IBM Board Meets in San Diego with Ring 76 Members:

The Board of Directors of the International Brotherhood of Magicians held their annual Midyear Meeting at the Town ... Country Hotel on Saturday January 5th 2002.

The IBM Convention Committee held their meeting the Friday afternoon before the board meeting and went over plans and budgets for this summers convention in San Diego. The IBM Conventions have for the past three years all lost money. Part of the problem has been lower attendance and higher costs for staging a convention.

The IBM has not raised the price of a registration for a convention in seven years. They voted to raise the price from 110-dollars to 150-dollars beginning in 2003. Which means the San Diego registration is still a bargin price. The Society of American Magicians charges 195-dollars for a registration to their convention.

It has been decided the main form of transportation from the Town & Country Convention Center, sight of this summers convention to the Civic Theater in Downtown San Diego for the three evenings of public shows will be via the San Diego Trolley. Those registering for the convention will be given the choice of receiving a four day trip ticket on the trolley or driving their own car to the theater.

Following the Saturday Board meeting 34-members of the IBM board and committees boarded a bus provided at no expense to the ring by Old Town Trolley Tours to

transport IBM Folks to Jack's Magic Museum on University Avenue, for a cocktail party, dinner and show by Ring 76 members.

This was an opportunity for the IBM people to get away from business and meet some of our members.

The board of directors of Ring 76 hosted this event with the help of many members. Paul Thomey, Tom McCarthy and Sumit Dua entertained our guests at the bar as they arrived. Michael E. Johnson worked the tables before and after dinner.

The show featured Richard Ustick and one of his magic songs that included his son Alex and daughter Cristina. Their performance brought a standing ovation from the IBM audience. Next Greg Wauson presented his "Pom Pom Stick" and received a big round of applause. Diane Lane did the Misers Dream with gloves on that created good reaction. David Lopez invited IBM President Robert Escher up on stage to help him with a card trick. Bob Ingalls presented some comedy magic as only Bob can do it. The show was closed by the sensational minapulation act of Armando Torres who also received a standing ovation and much praise for his act.

The January 2002, meeting was held one week earlier than usual because so many of our members go to the World Magic Seminar in Las Vegas, which is scheduled for the second week of January.

Our guests for the January gathering included Ron Kittle, Ted Dunning and Tom West. Working behind the bar were members Tom McCarthy and Sumit Dua. Both performers kept the members and guests entertained with their close-up skills.

President Don Soul called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m., as announcements were being made 2^{nd} Vice President Diane Lane was circulating through the membership selling raffle tickets. There were five raffle items and each one of them carried a minimum 10-dollar value with raffle tickets selling 6 for 3 dollars.

We were reminded of the Tim Ellis lecture January 17th. Dick Dale Territorial Vice President for Southern California encouraged members to attend the lecture and reported that the IBM Board of Directors had been pleased with the effort Ring 76 extended during their half yearly meeting in San Diego.

Ring Librarian Betty Armstrong announced the ring library has received two new books and encouraged members to check out books. She reminded everyone that books could be kept for a month at a time and should be returned when you are finished with them because others may be looking to check them out.

We said Farewell to Charlie Norris who is moving to Morgan, Utah to be closer to his two daughters. He has built a new home there and is looking forward to the move. At 76, Charlie says it is time to be closer to family.

We took a few minutes to audition

two members who have both applied for membership into Ring 76. First to audition was Josh Karatkiewicz, who goes by the stage name of Josh London. Josh presented a rope routine that was very professionally executed. It was a series of effects with knots, then two pieces of rope became one piece then the rope was cut and it became one solid loop and then returned to one long

piece of rope. Josh is a teenager and is a very accomplished magician with both close-up and stage presentations.

Our second audition was Ted Dunning, who specializes in closeup magic. He

began with a clever card location and then moved to coins. He presented a clever cards across. Ted has spend some time in magic and later in the evening stepped behind the bar to show our members a few of this moves with a deck of cards.

Following the audition the two performers were asked to leave the room while the membership unamously voted to accept both of them as members of Ring 76.

At this point Diane Lane conducted our auction and five people walked away with some new magic.

Terry Godfrey one of the very busy working pros within the ring was introduced to present a mini-lecture on card magic. Terry had just returned to San Diego after a gig in Arizona.

He handed out decks of cards to any of our members that did not bring one. Then quickly went into a demonstration of the double lift. Terry gave the members two different versions of the double lift and commented on several good books that have

additional material and several good tricks that involve the double lift.

