There will be no registrations at the door. However, there always a few convention "No-shows", so you may have a tiny chance to get registered on somebody's cancellation if you show up bright and early on the fifth of July with cash in hand and GET IN LINE. (Eleven years ago the line was over a block long; but I did get in - good seats too.)

The CMINI HOTEZ is also booked solid, but THE WESTGATE HOTEZ is taking the overflow at the same Convention special rate. NOW, that's a great dead.



The Board met on May first with Dick DALE, Mike STILWELL, J.P.JACK-SON, and Sherry LUFT. T.V.P Joe BERTUZZI also joined us for a review of Convention Activities planning and action items. Honorary Memberships for Helen HIESHETTER, Mary MAR-TINEZ and Ethyl BERWIN were reviewed and re-affirmed by unanimous vote. One additional Honorary Membership is still under consideration. A letter from Bill WELLS, the Convention Committee Publicity and Program Chairman, provided advertising rates for the sixty first IBM Convention Program. Bill also indicated that it is customary for the local, host ring to take an ad in the program The Board voted to take out a full page (8-1/2x11) at a cost to the ring of two hundred dollars, which will list all members of RING 76 under a "WEL-COME TO SAN DIEGO" message. (Better get those dues in soon if you want to see your name in the convention program.) Sherry LUFT will coordinate our ad sales campaign assisted by Bob IN-GALLS and J.P.JACKSON.

At the suggestion of Ed MORRIS, the International President, and Joe BERTUZZI the Board voted to undertake the production of a benefit magic show at a local children's hospital the night before the convention starts in an effort to publicize the convention and RING 16. V.P.Mike STILWELL will head the Show Committee, place to be determined, and will be looking for performers.

During the business portion of the next regular meeting, on May fifteenth, the Nominating Committee (George EDWARDS, Vi FREELAND, and Jim RILEY) will present their recommendations for new Ring Officers to the membership, and then open the meeting for nominations from the floor. The

Board proposes that, if the slate is accepted with no additional nominations and, if the membership concurs, elections may also be conducted, time permitting. If not, elections will be the subject of the June meeting on the nineteenth.

Next Board meeting will be at Dick DALE's home on Monday, June fifth.

At the age of nine Frank read a JERRY TODD adventure novel in which the hero, Jerry, and his friends rigged an old scow up with a stage and put on a black art show, which they ferried from town to town along the canals which criss crossed New York state. With this inspiration he discovered the 798.3 shelf at the public library from which he read everything from Hoffman to C. Lang Neal's MODERN CONSUROR. John Mulholland was on the library's advisory staff and Poughkeepsie was Al Baker's home town so the library tended to have a generous collection of magic books.

Poughkeepsie was not as remote from New York City as the seventy five mile distance might suggest. Frank's father worked for the railroad and the boy had accest to a free pass. The journey to New York, the mecca for all magicians in those days, was less than a two hour trip and *Max Holden's Magic Shop* was about two and one half blocks from Grand Central Station.

The Hermanns moved to Detroit when Frank was eighteen. To satisfy his family he got a daytime job as a shoeclerk in Motor City and worked nights at some, of what Frank typifies as, "simply terrible" beer joints and burlesque houses. Scale in the beer joints was four dollars per night and the management wanted three shows each evening.

Then one of the top acts of the day, RUSSELL SWAN, THE MAGIC MAN, was booked into the BOOK CADILLAC HOTEL. Swann had been featured at the WALDORF ASTORIA in New York City and THE WALTON ROOF in Philadelphia, but did not do much sleight of hand or manipulation and Frank, had never heard of him. {Another case of the finger flingers being upstaged by the showman.) Frank went to see him, however, and was completely bowled over by two things. Detroit was a dancing town; but every little night club, every little beer joint, had to have three acts. The acts, however, were required to get on and get off so as not to interfer with the dancing. Singers were allowed to do two numbers with one encore. Magic acts were allowed eight minutes. There were no exceptions.

Anyway, when Frank went to see Swann he did forty fire minutes. As Frank says. "They are him up! I was absolutely astounded. He killed them! Absolutely killed them! I was so awed I went backstage to see him, which was something I didn't usually do. He was very cordial, very kind, and he asked, 'Where are you working?' Well, as I told him, I was working at an awful joint called TOMPKINS BLUE RIVER. He asked what time I went on, and when I told him he said, 'I'll come and see you."

The very next evening the Mafia type who managed the BLUE RIVER came back to Frank's dressing room (actually the men's toilet) and announced, "Some of your high class friends are out front." When Frank looked out, there was Swann, dressed in soup and fish and accompanied by a beautifuly dressed girl. With them was another couple similarly attired.

