
And Please, PLEASE, PLEASE, folks, check your address listing on the

BOARD MEETING

The Board (a nice large quorum this time - thanks folks) met on April third with Dick DALE, Mike STILWELL, J.P.JACK-SON, Ed RAYMOND, Sherry LUFT, Ed FOR-SYTHE. Mark DIMEN-STAIN. and Harry HARTMAN present. In accordance with the By-Laws, the Board discussed recommendations for changes to the annual dues. A brief review of the Ring's fiscal year prompted the Board to approve a one dollar increase in annual dues for the coming 89/90 membership year. Effective April Third, 1989, annual dues are now twelve dollars. Members who have already paid in advance will not be charged the one dollar increase. For information, general approximately nine dollars of the annual dues covers printing newsletter and postage costs.

The Board reviewed those articles of the By-Laws concerning Honorary Memberships and examined criteria for such designation. The status and proposed continuation of existing Honorary Members was also discussed and reviewed without

resolution. The topic will be researched and continued at the next Board Meeting.

The Board examined the elegibility of possible candidates for office for the coming elections and disrecommendations cussed to be submitted to the Nominating Committee at the April Tenth Meeting. Second Vice President Ed FORSYTHE, by unanimous opinion, was selected to serve on the Board Directors for the coming year. His matriculation will create a vacancy in the office of Second Vice President for which there are no known candidates. The Second Vice President is the Ring's Membership Chairman and is primarily responsible for promoting Membership growth. The Board and the Nominating Committee will readily accept the nomination of candidates for this office or the application of members themselves, seeking this election to office. Contact any Ring Officer or member of the Nominating Committee (George EDWARDS, VI FREE-LAND, or Jim RILEY) if you know of a good candidate for Second Vice President, or wish to announce your own candidancy. The next Board Meeting will be on May First at Dick DALE's home.

That song was written many years ago by A. Seymour Brown just for a little girl who was born Jeanne Jacqueline Willardson in Caribou, Maine, and who now lives in San Diego, CA. She happened, however, to be the daughter of Howard Franklin Thurston, one of the greatest magicians of this or any century, and Brown was a famous songwriter whose credits included

the 1911 hit song, OH. YOU BEAUTIFUL DOLL. JANE ("Jane Girl" as Thurston, her adoptive father, preferred to call her) was born to show business. Her mother, Nina Leotha Fielding, had been one of the famous Floridora Sextette before joining the Thurston show, and Jane had been little more than a toddler when Leotha married Thurston. From as long as Jane can remember Howard kept assuring her "someday, if you like, you can join me in the show." Her entire life was pointed toward that objective.

Of course, at first Jane was too young to travel with the troupe, and she stayed in a convent in Baltimore, a "nunnery" as she used to refer to it. And when she became of school age she was enrolled in RAYSON, a private school for girls in New York City. In addition to her regular school work she was given singing lessons, elocution lessons, dramatic lessons and, of course, dancing lessons. One of her dancing instructors was Bill "Bojangles" Robinson who taught at his own exclusive dancing academy. She was one of only about five white pupils enrolled there.

Another of her schools was Ned Wayburn's. Everyone in show business went there; People like Marilyn Miller and Ann Pennington. And, of course, when summer came, Howard and Leotha came home. Thurston had bought a house in Beechurst, Long Island, right across the street from the former home of THE GREAT HERRMANN, his hero and inspiration in magic. As a boy he had seen the Herrmann show in Albany N.Y. on his way from the MT. HERMAN SCHOOL in Massachusets to the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia where he was going to study for the ministry. He had had an overnight layover in Albany and, after seeing the show, spent the night wrestling with the desire to become a magician rather than a minister. By morning he had firmly resolved to stay with the ministry, gone to the ticket office in the railroad station and asked for a ticket for Philadelphia. However, when it came time to board the train he discovered he'd mistakenly been given a ticket for Syracuse, the destination of the Herrmann company. Responding to destiny, he boarded the train, even investing in a Pullman ticket so he could sit and watch Herrmann throughout the trip. He, apparently, expected the great man to constantly perform magic. Of course, he was disappointed, but his feet



