## **Ring 76's August Meeting**

There was a feeling of freshness from the opening minute of this month's meeting as our new President Gary Schwartzwald called the meeting to order and introduced the new board. We had three new guests, two of which. Ken Dear and Craig Beresh are magicians and John Stephens was the third visitor. Before the main meeting got under way we were treated to a panel discussion on entertaining at hospitals by guests Eric and Debbie Hansen from the Armed Forces YMCA working out of Balboa Naval Medical Center. Joining them were Ring 76 former officers Sherry Luft and Dick Bush. Rounding out the panel were veteran members Rov and Betty Armstrong. From the discussion we learned that one must be aware of hospital restrictions when it comes to the use of certain props like balloons or food but performing for hospital residents can be rewarding for both the entertainer and those being entertained. If such performing is of interest to a magician, he or she should contact the volunteer offices of hospitals, be they for children, psychiatric, orthopedic or whatever's out there.

After a brief break, our regular meeting opened with the announcement of many innovative items the new board has come up with to make the meetings more interesting. It began with Garv's introduction of a new feature called Pass the Mat in which, once a month, one of the board members will open the meeting with a performance. Doesn't sound too tough, right? Well, let's not forget that lots of us aren't professionals and this is the board's way of encouraging others to perform. By way of introduction, Gary showed us a pretty slick routine of Harry Lorayne's "Four Coins Across" then passed the mat to Membership Vice President Tom La Chance. Tom will have a month to prep. With that, Gary had Tom present Ring 76 Membership certificates to auditioners Myron Joseph and Sumit Dua and Official International Brotherhood of Magicians Membership certificates and pins to Paul Thomey, Gabe Travers and David Ebert.

Afterwards, Gary offered a brief announcement regarding the possibility of a new meeting site. Several members offered enough positive response that further research will be conducted by the board. Also, it was announced that three new award categories will be honored at the next installation banquet - Entertainer of the Year (determined on a monthly accumulated vote), Best Close-Up Performance and Best Stand-Up Performance

I.B.M. literature and Ring 76 applications have been accumulated for distribution to Brad Burt's magic shop. Tom La Chance will handle the chores.

Julie Dale then gave a treasurer's report, stating that the account contains over \$1,200. Our future meeting agenda was then discussed as as Gary Schwartzwald reviewed theme

plans from this point through February. Upcoming meetings will include a video teach-in, collector's corner, a pot luck Christmas party with entertainment provided by the membership, paper magic and our close-up competition in January.

Day of Magic, or Magic Heritage Day as it has been called, was reviewed and the board felt that if any interest in propagating this venture is desired someone must step forward in a leadership capacity, since the board is incapable of doing so due to various personal commitments. It was also determined that such event would occur in a month other than October since there is not enough time to assemble it adequately. The subject will be brought up to the membership during the September general meeting.

Ring 76 has a chance to become recognized by the I.B.M. as an outstanding Ring, the details of which were brought up by Dick. It was agreed that we should pursue this opportunity. Also determined is that the board should at all times maintain the Ring library to which Tom Kasner volunteered to assume responsibility.

In view of the fact that video teach-ins are a welcomed premeeting fare, the board authorized the purchase of video equipment and Tom K. will shop for same.

With no further business pending, the board adjourned.



# A.C.E.S. SCORE BIG

Last month, on August 15th, marked the debut stage performance of the junior magician's group A.C.E.S. and it was stunning. Under the direction of Rick Bruce, these talented entertainers gave the audience almost two hours of non-stop magic, be it on stage or in the lobby.

In Act I, the cast was summoned by rather ominous beings whereupon Rick appeared and introduced a Big Surprise, which was held by an audience member throughout the show. Next, Rick performed Lee Earle's Manila Miracle/Bank Night routine followed by the venerable Gypsy Thread, only this time with a twist; it was set to music. Great!