Next came the "Pass" thought to be one of the most difficult sleights in magic. Terry teaches the Dai Vernon version of the Invisible Pass, then gave us a look at his own somewhat streamlined version of the pass.

Terry has an easygoing style and keeps going back over the moves in a slow and deliberate manner, which helps in learning. This was an excellent session that leads to our performance portion of the program.

Richard Ustick our 1st Vice President in charge of entertainment took over the program. He reminded all of us this evening was magic with playing cards.

The first performer was Jack White who presented a card stab with a jumbo deck of cards and a very large knife.

Next came Jeff Marcus who presented a trick that was very popular a few years ago and after witnessing Jeff's work we would guess it would become popular again. With a ticket type punch Jeff made a couple of holes in a playing card. Then we watched at the hole moved to different places on the card. Clever effect and well done.

Jim Thayer, another easy going performer stepped up on the stage and

Did a series of clever color changes with cards. Jim has come a long way since he first auditioned for the ring a year or so ago.

Don Holcomb, presented a comedy routine with that venerable "six card repeat" routine. By the time Don finished there was a bag full of playing cards and Don still had "one, two, three, four, five, six cards in his hand."

Ed Estrinf, did a four ace trick that was very different.

Ed's polished style made it a nice change of pace trick to watch.

Byron McDaniel's always comes up with something a little different and a trick that has a little twist to the ending. He did not disappoint us with this effect that was a card transposition.

Michael E. Johnson was next; he had just finished a show and came to the meeting still in his tux. He did a trick that is part of his regular close-up act called "Synchronicity". The props for this trick include a thousand dollar bill, a hundred dollar bill, a meteorite, a diamond, a fossil and a crystal ball. Michael gets the award for showmanship because he really builds this card trick up and turns it into a mini-program by itself.

Sumit Dua became the next performer. Cards are Sumits life when he is not going to medical school. His first trick was a matching prediction effect. Then he did one of the tricks he is including in a new videotape on cards called the "Sherlock Holmes Card Trick". Both were very effective card tricks.

Gary Dismukes has been doing clever card tricks for Ring 76 members since he was 16-years old and that was many years ago. He choose an effect that had 5-people select a card. Then through dealing five poker hands he found the five selected cards. This was another trick that had great showmanship and excellent execution.

Bob Pozner was our final performer of the evening and he presented a John Scarne trick that was in a film that was shown last year at a ring meeting. Bob started with an unopened new deck of cards. Had a member of the audience open the cards, they were shuffled and after

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New Ring Constitution & By-Laws Ready for a vote:

At the February 11th Meeting all members of Ring 76 will receive a copy of the new revised Constitution and By-Laws. Those not attending the meeting will receive their copy by U.S. Mail. This new work was revised from the 1995 Constitution and By-Laws that was never ratified by the membership.

President Don Soul appointed a committee soon after his election last June, to rework this document so the ring could operate with a ratified constitution. The committee included Don Soul, Richard Ustick, Dr. Joel Moskowitz and Jack White. These four with impute from Attorney Marcus Day have been going over all sections, every sentence and each word. After many months of work the final copy of the Constitution and By-Laws have been agreed upon by the committee.

In presenting this document to the general membership it is asked that everyone read over the material and then on a post card that will accompany the Constitution and By-Laws vote to accept or reject the document. The Ring Secretary must receive all ballots no later than March 1st. You are asked to keep your copy of the Constitution for future reference.

Ring President Don Soul reminds us that a Constution and By-Laws are necessary in conducting day-to-day ring business in an orderly fashion. Richard Ustick says he believes that many of the ambiguities of the former document have been removed or redefined to make the meaning of the document clearer to all concerned.

Ratification or acceptance of the Constitution and By-Laws will only require one vote over half of the ballots received by the secretary. Please take the time to read the document and send in your ballot. Every vote is important.

There is a great old proverb: "Faithful are the wounds of a friend."

That's cool, but what does it have to do with magic? You've done it all. You have the beginning of your act. You have the finale and you have stuffed the middle of your act with wonders sublime like a squirrel stuffing his cheeks with acorn meat. You've practiced all the 'pieces' and 'part' of your act: The moves, the feints, and the patter. You have ferreted out every possible manner in which you could encounter the slippery slope of failure and come up with clever 'outs' and recoveries. You pretty much have your act as perfect as you can get it. You think.....

