David asked to audition and his bubbly personality and enthusiasm got him a round of applause as he presented a card routine. When he finished he was asked to leave the room while

Jack White then introduced a reel of 16mm film clips of magicians of the past. Several clips of film were kinescope prints from television programs.

The film included Harry Blackstone Sr presenting a card trick using a lot of showmanship and a Svengali Deck and 10-volunteers from the audience. That clip was broadcast in 1958. It was followed by a clip from a daytime variety show and featured Harry Blackstone Jr., pre-beard and moustache. Harry Jr.



was very young and presented the vanishing birdcage and his pickpocket routine. The next clip was from a variety show known as Super Circus and featured a performer whose identity we cannot be sure of but presented such a well routined billiard ball act that blended into Lloyds multiplying candles that his work brought a round of applause from our membership watching the 50-plus year old film.

The next clip was Richardi Jr. Appearing on a program called "Hippodrome". This vintage clip of film was from 1962, and shows the dancing and prancing fast moving Richardi and company. His canary in egg is still beautiful to watch even today.

Our film program was concluded with a theatrical short subject from 1946 featuring John Scarne. The film was an expose of gambling moves. But it was actually a clear explanation of how magicians do their card tricks. Scarne had written a popular column for servicemen and women during World War

Two explaining what to look out for in card games.

When this film was released magicians across the country were up in arms over the public exposure of the sleight of hand involved in this magic. You might say that John Scarne was the Masked Magician of his time.

It is interesting to note that several of the younger magicians in the audience thought Jack White was slurring his words when he talked about close-up magician John Scarne. They

thought Jack was talking about John Carney and they couldn't understand why he was putting an "S" in front of Carney's name. (Oh, to be young and not know.)

sold they gave out some very nice gifts that included books and video's. The top prize which was valued at more than onehundred dollars worth of magic went to Bob Ingalls.


After the dealer night presentation there was a lot of fellowship and exchange of magic ideas with many of our members.



A couple of fiction books that might interest the magic community are now available and would make ideal holiday gift giving suggestions.

#### "Carter Beats the Devil"

First off is, "Carter Beats the Devil" written by David Glen Gold. This is an historical fiction novel about Magician Charles Carter, aka Carter the Great. Overall the book is historically very accurate and will bring you in contact with a variety of real life characters, including President Harding. Gold takes the reader through Carter's upbringing, his discovery of magic, his personal life, and of course, his career.

Carter was a California guy, so some of the background information may add a little extra reading pleasure for Golden State historians. You get a great sense of the time period and how life was, for a performer climbing the entertainment ladder. Author Gold brings suspense and intrigue to the reader and easily will keep you turning the pages.

Although the ending is a bit too fictionalized for my tastes, I think this book is definitely a worthwhile and enjoyable read. Give this book a try if you are into magic and history. I guarantee it will beat the devil out of many other magic based novels.

#### "Grift Sense"

James Swain is one of those highly talented Florida magicians, and a pretty nice guy. I read his first novel, "The Man Who Walked Through Walls", several years ago. I thought it was an excellent magic based novel and have been anxiously awaiting his next book. Well it's out and I read it.

The only bad news is that it is not magic based. "Grift Sense", as you can tell by the title, is a con man, hustling, gambling, themed novel. If you like gambling stuff, and fast paced, fun, its pretty damned interesting.

Many authors open their novel with a quote. If you enjoy the following quote that Swain uses in "Grift Sense", you'll enjoy the book.

"And God said to Moses
Moses come forth
And Moses came fifth
And cost God
Two hundred and fifty bucks."

Some years ago I spent time researching what I hoped would be the best, easiest and most lucrative method of working restaurants as a magician. I interviewed friends all over the country and read literally everything that I could find on working this peculiar venue.

Here is the plan I came up with to make restaurant work a success.

 Have a professional photograph taken of you in a magic pose. Then have it professionally mounted in a glass covered picture frame with copy that might read something like, "The Amazing Magic of Brad Burt. LIVE at your table courtesy of Joe's Restaurant."

The above should all be professional hand lettered and hung in a conspicuous place so those coming into the restaurant can see it and know which days and the time you will appear. This will become the magician's first encounter with patrons or the restaurant.

