# Review of the PCAM Convention in Arizona

Editor's note: Dr. Joel Moskowitz made the long hot trip to Arizona and the PCAM Convention in early August. Here is his review of that event.

For the magician seeking an opportunity to increase their publicity credits, the 69th Annual Pacific Coast Association of Magicians Convention in Page, Arizona, was the place to be. If you search for PCAM on the Internet, you will encounter several successful prior contestants who include an award at PCAM as evidence of their proficiency. Even if you elected not to compete, PCAM offered an intimate experience with some illustrious illusionists.

But first, the why and where of Page, Arizona. Set in the Navaho Nation (Did you know there are two million Navajos, which is the largest Native American population?), adjacent to the Glen Canyon Dam, which restrains the Colorado River into becoming Lake Powell with a 2000 mile shoreline, Page is about 4000 feet,

8000 people, and 10 churches, in a main street which loops to intersect with Highway 89 just short of the Utah border in the Northern reaches of Arizona. Ryan has presented his talk on his adventures at the Gilbert Toy Company many times and has honed some very interesting, unique and funny stories from his years with this great institution. He told us about A.C. Gilbert the man and

how he invented the Erector Set; Chemistry Set, Puzzle Sets and of course about Gilbert's interest in magic and the Mysto Magic Set. One of Gilbert's partners in the magic business in the beginning years was John Petrie of the Petrie Lewis or P & L Magic Company. Mr. Ryan presented two Mysto Magic Sets to be added to the collection at Jack's Magic Place. Two truly prize gifts for the collection.

The Mysto Magic lecture ended at 7:30, and there was a brief break while Josh London and Kenny Shelton sold raffle tickets. We had some quality prizes to raffle off this month. The grand prize was a giant Card Castle that was mounted into a very nice hardwood frame. A 50-

Following a very successful raffle, the meeting was turned over to Bob Ingalls, who is in charge of entertainment. Six prospective members hoping to join Ring 76 were auditioning before the membership. To be fair to each performer, Ingalls put numbers in a hat and each performer drew a number that announced where they would appear on the program.

Leading off was the team of Neal and Dina Reed. Neal performed a cut and restored rope using a very sharp and dangerous looking knife. This was followed by a manipulative change of red-backed packet of fives with a blue backed packet of jack's between the two hands. Neal then did a very nice locked card in plastic frame. Five people tried to unlock the case

with the card, but the correct key belonged to the person who selected the card and had the matching card.

Billy Rovzar fooled us all with a mentalist cold match of a card that could not have possibly been forced. Billy asked Sherry Luft to select a card from a well-shuffled deck. Sherry was given a torn corner taken from the selected card while Billy caused the rest of the card to disappear. A paper bag containing a bottle of aspirin was brought out. Sherry opened the sealed bottle, removed the cotton and dumped the aspirin out, and in the bottom of the bottle was the selected card and the torn corner matched perfectly.

Like the pro he is ,Phil King presented a well-practiced traditional act with clever patter. Using a piece of pipe from the Titanic, Phil

patter. Using a piece of pipe from the Titanic, Phil produced a number of multi-colored silks. Then he told the story of the woman who forgot her umbrella, which translated into one of the best-mutilated parasol routines we have ever seen. Phil King has a winning personality and is a welcome addition to Ring 76.

Phil King has over the years done hundreds of Boy Scout shows and has honed his magic for audiences of all ages and it shows in his presentation.

Next Ed Estrin did the "Professor's Nightmare" using a hypnosis motif. This was a different version of this rope effect and very well done. His handling is





#### Edward Marlo's Future Reverse

In this issue of MagiCurrents, we will explore one of magic's best card reverses. This card reverse is so great; you can reverse any card in the deck and maintain the entire order of the deck. Here is how the Future Reverse is accomplished: Hold a deck of cards face down in your right hand. You will be dribbling the cards from your right hand to your left hand. As you do this, tell a spectator to tell you to stop whenever he/she wants to. This is done. So now you have about half the cards in your left hand and the other half in your right hand. Raise your right hand to let the audience see the bottom card in the right

hand. This card will be the card that will be reversed. As soon as everyone has seen the card, bring your right hand to your left (the left half of the deck is held in standard dealer's grip. As your right hand comes to the left to apparently