Aethan Friday was up next with a version of Twisting the Aces called Waving a Classic and Rick returned doing Eugene Berger's version of Ashes - on - the - Palm. Youngster Leon Bennett took center stage with a mentalist bit called Star Turn which would have made Kreskin envious. To close Act I, Russian magi Misha created a floating paper rose for one lucky female spectator then magically changed it into a real rose.

During the intermission, several members of the cast performed close-up stuff in the lobby. Talk

#### "Mental Masterpieces" by Larry Becker

Larry's second tape has some very exciting happenings that bring out the depth of his performing experience. As in the first edition, he is assisted by his lovely wife, April.

"H. G. Wells' Time Machine" begins with an audience member invited to the stage. The helper is asked to merely think of any year in this millennium. There is no force involved here. The participant then handles a British penny which they place into an envelope then seal. The thought-of year is then noted on a label on the back of the envelope out of the performer's view. The envelope is held between the spectator's palms which represent the time machine. Following a bit of by-play, the envelope is torn open to reveal a transformation of the copper coin to a pirates' silver doubloon. Larry identifies it as being minted in the year 1631. The spectator then affirms that the thought-of year is indeed--1631.

"Out Of Body" is, as strong a mental effect as can be produced with nothing more than 52 regular playing cards and the card box. Strong words you say, well see what you think. A deck is produced, taken out of the box and given an overhand shuffle. As the performer's back is turned, the spectator freely cuts the deck and completes the cut. This action may be repeated. The card which was cut to is noted, replaced and the cards are returned to the box and the flap is closed. The performer secures the box with two rubber bands and it is held between the palms of the spectator. The mentalist then creates an "out of body" experience for five seconds. He then proceeds to divine the identity of the cut-to card. By the way, the helper is not a confederate. Friends, properly presented, this stunner will bring gasps to your audience. No pre-show work, just good acting required during the performance. Umm...um.

"Casino Royale" finds the mentalist setting the stage with an imaginary trip to Las Vegas. A goblet full of different colored casino chips is displayed as a spectator is asked to join you on-stage. Several chips are noted in the goblet and it is handed to the spectator to shake up to mix the contents. The helper now closes their eyes and selects one anywhere in the vessel and upon request places it in their pocket unseen by anyone. An amount of money to be wagered is determined next by the spectator cutting a number of bills at random, placing them into an envelope and sealing it. The helper finally selects two cards, one face up and the other face down. The selection of the cards is handled entirely by the spectator counting cards until the deed is done. (The force is as diabolical as they come.) The two selections are placed in the gentleman's--in this case-outside breast pocket for all to see. A prediction having been in full view from the start is opened and the spectator is invited to read along with you. Each event, the casino to be visited, the amount to be wagered, and the outcome of the game has been foretold. Larry comments in the explanation section that if you don't get a standing ovation after all this, I give up!

Larry's next offering is entitled "Kolossal Killer III." Larry asks a spectator to join him on stage and to be prepared to commit "legal arson." The helper is requested to imagine burning the black or the red cards. The answer is the black ones, so a small piece of flash paper is ignited. The spectator is then asked to select the hearts or the diamonds for destruction; responding the diamonds, another bit of flash paper is burned. Larry takes advantage of a small lack of following requests when the helper lazily drops his hands in front of him when asked to hold the "invisible cards" up to his face and merely think of one. Larry's comment is that one card has been inadvertently allowed to fall to the floor. "Please don't worry because we are now going

to incinerate the cards left in your hand." One last bit of flash paper-poof. The helper is now asked to name the card that was dropped accidentally. So stating the five of hearts, Larry now opens the wallet to display a six of hearts, just one card off. Now comes the KILLER part. Noting that the cards are off by one, he calmly turns the six over to reveal a prediction . . . I predict that even though your card and mine are the same color and suit, the values will be off by one! The equivoque in this piece is absolutely wonderful. Folks, in your observer's opinion this is a three thumbs up!!!