- Have again, professionally produced tent cards
  that can be placed in those small metal-holding
  clips that you often find on restaurant tables.
  Have "no" mention of tips, just that the magician
  is available to entertain patrons of the restaurant.
  The table tent should instruct guests to ask the
  server or wait person to have the magician to
  come to your table.
- Make sure you have plenty of business cards in your pockets at the restaurant to hand out to people you entertain because they become potential clients.
- 4. What this system does is eliminate the awkward approach of "cold calling" at a table.

Now you have a more comfortable situation for both you and the restaurant audience. It also looks much more professional and thus you are more likely to be able to quote a higher price for outside shows that come from those who watch you work at the restaurant.

One reason this approach does not find favor with some magicians, I believe, is because it will involve a modest capital out lay of several hundred dollars. But magicians who have used this method tell me it is money well spent.

I urge you to give this method a try the next time you have a restaurant gig to work. It will bring you the magician prestige and bigger tips.

There will be NO board meeting in December!







With the holidays upon us you may be thinking about gifts in a magical vein, and there is nothing better than a good magic book. I will toss out a few favorites of mine that you might consider. This article could fill up the entire December newsletter if I made recommendations on videos, props, silks etc., so I will restrain myself to notable books making their reappearances.

Bound periodicals are experiencing resurgence, and most magicians would really enjoy them. Tricks, philosophies, discussions, reviews, and humor by "name" performers are all present, and the books are goldmines of ideas. Contributors are literally a "who's who" of magical writers, thinkers, and performers past and present. The list that follows is only a small assortment of the many titles available.

Magic Menu, Jim Sisti—10 years in two volumes Phoenix, Bruce Elliott—6 volumes
Jinx, Ted Annemann—3 volumes
Apocolypse, Harry Lorayne—3 volumes

Getting a friend or relative started in magic is fun for you, and good for magic. Some wonderful beginner books are once again in print, and here are a few of my favorites.

The Magic Book, Harry Lorayne filled with good effects and good teaching techniques.

Complete Course In Magic, Mark Wilson, is a classic book and a lifetime reference.

Amateur Magician's Handbook, Henry Hay, may actually be to good for the casual beginner.

Magic for Dummies, or Idiot's Guide to Magic,
and books for testing interest, but both contain som

good books for testing interest, but both contain some gems from "name" performers.

Dropping a hint to a loved one for a gift? Many classic magic books are now in print once again and this is the chance to add them to your library. Our Magic,

Maskelyne and Devant—a great read for thinking magicians.

**Greater Magic, J.N. Hilliard** (Kaufman expanded edition)—a must in every magic library.

Modern Coin Manipulation, T. Nelson Downs—the coin book that started it all.

**Sleight of Hand, Sachs**—get a used 1940's Fleming edition if you possibly can.

**Art of Magic by T.Nelson Downs**—ghostwritten by J.N. Hilliard, predates Greater Magic and an excellent book.

Modern Magic, More Magic, Later Magic all by Hoffman—older books all filled with good ideas to up date

Modern Magic Manual, Jean Hugard—much standard information in this volume and a great reference book.

There is more than enough here to keep you reading and studying for years! So, drop a hint for your wants, give a start in magic to a friend, or give friend hours of reading pleasure. May your holiday season be magical in every sense of the word, and keep the magic alive in 2002!

### Magic Notes from Jack White

### Never a dull moment at a Magic Shop:

As you have no doubt already read in this publication Mary and T.C. Coley made a significant contribution to our November meeting. This is not the first time they made the members of Ring 76 the beneficiaries of their kindness. The Coley's operate the Seaport Village Magic Shop and the Southpaw Store (left handed store). They have been in business for themselves all their married life.

They began operation of the magic shop at Seaport Village, September 11, 1989. Neither of them knew anything about magic. Gary Buss, had a magic shop next to the Coley's Southpaw store. When he went out of business and closed up Mary started stocking a line of magic and joke items.

The day I dropped by the store was one of those sunny

afternoons and we were seated on a bench in front of the magic shop. Mary and T.C., said they welcomed a few minutes away from the hustle and bustle of the store to talk about what they have



accomplished over the years.

The Seaport Village Magic Shop is open from 10 in the morning until 9 at night, seven days a week 365 days a year. Yes, that means no real days off for the people who run this shop.

Mary says she and her husband realized from the beginning they were going to have to learn how to perform many of the tricks they sold. They told me that from time to time a magician would drop by and show them a couple of moves to make a trick work a little better but for the most part they learned the hard way by performing the same trick over and over again at the counter of the shop.

Mary's favorite trick is "Scotch & Soda" a coin trick by Johnson Products. One morning while working behind the counter David Copperfield who was appearing with his big illusion show here in San Diego sauntered into the shop.

