

MEMBERSHIP BOOM IN S.D.

Ring 76 Membership Jumps 1,452

he number of members in Ring 76 has jumped an astounding 1,452 to 1,512 full, paid and participating members. The Ring Treasurer reports that we now have slightly more than \$46,517 U.S. dollars in the bank. This dramatic membership increase, and the corresponding increase in funds means that the Board has altered its plans for the annual installation of officers.

The plans for the July installation of officers is now to charter a United 777 and fly the Officers and select members of the *Ring* to Hawaii for an installation banquet hosted by **Doug Henning** and **Harry Anderson**. The featured performers, schedule permitting, are **David Copperfield** and **Siegfried and Roy**.

It is anticipated that the cost, including the buffet with chicken and fish, should be a very reasonable \$8,723 per person with tables of ten at \$87,000. We have booked a hall which seats 15,300 and must have your reservation, paid of course, by March 15 to guarantee space. For seats call TicketMaster at 1-800-April-Fool.



Scott's Thoughts



A "magician" who hasn't adequately practiced an effect and insists on showing that effect to someone as soon as possible is no different from anyone who just bought a new car. They both want to show off their new purchases to someone as soon as they can so that they can get their ego stroked with a compliment. The difference is that a magician can't show the box and say "let me read you the instructions on what this thing does." He must show how it's done. He must demonstrate the effect and a "demonstration" is often confused with "performance." The demonstration may develop into an entertaining performance over time after practice and rehearsal and with the injection of the magician's personality, but a demonstration is often no more than a presentation of a puzzle (no denigration to magic dealers intended.)

Len Kornsberg's column in the June 1995 issue of MAGIC Magazine postulated that there have



Okay, assuming that we know enough tricks, then let's go further to assume that we know enough principles. Fitzkee pointed out in his 1944 book The Trick Brain that there are only 19 basic effects and I don't think that the physics of magic have changed since then. Sure, the principles have been updated and/or expanded: however, the methods of accomplishing these effects can be understood through study and practice. Whenever we see a dealer demonstrate an effect or a magician perform on TV, we know, think we know, or have a good idea, of how the effect was accomplished. We know the basic card sleights, black art principles, and other arcane methods. We know of the existence of gimmicks, shells, gaffs, and false bottoms and how they are applied to the art of illusion.

We have books that explain how everything is done that we can always go to for reference. If we have all of this information, then why aren't we applying them to our own performances? That is to say, why aren't we more creative? Why are there so many "creative copy cats" who bastardize great ideas and think that they have created something new? Before I go too far afield on ethics, I want to focus on your magical knowledge and what you could be doing with it.

That says a lot about the quality of these effects. Magic catalogs advertise tricks this way and often those adjectives apply, but imagine doing minor miracles *impromptu!* Naturally nothing comes for free and although the effects Gregory performed don't cost money, they do require practice to polish them into gems. Fortunately for the 15 or so attendees, the lecturer had obviously already invested his own time (as well as lots of performances for live audiences) to make them look natural and polished.

So what are some of these effects? How about making a borrowed coin disappear *completely* and convincingly? Or how about changing a dime (or an

acom or a rock) visibly into a silver dollar when it's tossed into the air? Or would you be impressed to see someone make a half dollar appear, disappear, then appear and completely

disappear again apparently using only his bare hands and with no

phony moves? How about an impromptu ring through spoon trick and a routine with a borrowed Bic pen? Pretty cool, huh?

This is the first time I've seen routined impromptu magic. Some of what I leam, for example, was instead of just doing one trick with a borrowed quarter why not make it into a routine where the coin disappears not once but twice and each time appears under the magician's watch. It then disappears once more and appears under the spectator's (!) watch. Greg teaches this routine during the lecture and I can only imagine the impact this would have on someone who simply asked you to "show me a trick."

For situations where you're sitting at a table, Gregory demonstrated and taught a "one goes into the pocket, two go into my hand" effect with crumpled dollar bills. Very impromptu but effective. He also performed a piece with a packet of Sweet 'N Low, a dollar bill and a quarter.

What's a lecture on impromptu magic without a rubber band effect? I don't know because this lecture included both a good band through the wrist trick and a version of Dan Harlan's "Traveling Cash" using a borrowed wrist watch, a time travel theme and finishing with a kicker.

