selected and offered to remove an article of clothing each time he missed finding the choosen card that finally turned up on his T-shirt. It was a strong opening act for this competition.

us with the help of a spectator. David has become a premier mentalist and matched or predicted the spectator's choice several times, using different techniques for each effect. For his finale, a mind-blowing closing with the deck arranging itself into ESP suits with no assistance from David. That one left everyone scratching their heads.

Our third honoree for the year 2003 is Jim Swoger, who is celebrating his 80th year in magic. Jim began doing magic shows when he was five years old and at the ripe old age of seven he did a coin trick for Houdini. In the 1930s he was one of the busiest magicians in Pittsburgh, Pa., doing a full evening review style show. In the 1940s he and Melbourne Christopher were in the same Special Services group in the Pacific during World War II. Jim did thousands of shows for G.I.s under battlefield conditions. When the war was over ,Jim opened a magic shop in Pittsburgh that became known as "The House of Enchantment." For 40 years Jim, advertised his magic creations in the Linking Ring Magazine and appeared in shows and was part of the dealers' room at IBM Conventions all over the country. In the 1990s he moved to Oceanside and was presented with an honorary lifetime membership in the IBM and the SAM. He continued to create new magic effects and market them. For the Ring 76 Close-up contest last month, he created two new effects and at age 85 presented them as a contestant. For all that he has given to magic and magicians everywhere, we are proud to welcome him as an Honorary Lifetime Member of Ring 76.

We announce these 2003, Honorary Lifetime memberships now; however, their names will be engraved on our plaque of honor, and they will be publically recognized at our ceremonies and installation banquet in mid-July. As honorary lifetime members these three individuals will be given all rights and privilges of regular members of Ring 76, dues free.

Ring 76 Junior Magic Program Is Alive & Growing!

The other evening, minutes before the Ring 76 Board of Directors meeting was called to order, Fred Kaplan, who heads up our junior magicians program was showing me a very different and clever card trick. I had just attended the David Regal lecture the evening before and thought I had witnessed every clever card trick invented. But Fred's trick blew me away. Knowing I could not ask how he did it, I instead asked, "Where did you find that effect?" He said one of his young students had come up with it. And added, "It's a killer, isn't it?"

Fred Kaplan's efforts in establishing a Ring 76, Junior Magicians program is growing each week.

With the assistance of Phil Tuttle, a complete teaching program has been written and put into lesson plan form. Recently these two men began taking in students from the Barrio Logan area of San Diego.

They now have 12 youngsters from this "at risk" neighborhood.

Some months ago Kaplan made an appeal for help to our members, especially for a member who is able to speak both English and Spanish. To date, there have been no volunteers; however Fred tells MagiCurrents that one of his students is doing a fine job of translating for the students who speak only Spanish. However, there is still a need for an adult Spanish-speaking magician to help make this program more meaningful for Spanish speaking students.

This spring Kaplan and Phil Tuttle hope to have honed the skills of their young performers so they can entertain at birthday parties and take their show as a group to North County retirement centers, offering a complete program of magic. The students are all working hard to achieve the quality that allows them to appear before an audience.

Because Phil and Fred have already completed the hard work of creating magic lessons for their young students; volunteer instructors need not have any fear of not having enough material to work with or having magic tricks to teach the students. These young people make all of their own props and perfect their movements and skills with the instructors looking on from the sidelines and giving confidence and advice.

Adult volunteers are needed to assist with the teaching of magic. Help is needed two Saturday mornings a month and perhaps one afternoon or evening a month to learn the lessons to be taught to the students. 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Ever wonder what makes magic, magic? Ever ask yourself the following question when looking at a particular effect, trick, routine: Why? No, really....Why? Why is THIS magic?

Ever notice that magic comes in flavors that start at the simplest of what can only be classified as 'Puzzles' and gradually move toward the sublime? Sublime equaling the kind of routine that leaves you thinking that maybe magic is REAL.

Ever think about what magicians do so deeply that you really begin to doubt the validity of what we do. Seems so trivial. So much nonsense. Why? Look at it this way....if we really could do magic, wouldn't we pluck real gold coins from the air and predict the lottery in such a way that we always win the big ones? Don't you think that 'lay folk' think that same thing? I mean let's face it, they really are NOT stupid. So what is it that we are doing out there with our decks of cards, purses full of half dollars, pockets bulging with sponge balls, color changing knives, fake body parts, and small silk hankies? What?

