





January Meeting

January is comedy month for Ring 76. A time to put away the more serious aspects of our craft, and look at the lighter side.

The pre-meeting featured a panel discussion on the importance of performance and stage craft. Sometimes overlooked by the magician, it is not the trick, but how it is presented that is important.

Dick Dale and Mike Clickman led an informative review of basic stage directions, the importance of being reviewed before you perform, and presenting yourself as well as the effect. Magic is more than just doing tricks, and this brief lecture reminded us of that.

Julie Dale called the meeting to order. Treasurer Gary Dismukes sent his regrets, but the rest of the Board of Directors were present. Thirty-two members and five guests filled the American Legion hall. Dick Dale announced the upcoming lecture by Ali Bongo, and Gary Schwartzwald announced that Falkenstein and Willard have been signed to preform at July's installation banquet.

The next order of business was the audition of new members. It is Ring 76's policy that all new members must audition before the group. Tonight' auditioners were Tom McCarthy and Bob Matchinske (with his lovely assistant Cheryl Boyd). Tom dazzled us with a Monty effect with blank cards, then again with queens, while Bob start off with a cut and restored string, went to cards manufactured by . the Otis elevator corporation, and finished with a flashy billiard ball routine set to the best music available . . . a kazoo. performers received bounding applause and unanimous acceptance

With that, the business meeting was closed and the magic portion art of the evening could begin.

Baffling Bill Cody
Started the show by calling up Richard
Ustick and Jamie Henkim. A card was selected and amount of that card was magically transported from Jamie's hand into Richard's. Cody then took an

Indian knife (with Norwegian blade), stabbed it into a deck, and removed the chosen card. **Dennis Filangeri**, whose Indian name is "Dances with pasta," presented a king and queen card transposition set to rhyme. The patter in verse enhanced an already well honed performance.

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Bryan McDaniel called upon Julie Dale to assist him in a baffling card trick with a well trained rabbit puppet. Greg Wauson started with a good opening remark, then with the help of Jeff Smith demonstrated his version of Martin Lewis "cardiographic." In Greg's version the pack is drawn, then handed to the spectator to find the chosen card. An inside joke any magician would find amusing. Tom Kassner called Charlie Norris up to the front of the room to pick a card. A larger card was held up, back to the audience, and a young lady was asked to use her "psychic" powers to guess the value of Charlie's card. A mysterious pattern of lights formed on the back of the large card aiding the prediction. Bob Pozner finished the evening of comedy magic with a routine culled from every magic bar in San Diego.

As always the talents of Ring 76 were well represented.

Next month will be the annual Close-up Competition. All members are invited to enter.

Board Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:00, in the home of Secretary Richard Ustick. Ralph Mauzy sent his regrets, all other board members and Gary Schwartzwald were present.

Richard Ustick will be this year's auctioneer. All members who wish to auction their magic are welcome to do so. The only fee is to donate an item to be auctioned for the benefit of the ring. You do not have to participate in the swap meet to auction your items.

The April meeting will feature dues collection and guest lecture. The lecturer is still to be

determined. The theme for the May meeting will be paper magic, with a video to be shown at the pre-meeting. June will host the annual Stand-Up contest. All members in good standing are welcomed to perform. July will feature the Installation banquet. Falkenstein and Willard have been confirmed as performers for this year's banquet and it will be held at the American Levion Hall.

The next order of business was the current financial condition of Ring 76. Treasurer Gary Dismukes has reported that, due to unusual monetary burdens, the treasury is very low. The exact figure is not know as the latest bank statement was not available, and receipts from the last raffle were yet to be deposited. One solution for the problem was to increase membership dues. On a vote of 6-1 this idea was tabled for discussion with the Ring at the next meeting. Gary Schwartzwald will write an editorial for the newsletter outline the reasons

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why a dues increase is in the best interest of the Ring.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned. The next meeting will be on February 26^{th} , at the home of Gary Dismukes. As always, all members are welcome to attend.

Phil The Magnificent Dies

Phil Stagg, better known to his fellow magicians as "Phil the Magnificent" died January 10th, after a long illness that included Leukemia, Cancer and Heart trouble.

Phil served in the U.S. Navy in World War II and saw action in the South Pacific. He retired form the Navy in 1969 after 31 years as a com-missioned officer. Stagg then went to work for the County of San Diego as a Deputy Public Administrator and held that position for 13 years. He and his wife Helen grew up living across the street from each other and enjoyed 55-years of married life.

Phil did not find magic as a hobby until late in life. But once his interest in the art was piqued he became a full-time magic enthusiast. He read books, talked with fellow magicians, watched videotapes and began doing shows for friends and civic groups. He loved to spend time in magic shops doing a close-up trick for anyone that would watch. He was a member of IBM Ring 76 and in his home workshop began building his own stage effects. His changing card under glass was a work of art. As was his color-changing rose routine.

