# Ring 76 Apologizes to Amir A. Rahim

The Board of Directors of IBM Ring 76 wishes to apologize to San Diego Magician Amir A. Rahim for any action that may have disparaged his image during our September 9, 2002, meeting. One of our members believed he was in danger and was being stalked. He asked us for assistance during that meeting. Because we hold our members' safety in the highest regard it was determined that we would take action to protect that individual's safety. Unfortunately, a sign with Mr. Rahim's image was posted stating he was "Unwanted."

The board wants to say we were wrong and now accepts Amir Rahim's word that he never meant any harm to any of our members, and that he was not stalking anyone. We apologize for any embarrassment that we may have caused Mr. Rahim or his family.

During the September 9th meeting, one of our longtime members informed us we had made a regrettable mistake and asserted that Mr. Rahim, is in fact a fine magician, a good person, and a credit to this community. We accepted our member's glowing report on Mr. Rahim's character and removed the sign immediately. We have taken steps to see that such a mistake never occurs again. We have written a letter to that effect to Mr. Rahim, and are now publicly apologizing for our earlier actions.

As a result of our letter and this public apology, Mr. Rahim informed us by e-mail dated December 9, 2002, that he has dropped any action, legal or other wise, against Ring 76.


#### **Coming Magic Lecturers**

Celled

Effect: The performer asks for a card to be chosen; the card is then ripped into four pieces, one of which is given to the spectator to hold for safe keeping. Then the other pieces are held in the performer's hand, and then made to disappear without a trace.

Then the spectator removes the battery off the cell phone, only to find the selected card folded in a neat square. There is a missing piece to the card, which is the piece that the spectator has been holding the whole time.

Preparation: To perform this dandy lion of a trick, you need: 1) a cellular phone with a removable battery pack, 2) two duplicate cards, 3) and, time to prep for this little miracle.

Now what you do is take one card and put it in the deck (but in a place where you can retrieve it easily, then force it) with the other duplicate card you fold it in half (long ways); you fold this card back and forth. Then, you fold the card again (along the width). Essentially, you want a card with creases from the top down, and from the right to the left in the middle.

Now you tear the pip corner off that card. This corner goes into your right pocket (in this trick, I prefer to use the pants pockets as opposed to the jacket pockets). The remainder of the card is then folded into a square, which is then placed under the battery of the cell phone. You do this by removing the battery of the cell phone, then place the card where the battery pack

usually goes, then replace the battery pack over the card. Hopefully, the phone will turn on. Now put the cell phone into your left hand pocket. You are now

ready to perform "Celled."

Performance: With the duplicate card somewhere in the deck, you have a card selected, but you force the card, using your favorite method. I will not go into any detail, because there are other sources out there on this subject.

Once the duplicate card is forced on an unsuspecting spectator, put the deck away, as it is out of play. I suggest that if you are working in a situation where (God forbid) you have no access to a nearby table, stick the deck of cards in your back pocket or a suit coat pocket. Just make sure you do not place the deck in a pants pocket. Fold the card as explained before.

You let the spectator tear the card into four pieces. Make sure that the torn pieces are about the same size. Take the the torn pieces and the cornor pice of the card and place them openly in your left hand. pretend to look for you cell phone, transferring the torn pieces from hand to hand, under that cover you ditch the pieces.

Here is a more detailed description: With the pieces of card in your left hand, you put your right hand into your right pocket, while your hand is in there "searching" for your cell phone: you pick up the corner (which is the corner of the card in the cell phone. This corner is held in right hand finger palm position (hidden from view of the audience). The audience sees that you come out of your right pocket with "nothing" in your hand.

Now you will put your left hand into its pocket to "look" for the cell phone. To do this your left thumb holds the packet in your left hand in place. You then turn your left hand palm down; while this is happening, your right hand turns palm up (be careful not to expose the card in your right hand). Apparently, to the audience, you went into your right pocket and found nothing; you are now preparing to go into your left pocket, and to do this you put the packet in your left hand into your right hand. This is not what happens though.

