there. Kaplan says he will continue to interact with that group and help Mary Ellen Brown in teaching her students the basics of magic.





Two Card Transposition

Effect: You have two spectators select two cards. You replace the two cards into the deck. After

some extensive shuffling and by play, you show one of the spectator's cards on top of the deck. You table this card, and then you show the next top card, hoping that it is the selected card. It is not, so you magically change it into the card you just put on the table. The tabled card is the other selected card.

Performance: Grab your favorite deck of playing cards, gather around the campfire and have two spectators snag two cards. Get the cards back, and control those two cards to the top of the deck using your favorite method. Do some false shuffles and cuts to get the audience's mind of the fact that you controlled their cards to the top of the deck.

Next, perform your best double lift to show a selected card, ask whose it is, then table it. Do another double to show an indifferent card. Act as if this is one of the selected cards.

It is not of course.

You will now perform a Paintbrush Change. Briefly, you will take the double in the right hand face up and close the book as in 2 x 2 Ace Production, but instead of letting the whole deck fall on top of the double card you will brush the double against the back of the deck three times. On the third time you will leave the indifferent card on top of the deck face down, by pushing the indifferent card on top of the deck face down with your thumbs, now showing the first selected card you tabled. Do this, and show the tabled card as the other selection.

Afterthoughts: This is a Jay Sankey effect, "The Amateur vs. The Professional," in his excellent video "Sankey Very Much". I won't give away the presentation of that trick, but I will tell you

that it is very nice. It gives you a reason for doing this trick. Other than that, this is a very strong trick, when performed correctly. It is totally impromptu, so you can perform it in a restaurant or at a corporate banquet.

As for the Paintbrush Change, I have never seen this done before. I saw a version of this on J.C. WagnerÇs video "Queens Debate," put out by **Brad Burt's Magic Shop.**

If you attended the Paul Gertner lecture in April you not only witnessed some excellent magic but you were treated to a new dimension in Ring 76 presentations. Member Gary Salisbury set up a big screen video projector and operated the camera that allowed the audience to see close up the moves Gertner was trying to teach his audience.

Salisbury works for National Cash Register Company and has been able to acquire some of their surplus and out dated video equipment. We are all indebted to Gary for allowing us to use his projector for lectures so that we may more clearly see first had what our guest lecturers are doing in a close-up big screen picture. This new tool means you can be in the back of the room and still see the smallest of sleights.

We all thank Gary Salisbury for going to a lot of work to make this happen for Ring 76 members. We look forward to using this video projector at future lectures.



Many years ago now I had the pleasure of watching one of the truly great close-up performers work and lecture. Not only a wonderful performer, but he is also my favorite magic writer and a thoughtful and generous lecturer. His name is Harry Lorayne and his classic Close-up Card Magic is still one of the finest books of commercial and usable magic in print.

But, beyond the magic that I saw Harry perform and explain that night, I learned an even better and more cogent lesson and I would like to pass it along.

The lesson is an odd one and has to do with HOW we as performers treat our audience. I have always attempted to treat an audience with respect, but after 30 years of watching hundreds of performers I can tell you that that is not always that way an audience get's treated. I have seen performers of even high caliber do things that caused my teeth to clench and a slightly sick feeling horror envelope me. Really. I have explanation for this, but it doesn't really matter at the genesis of such behavior. What matters is that treating people with kindness is just a better way to act if not be as a performer.

As an aside, another performer that I hold in the highest esteem was Mike Rogers. I am convinced that grouchy phychopaths would walk away from a Rogers

What did Harry do that so impressed me that even 20 plus years later I can still remember the affect that it had on me? It was a really simple, even a little thing. During the performance of an effect Harry asked for the loan of a handkerchief. After a pause an older gentleman handed Harry one. It was crumpled, dirty and obviously used. I was frankly horrified. Harry, to his great credit, did not miss a beat. He used the proffered hanky, completed the effect and handed the hanky back with a polite and sincere thank you. Why was this so startling to me?

