I picked up the current issue of "San Diego Family" magazine and found advertising for several of our Ring members in the pages of that publication. Their ads were so well written and produced I thought it important to pass this information along to our members.

San Diego Family magazine is just what the name implies a monthly publication of about 150 pages of articles and advertising for family products and services. Toward the back of the magazine there is a classified section with display ads for entertainment for family functions, parties, and shows. This magazine has been in business for 22 years, with a readership of 300,000.

All of the magicians I talked with tell me their ads all pay for themselves and bring them many leads for new shows. In the classified section there are display ads for about every kind of entertainment you can think of, including a complete circus. So the competition for the entertainment dollar is fierce. Having an appealing ad for magic is very important.

Under the heading of magic, Terry Godfrey has the largest ad; it is one column or two and a quarter inches by five inches long. He has a very eyecatching headline that forces you to read the ad. "Make your child's birthday one of the happiest & most memorable days of their life." In the ad itself Terry invites potential clients to come and visit his show at Seaport Village with the times he performs. This quickly lets the reader know this is a professional entertainer who works a popular venue on a



regular basis. His telephone number is in large bold letters, a nice clean ad that gets a lot of important information across to the potential customer.

On the next page I found an ad for Michael E. Johnson. Michael says he has been advertising in this publication for about five years and has received a lot of work as a result. In the beginning Michael had a photograph of himself in the ad and would receive just enough work to pay for the ad. Then he found the



cartoon drawing of the little boy pulling a wagon with a rabbit. He began using that image as his logo and suddenly his leads tripled for work. He also has included a 760 area code telephone number which makes his ad appealing to North County customers.

Jeff Marcus is another Ring member who has advertised in San Diego Family magazine for many years. He says he finds that this publication is easier to work with and gets him many more leads for shows than "Parent" magazine. He reminds readers all of the work he gets from these ads are kids shows. Jeff offers more than just




magic; his Alakazam Entertainment is a complete unit and can offer clowns, games, and more. His clowns do balloon animals and face painting. Like Michael Johnson, Jeff has two phone numbers in his ad, both a San Diego number and a North County When you call Jeff's phone, there is a recorded message if he is not in the office. He returns his calls promptly, and that is very important

for good client-performer relations. Jeff also makes it clear that his company accepts Mastercard and Visa as a form of payment for his services.

Dick Dale is another Ring member who has a very clean straight forward ad in this publication. Dick's ad is aimed at families looking for a magician to entertain at birthday parties. He says he will make the birthday child a Star. Dale has an 800 number to call which appeals to



people who want to make toll free calls, and he also includes a Website address that allows potential customers to look at all of the things his show has to offer. Dick also makes it clear that his act will include the appearance of a live rabbit. If you have ever attended a David Ginn lecture, you know that is a very important part of doing childrens birthday party shows.



Longtime San Diego magician Joe Mystic has a very different style ad. At the top of the ad he proclaims he serves all of San Diego County. He offers magicians, wizards and clowns in his shows. He lets people know he does school and library shows and also has a complete show with a Harry Potter theme. The

Wizard theme is hot right now, and Joe has created an ad to take advantage of the popularity of the new Harry Potter books and movies. Joe also has included a Website for customers to go to for more information and e-mail contact for information on open dates. More and more people are using e-mail as a way to communicate and conduct business.

MagiCurrents gives an A+ to all of these enterprising professional entertainers who have learned well the importance of selling their shows to the public. Each one of these performers knows what sells their show and has highlighted that feature. In addition to being good showmen, they are good businessmen. Advertising does sell you and your product.



Effect: The four kings turn face down, then turn into the four aces.

Set-Up: Pull out two red kings, one black king, two black aces, and a red ace. Arrange the cards in the following order from the face down. All cards are face up. Black king, red king, ace of spades, ace of clubs, red ace, and red king.

Performance: Perform an Elmsely Count showing four kings. Place the last king (black) on the bottom). Get a break above the one black king on the bottom, and turn all five cards face down. Explain that you will turnone king face down. Perform a Jordan Count showing all the kings face down. Openly transfer the bottom card (ace of clubs) to the top of the packet. Make no mention of this. Now turn your body to the right as your do a Block Push Off with the top 5 cards, turning them face up. You will see a red king. You supposedly turned one king face up. Perform another Elmsely Count showing four face up kings. Place the last king (red) on top of the packet. Get a break above the bottom two aces, and Side Steal or palm them into your right hand. Wave your right hand over the left (your left hand holds the rest of the cards, while your right hand holds two aces). Drop the two aces onto the face of the red king, and perform an Elmsely Count showing four aces.

Some time ago I set about to gather all the best material I could find on doing truly Impromptu Magic. The reason was simple and, since I don't plan on actually finishing what I started (in this case), I offer it you in hopes that someone will realize what I believe has the potential to make someone a household name in magical entertainment.