Now, you prepare for a full dress production in front of the video camera. You perform. You perform as if you are in front of a full house. You pause when you are supposed to pause. You laugh when you should laugh. You stare out at the audience and pretend to see the response that you desire and react to it in kind. You relax and attempt to get the pacing correct. You are going for the gold as you pretend to do the finest act of your life while actually performing for the blank staring, uncaring eye of the video camera and the blank walls of your practice room. You attempt to do everything exactly the way that you believe it will happen in real life right down to "feeling" what you hope to feel during a performance high.

Then....you watch the tape and rip your act apart. You sit by yourself and make copious notes on where you stuttered because you really didn't get the patter down on that one routine. You curse your failure to show enough emotion as you perform the final movement of an effect that should have the audience gasping in their seats, eyes wide with horror as they realize that you are totally psychotic and have actually killed your assistant. (O.K., you can ignore that last statement. I am reading a new Stephen King novel as I write this.) You do your best to be as honest with yourself about what you see in that

videotape. And, then, you fix what you can and do it all over again. You do it again and again until you simply can't figure out anyplace that it can get any better.

And, then? You ask a friend to watch the finished product and rip it apart. Here you are: Faithful are the wounds of a friend. If you don't get an honest appraisal it is worthless to you. Will it hurt? Maybe, maybe not. It does, thank your friend even more for his or her help.

Audio tape what your friend has to say. See if you agree or disagree. Where you agree....Fix it! Follow the process. Work the process and you will end up with an act that can take you to Vegas or anywhere else you want to go as magic professional.

Lecture Schedule:

Ron London brings his lecture to Jack's Magic Place on March 13th 7 p.m., start time. Tickets will be sold at the door for \$10-dollars per-person bring a guest.

For many years Ron has organized hospital visits by magicians in cities hosting IBM Conventions. San Diego is no exception. He is planning on visiting several hospitals in this area and will have details on that project when he lectures here in San Diego.



Ice McDonald is working out dates in April to come to San Diego and present a lecture on creating your show. Ice began his magic career here in San Diego and has worked all around the country with his unique act. He will share tips on creating original material, framing your act and then getting it booked. Ring 76 Close-Up Contest

Monday Feb 11th

Plan to be part of this contest:



Always on the lookout for anything that can be pressed into service for magic purposes, I discovered some aluminum briefcase-style tool boxes with movable dividers. These can be found in many places: I have seen them at Home Depot and Lowe's Home Improvement stores in the \$25 to \$30 range, for example. Some models



have soft sculptable foam interiors, some have precut foam that can be broken out and rearranged as needed,

and one model has stiff foam over wood dividers (which in the one that I liked). Recently, however, I found a similar one, the same size (in inches, lying on its side, roughly 12d by 16w by 4.5h), for only \$15 at the local Wal-Mart. My wife saw me eyeing it and got it for my birthday. I think mine was called GREAT NECK.

These cases are shiny aluminum in a small diamond pattern, with lockable latches and keys included. Corners and all outside edges are protected with sturdily-riveted metal covers. One could easily mask off the corners and hardware, rough sand the flat areas, prime them, and paint them if he really hates the shiny look. The cases also have two sets of four feet to protect table tops from marring, and reinforced lid stands on the back, so that the lid will not break the case's hinge backbone.

A handy addition to the Great Neck version is a shoulder strap. The strap is one-inch nylon webbing, adjustable in length, with a two-inch rubber fatigue pad featuring tiny no-slip bumpers on the shoulder side. This strap hooks it!s hefty nylon spring clips onto a ring mounted on each side of the case by strong brackets and rivets.

The interior movable dividers, stiff foam over

wood, fit into slots every quarter to half inch. The case is easy to configure, and holds cards beautifully. One can lay the cards flat (face down), and three or four decks will fit into a space with exactly enough slack to pick them up from one end. Alternatively, stand the decks on their long sides, and four decks will fit exactly the same footprint as they did lying down, only they will be a tiny bit taller. Change the divider spacing to stand as many decks as needed on their sides.