If the above seems like a downer, I'm sorry, because it's not meant to be. I am convinced that the best way to do the most powerful and exciting magic is to be firmly rooted in the REALITY of the situ-



ation. You have to know what your audience is thinking in order to manipulate how YOU want them to react. You have to lead them along a neatly devised road only to dump them into the uncertainty of a dark forest of doubt in what they experienced of your magic!

Reality says that dollar bills do not float about the place. And, in fact they don't. That's what makes it magic when YOU make that happen. I know that for myself, after doing magic for over 32 years professionally, I have to periodically step away from the technique and try and SEE what the audience is SEEING! I encourage you to do this. Work at it. It is not

easy. We sit behind the curtain and watch the rabbit being placed into the hat. We know the extra coin is in OUR hand and the deck has a brief, but crucial set up. We KNOW what is going on and it ever so subtly affects our management of the miracle we are striving to present.

Thus the maxim, "Practice until you no longer know what you are doing," comes into play. What we present flows with such automatic grace that we can stand outside of ourselves and SEE as the audience SEES. The magic happens NOT because WE did some unseen manipulations, but simply because of the 'Magic' in OUR hands. The magic flows like streams of energy from us and activates a series of happenings that can not happen. You see, the truth is that not everything IS possible. If that were true then magic would truly be a silly enterprise. But, it is NOT silly. It is an entertaining link with a realm that humans would love to believe is possible and thus when astounding things happen before them they are, in fact, comforted.

Magic well done is truly one of the most important of entertainments, and we should all be thankful that at some turn in our lives there it was for us to pick up and learn and do. Thank you.



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View from the Cheap Seats

What are we doing here?

I have a modest magical library according to most of the magic people with whom I converse (either personally, or online). My total holdings include 130 books, 2 DVDs, 12 videos, and a couple of CD-Roms. Of course, I have chosen these volumes very carefully, and they include the both old and new classics such as the complete Tarbell Course, Greater Magic, Dai Vernon Book of Magic, Stars of Magic, Hay's Amateur Magician's Handbook, Lorayne's The Magic Book and Apocalypse, Hilliard's Royal Road & Expert Card Technique, Elliott's Phoenix and New Phoenix, Sisti's Magic Menu volumes, Magic of Michael Ammar, Jinx, and Ammar's Complete Cups & Balls, to name only a few.

Herein lies the crux of my article: How much is too much? What are we doing with the material that we have? How much of it do we actually KNOW and USE? When does the enthusiasm for one's hobby and/or profession end and "magical secret lust" begin?

One reviewer called Lorayne's **The Magic Book** "enough material to make a close-up star out of a serious student." The **Tarbell Course** contains in its eight volumes the complete spectrum of magic, from close-up to stage to illusions. **Greater Magic** has (in the Kaufman 1994 edition) some 1400 pages of magic from virtually a "who's who" in magic during its pre-1940s heyday. Collected periodicals such as'**Jinx**'(3 volumes), '**Phoenix** (6 volumes) **Magic Menu** (2 volumes), **Apocalypse** (4 volumes), and many others by Karl Fulves and Richard Kaufman contain *hundreds* of tricks *each*.

When one first gets into magic as a hobby, "magical secret lust" dominates the learning. Then, as too much money gets spent for dross, and the student learns more about basic principles of magic, the lust dissipates for a while. I suspect that it comes back with a vengeance, however, as the student begins to mature in his knowledge. What started as curiosity, perhaps decades previously,

now reincarnates as""know everything that is knowable."

Then, the race begins. How many books, videos/DVDs, pamphlets, and dedicated tricks can one afford to acquire to "keep up with what's new"? Somehow, we feel as though we are missing something if we don't have the latest/greatest from Ammar, or Sankey, or Daryl, or whomever.

What you will discover, if you are honest with yourself, is that you probably have more magic sitting on your shelf as yet undiscovered (or at least under explored) than you could ever learn in a lifetime. Two years ago I challenged Ring 76 members to learn one trick per month (from their respective existing libraries) well enough to add it to their performing repertoires. Did you do it? I did, and I am glad that I did!

A few months ago, Brad Burt's column in this same newsletter challenged those same members to "get out there and perform." I would add that "armchair magicians" are missing fully half of the joy of the hobby. There is nothing that compares to the joy one feels when that fleeting moment of rapturous wonder crosses the face of your spectators.