place its half on the left's half, your left fingers (your left middle, ring and pinky fingers) push the "chosen card" to the right. This will cause the card to come in contact with the right pinky finger. The card will be gripped



between your right pinky and ring fingers. If you lower the left hand pack, this will cause the chosen card to come free of the left hand pack. The top half of the deck (This is the deck that was originally in your right hand.) Place

your left middle, ring, and pinky fingers on the face of the chosen card. Now flex your left fingers and that will cause the card to become reversed in the middle of the deck; drop the top half on the lower half and you

have completed Ed Marlo's Future Reverse! If you are interested in doing this sleight in the context of an effect, try the Invisible Deck theme. All you need is a stacked deck.

Have a card thought of, the spectator tells you the thought of card, you riffle to the right card and do the Future Reverse, and everything is examinable. This is a very hard sleight to perform, but even harder to explain, so hopefully the pictures that Jack has provided will be of help. many years across the country and this is the farewell lecture tour.



Jack White had a great suggestion: Holiday show time is coming up and he wondered if I might have any booking ideas. The good news is yes, I do. The bad news is that they are not "snazzy," may not be surefire, although....bookings, they don't just work themselves. On the other hand, a couple of good focused methods of booking shows that can be fairly easily worked are a good thing.

Idea number one should be the linchpin of all your magic show marketing: You should have a list of EVERY client you have ever worked for, and you should make a mailing to those clients two-to-four times a year with offers of shows. And, MAKE an offer. Make them a deal. Tell them the truth that the holiday booking season is coming up fast and it IS the busiest time of the year for performers. IF they will book a show NOW, you will give them 'X' deal. Let's say your holiday shows go for \$500.00 or a half hour stand up show. If they book within the next 10 days (or whatever) you will not only give them the show for \$400.00, but toss in 30 minutes (or whatever) of warm-up close-up! Be creative. What you want to do is BOOK a bunch of shows. A full slate of shows. More than you would normally, because of the aggressive marketing you are doing.

Have you read <u>Guerrilla Marketing</u> by Jay Levinson? You should. Cheap book filled with KILLER information for the small businessman.

I think I have said this before, but it really bears repeating this time of the year: LOOK for a relationship with a Party Planner! Find someone who puts together the place, food, etc., but not necessarily the entertainment. Offer them a nice inducement to give you an in with the folks that are putting on the party. You get \$600 for the show give the planner \$200. Let me tell you....a hot planner with the right performer is a match made in heaven, money wise. REALLY! A planner that clients love and trust can get you a ton of gigs that pay what you want them to! If you up your price, give the planner more. Don't be BUT....BUT....you had better have a show that delivers the goods. You better have a show that reflects like gold off the face of the sun on the planner. IF you do, you can be making a very good part-time or full-time living! A good enough contact could give you all the work you need. But, you can also look for multiple contacts. Watch out for a need to be someone's 'exclusive' performer. It very seldom works to the advantage of the performer.

## **View from the Cheap Seats**



By Jon A. Hand

### Sympathetic Color Bleed Opener

Effect: A signed chosen card changes its back color to match the color of ink with which it is signed, making it the only card in the deck with a mismatched back color. The effect requires no double-lift, includes an unusual "sympathetic action" plot structure, and is truly easy to do. Try it with cards in hand and see!

Materials for Red-backed Deck Users: Red deck of cards with matching case; Low-value, red-suited card, say 2D, from BLUEbacked deck; and a BLUE Sharpie (tm) permanent marker

I will explain the effect from the point of view of the red-backed deck user. (If you habitually use a blue deck, use a low-value, red-backed, black-suited card and a red marker.) Setup: Place the blue-backed card, the 2D in this example, **second** from the bottom of the red-backed deck. Place a high value club or spade, say the JC, on the bottom of the deck. Optionally, remove the red-backed 2D altogether; the likelihood of its being spotted is extremely low, so I would not worry about it unless you are following this opener with a multiple selection routine where the 2D might be re-selected. Case the deck.

Performance: Produce the red case, and remove the red deck from it. Do a hand-to-hand spread, showing most of the red backs as if merely toying with the deck, but do not expose the blue-backed card second from the bottom. Square the spread into the left hand, grasp the deck in right hand Biddle position, and turn the deck face up to flash the JC as you patter a bit and gesture with your empty left hand.