Gregory's performing style has something in common with Michael Ammar. Both like to remove the "picture frame" from around the

effects, blurring the distinction between the magician's friendly

conversation with the audience and when the next trick has begun. The result is that the picture frame is formed around the performer himself as an effective entertainer because the audience does

not know when something mysterious and entertaining is going to begin. I realized this is characteristic of Gregory's presentation when a half dollar appeared from nowhere during what I thought were some introductory comments about the lecture.

The only items for sale were \$20 pre-recorded videos of this same lecture. Greg should be commended for bringing these videos. Attendees who intended to buy a video could stop taking notes and concentrate on the teaching. Sales of these videos were brisk after the lecture showing me I was not the only one who gave this lecture high marks. If you have a

chance to see Gregory Wilson perform or lecture I suggest you do not miss it.

ASK THE PRO



Curtis R. Clark

QUESTION: I am in the middle of the presentation of a brilliant, somewhat involved effect that requires the TOTAL attention of the spectators to see that there are not any MOVES. What do I do if someone interrupts at the critical moment?

CURTIS CLARK: Working in the restaurant environment is about the most challenging for magicians. There are customers moving around, people drinking, food and servers coming and going faster than imaginable. Without exception, you will be interrupt.

My style of magic, if you will, is to perform to the people. I may do the same effect three different ways with three different people. So, first I have to read the situation and the people. If my audience says: "You planned this!" I generally respond "Yeah. This server and I have it all arranged. At this exact moment, every night, she delivers food to this



very table, so this trick will work just right." Of course they immediately see the impossibility of the situation.

Another way that works very well for me is to designate one person to be the audience observer. I will select the person who has been scrutinizing my performance up to this point. Looking them squarely in the eyes I say, "You will watch me, never taking your eyes from my hands, so no funny business goes on behind everyone else's back." I then stand perfectly still and don't move my hands at all.

Another approach that works well for me, if I just can't see any way around the trick being broken, is to give it up, shrug, turn to the server and say "That's it! Pack your bags, you're outta here." Audiences love that and I always get positive reaction. I just verbally toy with the group until the food or drinks are served and move on to the next killer effect.

Basically, watch your audience. They will generally give you an indication of the best approach for them.

PRODUCT REVIEW

AUTO MONTE

At our Ring meeting last Tuesday (Rochester, New York), one of our members brought in a new effect called Auto Monte from Bob King. If you like Monte, this is pretty cool.

Three Jumbo cards are spread to show the typical money card in the center, losers on the ends. Then you remove the hand holding the spread to show the kicker, the cards are permanently riveted together at the bottom making it impossible to move the money card from the center. The spread is closed, the bets are made, but when the cards are respread, the money card is one of the outside cards. Close and reopen the fan, the winner is again in the center of the spread. A sticker is clearly affixed to the money card, the fan is closed but when shown again, the card has again moved to the outside (and the sticker has followed it!).

This is nice strong magic with lots of room for comedy. Unlike similar effects out there, thanks to a 'circular locking mechanism' (Bob's words), this needs no reset or extra cards. Oops, I let it slip, this is mechanical... no real work involved. But, even for us that enjoy a bit of a challenge, this has the makings for a lot of fun and is so clean no one will ever suspect a thing.

Tahoe lecture (May 13) and that the Board was working on the location and format of the installation of new officers.

Jim Jolly presented I.B.M. international certificates and pins to: Bill Monroe and Diane (Snickerdoodle) Lane. Diane was recipient of the coveted certificate carry case, the official I.B.M. manila envelop, complete with canceled stamps.

The new business portion of the meeting began with the appointment of a nominating committee for the *Ring* 76 June elections. **Diane Lane**, Chairperson, **Sherry Luft and Bill Monroe** volunteered for the committee.

Board Report - March 25, 1996 at Rick Waterhouse's home, San Diego

- 1. Slate of Officers Mark Flores has agreed to seek another term in his current position as a Board Member at Large with Rick Waterhouse filling the second at Large Board seat. Sherry was asked if she would consider running for *Ring* Secretary and has indicated that she would think about it. Greg Wauson indicated he has interest in serving the *Ring* in several potential capacities (President, Secretary or Vice-President). Several sug-

gestions were made by the members present and given to Sherry to carry forward to the nominating committee.