"I wanted to run out the back door," Frank says, "but I went out and did my act. Swann laughed. He applauded. And after the act was over he called the manager and said, Where did you get this guy? What are you paying him?' When the manager refused to tell him he said, I know it's not enough!"

Naturally, Frank became a Russell Swann fan from then on. As he says, "He wasn't a super manipulative magician, but he did very clean magic, and he did everything perfectly. His big thing was the SNAKE BASKET. He made an Olsen & Johnson

production out of that. We kind of kept in touch for a while, but then I lost touch with him."

When Frank was in his twenties he made his way to L.A. where he got a job demonstrating and selling magic at Bert Wheeler's original HOLLYWOOD MAGIC SHOP. The job paid only commission so his income was varied and precarious.

Working there he met Cal Sten who invited him to join the MYSTIC THIRTEEN, a club of young Los Angeles magicians. Other members included Marvin Roy, Bob Gunther, Bob Haskell, Arnold Furst, and Jim Conley. The boys received constant help and encouragement from such established magicians as Loring Campbell, Caryl Fleming, Chester Morris, Maldo, Cantu, Bill Larsen Sr. and others.

About this time Russell Swann was booked into the COCOANUT GRO VE at the AMBASSADOR HOTEL. Frank quickly renewed his acquaintance with his hero, and subsequently Swann asked Frank to write and routine a PANCAKE IN THE HAZ bit for him. The routine required a stooge, and Frank got the job. When Swann moved to the MARK HOPKINS in San Francisco Frank went along.

While they were playing San Francisco Frank was offered the opportunity of opening his own magic shop in Los Angeles and was replaced in the act by Charlie Miller, who himself was later replaced by Jay Marshall.

The new shop prospered and became the hangout for all the famous magicians of the day. Paul LePaul, Jack Gwynne, Bill Neff, Ade Duval, Cantu, Maldo and Al Wheatley were all regular drop-ins. By now Frank was playing regular club dates and having a ball.

World War II ended all that. Frank was drafted into the Army, serving in Texas, Chicago, and finally in the Yukon and the

Aleutians. By this time he had acquired a beautiful Canadian wife, Georgia, and a son.

In 1949 television was becoming a factor in the entertainment field and Frank was anxious to try the new media. Although New York City was then the television capital of the country Frank, apparently, foresaw Los Angeles as the future center and moved the familty there. It took two years to get his first TV show on the air. In the meantime he worked as a novelty salesman, a theater projectionist for Jim Conley, and broke into the trade show business.

There were only a thousand TV sets in LA in 1951. As Frank says,"I finally found an advertising agency that would listen to me. They had a marvelous combination of sponsors: there was Four Fin Tuna, Genuine Chinese Food, and some kind of honey. (I can't even remember their name.) I put a show on the air called MAGIC PARTY. The pay was abysmal, of course, and I had to write it, run it, and come up with the props." Many people, like Jim Conley and George McCathy, contributed their talents to the show.

"After a year," Frank says, "everybody got tired of the show. The agency was tired, I got tired, and the sponsors got tired. So we went off the air for a while. The sponsors still hired me to do market appearances after the show was off the air.

All during this period Frank was also playing the lead in the THE DRUNKARD in Los Angeles and doing an old fashioned magic act in the olio. Like most magicians Frank had always been his own producer director, but now he found himself under a professional director, even in his olio act. The director would ask questions such as, "Why do you pause there?" or "Why do you turn to the right at that point?"; questions he had never before addressed. He found the act tightened and pointed as it had never been before. This worked to his great advantage as it was, substantially, this act that he played on the USO circuit right after playing THE DRUNKARD.

It seemed that everything was coming at once about then. At the time that he was negotiating the USO tour, KTLA called about what, eventually, became the SKIPPER FRANK show. No one knew what the show was going to be about. In any case Frank went over and talked to them, and they said, "Yes, that's fine." But nothing seemed to happen, and the date for his USO tour was approaching. KTLA kept stalling and finally Frank told them he was leaving for a two month tour of the Orient. They said, "Don't worry about it," and off he went. When the troupe got over there they discovered that the two shows in front of them had gotten into trouble. Frank never found out what it was, whether drugs or money changing, but the troupes were sent home. Now, instead of two months, Frank discovered he was on a six month tour. He fully expected KTLA to find themselves another guy.