The next item on the tape is entitled "Clearly Predictable." A bit of pre-show work is involved in having a spectator select a classified ad and marking a bill out of their wallet or purse. They will also be asked to bring a sealed envelope to the stage along with the bill. A prediction scenario is posed and the pre-show spectator invited onstage. A see-through plastic bag is displayed with a newspaper inside. The sealed envelope is next placed in the bag in front of the newspaper. A card is selected by an audience member and placed face down in the clear bag along with the paper and the sealed prediction. The bill signed by the spectator is then handed to the performer and it too is put in the bag. The bag is now opened and the newspaper removed. The selected card is now visible and the paper is opened to show a large six of spades printed inside matching the identity of the card. The paper is further opened to show the ad that was circled earlier and it, along with the signature is authenticated by the spectator. The sealed envelope is now removed and a second person comes up to read the ad. The first helper reads a prediction from the envelope and the second person verifies this to read exactly the same. Finally, the second helper reads one more prediction from the envelope and it turns out to be the serial number of the bill that was marked earlier

"Calendar Caper and A Cut Above" is a personalized onstage birthday greeting to an audience participant. The helper is asked to simply think of their birthmonth. While the performer's back is



mance, each contest held as the monthly meeting for January and June, respectively. Past-President **Rick Bruce** then took the floor to announce that his youth group, A.C.E.S., will present their first stage performance August 15<sup>th</sup>. A full report on the event will be offered later.

Official business out of the way, it was time to proceed to the evening's theme "Linking Ring magic." Eight members turned into performers this night presenting effects gleaned from the pages of the I.B.M.'s monthly journal. Entertainment Vice President Dick Dale started things off with something he found in the September, '92 issue. He told us of his uncle. Ebenezer Tate, and the compass he invented but I hesitate to report any further on the state of Mr. Tate for I might misstate and cause a debate. Gabe Travers stepped up next with a nice combination of two effects from the November, '95 issue - "Utility Beating Heart Bill" and "Message Balloon," after doing a card force. Creativity and youth go hand in hand. Good job, Gabe. Our next performer was Past-President Greg Wauson with a mentalism effect "Thanks to Fibonacci II" from the June, '97 issue. The workings of this puzzle are based on mathematics and the outcome is baffling. Read that one! Secretary Don Soul took the stage next to demonstrate Tony Griffith's "Datacard" from the August, '97 issue. This one is a novel presentation of Brainwave using a regular deck of cards and it works! Sumit Dua hasn't received the Linking Ring, having just become a new member. but he did entertain us with "Twisting the Aces" and "Slap Card". Myron Joseph followed Sumit's routine with Al Thatcher's "That Spelling" from Tom Craven's column in the November, '96 issue, having the spectator spell the name of his card from a wellburied, mentally-selected card. Skipper Frank Herman, who once

had his own One-Man Parade in the Linking Ring, took the spotlight next and showed us his latest item heading for the market "Spunky Spooky Spoons". Without revealing too much, they live up to their name. The last performers were Roy and Betty Armstrong with a delightful presentation of Harries Super De Luxe Parasol Mystery set to music. In a vague way, it is Linking Ring magic since Roy had purchased it from an ad more than forty years ago!

turned, the participant places a number of cards from a well shuffled deck in the box corresponding to their month of birth. Twelve additional cards are counted into their hand and a prediction is produced. It reads: "I, Larry Becker predict on this date a member of the audience, born in the month of April will subsequently select his lucky card, the two of clubs." The helper's birth month is April. The spectator then counts four cards into the performer's hand, the fourth card being the two of clubs. No pre-show work here sports fans.

The tape's final presentation show-cases an effect whose older brother "Flashback" has been in my kit for years. Having seen Al Cohen in Washington, D.C. demonstrate it, I had to have one. It is a great walk-around effect that can be repeated if need be. This, in your scribes' opinion, the best all-around book test in the business, bar none! Your writer has been performing this piece for over a year and as other effects claim to deliver "commercial results," this one really does.

Friends, I suppose it's fair to say that your scribe is a Larry Becker fan, but please check this video out.