Here's the concept: An act that uses ONLY props, etc. that can be borrowed at the show venue. Period. No gimmicks at all or perhaps very, very few. Perhaps a thumb tip, but I don't want the concept to get too far afield. Perhaps only gimmicks that will then be used to ACT upon items borrowed, etc.

Think of the power and EFFECT that you could have when you really get your chops down. Now, combine your magic skill with a pleasing personality able to be both humorous and serious....man, you could write your own ticket. THINK...in one sense this would BE what people REALLY expect a magician to be! Walk in and without any 'funny props' you take the audience apart.

Now, a story to illustrate why I came up with this idea: Billy McComb, my vote for one of the 10 best magicians of any kind of all time, used to work cruise ships.

His reputation maker? He worked a LOT of international cruises and there might be folks from 5-15 different countries on board. He was able to put ANY COIN FROM ANY COUNTRY given to him into a borrowed bottle! Think of that.

There is the basis. You walk into any venue and produce magic with what is there. Easy? No, I don't think so, and there may be only a handful of folks in the world that could pull it off. I would love to see someone give it a try or find out that someone has realized my dream already! Take care and all the best,

View from the Cheap Seats

Exploring the Allied Arts, Part One

At one time or another, most magicians become curious about the some of the allied arts to magic. If you haven't explored any of these yet, it is almost a sure bet that you will at some time in the future. Perhaps this View From the Cheap Seats will save you some money, time, and effort in your initial investigations.

Our first allied art is Clowning, a profession perhaps as old as magic. From court jesters to circus clowns, these mirth-makers have become as legendary as magicians. Often you can find some good books on beginning clowning at your local municipal library. A quick check on-line with book specialty stores should reveal dozens of books on the subject.

Good clowning books detail makeup, costuming, and several routines for clowning. Just as platform magicians have their assistant(s), clowning depends upon more than one individual for maximum impact; the best routines are often for three clowns. In the eyes of the audience, the members of the clown troupe are equals, unlike the audience perception of the magician and his/her assistant (your magic assistant is more than just your lackey, right?). Serious clowns devise their own original makeup, which gives them distinctive identities that are required for professional work. If you find that you enjoy clowning and have aptitude for such physical comedy and mime, you will most certainly want to devise your own makeup.

My favorite book on the subject is Be a Clown, by Mark Stolzenburg, a 1989 book that may be still in print or readily available in the used marketplace. Search for it in the sites listed later in this article.

Finally, there are books mixing magic with clowning. Magic Inc. in Chicago lists two volumes by clown professional Ernie Kerns, both entitled How To Be a Magic Clown; the second volume is a compilation of three books by Kerns and two other clown magic professionals, so the reader gets three professional opinions on makeup, costuming, and

routining, all in that second volume. For working magicians, clowning might even be a separate side career and a significant source of additional income.

Juggling is another allied art to magic. I must confess that juggling intrigues me, and I will have a "go at it" this summer. Beginning juggling books abound in public libraries and bookstores. Many of the ones that I have read feature color photos augmented with graphics explaining the arcs, tosses, and patterns. Many of them go beyond scarf juggling and ball juggling to include clubs, rings, knives, and two man juggling.

An almost forgotten aspect of juggling is plate spinning; the plates are not only spun on dowels, but also on their edges, as one might spin a coin! I know of no juggling books which cover plate spinning, but there is a marvelous photographically-illustrated chapter on it in a century-old classic magic book entitled The Modern Conjuror (and Drawing Room Entertainer), by C. Lang Neil (incidentally, the magic in the book is superb and taught well; the book also includes chapters on Troublewit, Chapeaugraphy, and Shadowgraphy).

Most all beginning juggling books seem to agree that juggling is not nearly as difficult as it looks. Most insist that the average person can learn the basic moves in under an hour, and that regular practice in short periods every day works wonders in making the actions smooth and automatic (imagine that!). My favorite beginning juggling book is Juggling for the Complete Klutz, a book that predates the current ...for Dummies series of books by almost 20 years. Authors John Cassidy and B.C. Rimbeaux wrote the book in 1977, and it has sold more than a million copies and stayed in print for more than 25 years (my copy is the 25th anniversary third edition). If you get it new in a book store, it even comes with a set of three juggling cubes (they don't roll away when you drop them...). A specialty book within the subject is Three Ball Juggling by Ken Benge, an encyclopedia of moves possible with just three juggling balls. I have even found available specialty books on rings and clubs.

Check out the listings for clowning and juggling books at www.Amazon com, www.Barnesandnoble.com, www.Booksamillion.com, or www.Bibliofind.com. In just one of those sites, I found more than 35 different Clowning titles and more than 100 different Juggling titles.