The case has a lid tool holder of sixteen pockets, into which I put scissors, ink pens, pencils, Sharpie(tm)




marker, paring knife, and more (a set of color-changing knives would fit here beautifully). This tool holder snaps out via a rotating catch,

revealing ample room for larger flat effects behind it in the lid of the case (Jumbo cards, Presto Clock, Insurance Policy, etc.). A bit of open space between the top of the dividers and the case lid's tool holder allows you to put other larger items flat on top of everything else, such as a decent-sized close-up pad. I put four linking rings in a cloth bag into that space, for example. For close-up work, you could attach four pieces of velcro to the outside of the lid of the case near the corners, and attach the matching velcro to the underside of a close-up pad (or a large mouse pad; check Office Depot, Office Max, or Staples for oversize mouse pads).

Although the outfit functions most often as my practice case, most of the items present are ready to be performed. As a sample, here are the current contents of my case: a chop cup in cloth bag, a set of three aluminum Charlie Miller-style cups, a Corelware(tm) fluted coffee cup, a yellow tennis ball, a blue racquet ball, four 1-inch red sponge balls, four 1.5-inch red sponge balls, two yellow 2-inch sponge balls, a set of five multiplying! golf balls (no shell), twelve thimbles, a coin purse holding five U.S. halves and five English pennies, a Scotch and Soda (Eng. Penny version), a double-height shot glass, Mirage wallet, large playing card-motif bandanna, 18-inch opaque nylon handkerchief, 60-inch rope for Cut and Restored, 18-inch rope for Finger Ring on Rope, eight decks of cards (some clean, some gaffed, and some stacked), three cardboard matchboxes for various effects, three spools of thread (black, off-white, and "invisible"), four ten-inch linking rings in cloth bag, eight five-inch miniature linking rings in cloth bag, and five small commercially-

"Jay's Journal of

Anomalies"

Ricky Jay the multitalented sleight of hand artist, actor, author and scholar of the unusual, from 1994 to 1997, published a quarterly newsletter titled; *Jay's Journal of Anomalies*. Those journals have already become highly collectable. A subscription for all the issues cost \$90. There were only sixteen different issues and they have been gathered together and now appear in book form.

In San Diego, book stores have been reluctant to stock this title so you probably will not find it on most store shelves and it may have to be special ordered. The online book store Amazon.com can fill your order almost immediately however.

This is not a magic book, you will not learn any tricks here. At least not any you will go out and immediately perform for your friends. But you will learn to admire showman who used deceptive means to sell their attraction. Like Monetto, the time-telling, tail wagging dog who could pick out a person's selected card from a complete deck spread on the floor.

For magicians there is a wonderful section on Automations and another section on levitations. Most of these performers lived in the 1800's and their modus operandi is crude by today's high tech magic. But the graphics and research that has gone into each article makes this a wonderful book to read.

Ricky Jay is an excellent writer but often times challenges his reader buy using Victorian phrases and vocabulary that sends you to the dictionary from time to time to check the meaning of words.

As a child at the circus I remember watching in amazement as a woman high above the circus ring walked upside down on a suspended steel plate. In his Journal Ricky Jay takes us through the history of what he calls "Dancing on the Ceiling". After reading this chapter, I now



have even more regard for this unique act.

If you like reading about jokesters, hoaxsters, pranksters, sideshow anomalies, mechanical marvels, hustlers and conjurers this will be a delightful read. But remember you are reading history not the present.

It's a 40-dollar book and is well illustrated with both black and white graphics and excellent color drawings as well. Highly recommended for those who want to know what has gone before.

It is against the law in Las Vegas to use fire of any kind in your act with out the express permission of the Fire Marshall.

His act consisted of coins and cards. He produced three coins from three balls of fire. The coins then jumped

from hand to hand. Then four aces were produced and covered the coins for a matrix. Then he ended the act with a sensational four ace routine with help from a lady in the audience. The judges called it a "classy act that showed much skill." His act ran a tight 6-

minutes.

His favorite autograph is that of Fantasio, who manufactures all those appearing and disappearing canes and candles, among other things. He says he has always admired Fantaiso's creativity and showmanship.

I did a show

in December for a local Hospital Christmas Banquet, and I decided to do the whole show out of that case. I simply emptied it, placing into it only what I needed for that show, and in three minutes I was ready to go. I unpacked before the show on a table in my performance area, laid out my effects, and then packed up each one into the case after it was performed, while grabbing the next one. I was ready to depart immediately after my last effect, and when the audience turned its attention elsewhere, I walked out with my table in one hand and the case in the other.

It was a whirlwind four days in Las Vegas for the World Magic Seminar but what a treat. I think you'll find a feature story elsewhere in MagiCurrents regarding one of our talented members and he receives my hearty congratulations for placing in the youth competition.