I had watched not long before a young (hot) performer at the Magic Castle ask for and receive a hanky form a spectator in the audience. The hanky was clean, pressed, almost sterile looking. And? The performer made a joke handling the hanky as if covered with, well, snot. Completed his trick and handed the hanky back crumpled and with nary a thanks for the loan. I remembered being distinctly embarrassed by the whole episode and it pretty much ruined the rest of the performance for me. O.k., I 'might' be over sensitive, but I don't think so. It was just a shoddy and thoughtless interlude that received a sad little laugh at the expense of a spectator's kindness. It reflected badly upon magic and magicians in general and was not necessary.

Harry Lorayne whatever else one may think of any foiables real or imagined is a gentleman and a pro. He handled what could have been a terrible situation with elan, precision and kindness. Many performers when faced with a situation that is embarrassing for 'them' will instinctually fall back on a joke at the expense of someone else. It only reflects back with more force and makes the performer look that much worse. We ALL need to think through what we are going to DO when faced with the unexpected and embarrassing situation. Why? So that not only do we come out looking good, but so does the audience and thus magic is enhanced as well.



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In the March edition of Cheap Seats, I reviewed Volumes 1 and 2 of Mark Wilson's ongoing video series on performing illusions. Now Volume 3 has just arrived in stores, and I will share my thoughts on it while it is still hot off the publisher's duplicator.

The new volume is dedicated to Suspension illusions. According to the official Wilson website (which is http://www.markwilsonmagic.com), there are two more volumes yet to come on other types of levitation. The instructional tape has some fine moments, but also has areas in which it is lacking.

The first type of suspension, the "Super X" style, is presented and explained quite thoroughly. Although no attempt is made to explain how to build such an illusion, the abundance of front and rear views would make it fairly easy to determine how to construct the unit from steel or aluminum tubing with the aid of a local welding shop. Exact dimensions are readily available from such standards as the Mickey Hades Encyclopedia of Suspensions and Levitations or Tanner's & Grant's Six Modern Levitations. Tips on hiding the gimmick from balcony audiences are included, and hoop technique is clearly shown from several angles, perhaps to the point of redundancy. Clever thematic suggestions and two possibilities for performing the illusion surrounded are explored also.

Next is a brief look at the "Flying Carpet." Hoping to avoid redundancy with the ÑSuper Xâ here, Wilson sadly skimps on this affordable and easily transported illusion. His version, shown in clips from his 1960's television series

Magic Land of Allakazam, is essentially a cosmetic alteration of the "Super X" suspension. The traditional "Flying Carpet", however, is lower to the floor and does not require the magician's strategic body placement that "Super X" does. I would like to have seen Wilson do the more commonly available version of the "Flying Carpet" which uses a false book to screen the gimmick (or even two books, like

Jack Gwynne's original version). Interested readers can find more info in the Hades *Encyclopedia* mentioned earlier, and some interesting variations allowing surrounded use of the suspension in Jim Sommer's Illusion book published by Magic Inc. in Chicago.

A good overview of the Chair Suspension follows the Flying Carpet. Wilson wisely chose the Harbin/Klamm/ Sommers version in which the board upon which the volunteer rests can be taken away, leaving the volunteer suspended in the air from the top of a folding chair. I would like to have seen a real person suspended rather than a teddy bear, as the suspension needs careful placement of the volunteer to avoid balance problems (i.e., the volunteerCs shoulders must be over the chair back). Also, the volunteer must hold up his own head/ neck and lower legs/feet, so the magician must whisper this info to the volunteer as he helps her recline upon the board. These are important points that should not have been omitted in the discussion, and having a live subject would have undoubtedly led Wilson's commentary that way. This version of the†Chair Suspension can be done surrounded, and is probably the best suspension available for the active amateur or semi-pro magician; it is lightweight, easy to transport, and cost effective.

A brief overview of the Broom Suspension is included, again from the *Magic Land of Allakazam*. The harness is not shown, nor is the ratchet mechanism. These omissions hurt the student, as such missing details keep the prospective purchaser from making an informed decision about the suitability of the illusion for his purposes.