Many years ago now, Winston Churchill was asked to give the commencement speech at Harvard. It was after the Second World War, and Churchill walked up to the podium and looked the look that should have scared the willies out of the Third Reich, said the following, "Never, never, NEVER give up." Having finished, he left the stage.

About seven years ago I bought a guitar with the idea that I would learn to play and make music. I was not committed and gave up. I have found that commitment and now spend at least two hours a day in practice. It is tough. I have decided that only the joints in my hands giving out will defeat me. I am having some stiffness and pain. I am having to figure out what to do about it. How to adjust. What does this have to do with magic?

Pretty much everything from my point of view. One thing that I have seen over the last 32 years in the magic shop biz is that a lot of folks start out, but they just simply stop too soon! Coin manipulation is hard. Really. But, it is not impossible to learn to do well. You just have to dig in and go a little bit longer to master the basic moves. Never give up. Magic is a skill learned over an extended period of time. The more time the better you will become and that almost inevitably. Magic by the nature of the beast demands a certain amount of thought. It is very tough to practice

aimlessly and without intent. There is always a goal. Your goal? Make a New Year's promise to attempt to perfect something that you gave up on, or that you never tried because you thought it would defeat you. Select something that is a step above where you are or further. Set a period of time to learn and perfect it. And, then just simply begin to work on it. A little each day or alot-it does not matter. All that matters is that on this thing you are not going to give up. You are going to persist until you have it nailed or know why it should be impossible for you and not someone else? You can do it. Just never, never, NEVER give up!

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### **View from the Cheap Seats**

Review: **Performing Magic For Children** by Uwe Schenk and Michael Sondermeyer, translated from the original German by Ariel Frailich; I Saw That! Publications; Toronto, Canada. 167 pages of text, plus two forwards, a preface, a detailed table of contents, and an appendix containing bibliography and index, published 1995 (German), 2000 (English translation).

This slim volume may well be the best single book of its subject matter in existence. Although there is little that is groundbreaking in this volume, more quality information is found gathered in this one book than any other book of its type. Despite less-than-sterling translation in places, this book needs to be read by every magician who performs for children, or who aspires to do so.

The subtitle of the book explains it all: Theories, thoughts, tricks, and tips for structuring magic performances for an audience of children. In fact, the book is arranged in that exact fashion, proceeding from general to specific. However, the volume is tightly packed with information, and it is imperative that it be read thoughtfully and in compositional order for the reader to get the most out of the information. Do not rush through this book, nor skip to the trick sections first, if you want the real work on children's magic.

There is much useful information in the publisher Frailich's *Foreword*, professional Piet Forton's *Foreword*, the authors' *Preface*, and the authors' *Introduction*. In these short sections, the entire rationale for the book is described, and it is necessary for the reader to adjust his thinking to match the frame of reference of the writers for maximum learning to occur. The bulk of the manuscript then fulfills the promise of the rationale (as well as of the title and subtitle). It is important to note that magician/publisher Ariel Frailich adds the occasional brief aside with additional thoughts or ideas; his comments are always in brackets [], and almost always serve to adapt the authors' Euro perspectives to North American sensibilities.

Ine book opens with A Few Dates, a bit of history on magic for children, which is a far more recent development than most readers would suspect. This history section is quite brief, but it is a welcome addition to knowledge on the subject in print, and to my knowledge the first attempt to detail this background information. Most of the historical bibliographical references in this section are European, many of them in German (the authors are German nationals, after all). However, knowing how the subgenre of children's magic developed is interesting in its own right. More importantly, the authors tie concepts examined in this short section to their teaching later in the book, so this section is an important part of the book.

It is important that the reader read perceptively in the following *Pedagogy* section. Far from a pedantic view of the subject, these 11 pages set up the rest of the book while adjusting the reader's thinking about magic from a child's perspective. A bit more history is contained here as well, tying this pedagogy section to the history section while showing how the psychological needs of children had been ignored for so very long (not only by magicians, but by society as well).

