Magic Goes To War

In the wake of September 11th and the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center twin towers and the attack on the Pentagon and the crash of a fourth commercial jetliner in a field in Pennsylvania, all the work of terrorists, our world has changed.

In the weeks since the "Attack on America" we have found magicians are once again in the forefront of building moral and in many cases forgoing their fee for performing by presenting a fundraiser for a variety of causes.



A case in point that caught our attention was the Sunday following the Attack on America. San Diego based magician Terry Godfrey, who because the airline industry was grounded could not make it to a fair date he had booked in Texas. So he contacted the management of Seaport Village here in San Diego and told them he would

produce a magic show free of charge, if he could pass the hat for donations. Then he asked Seaport Village to match the donations he took in from his three shows. The money was sent to the New York Firefighter's Association's Widow and Children's fund.

It was a kind act by a performer who did not want to sit idle on a Sunday afternoon while others suffered. Terry told MagiCurrents in an e-mail. "I decorated my performing area with flags. After I gathered my audience I explained to them the situation. I told them that Seaport Village frowned on "passing the hat" for donations following a show, but they had agreed to this one time event to help other's across the nation. The audience applauded and donated after the performance."

IBM Printing New Membership Directory

At first thought a directory of the entire IBM membership sounds like a great idea. But it is turning into a nightmare for IBM officials.

The national office of the IBM in St. Louis, Missouri, has entered into an agreement with a national marketing and publishing company to print a complete directory of all IBM members worldwide. The directory is to be released in 2002, and will include all members names, addresses, e-mail address and length of time with the IBM.

IBM has given every members name and personal information to the marketing group, which is editing that information into book form. You may have already received a phone call from the marketing company asking if the information they have on you is correct? Then the person calling will then ask if you would like to purchase a copy of the directory.

The hardback edition is selling for \$70-dollars there is a less expensive soft back edition also available. They will tell you they are only printing the number of copies ordered and if you do not order now you will not be able to purchase a copy of the directory in the future.

In recent weeks we have been hearing horror stories of telephone sales people applying pressure tactics on members to purchase the directory. Some members have informed MagiCurrents the sales people on the other end of the phone will "not" take no for an answer.

IBM Headquarters tells us they have been trying for years to put together a complete roster of members and the only way they could get the quality they wanted is by farming it out to a private marketing group who will create, print and sell the book. The private information in the book on each IBM member will not be used or sold by the marketing group other than appearing in the directory. IBM officials say they have heard and are concerned about the high-pressure sales tactics and will speak to the publishing company.

Many have questioned the need for such a publication and still others believe the planned directory will be outdated by the time it is in print. Some members are upset that their names and personal information would be given to an outside company to publish. IBM Officials say they had no idea they were creating such a hotbed of controversy.

We are told that Burton takes an active hand in the management of both magazines and has pumped a lot of new money into both sheets now that he is publisher.

Being a magazine publisher is a lucrative business anywhere but it could insure Lance a steady income in Vegas long after he is no longer that cities reigning magician. It is good magic to always look to the future.

The Social hour began at 6 p.m., with a small group of members arriving early to watch the work of Tom McCarthy the Ring Sgt at Arms doing his card magic from behind the bar as members sipped on pink lemonade.

The meeting began at 7:10 with President Don Soul calling things to order. Guests were introduced, Gary Salisbury a longtime member rejoined the ring, Jim Whiting a past members was on hand for the evening as was Bobbie Lee, Sugar Bear, who is a clown/magician, Howard Arros, and David Eldridge.

Members heard from Phil Stoker who was a professional magician in Thailand for 13-years

He is retiring from magic and is selling his illusions and magic. His magic garage sale will be held in October and highlighted in another section of this newsletter.

We were reminded of the Doug Brewer lecture the following evening. Diane Lane then conducted the raffle; we had four items that included a packet card trick, a coin trick, videotape and an autographed poster from John Calvert. The raffle netted \$70.00 for the ring treasury. Sumit Dua our treasurer gave a report an announced we have \$1572.92 in the treasury.