2. Selling Event the was considerable discussion on whether the Board wanted the selling event scheduled for the next regular Ring meeting, April 8, should be an auction or a swap meet with a blind auction component. Dick Dales was asked if he would consider being the auctioneer as Gary Salisbury declined due to current work demands. Dick indicated he would, if no one else was found to fill the position. Jeff Marcus' criticisms were that an auction tends to go on too long and that there was too much whining about the event after the event.

Rick and Dick both indicated that there was too much whining about small things after the event that left unpleasant memories.

Dick was assigned an action item to try and locate the rules used in last year's auction and provide these to Rick this week. Tables will be rented for \$5 each and the Ring will receive 10% of auctioned magic. Dick Dale will handle the auction and Jeff Marcus volunteered to help him. Jim Jolly and Sherry Luft will handle the money collection, recording and distribution for the auction. People should reserve a table by calling Jim Jolly.

2. Installation Banquet Greg reported that he had talked with a number of restaurants and hotels and the prices varied with a low of \$14.95 + 15% gratuity + tax, or about \$18 per person. Some with a maximum head count and all with a minimum.

Rick had talked with Tidbits and there was no minimum and

no risk to the Ring. Tidbits will seat a maximum of 250 people. There is a limited appetizer menu with drinks. Tidbits would get all the food and drink receipts and the Ring could have the door. Rick had talked with Mike Finney about performing though the cost is \$2,500 although Mike indicated a willingness to talk about the fee.

There was an initial vote by the Board of 2 for Banquet, 2 for Cabaret and 2 for a mix of the two styles. Discussion focused on the fact that the Cabaret-style promoted magic in San Diego and members would not be interested in paying more than last year's cost for a banquet. Greg suggested that the Ring pick up the initial \$5 for the first 50 members; subsequent discussion indicated the cost to the Ring was too high and it was not put to a vote.

Greg was asked to search for additional banquet locations, with lower cost, but a vote by the Board of the installation format was 4 for Cabaret and 1 for Banquet. A cabaret format will be pursued. Rick was assigned to look at other locations and consider other performers.

3. Casa De Amparo Rick reported that Loch David Crane, Greg Wauson, Jeff Marcus (tentatively), himself and one of the young non-Ring 76 performers from Magic Heritage Day have volunteered to perform. Sponsors of the event were said to be delighted and tickets for performers' guests would be provided by Rick. Magic In The Streets is a benefit for Casa De Amparo, April 28, 1996, from 1 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Cost is \$10 for adults and \$5 for seniors and students.

If we get to a point where we know enough "tricks" and we have enough books and magic magazine subscriptions, then we should be able to apply them to our own performances. In fact, we should be able to walk into most any situation with confidence that we can perform magic with items at hand. We shouldn't have to rely on thumb tips, dove hamesses, or substitution trunks to elicit a favorable response from our audience in an impromptu setting.

Stan Allen mentioned to me that confidence in your abilities means that you don't have to be carrying around a magic shop in your pocket to entertain. The magic shop should be in your mind so that when you walk into a room in an impromptu situation, you would feel confident enough that you could entertain with magic so that people know that you are a magician.

IBM Gold Cups winner Giovanni told me that he made the following statement to his wife while they were on the beach in

their swimming attire: "If trained commandos suddenly appeared from out of the sky and put a machine gun to your head and threatened to kill you unless I performed a half hour magic show right then, you could rest assured that your life would be spared." Now that's confidence.

It's important not just to know the secrets of how tricks work but we should know "why" tricks work. That way we can apply the knowledge to other situations and be creative. For example, Tenyo took the idea of the zig-zag illusion and made it small enough for a cigarette. I have also seen Paul Harris's "Immaculate Connection" linking card routine used on stage with jumbo cards. These ideas are just applying existing ideas and making them fit another size. but there are many ideas that can be coupled with other ideas and create a whole new effect.

It only takes a little imagination and a lot of knowledge. And you have enough knowledge.

Shuffling those cards, my hands being burnt so intensely that the blisters were obvious to the most casual of observers.

"I shuffled and shuffled and, boom, three cards flew out of the deck and landed face up. Quite the accident don't you know. I sheepishly looked at the spectator who had selected the card; 'None of those are your card?' I asked, hoping none were.