A long section covering the Three Sword Suspension from Wilson's 1970's

Magic Circus series wraps up the topics on this suspension video. The harness is shown here, but its application to the assistants body is not shown. The explanation segment veers into redundancy a bit at this point.

Future volumes propose to examine AGA and ASRAH levitations. It will be interesting to see what these volumes teach. In the meantime, despite the short comings mentioned above, this Volume 3 is a splendid overview of basic suspension techniques, and so belongs in the library of anyone seriously considering adding a suspension to his or her platform or stage work. However, knowledgeable magicians with levitation/suspension experience will find little new information.

One of the highlights of the evening was having J.C. Wagner attend and for a time get behind the bar and entertain some of the guests with his magic.

At 7:45 President Don Soul called the meeting to order and folding chairs were quickly set up and the dealers

stopped their selling for the meeting and auction.

Don had some announcements about coming lecturers, welcomed guests and new members. He then introduced the Board of Directors slate of officers for the coming year. There is a story on the coming elections elsewhere in this newsletter. Marcus Day, J.P. Jackson and Loch David Crane were appointed as the election committee to seek additional nominees for board jobs and to over see the election and vote counting process.

With no further business President Soul turned the meeting over to Jack White who began the auction. Richard Ustick kept track of each item as it was sold and collected the money at the end of the auction. Dealers were not allowed to sell until the auction ended.

All of the proceeds from the auction went to the Ring 76 treasury. White said he wanted to start the bidding on each item as low as possible to give everyone an opportunity to go home with a bargain.

There was a lot of very nice magic to be auctioned off some of it quite collectable. There was a package of Frank Herman tricks and advertising memorabilia, ring member Don Holcomb brought a nice collection of books, two very nice sets of cups and balls and a beautiful set of wooden billiard balls. Mike Stilwell donated one of his roll on tables.

There was a very unique prop that would release twelve spring snakes, Jeff Marcus donated many items from his table that included a die box, mental epic and a variety of other magic items. Bob Ingalls donated a lot of items that brought \$51-dollars. Brad Burt sent over a vanishing

birdcage and a vanishing clock. J.P. Jackson donated several lots of magazines and books. Bob Pozner auctioned off a ticket to the IBM Banquet Dinner at this summer's convention.

When the auction was over \$487 dollars had been raised in sales, another 80 dollars for tables. Jeff Marcus donated 117-dollars from the sales of items on his table for Ring 76 Junior Magicians activities. A total of 684-dollars for the ring treasury. The best part many members went home with a lot of new magic purchased at bargain prices.

New Houdini Stamp

I think everyone knows by now that on July 3rd the Post Office will issue the new Houdini postage stamp in honor of the 100th Anniversary of the Society of American Magicians who will be holding their convention in New York City. Houdini was one of the founders of the SAM and carried card number 1.

Here is something you may not know. Beginning with a series of stamps featuring the Universal Pictures Movie Monsters in 1997, the Post Office Printing Department has been experimenting with something called "Scrambled Indicia" its main purpose is to prevent counterfeiting. But in using it on stamps it gives a second picture under the image visible to the naked eye.

In the case of the Houdini stamp if you use a little decoding viewer that you can buy for under twenty bucks at stationary stores or the philatelic counter at the Post Office you will see Houdini bound in chains instead of the portrait of the famous escape artist and magician that is visible at normal viewing.



Houdini would have loved this little encrypted image. As you will remember from the many biographies written about him he enjoyed coded messages and would spend hours trying to decipher their contents. Often times breaking down highly sophisticated coded systems.

Magic Notes From Jack White:

A Magical Evening I Can't Forget:

One night in late March three San Diego legends in magic

all got together for a little dinner at a favorite watering hole the Gathering Restaurant in Mission Hills. The participants were Bob Sheets, J.C. Wagner and Terry Lunceford. I was invited

along as a referee and make sure each person had an opportunity to speak or perform or both.

Bob Sheets lives in Baltimore, Maryland with his wife these days. He lives there when he is not on the road performing and that is most of the time. But he grew up here in San Diego and I remember him as a very talented young man doing magic at Ring 76 meetings in the late 1960's. His sister and father still live here so he was home for Easter and will be back for Thanksgiving.