were firmly planted on the path he would follow for the rest of his life. One of the highlights of each summer at Beechurst was a benefit which was was held on the Thurston lawn at the end of the season. Many of their neighbors participated: people like Harry Richmond, Ann Pennington and OLSEN and JOHNSON, the stars of the future, long running super-hit, HELLZAPOPPIN: When Leotha and Howard were married the magic in the show was first class, but the staging was old fashioned. With her Broadway experience she gradually modernized the scenery, the lighting and the staging, besides generally tightening up the performance. She set up a two pronged program to catch and eliminate "glitches", stage waits, and other similar defects in the show. At every performance she sat in the audience with a clipboard noting every incidence where improvement was needed. In addition a prop

table was set up down in one with a pad and a pencil attached with a string. Every member of the company was enjoined to note any untoward event on their way off the stage. Immediately after the show a critique was held right on the stage. Thurston would chair the meeting and every note on the pads would be discussed and remedies and improvements were solicited from the entire company. Only then were they free to go out to supper or to bed, as they chose.

Such careful attention to detail was especially important in a large show, and the Thurston show may have been the largest magic show ever to go on the road. Although Thurston advertised himself as Kellar's successor, a privilege he had gained back in 1908 when in a ceremony in the old Ford Theater in Baltimore Kellar had formally "turned the mantle over to Howard, he had retained very few of the original effects. Kellar had featured only four or five major illusions whereas Thurston featured no less than eighteen. The scenery and equipment required three railroad box cars, and there was a company of forty, plus livestock.

Jane made her debut on the show in September of 1928. As she says in a tape made some time ago, she isn't sure who was more nervous, she or her father. Her performance began with the song, "MY DADDY IS A HOCUS-POCUS MAN"; the first stanza of which heads this article. The first season she did five minutes in each of the three acts, the next season ten, and from then on, in her own words, "a whole lot more". One of her favorite illusions was one that was called the "CREO" illusion on the show; the creation of a live woman from a plaster head and a flowing gown, apparently in full view of the audience. Her patter included the phrases, "A rag, a bone and a hank of hair - create the lady who does not care." Another great favorite was "BLACKART", which she did with Herman HANSEN. One amusing incident about the show which Jane likes to tell is the story of Lord Pickwick. Lord Pickwick was a monkey. Not the only monkey on the show by any means, but the pet of the company, particularly Jane's mother. The wardrobe mistress made special clothes for him: little jackets, trousers and hats so that he always looked very "spiffy". He also got the impression that he owned the show. Whenever he made his appearance from his production box (which was his "job" on the stage) he came out chattering, talking as the company referred to it. After having his say to Thurston from the vantage of the magician's arms, he would begin searching the audience for Leotha. Since the glare of the spotlight blinds anyone trying to see the audience he would use his little hand to shade his eyes which would dart all over the theater. When he spotted his quarry he would make a lunge to get out of Thurston's grip, and if he weren't securely held, leap across the stage, scale the orchestra pit with one jump, and take the most direct line to his beloved - even if it included the tops of the heads of members of the audience. The experience must have been quite traumatic for some of the more timid spectators. Once in Leotha's arms he would nestle down contentedly and begin a stacatto conversation with her, presumably telling her all about it. There he would remain until an usher was dispatched to capture him and return him to his cage backstage.

Another incident, which was a source of great merriment for the entire cast, occurred at one of the show's Chicago engagements. Werner "Dornie" Dornfield, a well known Chicago magician for many years, was a great friend of Thurston's, and the two loved to exchange practical jokes at one another's expense. One of the illusions on the show was "THE VANISHING WHIPPET". (The Whippet was a popular model automobile of the day.) The trick required Jane to drive the car (adorned with a bevy of showgirls) onto the stage whereupon her father would make it disappear. While the car was still offstage Dornie slipped into the front seat beside Jane. When Howard first beheld the car he could see that there was someone other than a showgirl in the front seat, but he couldn't see who it was. In the true show business tradition he wasted no time investigating, but expeditiously vanished the car - Dornie and all.

Despite all the travels and the busy, busy work of putting on such a large show, Jane thinks of the next six years as the happy days. However, in April of 1934 she lost her mother, and on Oct sixth, 1935, Howard had a crippling stroke on the stage of the Kearse Theater in Charleston, West Virginia. Jane and Herman Hansen, Thurston's stage manager, continued the show for the rest of the season, honoring the contracts which had been signed, but it was the end of an era. The show played no more at the end of the 1935/1936 season, and Thurston, himself, passed away on April 13, 1936.


