President's Message

The **Bob Markwood** lecture was well attended by over 40 people and he did a great job helping us develop a fresh view of performing. I really enjoyed the lecture and Markwood caused me to think about my own issues with performing magic.

I became a member of Ring 76 over seven years ago. Last year was the first time I was willing to perform in front of the Ring. Although I have performed for the Ring since then, I have not performed very often. I wasn't always this reluctant. As a teenager I was more comfortable performing magic than I am now. There were, and still are, several parts to my apprehension. The biggest parts were that I didn't feel comfortable with the group and also did not feel that I would get honest feedback from my peers. I need the honest feedback to know if I am embarrassing myself. Going to several East County Magic Club meetings helped me.

At these meetings there was a small group of people that expected everyone to share and they showed interest in each other and in me. This more relaxed atmosphere helped me get ready to do a trick or two. I don't know if it is semantics or just my attitude, but it helped that it felt more like *doing a trick* than *performing*. I have to admit that I was not happy with my

first two experiences in front of this group. Even though I got positive feedback I don't know if the tricks were well received or not. My problem was that I did not really know what the group thought and I didn't hear how I could be better. So, everyone was nice, but not very helpful. The next time I did a few tricks I asked for constructive criticism, and I got it.

The most interesting part about the honest feed back was that the trick(s) I thought were really good went over okay and the tricks I thought were barely okay were pretty well received. By performing and receiving honest input I felt better about what I was doing and knew how I could become better. I've seen similar reluctance from other people who love magic. That is one of the reasons the Ring 76 Board is now doing a pass-the-mat trick. A good case in point is **Tom La Chance** who really was worried

about his pass-the-mat trick, then he got up there and was outstanding. If he never got up there he would never know how well he performs that trick and the great impact it has on an audience.

Yes, as President I am leading up to getting you to do a trick at the November meeting. Since the theme is Turkey Magic you can do a trick that is a turkey. It shouldn't take much practice to do a turkey of a trick so give it a try. If you want honest feedback, go ahead and ask, you'll get it.

Let me know if there is something we can do for you. If you're enjoying the meetings, bring a friend. See you on November 10th.

A lecture by **Bob Markwood** was our meeting for October and what a delightful treat it was for the 40 members and guests. If you've never had the pleasure of seeing Bob in a seminar-type environment you've missed two hours of valuable tips on performing AND making money with magic. Bob makes it interesting by including everyone in the lecture and at one point or another he had each of us up there in front of the group.

Bob started with a trick he calls My Favorite Card, using his assistant, Jim Riley, showing how to distribute your business card or that of your host to your audience. This was followed by the Human Card Deck with Bill Monroe, Donna Soul, Raam Wong, Betty Armstrong, and Chris Lorenzen as. what else, human cards. Bonnie Love participated in the you-do-as-I-do version of Mike Caveney's Linking Coat Hangers and just about everyone else in the audience was part of Bob's Quality Game and the Freeze Game. Suddenly, we all realized we were in for an evening of magic which included us, and that was the point of Bob's lecture. Without giving away too much of his lecture material, it can be said that his use of those attending his lectures will come away learning and retaining much more because of his methods.

For example, he brought out the Magic Coloring Book and set in motion "improv magic."

Lynn Javier was asked to perform it and she did a bangup job. In contrast, Loch David Crane was invited to improv a mute "Copperfield" presentation of the same trick set to music from Jurassic Park. It proved to be a hilarious show-stopping performance. Next, using the same

Ring 76 October Board Meeting

The October 27th Ring 76 board meeting took place at Tom Kasner's home. Attending were Dick and Julie Dale, Tom La Chance, Tom Kasner, Gary Schwartzwald, Don Soul and Greg Wauson. The meeting opened with a brief review of a February lecturer. Nothing definate has been planned to this point.

The organization of the Ring library was the next topic. Tom Kasner did a wonderful job of cataloging the material complete with a detailed list in booklet form as well as bar coding of all publications. It was established that in order to borrow library information, each person shall be limited to three books at a time with a deposit of \$5 for soft-cover and \$10 for hardbound books, refundable upon the return of the items. Tom will lug the two tubs of double-layered books to each meeting.

Our permanent meeting place has been established at the American Legion Hall, thanks to Dick's negotiating. They are very excited for having us and have welcomed us back with open arms. The Legion Hall will be the site of our annual pot luck Christmas party December 8th. It is hoped that Santa Claus' sister, Clara Claus (Peg Marcus), will be in attendance, barring a scheduling conflict. The party will include an anonymous gift exchange of items costing no more than \$5. Bring a gift, you get a gift. The pre-meeting Collector's Corner will be handled by J.P. Jackson. Entertainment will consist of member performances.

Previous December board meetings have been skipped due to prior committments, both professional and personal. If a board meeting is held in December, it will be at the home of Tom La Chance.