My message to you today is to dig into your library, learn some great forgotten material, and make magic for an audience. Put your "magical secret lust" or "know everything lust" aside and reexamine what got you into magic in the first place. Performing the impossible, even the mildly impossible, for either a handful or a gaggle of spectators is what it is all about.

MIND OVER MATTER

He Lived As A Devil, Eh?

Effect: A packet of 14 cards is shown face down. The performer deals the top card face up onto the table. On it is the name Bonnie. The next card is dealt face up, and placed to the right of the 1st card. The name on it is Clyde. It is explained that each pair of cards are partners in crime. Some are fictional, and some really lived. After all the cards have been dealt into two piles, either pile is placed on top of the other. The cards are then mixed and cut several times. The packet is then handed to a spectator who is instructed to deal the packet back and forth into two piles. After the deal, the spectator may stop, or pick up either pile and place it on the other, and do the procedure again. This is done as many times or as few times as the spectator wishes. When the spectator is satisfied with the two piles, he is to take the top card of either pile, and place it unseen into his pocket. The spectators each pick up a pile of cards, and thoroughly mix them, even going so far as to trade as many or as few cards as they wish. The two piles are finally shuffled together into one packet, and set face down on the table.

Two new cards are introduced. They bear the names Holmes and Watson. These are our "Detectives" Their job is to hunt down the criminal's partner. Holmes goes face up on the bottom of the packet, and Watson goes face up on the top of the packet. The "Watson" card is now dealt to the table. The next card is placed on the bottom of the packet. The next card is dealt on top of the "Watson" card, and so on until the "Holmes" card is dealt to the table. The cards remaining in the hand are discarded.

The packet on the table is picked up, and the dealing process continues, but in a slightly different way. This time, the top card goes to the bottom of the packet first, then the 2nd card goes to the table. This is done until a smaller number of cards is sandwiched between the two Detective cards. The cards NOT sandwiched are discarded.

The packet that remains is now picked up, and the top card is dealt to the table, and the second card is placed on the bottom. This continues until only one card is sandwiched between the Detectives. This card is turned face up. It says, for instance, "Frank James." The performer points to the spectator,s pocket, and says, "Jesse James! You are under arrest!" The spectator removes the card from his pocket. It bears the name "Jesse James."

You will need to make up the following pairs of cards; one name to each card:

Bonnie & Clyde
Butch Cassidy
Sundance Kid
Boris
Natasha
The Joker
The Riddler
Erik Menendez
Lyle Menendez
Frank James
Jesse James
Bill Clinton
Al Gore

Place the cards into the order given. Now, for the two Detective cards. You may use any names you wish, but I have a love of Shelock Holmes, so I prefer Holmes and Watson. Place all the cards into a packet wallet, and you are set.

Bring out the packet of Criminal Cards, and deal them face up alternately into two face up piles, as per the presentation. After the deal, pick up either pile, and place it on top of the other. The packet is now in a cyclical order (abcdefgabcdefg). Pick up the combined packet, and give it a Charlier shuffle. Briefly, hold the packet in the left hand, and push off about a couple of cards off the TOP of the deck into your waiting right hand. Now push off a couple of cards off of the BOTTOM of the deck and place them on top of the cards in you right hand. Now push off a couple more cards off of the TOP of the deck and place them unde neath the stack in your right hand. Continue this procedure until you have exhausted the deck. All this has done is cut the packet once. Set the packet on the table and allow the spectator to cut the packet as many times as she wishes. The packet is still in a cyclical order.

Now with an ove hand shuffle, run 7 cards, reversing their order, but place these 7 cards back where the came from. In other words, do not place them behind

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Magical Thinking An Essay By Dr. Joel Moskowitz

If you are a thinking magician and think you know about magical thinking, this might make you think about the way people think and it may affect your performance.

A youth told his parent, "When I grow up I want to be a magician." His parent responded, "You can't be both, son."

Inherent in this wisdom lies the psychological mechanism which enhances mature spectators appreciation of the art of magic. In psychoanalytical terms, the root lies in magical thinking. A significant factor in allowing oneself to be amazed and amused by the conjurer is the capacity to think and feel as an infant. Performers are well accustomed to encountering an audience member who reacts with offense to being, as they feel, deceived. These people become distressed when in a situation that taps a time when they were miraculously powerful and helpless at the same time.