Phil also knew and worked on ideas with magicians Gary Salisbury and Jim Burns. Phil and Jim Burns were longtime friends and spent hours talking magic and working out routines that Jim would perform on his tour of County Fairs. Phil the Magnificent was a comedy magician. But most of all he enjoyed the rewards that performing brings to those who practice magic as a hobby. Even during his illness he took time to practice his slights and was always coming up with new trick ideas and routines.

Cheap Seats

The Jonah Deck

Trick decks have generally lost their luster among experienced magicians.

Undoubtedly, this lack of enthusiasm is caused by too many beginners getting their hands on such decks and murdering the effects, or outright exposing

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the methods due to poor handling. What a shame! With the presentation skills of an experienced magician, you should be able to dazzle a crowd with a trick deck and forestall any problems from the spectators by your handling.

With this in mind, I present: THE JONAH DECK! All of you will recognize the Svengali principal at once, of course. The more experienced among you might recognize elements of Ralph Hull's "Pop-Eyed Eye-Popper" and Vernon's "Brainwave Deck."

think that I have a new wrinkle here, combining elements of these three. Get a magic friend to help you (saves money), and make up one of these decks for each of you.

 Buy two Svengali decks of the same brand but different back colors (i.e., red and blue Bicycle Poker 808s). The red-backed force card should be a black-suited card, and the blue-backed force card should be a red-suited card. The force card will be a lonah card, or bad luck card, in



the patter, so you might like the Queen of Spades (bad card in game of Hearts), but any card will do.

- 2. Swap your red force cards with your friendÆs blue force cards, and swap deck cases. Now each of you has a deck in which the short force cards are one color and the long indifferent cards are the other color. From this point on, I will assume that I am working with the red/force, blue/indifferent deck; if you have the reverse setup from this friendly exchange, just invert the colors in my descriptions below.
- 3. Apply roughing fluid to the faces of the force cards, and to the backs of the indifferent cards; let dry thoroughly. Apply fanning powder (use

one of the systems that treats each card individually) to the backs of the force cards, and to the faces of the indifferent cards. Using my red force back example, you now have a deck that will appear red-backed when ribbon-spread face-down, and that will show all indifferent cards when ribbon-spread face up. The roughing fluid hides the blue backs and the force cards (thanks to Ralph Hull here, for hiding the force cards in "PEEP"). You are now ready to learn the routine.

Remove your "red" cards from your red case. Ribbon spread the cards backs up, showing the red cards as you begin pattering about the simplest way to choose a card at random. Close up the cards, flip over, and ribbon spread face up; continue pattering about complete random choice of a card, whether the card is chosen face down, face up,or with a simple cut. Close up the cards, and hold them face UP by the sides in your left hand. Have the spectator cut the deck, which he will do by the ends, ensuring that the force card is left lying on the lower half of the cut.

Acting required here! Bemoan the exposed QS (substitute your force card here). "Oh, no! Not the Queen of Spades! Did you have to pick that one? That's my bad luck card! Strange things happen anytime the QS is chosen! I have even considered taking it out of the deck permanently! Here, try again..."

Take the cut from the spectator and replace it on the QS. Flip over the deck face down, and make a few complete cuts by the ends. Flip over the deck face up, and have the spectator cut to a new card. QS again! "I knew it. I knew it. I knew it...!"

Angrily take the cut portion from the spectator and replace it. Carefully square the cards, as if taking care that the QS does not show up again, and lay them face up on the table. You then cut the deck yourself by the ends; QS again! "ARGGH! Stop that!" Complete the cut so that the QS is on the face of the deck looking up at you.

Remove the QS from the face of the deck and slap it on the table, face down so that the red back shows. Shout to the QS, "Quit looking at me that way!" Flip the cards face down as if preparing to deal, and the blue-backed deck shows! Look wildly back and forth at the red and blue backs. "What happened?!" Flip the deck back face up, and replace the QS on its face. Cut again: two QS showing! Complete the cut, and cut again: two more QS showing! Complete the cut, leaving the QS looking up at you from the face of the deck.

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Wipe your forehead or rub your eyes with your free hand. Hold the deck in the customary Svengali manner for riffling to show all of the force cards at once, but higher so the blue backs show. Riffle, and nothing but blue backs and QS show! "This can/Et be happening!" Look wildly around at the spectators, as if seeking help. Flip the deck over face down, and cut, completing the cut. "Finally, some sanity!" you say, as the red-backed card appears. Slap the deck down on the table, and hurriedly ribbon-spread, breathing a sigh of relief as the cards show all red!. Close up, flip the deck face up, and ribbon spread to show no QS/all indifferent cards. "Whew! That was a close

one! ThatÆs all the bad luck I want for today!"

Case the deck, and toss it into your closeup case or jacket pocket, and go into a non-card trick. Or, do a deck switch as spectators freak out and ask to see the deck (I'll discuss deck switches next month!)