Discounting blank transitional pages, the entire direction of the book is outlined in the 24 pages of *Forwards*, *Preface*, *Introduction*, *History*, and *Pedagogy*. If you skip these sections, you have only yourself to blame for getting less than optimal knowledge from this book.

The Audiences and Accommodations section is densely packed with information that one would take half a professional lifetime to discover on his own. Practical information on choosing a time and venue, lighting and sound, audience age groups and group size, setting up audience in relationship to the performance area, attention span problems, the all-important audience interaction, and much more are described here in a terse but insightful manner. Merely breezing through this section will result in the bulk of the book's information being lost to you, as the authors continually tie the remainder of the book to information here.

Designing an Act is a very useful section of the book. Valuable information on what works, what does not work, and the whys thereof, will help the careful reader avoid the most common pitfalls that await first-time performers for children. Rather than naming specific tricks as "appropriate" or "inappropriate," the authors give a set of criteria that can be applied to any trick under consideration. Adding this section to the learning in the previous sections, the authors have given a crash course in children's magic in less than 70 pages.

However, more than half of the book remains, to the delight of the reader. Each author

# MIND OVER MATTER

#### An Equivoque Subtlety

This is an unbelievably easy thing to do, but it will do WONDERS for any Equivoque sequence in which cards (not necessarily playing cards) are used. I came up with this almost by accident. I was in a brainstorming session with San Diego magicians Jeff Marcus and Sumit Dua. We were discussing various ways to make Equivoque more effective. As we brainstormed, we began to discuss the idea of having cards turned over, instead of picked up, pointed to, or any other action of the like. I am going to tell you right up front that it is ridiculously simple, and I think that many of you will not even try it because of its simplicity. Trust me. I tell you that it works, and that it will make your Equivoque sequences much stronger.

To explain this to you, let us assume that you have four cards laid out face-up in a row, one of which has a blue back (the others are red backed). The idea now is to use Equivoque to eliminate the three red backed cards.

With the cards set out as described above, tell the spectator, to push any two cards toward you. The spectator will now do one of two things. She either will push the force card toward you, or she will not. If she does not, then pick up the two cards that she pushed and hold them face-up in your left hand. Do not place them aside as in most Equivoque sequences, but rather hold them in your hand without drawing attention to them.

If, on the other hand, she does push the force card toward you, tell her to pick up the two that she did not push, and hand them to you. In either case, you will end up with two of the non-force cards in your left hand.

Now, tell the spectator to concentrate on the two cards that remain, and tell her to turn one of them over. Do not use the term "facedown." Many lay people do not know what that term means. Also, I feel that the word "down" implies that you want the overturned card eliminated. Sort of like when you "turn down an offer." She will again do one of two things. Either she will turn over the force card, or she will not. Now comes the subtlety. If she turns the force card over, leaving the non-force card face-up, casually toss the cards in your left hand face-up on top of the other non-force card.

If, on the other hand, she turns the non-force card over, leaving the force card face-up, do the opposite. In other words, casually toss the cards that are in your left hand face-down onto the other non-force card, i.e,. the card that was just turned over by the spectator.

In either case, you have now caused all three of the "eliminated" cards to look the same, while the force card looks different. This is kind of like the game that is (was) played on Sesame Street. You know-"Three of these things here go together." Three of these things are kind of the same, but one of these things does not belong here, etc. It is that kind of psychology that has been put into play. All of the attention is now placed on the card that "looks" different. Therefore, it is the object with the spotlight on it.

Well, that is the subtlety. It is absurdly simple, but it makes all the difference in the world. Try it and see.

