
Territorial Vice President Dick Dale then introduced the incoming president and board and began the oath of office

laughing at this booth throughout the convention.





Effect: The performer shows a deck of cards (all the cards are different). Then the magician has a spectator select and remember a card of her choosing. The selected card is placed back into the deck, and the whole deck is given to the spectator to shuffle. The cards are then put into the card case.

The miracle worker then takes a marker or pen out of his pocket, taps the case three times and upon opening the case, a deck of cards wrapped in tinfoil falls out of the case. The performer gives the tinfoil-wrapped deck to the spectator to tear open. The spectator notices that all the cards have turned into the selected card.

Preparation: You need to wear a jacket (suit coat) to perform this little miracle. You also need a marker or pen, which is placed into your right upper/inner jacket pocket. You also need about a 6-inch square of tinfoil (or aluminum foil, it is the same thing). You need a One-Way-Force-Deck (we will call this OWFD), and a regular deck of cards. Make sure that both decks are the same color if you want this trick to be effective.

Now with the tinfoil, you wrap the OWFD in the tin foil. Make sure no part of the deck is showing, if there is a bit of the deck showing, use more tinfoil. Now place the tinfoil wrapped OWFD in your left outer jacket pocket. You are now ready to perform Mashed.

Performance: You carry on with your normal close-up magic, then, when you complete your last card effect (yes, please do a card effect before you perform this trick), you need to get ready, and the way to do this is to control the duplicate of the card that is the OWFD card in the normal deck to the top of the normal deck.

Example, if your OWFD is the 9 of spades, control the 9 of spades in the regular deck to the top. Now it is very simple for you to force the top card on anyone. If you have another method for forcing a card, by all means use it.

Once the card is forced, give the deck to the spectator and have her replace her card in the deck, then have her shuffle the deck. Then take the deck back and place the cards in the case, close the case, and hold the cards/case in your left hand. You are now going to remove the marker from your right inner jacket pocket, and while you do this you will perform a very basic deck switch (the normal deck is placed in your left hand). The way you do this is your right hand goes into your right outer jacket pocket to apparently "search" for the marker, as if you forgot where you placed it. While you do this your left hand opens the left flap part of you jacket, the deck (which should be in your left hand) and the left hand dive into your outer pocket, make the switch for the OWFD and get the heck out of there. You make a big deal about this. Finally "find" the pen.

Your situation is this: you have the tinfoil-wrapped OWFD in your left hand, the regular deck in your left outer jacket pocket, and that pesky pen in your right hand. I tap the deck three times with the pen. Right after I produce 7 golden geese.

When opening the case, you need to open it in such a way that you do not let the glimmer of the tin foil ruin the surprise. The way to do this is when you open the case open the flap so it opens toward the audience. If you are using a deck of Bicycle cards, have the big spade face the audience. Turn the deck so that the mouth (the part where the cards come out of) is facing towards the ground. To do this without letting the tinfoiled-deck fall to the ground, you need to squeeze the sides of the box, thus causing the tinfoiled deck to be pinned inside the box.

You will now throw the cards out with one quick motion like you are clapping your hands, but keep the card case in your right hand as the tinfoil wrapped OWFD falls into your left hand. Hand the deck over to the spectator and have her tear the tinfoil apart. She will discover that all the cards have turned into her selected card.

Afterthoughts: The biggest influence for this effect is Jay Sankey's Meltdown, from his book, Sankey Panky.

Sankey's idea of having a deck of cards wrapped in a

Get On The Show

Many years ago a wonderful magician, Ken Donnelly, wrote a splendid article for small local magic newsletter in Long Beach. That article and its reprints affected many magicians both young and old for years to come. I am sad to say that over the years I have lost my copy, but I remember vividly the gestalt of the article, and I would like to attempt to convey it here.

Our art attracts a vast array of folks that "do" magic for a variety of reasons. Many, many non-professionals never or almost never perform a trick for ANYONE. That's not a bad thing or a good thing as it goes. Personally I am one of those odd introverted magic types who can derive endless hours of satisfaction simply sitting and learning new material without any wish or desire to perform it!

But, in the end, those that truly take magic out to the rest of the world are those that perform for an audience. Paid or free, it does not matter. The real stuff, the real magic happens when others see the effect and are amazed, frightened, and hopefully entertained. So, GET ON THE SHOW!