When he got home he was startled to see KTLA running plugs for the show he had expected to be on. He called the station, and they said,"Come on in and talk to us." They made him an appointment to see Klaus Landsberg, the program director. Klaus, in Frank's eyes, was a genius. He was the pioneer broadcaster in LA and the first one to run a TV station in the black. Under his direction KTLA innovated TV wrestling and the Roller Derby. His appointment was for eleven thirty A.M. on a Monday morning.

Frank says,"I got there at ten o'clock, naturally. Eleven o'clock came and went. Noon came. One came. Two came. Finally the

secretary said, 'Mr. Landsberg will see you now.'

"So we sat down and talked about the show. The setting was going to be a place called FUN ISLAND. We were going to have cartoon packages: DAFFY DUCK, that sort of thing. We were talking very casually at three fifteen when he said, We're going to try you for two weeks.' I said, 'Fine. When do we start?' He said, 'This afternoon.' I asked, 'What time?' and he replied, 'Five o'clock.'

"What am I going to be?' I asked. 'I dunno. What do you want to be?' At that time the station was owned by Paramount so I said, Will you call the wardrobe dept. and tell them I'm coming. I'm going to find something to wear, and then I'll tell you what I'm going to be.'

"So, I went down there, and all I could find that would fit was a Navy type blazer and a yachting cap. So I got on the phone (it was then twenty minutes to five.) and I said, What do you think of SKIPPER FRANK? He said, That's lousy. I said, Well, that's what you've got."

In the meantime Frank had picked up some paper cups, a hank of rope and some newspaper. He got to the station at five of five and found the studio and the director. The director said, "Just stand over here." Frank asked him what he was going to do, and the reply was, "Just wing it." Thus began a program that was to last for nine years.

Frank did some tricks with the paper cups and the rope and made a Christmas tree out of the newspaper. When six o'clock came (it was an hour show) he asked the director, "Did he call?" When the reply was "No" Frank said, "I guess I come back tomorrow." and he said, "I guess you do."

Frank heard from Klaus only once during the first week and a half of the show. On one show he used a BANG gun, and Klaus called with the cryptic message,"No guns on the show!" Then on the final Wednesday he got a call to be in Klaus' office on Friday. His two week trial was up.

On Friday Klaus said,"Monday morning they're going to offer you a contract. You should have your agent here. Who's your agent?"

"I don't have an agent,"Frank replied.

"You should have an agent," Klaus said. "Those lawyers are tough."

Very boldly Frank said, "You be my agent."

Klaus' jaw dropped, and then he laughed. "OK," he agreed.

Klaus got him a seven year contract with an escalator every twenty six weeks. A very propitious contract as it worked because Klaus died young in the third or fourth year of the contract. He was followed by a succession of managers, most of the inept. Paramount did not believe in the future of television and paid very little attention to the station, sending the jerkiest of its executives to KTLA. Frank would get edicts like, "No live audiences." or again "Live audiences." And then, "No live animals." And finally, "No puppets." After that last edict Frank asked the current director, "Why?"

"Ventriloquial figures look like dead children. I can't stand them."

These were the kind of bizarre problems Frank was fighting all the time, but despite the difficulties, at the end of the seven years he was able to extend the contract for another two years, thus establishing an enviable nine year continuous run.

One amusing anecdote that Frank tells of those years involves Harry Blackstone, Sr. During the war while Frank was going to Radio School in Chicago his spirits were at a very low ebb. The discipline and rigorous schedule at the school were very onerous, and Frank had very little contact with magic. He had managed to do a few shows for the local USO, and they had arranged for him to get a few passes. On one of these occasions Blackstone was in town, and Frank went to see him. Frank was so lonely that he conquered his natural timidity and went back stage. Blackstone greeted him like an old friend, and Frank spent the day with him, even overstaying his pass. Blackstone boldly called the school and used some story to extend the pass. The day brightened Frank's life for weeks to come.

By the time SKIPPER FRANK was on the air Blackstone and his wife had retired to Hollywood. One day a pet blue parakeet of which they were both very fond got away from their home, and they were both very distraught about it. Someone called Frank to tell him about the tragedy, and ask his help.

"I have twenty thousand detectives to put on the case, "Frank said. One of his sponsors was Schwinn Bicycle and he had a bike to give away. "I did a story on Blackstone - how he had given away thousands of rabbits to kids all over the world, and now his pet blue parakeet was lost. Whoever found it and returned it to Blackstone would be given a Schwinn Bicycle. We had the parakeet back in about three hours."

Then came the cruise ships. Like so many of Frank's experiences these too started at the last minute. He had been working for Teleprompter and then Warner, traveling the country showing the Cable Television Stations how to set up local programing with a minimum of equipment. While he was on this job he got a call from Peter Pitt at two o'clock in the morning.