Jack White introduced the members to the Ring 76 Library and gave the members an over view of its contents and showed them a brief card trick from one of the volumes.


We then broke the group up into smaller groups and began the feature portion of the evening our "magic teach in". Our instructors for the evening were three longtime ring members and a new but very experienced and talented member who is a joy to watch with cards.



Diane Lane was at table one with a series of rope routines. Diane cut a hank of rope for each person to work with as they learned a "popping knot" routine among other rope moves. You could hear a lot of laughter from this table

as members worked with the ropes.

At table two Bob Ingalls who is an excellent teacher of magic taught a very clean coin matrix with four quarters and four cards. This is one of those tricks that come in handy when you have no props and someone says hey lets see a trick. Bob took his time and





walked each member through the effect.

At table three was Bob Pozner teaching some of the basics of good coin work. Palming and general handling. Bob brought with him a handful of coins so that

each of his students could do the moves with him as he demonstrated. His coin in ear routine is very clever and again we heard a lot of laughing from his table.



Table four had Syd Segal presenting five of his own

card effects. Syd took great pains to show each move and went so far as to have notes printed up so that serious students could take them home and practice this very clever series of card tricks.



The instructors spent about 20-minutes at each table presenting their effects and helping the students learn. The instructors would then move to the next table and start all over again with a new group. It was a friendly and spirited group of entertainers and students.

Many said this was the kind of event they joined the ring hoping to attend. Another teach in session is planned for next spring.

The teach in took an hour and 40 minutes to complete and if you paid attention you could not help but learn several tricks by the time the session was over.

For those who needed to move around a little bit Jeff Marcus was at the bar teaching some excellent rubber band magic.





Used Magic Book Heaven


If you are into used books especially magic books

Magician and Ring 76 member Jeff Smith was moved by Terry Godfrey's efforts to do something to help others through his magic and sent e-mail letters to other magicians urging them to make an effort no matter how small to help those who's lives were in ruin.

The editors of MagiCurrents and the Board of Directors of Ring 76 concur with these efforts. We know there are many members of the magic fraternity who have given of their time in similar efforts that we have not heard about and we applaud their efforts as well.

While every performer has his or her own style of magic we thought it might be appropriate to list some effects that may work well during this period of crisis. All of these tricks are described in books that currently are available in the Ring 76 Library. What follows are merely suggestions for performers looking for special material to add to their acts. Sometimes the older material can be fresh and new to audiences of today.

Tarbell Volume 3, how to make an American Flag Blendo page 317. A Color Changing silk with a hank tube using red, white and blue silks and American Flag. In Tarbell Volume 4, a routine for Cut & Restored Red, White and Blue Ribbon.

Rice's Encyclopedia of Silk Magic Volume 1, the Fan & Flags routine page 480, also on page 482 a flag effect called, "Changing of the Colors". Rice's Encyclopedia of Silk Magic Volume 2 there are two excellent routines for Mismade Flag page 824. On page 844 of the same volume at trick titled "Pusha Da Push" a sensational routine with a dye tube and American Flag and some great patter. On page 1001 a version of 20th Century Silks with the American Flag.

There are many other routines with a patriotic flavor. Red, white and blue billiard balls, volume one of the Phoenix page 10 and 128 has a routine with red, white and blue linking ropes. In Mark Wilson's Complete Course in Magic



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page 382 there is a wonderful table design constructed out of the stars and stripes.

I must also remind you of an effect that was presented by the late Frank Herman during World War II and the Korean War, he worked with a red, white and blue Trouble Wit and had a wonderful story to go with it. The routine is in

Magic Inc's, Trouble-Wit Book. Frank called this "move"in the accompanying photo, with the Trouble-Wit, "The CIA Girdle, because it sneaks up in the behind."

During this time of national crisis there is nothing wrong with including a patriotic effect in your show or as a finish to your act. It is in keeping with the times.


You may be able to attend the IBM Convention next summer for a small fraction of the regular registration fee.Or you may win one or more exciting prizes that range from new magic video's to a new book.