"'No, none are mine was the response.' Whew! Then I noticed, three cards, all different suits,

Diane began by regressing the Ring members to childhood, "take the first or last digit in your age and become a child of that

age. If your 58, now you're either 5 or 8!" Diane asked if we like bunny rabbits, and of course we all did. She asked if we'd like to see one, we all did. She made one from a silk wrapped around her finger (the body), its ears (the ends of the silk), we weren't impressed. Diane caged the silk bunny. Asking the group if we liked cats and dogs elicited applause. When she asked if we liked bunny rabbits applause and cheers erupted. When we looked at the cage again, there wasn't the one silk bunny but two real bunnies. Diane said this brings us to "the infomerical." Her father manufacture's production boxes and she had eight young bunnies looking for good homes.

Bill Monroe was our next performer. Bill explained that he learned his effect at a John Allan Magic Castle lecture. Brown, chosen as spectator, selected a card from the deck. Bill had Mary sign her selected card. Bill produced a card with his signature and analyzed Mary's handwriting compared to his. Placing his signed card face down on the table off to one side, Bill placed the deck down and gave it a quick slap which he said would make Mary's card vanish. Fanning the deck, it had vanished. Bill reached across the table to reveal that the card Mary had sign had taken the place of his card placed there earlier.

Frank Herman was the evening's next performer. Frank began by producing an eagle and asking Greg Wauson whether it was a boy or girl eagle. When Greg couldn't say which it was, Frank changed the eagle into an egg, which no one could tell. Frank then showed an effect where water, against the laws of nature, ran up stream. Frank then turned Greg's hand into a gun and showed his ability to shoot various things including through a plastic jug. Those up front got the point,

Gallager style, from the spurting bottle.

Jim Jolly was next up. Greg as spectator selected a card and showed it to all present. As Greg was replacing the card. Jim asked Greg to remember the setting, some cards in the left hand, some cards in the right hand and Greg with his selected card, in between. Jim shuffled the deck in a most unconventional way: some face up, some face down, some back to back and some face to face. When he finished, he asked Greg if the card on top, the ace of clubs, was Greg's. Greg said no. Jim handed Greg the ace of clubs and asked him to wave the card over the deck. When Greg waved the card over the deck, Jim spread the cards showing the cards had all immediately become face down. Jim asked Greg if the setting wasn't very familiar, some card in the left hand, some in the right and Greg with a face down card in between, just like earlier. Greg, turning over the ace of clubs he had waved over the deck, discovered it had turned into his selected card.

Rick Waterhouse chose a Michael Ammar effect for his routine, selecting Loch David Crane as his spectator. Rick told a story with four blank cards that turned into cards with webs then into spiders then back into blank cards. Rick said they should try to bring back the vanished spider when, very much to Loch's surprise, a spider appeared on the floor.

Rich Robertson again regressed the group to "5 through 11 year olds." Sherry Luft was Rich's assistant and had agreed to be locked into a head-stockade. Greg showed that it was a solid, locked stockade before Sherry was locked in. When Rich covered up Sherry, she magical became free, yet the locks were as locked as ever. Rich retrieved the stockade and,



by magic, was himself locked in the stockade.

Jeff Marcus started his routine with a very long piece of rope that went from having to ends to three ends to four ends, back to two ends. In Jeff's performance the rope took on amazing properties and defying the laws of matter, tied and untied itself in mysterious ways.

Joe Mystic demonstrated a card effect where Diane Lane chose a card, the three of diamonds, and returned it to the deck where it was promptly lost. Joe, shuffling the deck over and over told Diane he would make her card, which he hadn't seen, come to the top of the deck. Turning over the top card, the two of diamonds, he announced he had done the impossible. Diane told Joe that he was mistaken, it was the 3 of diamonds not the 2. Joe folded up the 2 and tore a small part of the card out of the middle. making the card in a 3 of diamonds (the middle diamond pip ripped in the card by Joe). Joe said the hardest part of the trick was making the corner number match, revealing that the 2's in each corner had changed to 3's.

Greg Wauson's performance concluded the main meeting. Greg did a wonderful rubber band and ring routine using Jim Jolly and Jim's wedding band. Greg linked and unlinked the ring to the rubber band, concluding with the ring off the rubber band and one complete and undamaged rubber band.

After the regular meeting, Loch David Crane performed a complete ten minute close-up routine for a small group of Ring 76 members. Loch produced a video for himself and lots of laughs for his small gathered audience. It was a most enjoyable evening with lots of Ring 76 members we have sorely missed.




