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

id anyone catch the ABC TV special David Blaine: Street Magic on May 19th? What an astounding performer! It's amazing what you can do with a simple double lift, a folding coin and the ability to snitch a wrist watch. Along the way, viewers were treated to Gypsy Thread, Raven and ashes-onthe-palm but the highlight of the hour-long show (part of a million dollar deal) was something so eerie I, for one, still cannot understand the method involved. The 24 year old levitated himself six or seven inches off the ground in full view of city street passers-by, apparently with no wires or other rigging! Some one clue me in!!

Blaine's talent made a lasting impression on the crowds that gathered. Seemingly tired of special effects from stage magicians, the appreciative audiences reveled in clean, straight-forward (albeit dead-


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June Teach-in Scheduled


What does it take to be a Magician?

- I. The phone rings and you answer. "Can you do magic at my party?"
 - A. Yes I Can!
 - 1. You are a Magician
 - 2. Plan your show
 - B. No, I don't like to do shows.
 - 1. You don't want to be a Magician
 - 2. Try another hobby




II. The rules of Magic

- A. The audience enjoys magic because it is fun. The Magician must be having fun along with them.
- B. The Magician is a special kind of actor. An actor's job is to entertain his audience. A piece of rope cannot entertain an audience, but the Magician holding a rope can!
- C. Use a variety of the "tools of the trade": vanishes, appearances, penetrations, etc. Don't repeat the same kinds of tricks.
- D. Don't try to be mysterious. Nobody will believe you can do magic. Use a lot of comedy in your tricks.
- E. Remember, the show is for the audience. Do tricks they like, not just the ones you like to do.
- III. The plan for a good show is as simple as A, B, C, and Go.
 - A. Decide what kind of tricks to do.
 - 1. Ask, "How big will the audience be?" Use the right size tricks for the show.
 - 2. Ask, "What will the ages of the audience?"
 - a. If it is a party of twelve year olds, choose the appropriate tricks for them.
 - b. If there are mixed ages, choose something for all ages but slanted toward the youngest members.
 - 3. How long should a show be?
 - a. NEVER longer than 1/2 hour. Try 15-20 minutes.
 - b. "Always leave your audience wanting more."
 - 4. Always have a good variety of tricks you are comfortable doing.
 - B. Set up your act. Put your tricks in an order that is entertaining.
 - No magic formula for this. Only trial and error.
 - 2. The first trick should be special. "Prove" you are a magician right off.
 - 3. Follow this with a longer, more complex, trick or two.
 - 4. Follow this with a couple of quick tricks with PLENTY of comedy.
 - 5. Alternate long and short tricks. Make them different. Don't do two vanishes in a row.
 - 6. Choose your final trick carefully and leave your audience happy.
 - a. Choose your "best" trick.
 - b. Be prepared to say something so they will know you are through.
 - 7. Keep a record of your shows.
 - a. What worked, what didn't.
 - b. This is a quick way to choose the right show for your audience.
 - C. PRACTICE, PRACTICE, your program.
 - 1. Practice daily in front of a mirror.
 - 2. Lay out your entire show, just as you will do it.
 - a. Write your program out on a card.
 - 3. Rehearse the entire show, NOT just the individual tricks, just as you will be doing them in a real show.
 - 4. Practice going from one trick to another.
 - a. You will find many unexpected problems.
 - b. One trick may not flow into another.
 - c. What if the trick does not work?
 - d. Always have an emergency trick ready if needed.
 - 5. Where will your helpers stand? Can they see your secrets?
 - 6. What will you do when you are finished with a trick?
 - 7. Rehearse what you are going to say.
 - a. Talk your show aloud.
 - b. Talk to your audience, NOT above them.
 - c. DO NOT SAY, "Now for my next trick . . .
 - 8. Timing is important. Practice the right thing to do, and say, at the right time.
- A. On the day of the show . .
 - 1. ALL materials should be carefully packed in a suitcase.
 - 2. Arrange your tricks in order.
 - 3. When you arrive, have a table set up were you can perform.
 - a. Use a corner of the room to hide your secrets.
 - 4. If possible, set up in private.
 - 5. You will have "Stage-Fright." Everyone Does.
 - 6. Enjoy Your Show!

new magic trick. He had no patter and no practiced showmanship but he made up for those with an extroverted personality and a fascination like a boy with a new Tonka truck. People became involved in the experience. I heard several people say, "Did you see Steve's trick?" This was probably Steve's first magic trick, obtained by plunking down twenty bucks at a magic shop. He had practiced just enough to know how to set the coins into the glass with no fumbling. He made no claims of being a magician, just a guy with a single cool trick who added a lot to the enjoyment of the afternoon.

So what's my point? That a likable

enough personality will make up for a lack of practice? Or that it's okay to neglect putting some real thought and entertainment value into a magic performance? Or that if the trick we buy is clever enough that it can carry the show? Nope on all counts. Simply, if someone like Steve can generate as much fun and interest in one trick as I saw, we who call ourselves magicians can really, as Michael Ammar would say, press the wonder buttons of our audiences. Starting with a baffling trick, think how powerful it can become when we surround it with smooth, nonfumbling handling, a well-thought-out presentation and an effective story which involves the spectators! Such is our goal. Let's have fun presenting our magical wonders and keep our standards high.

What David Blaine did with forces and duplicate cards didn't require manipulation as much as it did creativity. The guy's very clever. Keep on the lookout for him. He may be in your neighborhood soon.