Board reports: Tom Kasner stated we have 61 members and Julie reported a treasury sum of \$872.22. It was agreed by the board that **Joe Mystic**'s efforts in publishing *MagiCurrents* during the prior administration should be reimbursed only with respect to his submitted copies of invoices from copy shops, paper dealers and postage. The receipts submitted thus far total \$126.

The I.B.M. Ring Quality Program was next discussed. Examination of the program showed the period of evaluation to be not less than one year but not more than two. Based on that span, the board decided to include Ring 76 activities from October, '96 through April, '97. Tom La Chance and Don will gather the necessary info.

The Linking Ring One-Man Parade feature was next to be considered. The board needs to solicit *original* effects or presentations by the membership in order to submit to LR magazine. A call for interested parties will be put forth at the next few meetings in the hopes that Ring 76 can send it to I.B.M. by the February meeting.

The need for a Ring 76 historical document has been pursued, off and on, by **Dick Bush**, **Jim Riley** and **Fred Rohrer** in the past. It still needs to be pursued. An announcement by Dick was made that **Roy Armstrong** was kind enough to contribute many years worth of *MagiCurrents* for such efforts and special board thanks go to him. Tom Kasner shall be custodian of those newsletters.

With no further issues to discuss, the meeting was adjourned.

MONDAY NIGHT MAGIC AT THE BIG APPLE by Scott Wells

Imagine yourself 30,000 feet in the air on your way to New York City. You're thumbing through the airline magazine and thinking about what you're going to do when you arrive in the Big Apple. As you page through the magazine, you flip to an article about a magic show in New York. What could this be? You wonder where it is and when they have the shows. Well, the second question is answered easily enough by the title, but you read on for more details . . .

What does the 37 year old hit musical "The Fantasticks" have to do with magic and magicians? Well, on Monday nights the venerable Sullivan Street Playhouse in Greenwich Village, New York is dark, that is, it was dark. Now it plays host to a different trio of parlor magicians and a close-up duo who display their feats of legerdemain for appreciative crowds who are continually looking for unique entertainment. Hence the name of the show, Monday Night Magic (MNM).

And these tricks are not just for kids. On the September night I visited, Todd Robbins amazed the packed house with tricks not suitable for the squeamish. He walked on glass, ate a 60 watt light bulb, and drove a nail into his nose. Not your typical sleight of hand faire. During intermission, the audience was treated to true "close-up" magic by two magicians in the upstairs Fantasticks Museum. J.B Benn and Frank Brents were separated by about 20 feet and 50 years but equally matched at their proficiency of pasteboard prestidigitation as playing cards danced at their fingertips.

Back for the second half, Jamy lan

Swiss provided us with a delightful cup and ball routine from the streets of India, he showed us a little black bag that allowed a little white egg to continually vanish then reappear, and he finished with a heart warming story about the first magician he ever saw perform at Radio City Music Hall. During the story, Jamy recreated the trick he saw that magician do as he tore apart a cigarette paper then miraculously put it back together.

What makes this all the more entertaining is the intimacy of this venue. The theatre only seats 148 people with people seated at a 180 degree angle around the magicians. Spectators on the wings watch in hopes of learning how it was done, but these magicians are not your common tricksters. Try as you might, you can't see how they do it. You could say that the closer you watch, the less you see! Professional magicians from around the country and across the globe vie for a treasured spot on the small stage.

The opening act that evening was Michael Chaut who changed the color of a small hanky and surreptitiously stole a spectator's watch only to have it reappear inside a locked box which was held by the gentleman's wife throughout the performance. Michael was filling in that night for an act that was under the weather. But that's only part of his job. Michael is the creator and producer behind MNM. He puts on the show and works with a committee to find the right blend of talent each week.

"MNM started as an idea to bring intimate parlor and close-up magic to New York," said Chaut. "Los Angeles has the famed Magic Castle (a private nightclub for both magicians and non-magicians) and Houston has its elite Magic Island (a public nightclub), but since Mostly Magic (another public nightclub) closed in New York four years ago, quality magic has been missing from the New York night life. I just wanted to bring it back." London started the ball rolling in 1995 with a similar idea also entitled MNM. The creative idea apparently struck Chaut without his knowledge that London's MNM was already up and successfully running. Since their "unofficial" opening earlier this year, Michael has had the cofounders of London's MNM perform on the Sullivan Street stage. As a result of their friendship and exchange of creative ideas, the two are now affiliated.


Another similar venue opened in the Boston area nearly two years ago and offers locals and visitors something different each Tuesday night. That same evening I was there, Jon Stetson, producer of Boston's "Magicians and Spirits" was there to exchange some ideas with Michael Chaut. With the popularity of magic on television and in Las Vegas, perhaps this idea might catch on across the nation. In the meantime, you can catch the magic in Greenwich Village every Monday night. It's "Fantastick!"




Loch David Copperfield and the Magic Coloring Book.