There is no time in our lives when we are as great a magician as when we are infants. Powerless in fact, we seem to be able to command these huge creatures (parents and other adults) by simply thinking we are wet, hungry, cold and with the most minimal of signals they do our bidding. The essence of magical thinking resides in this early period of cognitive development. Magical thinking refers to the belief that gestures, postures, specific thoughts or expressions can in some mystical way lead to the fulfillment of wishes or ward off evils. It is a very primitive belief system. In most, as we grow and mature, we learn that just because we step on a crack it won't break our mother's back.

Very young children, not understanding what actually causes things to happen, may harbor these erroneous ideas. To some extent religion and superstition encompass this kind of conviction. Persons with severe mental illnesses, i.e. ,schizophrenics or those with obsessive-compulsive disorder, may exhibit similar reactions.

If one searches for references regarding magical thinking on the Internet, you are mostly directed to the concept that this thought process is a feature in, for example, faith in alternative and complementary medicine. Although the articles infer that there is a crosscultural basic hard wiring amongst humans that impels us to

such beliefs i.e. religion, the explanation doesn't go deep enough. As babies, we humans have all the same needs. Our pattern of learning about the world and how we can affect it and it affect us is doubtless the same for all of us. Magicians recreate the experience of defying reality. As spectators we identify with the wonder worker. In so doing, we enjoy the marvel of a very early time in each of our lives. Those who cannot go back to this feeling state suffer a rigidity, which mutes their capacity for pleasure. All the illusion arts, from mimes to movies, depend on suspending disbelief. The personality that permits us to think like Einstein and play like Bugs Bunny is the optimum adaptive style.

It is a major aim of our educational system to teach us how to reason logically. Magic defies logic and science. It is a generally accepted truism that scientists are particularly vulnerable to the outside the box techniques of the conjurer. Remember Uri Geller and the Stanford Research Institute (not connected withStanford University)

At the Magic Castle in Hollywood, in the Close Up Room, the Host will choose two spectators to sit on either side of the performer. In this position, they serve as the surrogates for the people in the bleachers. Alas for the magician if either or both assistants feel challenged by not knowing how it is done,. The enjoyment of the wonders is obliterated when these personalities feel threatened by the mystery.

Their reaction is contagious and the audience is witness to an unwilling contest where the performer is forced to be on guard. The assistant conscious or unconsciously will behave so as to sabotage the performance. Thereby he/she gains control of what they feel is diminishing them i.e. being fooled.

What is the performing magician to do upon encountering the insecure assistant who is more concerned with the how than the hooray? If you have a style, that suggests that indeed you do possess extraordinary powers, no explanation will be sought. A mentalist perhaps. They will ask to kiss your ring and start a new religion in your name. Satisfied that you are the proof of what they have known, all along, that there are things not understood by physicians or scientists. A. Conan Doyle, creator of Sherlock Holmes, the ultimate logician, refused to accept his friend Houdini's protestations that he did not have unearthly abilities.

If your performing persona requires you to offer a disclaimer (It is only stagecraft.) be prepared that some/many will see this as just another subterfuge to conceal mysterious powers. Can the deceiver be telling the truth? Remember the profound: "For those who believe, no explanation is necessary. For those who

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do not, no explanation will suffice."

In the instance of the audience member(s) who are uncomfortable about not knowing how you accomplish your astonishments, psychological karate may sooth their apprehensions. Assure them that in being suspicious, they are in good company. Erudite men/ women of science are also baffled. Offer to provide them with enlightenment They can take lessons from you. Calmed, the need to compete for the holy grail of knowledge will disappear. Few will accept the offer of the forbidden apple. Bow and vanish.

the cards they were in front of. The packet is now in a Palindromic order (abcdefggfedcba). Hand the packet to the spectator, and as in the performance, let him deal the packet back and forth into two packets, and place either pile on top of the other. Let him do this as many or as few times as he wishes, but make sure he knows that he is to stop when he has two piles dealt that he is satisfied with. When he is satisfied, instruct him to take the top card of either packet, and place it in his pocket. As he is placing the card in his pocket, pick up the packet that he did NOT remove the card from, and begin to sloppily mix it. However, you must keep track of the bottom card of your packet. That is the card that partners with the card in his pocket.