"I was supposed to go on a Princess Cruise in the morning, but I got a better paying job. Will you go." Frank had vacation time coming from the cable company so he said, "Sure."

He boarded the ship in San Pedro the next day. He had no trouble finding the purser and getting assigned a cabin, but it

him four hours to find the recreation director.

As Frank tells it, "He said, 'Oh, you're the magician.' I could tell right away what this guy thought of magic acts. He said, 'I'll talk to you in a day or two.' Like go on, don't bother me.

"Two days later he said, 'They want you to work tonite. How long do you do?'

"How long do you want?' I asked."

"He said,'I don't want too long. About twenty minutes.'

"So I went out and did my twenty minutes that night. Then he said, "Oh, I said we wanted you to do one show on the way down, and one show on the way back. But now we want you to do about four shows.' Fortunately, I had the MAGIC DIGEST with me. It's like a portable TARBELLS. I went down into my cabin and went through it. I got three more acts using newspapers, paper bags, cardboard boxes, anything else; and then I went all over the ship looking for the props. And I did the shows and came home and went back to the cable TV job."

The second cruise ship job came as unexpectedly. The family was living in Seattle at the time, and Frank happened to be in LA on business. He was walking past the office of an agent named Sonny Miller and decided to drop in and say, "Hello". Frank hadn't had a lot of work from Sonny, but Sonny had the best clients in the city, and the work Frank had had from him had been excellent.

Frank walked in and Sonny said, "Oh, my God. Am I glad to see you. You're going to Alaska in the morning."

In Frank's words, "I said,'I don't have any of my stuff here. My stuff's all in Seattle.' He said, 'You can do it! Get on the ship.' Lee Grable had been scheduled for the job, but for some reason he had to cancel. Sonny went on, 'I'm just getting in with Princess cruises, and I don't want to lose this account. Do it!'

"I called my wife and said, 'Do you mind if I go to Alaska?' She asked, 'How long are you going to be gone?' I said, 'Fourteen days,' and she said, 'O.K.'

"I went over to Joe Berg's and bought a hank of rope. I had wanted a good set of LINKING RINGS, but the set I got was awful, like coat hangers. I also bought a couple of decks of cards and things like that, and I got on the ship.

"I found I had to do six or seven shows on that trip. Fortunately the first stop was in San Francisco, and I jumped off the ship and and went to Buma's shop and got some more stuff.

"While we were on the cruise they said they wanted me to stay on the ship when we got back to LA, and go to Acapulco. I ended up staying with Princess for nineteen cruises. I enjoyed that work.

"When it came to the Christmas cruise I said, 'No! I'm going to spend Christmas with my wife!' They said, 'Would you come if we hire your wife?' I said, 'She doesn't work any act.' They said, 'We'll hire her as a children's director. She can play games with kids, can't she?' So she went on the Christmas cruise. Of course our kids were all grown up and gone by then. That was the most delightful cruise I ever had. We really enjoyed it.

"On the last ship that I worked in that series', (I did five cruises on that last ship.) the captain gave me the greatest compliment I have ever had. He came down to every show I ever did on that ship. This impressed the crew tremendously. They said, 'He has never done that for any other act!' Immediately, the bartenders, everybody, began to treat me with a special respect."

Nine years ago Frank was in New Orleans concluding a contract to work the New Orleans Home Show when he collapsed in the Shrine of St. Jude. Cancer! Some kind citizen delivered him to the New Orleans Charity Hospital. The first doctor to examine him was Jim Angel who also performed the first of five operations which saved his right leg and his life. He spent one hundred and two days in the hospital with brief respites at the home of magician Ralph Fountain. Ralph was alerted to Frank's plight by their mutual friend Bev Bergeron. Ralph, in effect, adopted Frank.

Frank survived with his life and his leg, something none of the doctors had believed possible. After the operations succeeded the danger of infection was so great that they administered large doses of a very powerful antibiotic. The known side effect of this medicine is hearing impairment, from which Frank now suffers. But he still works, doing shows, running his magic shop in Oceanside, and enjoying life.

To quote Phil Willmarth from the March 1980 issue of the LINKING RING (from which many of the facts in this article have been gleaned):

"Through all of his life with its successes, temporary set-backs, changes of direction and occupation, and so on, the one consistent fulfilling and stabilizing force (in addition to his very supportive wife and family) has been his magic. His magic has provided an outlet for his creative energies, a consistent means of income, and made him many friends. I feel that magic and the world needs more Frank Hermans, and applicant his talent, his generosity, and his indomitable spirit.