Last year at this time I described a large number of suggestions for tailoring your magic show to a Halloween theme. One of my suggestions, a Jack-O-Lantern Square

Circle, caught the attention of Ring 76 V.P. Dick Ustick, who requested that I detail my construction and painting of this item for this year's Halloween issue. I had great fun with mine, performing it as a climax of a 25 minute show that I performed seven times in four hours at a school Harvest Festival. I hope you will make this mood-setting prop and use it annually during the month of October.

Materials needed:

Medium to Large Plastic Jack-O-Lantern Candy

Pail

Large Metal Can (holds Grapefruit Juice or Orange

Juice)

Medium to Large Instant Oatmeal Round Box Small Piece of Half-Inch Plywood (2' by 2' at

most)

Small Bottle of Carpenter's Glue Model Car/Airplane Glue (optional)

Testors™ Gloss Black Model Paint & small brush (optional)

> Spray Can of Metal Primer Spray Can of Flat Black Paint Spray Can of Flat White Paint Spray Can of Gloss Enamel Yellow Paint X-acto[™] Knife (small diagonal razor on a handle) Full Sheet of Newspaper Masking Tape

Construction:

Use the X-acto[™] knife to cut off the jack-o-lantern pail's handle. Turn the pail bottom up, and use the knife to carefully pierce the bottom of the pail. Work your way to the outer edge of the bottom (flat base area), and cut around the circumference of the base, removing the entire flat base plastic. This is the only tough part of the construction, so work slowly and cautiously to prevent personal injury from a slipping blade. Smooth up any rough edges with tiny knife cuts, and you are left with a jack-o-lantern tube. Note that the new bottom opening will not be as large as the top opening due to the circumference of the original base being smaller than the top opening of the JOL. Use the knife to pierce and carefully cut out the indented, black-painted

eyes, nose, and mouth on the pail, leaving about "o" of the black outline around these facial feature holes, or repainting around these openings with the optional Testors paint. Be sure to leave the "teeth" intact to keep as much character as possible. You might even glue on some ears, perhaps cut from the scrap base plastic and glued on with the optional model car/airplane glue. This pumpkin will function as your "square."


Fold the newspaper in quarters or eighths (depending upon the size of your pail) and insert it into your pail. Force it up against the inside of the "face" (front of the pail) and around the inside of the pail until exactly half of the inner circumference of the pail (the front half) is covered. Use the masking tape to secure into position. Shake the flat black paint fully, and go outside (or into a well-ventilated area) to prepare for spraying. Paint the entire inner rear half of the pail flat black; the newspaper will mask off the inner front of the pail so that it does not receive paint. Set aside to dry.

The next step depends upon the size of your pail and its new bottom opening. Measure the diameter of your new opening carefully, and choose appropriate sizes of oatmeal box and juice can for the""circle" and the""invisible" tube. If you have a large JOL pail, a large oatmeal box will fit into the new bottom opening of the pail, and the juice can will fit into that. If you have a small or medium JOL pail, the juice can will be the outer tube and the oatmeal box will be the inner tube. If you chose a juice can that is too close to the size of your oatmeal box, use a 13 oz. coffee can for the inner tube, or get a larger outer can.

Use a can opener to remove the entire top of the juice can. Chill the juice in another container, and drink it during construction to keep you refreshed. Use the can opener to remove the bottom of the can. Smooth any rough edges on the top and bottom of this metal tube. Remove the can's label and wash thoroughly, setting aside to dry.

Open the oatmeal box and save the contents for future breakfasts. Remove the bottom, which is NOT an easy task; I took my box to a friend's woodworking shop and had him cut it off smoothly and cleanly with a band saw.

Prime your metal can with the spray primer, and allow drying for about an hour. Prime your cardboard tube View from the Cheap Seats Continues on page 8.

with the flat white spray paint, and allow drying similarly. Now, use the flat black spray paint to finish your "invisible" tube (make it black inside and outside), and the gloss yellow spray paint to make your outer tube. Allow both tubes to dry thoroughly, and second coat for total coverage. Two light coats are always better than one heavy coat.