Mrs. Coley recognized him immediately and did what any good magic store owner would do; she said, "Would you like to see a trick, David?"

He smiled and said, "Yes, I would." You must remember this is a person who was new to the magic business asking the most famous magician in the world if he wanted to see some magic.

Mary picked up her scotch and soda coins and went into her routine. When she finished Copperfield said, "I want one of those and I need some of these gag items." He began pulling various packaged joke items off the racks on the walls of the store and piling them up on the counter. It's not every magic shop that can brag that David Copperfield is one of their regular customers. Yes, David drops by the Seaport Village Magic Shop almost everytime he is in town and his parents who live in LaJolla come to the shop from time to time and purchase items for themselves and to send to David.



The Coley's have tried to make their shop a full service magic shop. While they stock a large supply of what magicians call "slum magic" which is the inexpensive

stuff that keeps the shop going. They also have a good supply of parlor and stand up props for local and visiting magi. They carry a nice line of Morrissey Magic as well as Viking, Tenyo and other prominent manufacturers of clever magic.

The joke department is really the bread and butter line of material. I was happy to learn from T.C., that someone is currently making a snake can with a spring snake that is covered in silk instead of the more common plastic. He added that the hottest joke item right now is a battery operated "Fart Machine". Of course the Whoopee Cushion, Joy Buzzer and Whoops the phony vomit are still popular joke items and continue to be good sellers.

You will find a nice supply of the latest books in magic on their shelves. Both hardcover and soft back volumes. But the Coley's are quick to tell you that videotapes are now outselling books on magic. So they carry a big line of videotapes and encourage the beginners to watch the tapes to better learn how to handle the tricks they purchase.

Mary says she and her husband learned early on they had to demonstrate the tricks they sell and when someone purchased a trick they had to teach them the handling of the trick as well. They became sales people and teachers in one day.

The Coley's are in their store almost everyday and they love getting out on the floor and meeting people and showing them something that entertains and mystifies and gives them a laugh at the same time. But they do get away for a few days at a time to attend a magic dealers show, or gift show to see what is new and make their purchases.

Mary was born at University Hospital here in San Diego and grew up not to far from Jack's Magic Place on 33<sup>rd</sup> street. T.C. was raised in Tyler, Texas and came to San Diego to work for Convair. The two met and were married and moved back to Texas where they operated their own floor covering business for 21-years.

They moved back to Southern California and T.C. opened a lock shop in Oceanside, Mary became a real estate broker. She still maintains her real estate license.

Today Mary says, looking out over the crowd at Seaport Village she gets more satisfaction out of selling a dollar forty-nine cent joke item than watching a half million-dollar real estate deal crumble because a seller backs out or a buyer does not qualify for a loan. But she has kept her real estate license just incase.

Since the events of the terrorist attack on America on September 11<sup>th</sup> business has been very slow. The Coley's say September and early October were the slowest months business wise since they opened the

magic shop. They are hoping for a good Christmas Holiday.

The Seaport Village Magic Shop normally has two good business seasons each year. July and August when the park is filled with tourists. Many of those tourists have been coming to this magic shop to make their purchases for 12-years. Some continue to purchase their magic through the shops website throughout the year.

The second business rush is during the Christmas holidays. The real rush will start when students are out of school and will continue through the first of the year.


Mary Coley will tell you that it's the people that come through their store each day that makes the business new and exciting for her and the six other people who work there. In the morning a group of young students come in and buy some jokes and Mary takes part in the process of making them laugh. That afternoon a semi-professional magician

drops by and looks over some of the close up magic in the case. Mary keeps in practice showing him a couple of the newer items.



Later that day a juggler arrives at the shop in search of the Dube line of juggling items they keep in stock. That evening she teaches a ten-year-old boy how to do a coin trick. There is never a dull moment at the Seaport Village Magic Shop.

I aimed at not only explaining my newly-discovered method (or at least, I think it is, although it may be similar to a Rossini move) but asked for background input regarding whether or not it had been published before, as it is such a simple move.

What I created instead was a lively debate amongst the e-mailed members of the local magic community - but also included Paul Gertner, Dave Goodsell and Dennis Marks from outside Ring 76 - about the attributes of "flair" vs. a layman's perception of magic and its moves.

So who's right and who's wrong? There is no such thing. I think it's a matter of personal preference, if I comprehended the comments accurately. Such a simple move as a