After we all caught up on what everyone was doing these days, we began talking about the past. I remembered a time in 1969, when Harold Ellis a Ring 76 member called me up on the phone and asked if I wanted to go to the circus and see Bob Sheets perform?

Bob had joined the Big John Strong Circus that was appearing for a month on a lot in Oldtown for San Diego's 200th Anniversary. It was a beautiful little tented show that was made to look like a circus from one hundred years earlier, 1869.

Sheets got the job with the circus when another former Ring 76 member Ken Benge a sensational juggler and fire-eater called Bob and asked if he wanted to join the show? Bob met with John Strong owner of the circus who was billed as the man who had more friends than Santa Claus. Strong asked Bob if he could juggle, Ken Benge said yes, Bob could juggle. Then Big John asked if Bob was a fire-eater? Again Benge said yes, Bob could do that too. Bob got the job in the circus that day. The trouble was Bob could not do any of those things. So that afternoon with the help of magician Bev Bergeron who was also appearing in Oldtown during that period with his magic show and Kenny Benge they taught Bob

Sheets how to juggle, eat fire and framed a small magic act he could do in the circus ring.

A month later when the Big John Strong Circus left town Bob Sheets packed his trunk and ran away with the circus. He has been a professional entertainer and on the road ever since. His life under the big top lasted only during the summer months and for only a few seasons.

When the circus returned to winter quarters Bob returned to San Diego and with J.C. Wagner worked such hot spots at Marco's Bar in Coronado. J.C. Wagner taught Bob how to be a good bartender and they were both beginning to make big names for themselves as close-up magicians.

Close-up magic was just coming into its own as a popular art form during this period of the early 1970's.

Recently in *Magic Magazine* Stan Allen wrote about how he often drove from Orange County on Saturday nights to Coronado just to watch Bob Sheets and J.C. Wagner work the bar at Marco's. Stan talked about magicians from all over Southern California dropping by this little bar to study the technique and the effects these two magical bartenders had worked out and were presenting nightly.


Later Bob would take his talents as a bartender and performer to a place called the Tower Bar in Snowmass, which is near Aspen Colorado. There his work as a magician and would be written up in magic journals and non-magic publications as well. He had become famous as a close-up performer.

During the winter months he was in Colorado, during the summer at private parties, trade shows, theme parks and magic conventions. For the past 33-years Bob Sheets has been presenting his magic close-up and on stage for audiences all across the country.

As we finished our dinner Bob reached down into a bag and pulled out two new videotapes he had just released. One was produced at Terry Lunceford's studio in La Mesa. Bob then said have you seen my new dice routine?

I said no and he went to work impressing everyone at the table and in the restaurant with a funny and very clever routine with a regular set of dice and some very clever handling and patter.

I have always enjoyed a good "Three Shell and Pea" routine and Bob Sheets has included that effect in his reparator for years. I asked to see his handling of it and he

announced he had just produced another new videotape for his three shell routine.

Bob has become the master of the "shell game" and quietly but honestly divulged his secret. It like all magic is simple and direct but sets him apart from other performers who include this effect in their act. His tape will open a new door on the old three shell game and give you new insight in how to really make this gambling stunt into good entertainment and a fantastic magic trick.

My comment was, "you should teach this to Ring 76 members!" Bob's answer was, "I would love too." So when he returns to San Diego in November he has agreed to do a lecture for Ring 76.

We are still working out the dates but it will be a sensational evening for both close-up and stand-up magicans and a great learning experience from a guy who has faced all kinds of audiences. So stay tuned to MagiCurrents because we will have more in future issues about Bob Sheets lecture.

It was one of those special evenings at the round table at the Gathering with three magicians talking about the past in San Diego and elsewhere.

We told stories about friends now departed and others still with us but scattered around the country. We talked about magic past, present and what trends the future will bring. It felt good to have been able to share some conversation with Bob Sheets. J.C. Wagner and Terry Lunceford even though it was just for few hour's. It was one of those magical evenings you won't forget.