I do this by mixing every card BUT that one, which I leave on the bottom of the packet. Instruct him to pick up the remaining packet on the table (the one he removed the top card of) and thoroughly mix it. After a bit of mixing, place the bottom card (the partner card) on top of your packet. Take back his packet of cards, and riffle shuffle the two packets together. In doing so, make sure that the top card of your packet becomes the 2nd card of the combined packet.

In other words, shuffle one card on top of your top packet's top card. Table the combined packet. Bring out the Detective cards. Place one on top of the packet, and the other on the bottom of the packet. As you have probably guessed, you will now do a Down/Under Deal. Deal the top card (a detective card) to the table. The next card goes to the bottom of the packet. The next card is dealt to the table. The next card goes to the bottom of the packet, and so on until the other detective card is dealt to the table. The cards remaining in your hand are discarded.

Pick up the tabled packet. You will now do a Under/Down Deal. This is the opposite of what you just did. The first card (a detective card) goes to the bottom of the packet. The next card is dealt to the table. The next card is placed on the bottom of the packet. The next card is dealt to the table, and so on until the packet is exhausted. Three cards will be sandwiched between the Detectives. The cards outside of the sandwich are discarded.


Pick up the small packet left, and once again do a Down/Under Deal as before. At the end of the deal, only one card will be trapped between the two Detective cards. This will be the partner of the card in his pocket. Flip over your card, and see the name, then "arrest" the criminal in the spectator's pocket.

Mark's Magic by Mark Stone

VANISHING RECORDS

EFFECT: A transparent front square box with no top or bottom, is held and shown empty. A flat piece of black plastic with a hole resembling a "phonograph record jacket" is shown and placed horizontally inside the box.

Then, up to eight 45 RPM normal records or the color changing record set are displayed and visibly placed



on top of the plastic record jacket inside the box; the records are visible at all times. Suddenly, the front of the prop is flicked with a silk and instantly, all of the records disappear without a trace.

APPARATUS & DISCRIPTION

Mark came up with the idea of this effect because he always enjoyed doing the "Color Changing Records" routine by Pavel. The apparatus is built in lucite and is a square box with a clear front and without a top or





bottom. The outside box panels are finished in bright colors and the inside of the box is flat black.

A white flat piece of plastic with a large hole that resembles a record jacket rests inside the box: the record jacket sits free on top of two side guides and can be slid back and forth or removed. The box's back wall has an extra short fake flap attached to it and a collapsing flap hinged to the fake wall top edge (fig 1). One side of this flap is white with a painted large black spot (hole) the same size as the plastic record jacket hole. The other side of the flap is finished in flat black.

With the flap up it appears you have a regular empty box. Now, move the left hand palm up and put it underneath the bottom of the back wall

(fig 2). Turn the box around with a smooth and slow 180 degree turning movement, saying at the same time,

"There is no false trap".

The instant the clear front is facing you, release the The flap

flap by using the right thumb. (Fig 4) will

drop down ontop of the record jacket. Continue turning the box so the clear front is again facing the audience. From the audience point of view you are just showing the box on all sides.

The box is now resting in just the left hand. Then place the set of color changing records or regular 45 rpm records inside the box having them apparently resting on top of the record jacket. (But in reality they are on top of the open flap.)


Grab the silk with the right hand and flick the clear front of the box in an ascending movement that covers the box's clear front for just a moment. At that moment

tilt the front of the box slightly toward the audience so the record jacket will slide forward (use your fingers to help) creating a gap between the back wall and the flap with the records.

It is through this gap that the left finger tips will push the flap back to the closed position, carrying all the records into the secret back compartment.

Immediately the left fingers hook the record jacket through the hole and push it back to its original position (flush to the wall.) All the records are gone! All this movement is easly done while the clear front is covered with the foulard for 2 or 3 seconds.

With the right hand, immediately grasp the box by the



upper back edge (flap and back wall together) and show the box empty.

This is a wonderful way to finish off your color changing record routine.

We are again indebeted to Mark Stone for sharing this effect with our members.

For our members who do not know Mark Stone, for many years he operated a company known as Cosmar Magic Company, based in La Mesa and produced many original effects that were sold around the world.

Mark began performing when he was just a boy and continued his interest in magic most of his life. In the 1980s he was an active member of Ring 76 and for a time served as Ring president. This is the second of his original magic effects he has contributed to MagiCurrents, and we look forward to more in the future.

Mark is currently preparing a book featuring many of his stories and his magic creations.

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