Next month I will continue this exploration of allied arts. Until then, may your greasepaint never run, and may you never drop your 3-ball rotation.

MIND OVER MATTER

Pair-A-Dox

Once again we pay a visit to the Palindomic Stack.

While this effect is a coincideence effect, it has its roots in the classic Brainwave Plot.

Effect: The performer tosses a packet of seven arbitrary cards face up onto the table. A spectator mixes the cards till content. The performer takes the packet

and tears it in half along its width, creating two packets. Each half packet is mixed by the spectator. The packet is now assembled, and now consists of 14 half cards. The spectator goes through a process of dealing two packets and reassembling the whole packet as many times or as few times as desired. When satisfied that the packet has been mixed, the spectator once again deals the cards into two separate packets. The spectator hands one of the packets to the performer, and keeps one for himself. The performer and the spectator mix their packets thoroughly, even trading packets if desired. After the mix, the packets are replaced on the table, and shown to be totally without order. The performer picks up a pile and so does the spectator. A random sorting and elimination procedure now takes place until one card remains. The two half cards match. The discarded cards are now turned face down to show that all the cards came from a red-backed deck. The "selected" half-cards are turned face down. It came from a blue-backed deck!

Method: This is stupidly simple, but it has fried many magicians who should know better. The packet is made up of six cards from a red deck, and one card from a blue deck making it a seven-card packet. The only card that you care about is your one blue-backed card.

Give the face-up packet to the spectator (note: the cards must always remain face-up so that the odd card is not seen. I should not of had to say that, but there are some people. Instruct the spectator to thoroughly mix the cards. When she is satisfied, take the cards back. If the odd card is the top or bottom card, give the packet a cut. This is not absolutely nesessary, but this insures that it will not flash. Tear the packet in half along the width of the cards, giving you two packets. Place one packet on top of the other. Go through the cutting and shuffling necessary to get the packet into a palindromic stack. This was described in last month's column, so I will not go over it again. Once the packet is in a palindromic order, have the spectator go through the dealing and reassembling proceedure also described in last month's effect. Once the spectator is satisfied with the mix, have the assembled packet dealt into two separate packets. Have the spectator hand you either packet, keeping one for herself. Each packet is thoroughly mixed. However, sneaky work will come in when you trade packets. In actual fact, you are mixing the cards, yes, but you are insuring that the odd card ends up second from the bottom. Once you have the odd card in position, take the packet from her, and while casually showing the random order of the cards, cut the packet so that the odd card is put into the same position as in your packet, i.e., second from the bottom. All that is left to do is a standard Down/Under Deal, and the effect works itself.

At 1st glance, you maybe asking, why bother with the palindromic stack? This will ensure that one packet with not end up containing both odd-backed halves. Try this out. It is a wonderful moment when the magicians in the room see the odd back.

Mark's Magic by Mark Stone

Again we thank Mark Stone for sharing with Ring 76 some of his magic routines that he has been assembling for a future book on magic. Mark has been a magic manufacturer, performer, and is a past president of Ring 76. Look for his table at the coming swap meet; he will have some interesting props for sale.

THUNDERBOLT KNOT (Cosmar Magic)

EFFECT

The performer hold and show a piece of rope with a knot tied at his center. Suddenly, at the performer's command the knot disappears with a thunderous BOOM.

COMMENTS

This was one of my first commercial effects, and distributed though a magic wholesaler to magic stores worldwide since 1984.

PREPARATION AND PERFORMANCE


The secret behind this effect is a false rope knot and a firework pull string; while performing do not hold the rope close to the face.

The firework strings comes in a package of 12. To prepare the strings for this effect, make a loop the size of your thumb in both ends of the strings.

Cut a piece of magician's rope of about two feet long and make a false knot at the rope's center. In case you don't know how to make a false knot, here is described a very easy method.

FALSE KNOT


With the left hand, take the rope by the end A, and, with the right hand, take end B. Make a loop in middle of the rope,



With the left thumb, push section x of the rope through the loop,

Take again the section of rope marked with a **x** between the left index finger and the middle finger; then grab with the left



finger
and pinky finger the
portion of rope behind the
loop as is shown in
fig 3-4.



Pull the rope section marked x; hold between the left index and middle fingers and, at the same

time, with the right hand pull rope's end B, this will form the false knot **fig 4.** If you pull both rope ends in opposite directions, the rope will come untied.



Once the false knot is set, introduce both thumbs into each string's loop. Grab the rope's ends with each hand in front of the string so that the string is hidden by the rope, **fig 5.**



While performing, tell the spectators to concentrate on the knot, move your hands away from your face, then pull your hands in opposite directions in one strong motion, resulting in the simultaneous explosion and



vanishing of the knot.

<u>Remember</u>: Perform this effect away from your face!