#### Magic Notes from Jack White

### What ever happened to Rick Bruce?

This is the time of year we think about old friends who have moved on to new cities and new jobs, sometimes new careers. Just as I was going over my list of friends who had relocated in the past year,

I received an e-mail from Rick Bruce, past President of Ring 76 and the man who created a magic program that has yet to be rivled for young magicians in San Diego County. Rick is now known as the "Wizard of Cambria." Last April first, he and his wife opened a magic/botique/ antique shop in the beautiful

coastal community of Cambria in Central California.

After being in business for nine months, Rick says his shop has become a success, but not without a great deal of hard work. All of the effort to make his little business successful is not just working behind the counter in the shop itself. Rick learned that he had to get out in the commuity and become known.

An excellent performer, Rick has participated in two large public shows, as well as a number of private paying party's. His first experience in Cambria was a vaudeville-style review. The producer of the show talked Rick into singing and dancing as well as performing his magic. After a good deal of rehearsal both Rick and the producer decided it would be best if he lip synched the song, but he turned out to be a very graceful hoofer.

For the magic part of the show, he performed a slight variant of "Matchmaker." It's a very strong mental card effect by David Berglas. David has included the effect in his wonderful new book " The Mind & Magic of David Berglas;" if you have not purchased a copy of this book yet, I am sorry to tell you it is pretty much sold out. We are told this huge volume with 566 pages, which was released in early December was printed in limited numbers of 3000 and no more will be published. That makes this publication highly collectable. Don't pass it up if one comes your way.

Matchmaker is perhaps one of the most unusual card in balloon effects you will ever see. It requires a number of inflated balloons and, of course, a

selected card. That card finally winds up in a randomly selected balloon. Rick performed it for an audience of 300-plus people and it became a miracle.

Rick's second show was even more ambitious than his first: he presented a one-man 90-minute spirit show at a Cambria theater. His show opened on Halloween and ran through mid-November. The first 20 minutes of the show were spent telling tall tales of early spirit mediums. The middle section of the show was spent demonstrating many of the unusual things that mediums did. Finally, the theater was surprisingly plunged into darkness to play host to flying tambourines, glowing spirits, and a floating torso with spirit kisses in the dark. This show played to sold out houses on weekends.

While billed as a one-man show, Rick will quickly tell us that he enlisted the help of several aspiring teenage magicians to help with the black art portion of the performance.

If you drop by Rick's shop in Cambria, you might find the Pendragons or the granddaughter of Silent Mora, they drop by when in the neighborhood. Even with all of this excitement, Rick misses his friends at Ring 76, but he is on his

While your hands come together to make the transfer of the "packet," you hold the left hand packet in finger palm position as your right hand apparently takes the packet. You now have the torn corner (from the cell phone) in your right hand; keep this hand closed palm down. You then go into your left hand pocket and ditch the packet in your pocket, and bring out the cellular phone.

You ask a spectator to hold the cell phone for you, while you insert your left thumb and forefinger into your right hand fist to take the corner out and give it to another spectator to hold as "proof." You now have an empty right hand fist, which is palm down. The audience believes that the other piece of the card is in your fist.

You hand the cell phone over to spectator (after turning it off), and you ask the spectator to remove the battery pack of the cellular phone.

The audience then discovers that the pieces of the selected card have restored themselves, and the piece that the spectator is holding fits with the rest of the card.

**Afterthoughts:** This whole idea of having a card found in a cellular phone battery pack is from Paul

Gertner's lecture notes, Amalgamations. The name of the trick is Cell phone Surprise. What I didn't like about Gertner's trick, is that you use a dollar bill, instead of the card. Gertner's routine called for two cell phones and an assortment of other props that wouldn't comply with my working space, which consists of my pockets. It is a great trick, but I wanted it to work for me, which is the name of the game. If you don't like the idea of having the card appear in the battery of a cellular phone, you can opt to have it appear in a nest of boxes, wallet, or some other impossible place. Make it work for your situation.

However, the real lessons to be learned are how to adapt magical standards to kid audiences, and Sondermeyer and Schenk teach these lessons with fervor.


