had been prescient enough to see the future early and sold the shops for a good price. As our story progresses you will see that Dick possessed the essential attribute for most of life's successes: A good head for business.

Dick has had four children. The first, Scott, was a career soldier in the Airforce who was drowned in a cruel accident several years ago. Next, came a girl, Michelle, who is married and practicing medicine in Chicago. A third child, Lori, is a student in the College of Pharmacy at the University of Michigan. More about the fourth, Erica, later.

After the hobby shops, Dick started a new phase in his life. He went into sales. When asked if he found that difficult, after the highly technical life he had led heretofor, he said, "I come from a sales oriented family. It was in my blood. I enjoyed it very much. I sold light industrial equipment; loaders, backhoes, that sort of thing. I became quite proficient demonstrating most of the equipment. I worked my way up to sales manager and even won a trip to Las Vegas." Dick spent several years selling, but then it was time for the next amazing facet of his career. He became a jewler.

A friend of his, who operated a jewelry store, was looking for help. As Dick says, "I'd never done it, but I was good with my hands, creative, engineering background; all things you can put to use. I set diamonds, created designs. In fact I created Julie's wedding band; carved it in wax, cast it, set the stone, the whole job." He worked as a jeweler for eight or nine years during which time he was doing graduate work at the University of Michigan and Centrel Michigan University culminating in a Specialist Masters Degree in Educational Administration.

Then he became an educator, starting out as a vocational instructor in the local high

school in Flint. This was in 1977. He eventually became director of Vocational Education. In 1984 he was offered the position of Regional Manager in Student Recruiting at his old Alma Mater, GMI.

You can almost see all the pieces coming together. The many years of industrial and technical experience, the public relations value of his years in magic, the lifetime sales background; all seemed to contribute perfectly to a vocation of student recruiting for a technical institute. After about a year he was promoted to Director of Admissions at GMI.

In addition, Dick was, for six years, Director of Entertainment for HISTORI-CAL CROSSROADS VILLAGE, a theme park in Flint. The park operated for a fifteen week season during the summer. Dick and his company did five magic shows a day, seven days a week during this period, completely changing the show every season.

In his own words, "That was a really good way to get an act tight. So I've got six tight, firm acts that I can do. Anything from 'cutting in half' to coin ladders, to a medicine pitch, to a Chinese Act and more. I've got all the wardrobe, all the equipment, everything that's needed. We had fourteen employees and a fifty six thousand dollar budget each season. Decent situation. Not a small time operation."

One anecdote from those days bears repeating. During the fourth show, on one of those hectic days, Dick was doing a rope trick before two hundred and fifty people when he suddenly discovered he had cut off the tip of his left thumb. With the help of the park docter he made it to the fifth show, however, his first trick required a thumb tip on his left thumb, which was already occupied by a voluminous bandage. He managed to make the tip work on his first finger and got through the show, but from then on, whenever he did a rope trick at the magic club his peers would solemnly warn him to, "Cut the white - not the pink!"

DALE (Continued)

Several years ago the Dale family entered the magic contest in JOE STEVEN'S DESERT SEMINAR. There were two hundred entrants among whom thirty were chosen to perform. The Dales were the opening act on the first night at THE FRONTIER. They had chosen to do their black art act. The act is titled "THE WIZARD OF AAHS" and, naturally, uses musical themes from the motion picture of a similar name. It is unique and worthy of an extended description.

At the curtain Dick is found frozen in position in a picture frame of light. He is dressed in white and in "white face", leaning on his cane. When he comes into motion he goes into a standard dancing cane routine for about twenty seconds. Suddenly the cane splits into two canes. One of them gets away from him, and he puts the other down to pursue the escapee. As he grasps at it, it suddenly turns into a broom and the music segues into the witch music. The recalcitrant broom continues to evade him, flying about the stage and, occasionally, buzzing him like an angry hornet. He, finally, manages to get hold of it, whereupon it changes back to a cane.

He puts this cane down and mimes catching an object in space. With mime he indicates that the object is an invisible cube. He carefully places the cube upon the flat of his outstretched hand. As he withdraws the hand the cube becomes visible, suspended in space, then begins to grow until it changes into a miniature white house which spins in the vortex of a magical tornado as the cyclone music segues in. The house lands with a bone shaking thud on the stage floor. The wizard politely knocks on the house door whereupon the roof flies open and out steps his daughter, Erica, as Dorothy.

The first time they ever did the act, a magician, who was running lights from the booth, and had actually been at rehearsals, was heard to say, "(Expletive deleted)! Where the hell did that kid come from?" We trust he caught himself moments later.




degree - Ring 36's loss, and our GAIN.