Return the deck to face down, then stand the deck in the left hand for an overhand shuffle. Slip shuffle the bottom and top cards, and then toss packets from the right hand into the left hand, alternating onto top and bottom (i.e., the first packet goes on top of the slip-shuffled cards, followed by a flip of the left hand fingers to slant the fallen cards to the left; then the second packet goes on the bottom of the previously-fallen cards, followed by a flip of the left thumb to slant the fallen cards back to the right). Shuffle off, continuing to alternate top and bottom, for a total of eight packets, ending with the last packet going to the bottom. The current bottom card is now the blue-backed 2D to be forced, so don't expose its face or back yet. False cut on the table, or in the hands, to end the shuffle routine.

Produce your blue Sharpie, and hand it to your participant. Then, start a standard Hindu Shuffle force, pulling off small packets with the left hand and asking the spectator to say "Stop!" whenever she wishes. At the stop point, rotate the right hand packet clockwise one-quarter turn relative to the left hand packet, and use the right hand packet to square both packets by bumping their narrow ends together perpendicularly (this Hindu Shuffle Glimpse is used here merely to keep both packets square). Immediately rotate the right hand packet one-half turn counterclockwise to show the 2D as the "chosen" card. Ask the spectators to remember this "randomly chosen" card. Meanwhile, openly do a half-pass with the left hand's cards by folding the left forefinger under the half deck and unfolding all of the left fingers, turning the left hand's half of the deck face up. Rotate the right hand one-half turn clockwise to make the 2D face up to the performer. Place the face up right hand half onto the left hand half and square all, leaving the whole deck face up in your left hand. All of this takes only a few seconds, and it looks completely fair and natural.

Ask your participant to use the blue marker to sign her name onto the face of the chosen card (2D) as you steady the card on the deck in your left hand. Blow on the card to dry the blue ink as you ask the participant to cap the pen. With the deck still face up, kick cut half the deck into the left hand, and complete the cut to lose the chosen card in the center of the deck. Flip the squared deck to face down, and either table it, or hold it in your left hand.

Patter a bit about ink "running" or "bleeding" like the dye in clothing. Have the participant wave the blue marker over the deck. If you tabled the deck, do a left-to-right table spread; if you are still holding the cards, do a full pressure fan in the left hand. Either way, a blue card shows in the middle of the red spread. Have the participant remind everyone of the

# Book Review

Final Séance by Massimo Polidoro Reviewed by Joel A. Moskowitz, M.D.

Houdini was never quite able to escape from the box into which he was placed by his learned admirer, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. Scholar and author, Massimo Polidoro details the strange friendship between these two luminaries. Final Séance (Prometheus Books, Amherst, N.Y., 2001, 275 pp, \$25 cloth) is based on original correspondence and photographs, as well as extensive research by the author.

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was so convinced in the magic of spiritualism that no amount of ratiocination nor the protestations of Houdini that his powers were trickery could unlock Doyle's perception. Although each respected the other, the rigid certitude, held firmly by Doyle, would not allow Houdini to break out of Doyle's refusal to accept Houdini's disclaimers.

Massimo Polidoro, Executive Director of the Italian Committee for the Investigation of Claims of the Paranormal, weaves the nature of their conflicted but respectful relationship.

Learning of Houdini's untimely death, Doyle stated, "We agreed about everything except Spiritualism." Doyle's persistent view of Houdini's abilities was that although some may have been conjuring tricks, Houdini, Doyle believed, was himself unaware of his own psychic powers. Knowing of Houdini's intense affection for his deceased mother, a séance was held to reach her. This antecedent of the channeling phenomena of today appeared to generate messages from the beyond.


The defect was that the English voice heard at the seance could not have been Houdini's mother. who never spoke English, Yiddish, nor German, French, Spanish, Italian-only Hungarian. An interesting publication that will not expose any magic tricks but does give us a clearer view of Houdini the man and his true feelings about spiritualism. Recommended reading for any Houdini buff.

He worked under the name of Professor Flora. Brian was 52-years old far, too young to be taken.