Member of a local magic club? Get on the show every meeting. Get the club to sponsor a full stage show at least twice a year so you can get the experience of

being on a full stage. Where? Rent time or look for free time at a local junior high, etc. Find a stage. Promote the show. GET ON THE SHOW!

Magic goes no where if it is not being shown the world. The old myths die in a Naturalistic miasma of disbelief in anything that can not be touched, seen, smelled, or heard. Magic cuts across the given into the realm of the unknown, but only if it is experienced by the world at large. Only if YOU GET ON THE SHOW and perform your practiced amazements.

If you have been sitting on the side lines WANTING to perform, but have been too shy or scared, then get off the bench and GET ON THE SHOW. If you don't want to be a pro, there are a hundred organizations that have little or no money, but could use some entertainment for abused children or lonely seniors. It is not that hard to find a SHOW TO GET ON TO. Try it, you'll like it and I am pretty darn sure that your audience will like it also!

piece of tin foil really inspired me. Jay used his idea of having a deck of cards wrapped in a piece of tinfoil as a framing piece of magic. I wanted to create a trick with the basic plot in mind. If you don't want to use a pen, you can use a magic wand or a giant Topsy Turvy Bottle, if you want.

If you are doing walk-around magic with cards, use this as a closing effect. You can also use this as a closing effect for your Ambitious Card effect. I am sure you have your own Ambitious Card routine, but if you don't you might want to look into Daryl's Ambitious Card video.

In return, Art Hannum presented a suitcase filled with props used by the late Sid Gerhart and Sid's straw hat and magic wand to be displayed by the Ring in his memory as the namesake for Ring 76. These items have been stored away for 23 years.

Following the awards Bob Ingalls presented a paper tear routine to music and then introduced Ice McDonald and his magic show.

New Ring Archives Uncovered and Now Available

In April a Ring 76 member found three large file boxes full of Ring records that dated back to the 1960s in a garage. On the surface it was just a lot of paper. But upon closer examination there were treasurer's reports, minutes from board meetings, rosters of members, notes on meetings and, in some cases, old photographs and press clippings.

Richard Ustick, who is a historian at heart, began the laborious process of putting all of the material together in chronological order and then binding these records into books. He spent more than 40 hours on this labor of love and has created the most complete history Ring 76 has ever had. There are still some gaps during certain time periods, but we have a better understanding of what has gone before.

While this should not be considered leisure time reading material, it is important to our Ring's history. These records are in our permanent library and available to anyone wanting more on Ring 76's past. We are all indebted to Richard Ustick for his attention to detail in assembling these records of the past.

Jim Whiting's IBM T-shirt A Success at Convention

Cartoonist and radio personality Jim Whiting joined the IBM in 1957, when he was just a young man living in Watkins Glen, New York. For years he took part in IBM activities in the Finger Lakes Ring 140 in Ithaca, New York; then, in 1984, he and his wife Bernita moved to San Diego County.

In 1987, Jim, designed a tee shirt for the San Diego Blood Bank. About that time he also joined Ring 76 and took part in local Ring activities. His first shirt for the Blood Bank was so popular he designed a second shirt in 1991. The second shirt featured an old Wizard and proclaimed the "Miracle of Giving Blood."

When the Ring asked Whiting to come up with a design for the Ring 76-sponsored IBM, T-shirt for the convention, he revived his colorful old Wizard in a tall hat and flowing red robes. Next to the Wizard is a giant

green floating ball with the letters "IBM."

It was decided a black shirt would be used with the colorful Wizard on the front. The only copy would read IBM-in the floating ball and "Convention 2002, San Diego, Ca."



Ring member Sumit Dua came up with the idea of printing a playing card on the shirttail. You can force a card, then have it appear on the back of the shirt. Don Soul determined the card would be the four of diamonds, because it shows up well on the black background.

We sold about 380 of the shirts at the convention. To get a good price, we had to have 500 made up. We will be selling the leftover shirts to Ring members at the next meeting for 10 dollars while the supply lasts, 12 dollars for XXL.

We will also be offering what ever is left over through the online Ring 2100 Market Place for \$17.50 post paid. If you are a Ring member, we are offering you a huge discount on this collectable shirt that will draw attention to you as a magi.

We want to thank Jim Whiting, Sumit Dua, Don Soul, and Donna Soul, who worked hard to sell these shirts at the IBM Convention. All proceeds go to the Ring 76 treasury. The few remaining shirts will be on sale at discount prices at the August meeting.