Cut your plywood to an appropriate size base for your Pumpkin Square Circle. Use the remaining scrap to cut four blocks about 2" by 2", and use carpenter's glue to attach them to the base as feet. Paint the base with two coats of flat black, both on the top and bottom, and set aside to dry.

Assemble your effect by placing the black tube in the center of the base, covering it with the yellow tube, and covering both with the pail. The yellow of the inner tube shows through the jack-o-lantern's eyes, nose, and mouth, giving the appearance of a lighted JOL. Load as usual and perform as any Square Circle. If you can produce spooky items from the seasonal departments of Dollar T ree/Big Lots/Wal-Mart, your production will retain unity of mood. Concocting a storyline around the JOL would be ideal for a kid's show. I produced a small terrarium bowl with water and a couple of goldfish in it as the climax of my load.

Have fun with this Jack-O-Lantern Square Circle, and drop me an email to tell me how it all worked out for you.

Magic Notes From Jack White: Making Magic Stronger!

Many of you may know about a special online IBM Ring that is e-mailed everyday. It's called IBM Ring 2100 any dues paying IBM member can belong and receive the information.

Recently a San Diego magician Greg Wythe who is an IBM member but not a member of Ring 76 had the following item online. I found it most interesting and good food for thought. Here is part of what Greg had to say.

If you, as a magician, see another magician and notice he or she is "flashing" a gimmick or some other obvious error in their show, do you say anything to them?

I recently watched a magician from a balcony seat in a theater that features just magic. I could see very clearly how many of his tricks worked. He did a metamorphosis and I could see his assistant lying on the floor behind the platform. It was not his fault it was the fault of the venue. I was torn as to whether or not to tell him after the show, I did not because I was unsure if it would seem out of line.

Another example was a street magician in San Francisco who told me, after I mentioned to him that I was a fellow magician that he was the "finest street magician I would ever see." He was the most God-awful insult to magic I have ever seen. He did a very clumsy linking ring routine in which he flashed very badly every time he linked or unlinked. He did a three-card monte with a gaffed card that flashed every time he turned it over and he spoke his patter like Marlon Brando as the godfather reading a Hungarian translation of the Magna Carta. Spectators were walking away saying "did you notice you could see the......."

What is the proper way to let someone know that they are making an error without sounding pompous or condescending?

I think we can all identify with Greg Wythe's comments and share his quest for how do I handle these situations. A Professional Magician Paul Sponaugle had these comments in response that make good sense.

If a friend sees how an effect is done, that is sometimes due to the familiarity between the two people, but if you, as a total stranger, can see what I'm doing, I want to know about it.

Personally, I would prefer that I be told that I am flashing a card, or that you can see the coin between my fingers.

Frankly I would much rather have a fellow magician tell me than hear if from some loud mouth in the audience.

Magic club meeting are a good place to have your magic critiqued. Some rings have a critique sheet that is handed to a performer after their show. A committee of advanced performers usually fills out the sheet.

We must all depend on video-tape, or the good-will of a knowledgable magician to tell us of our mistakes and hopefully how to correct them.


Criticism is very hard to take, especially if we are on the receiving end. But if the criticism is given as honest and helpful advice it may go a little easier and perhaps make a mediocre magician a good performer.

I don't think that we can afford to be so thin-skinned that we risk sullying our art in order to protect our fragile ego's. If that's the case, just think how our egos will be bolstered when we do the effects WELL and people are mystified by our legerdermain.

We hope that each member that performs at Ring 76 functions will make an effort to help fellow members in a constructive way. Let those that present some tricks and slights that need work or that deliver unclear patter know there is room for improvement. But do it in a constructive way.

If you are on the telling end of the conversation, then try to phrase your comments in such a way as to not sound like you are making a blanket indictment of the performer's abilities.

The important note in all of this is trying to be helpful. We thank Greg Wythe for asking the difficult question of how do we handle this situation.
