

Magic Day at the San Diego Blood Bank short of volunteer magicians

On Saturday, October 11th, the San Diego Blood Bank is holding Magicians Day. The Blood Bank is asking Ring 76 members to donate an hour of performing time to entertain those coming to donate the gift of life. About 26 Ring members signed up to take part in this event, but that number has dwindled to 19 because many members had to backout because of

other engagements.

advertised: show up and perform. We had originally hoped to have between 30 and 35 Ring members volunteer. The hours are 8:30 am. to 4 pm. At any of the five San Diego County Blood Banks in Vista, Escondido, El Cajon, South Bay, and San Diego.

Siegfried & Roy show in LasVegas to close indefinitely.

On Sunday, October 5th, the 265 employees of the Las Vegas Superstar illusion show known as "Siegfried & Roy" were told to look for new jobs. Alan Feldman, a spokesman for the Mirage Hotel and Casino where the magic duo have appeared for more than a decade ,said it is not clear if the show will ever open again.

Meanwhile, Roy Horn 59, clings to life in a Las Vegas hospital on life support-systems. Horn was 45 minutes into the first of two shows Friday evening October 3rd, when a seven year old white tiger by the name of Montecore, suddenly rose up and clamped his vice like jaws around Horn's neck and dragged the stunned entertainer off stage.

The backstage crew used fire extinguishers to force the big cat to release his hold on Roy. By the time paramedics had arrived at the Siegfried & Roy Theater at the Mirage, Horn, who was celebrating his 59th birthday that day, had lost a great deal of blood and was in very critical condition.

Horn's partner, Siegfried Fischbacher, visibly shaken, walked out on stage and told the audience the show was being canceled. Two days later Siegfried said it is not clear if the show will ever reopen.

Siegfried and Roy have been appearing in Las Vegas shows since 1967, and are the current reining superstarts of magic. They are reported by Forbe's magazine to earn 52 million dollars a year.

FISM Grand Prix Winner Jason Latimer appears at Ring 76 September Meeting

The September meeting is being called one of the best in Ring 76 history. The meeting was brief because of the special program. Bob Ingalls was the acting president in the absence of Diane Lane. Bob paid special attention to Dr. Joel Moskowitz and congratulated his being given a top award by "Linking Ring" magazine, the official house organ of the International Brotherhood of Magicians. Joel's award was for the best article, which was titled "Eric Jan Hanussen Hitler's Jewish Clairvoyant" and was published in the September issue 2002. Joe will be receiving a trophy from the IBM for his excellent writing.

Bob Ingalls also urged all members that had not signed up to perform at the San Diego Blood Bank on October 11th to do so. Bob also presented a belated metal for 2nd place in the Ring 76 stage competition to Josef Rennieltner, who

had been in Europe; this was the first time he was available to receive his award.

Then Bob changed hats and became the Vice President of Entertainment and introduced Dale Hindman, the President of the Magic Castle in Hollywood. Dale took center stage in front of a giant eight sheet from the Carter Show of 1928, that was used as a backdrop for this special evening.

Hindman is the grandson of Ray Muse, a famous magician from the past. Dale had some funny stories and presented a very different version of the six bill repeat trick with real dollar bills. He told the audience he has been in magic for more than 50 years and this evening he was the opening act for a 22-year old man. That young man was of course Jason Latimer, who won the Grand Prix of Magic at the close up competition at FISM in Holland this past summer. Jason also won the best invention category as well. He becomes the

third American behind Lance Burton and Johnny Ace Palmer to win the FISM Grand Prix Award.

Jason began his stage portion of the program with a card effect. A card selected by a spectator was placed back in the deck, which was then placed back in its box. Turning the pack of cards over, a card was found to be trapped between

the box and the cellophane wrapper. It was not the selected card, but with a flick of the wrist, the indifferent card suddenly became the signed selected card. It was a great opening effect.

Following the card trick, Jason presented a very beautiful routine with two linking rings. These were very large rings -- I am guessing at 14 inches-and appeared to be very heavy rings. This routine was graceful and perfectly coordinated with music. After linking and un-linking, Jason looked at his audience of nearly 80 people and said I know you are all magicians and have seen this many times but have you ever seen this and instantly a third ring magically appeared linked to the other two. You could hear the audible gasp from the magicians in the room as the third ring suddenly appeared.

Two chairs were placed on the stage and Jack White joined Jason for an interview. We learned that Jason is a college student at U.C. Santa Barbara, in his senior year studying math, physics, and economics and will enter graduate school when he graduates next spring. Jason is currently working on measuring the speed of light and how to slow it down. That knowledge can greatly benefit communications on earth. Jason's magic skill was the product of the Magic Castle's young magician's program of which he was a member for five years.

Jason told Jack that he spent a full year on the concept of the act that won him the Grand Prix award at FISM and another year working out the

moves and presentation. It all started at the Magic Castle when someone issued Jason a challenge to do cups and balls with clear glass cups. When he accepted the challenge he didn't

expect it would take him two years to work out the routine.

The interview ended and after a brief break for our regular raffle, that included a dinner for two at the Magic Castle, several magic books and props our program resumed with Jason's award-winning FISM act. It was the first time he had presented the act since he won his award.

Working seated at a close-up table, Jason could be seen by those in the back of the room on a big screen so everyone could witnessed every move. Jason walked onto the stage carrying a cardboard box that was shown

empty. He suddenly flipped the box over and onto the table three clear large glass tumblers appeared. Another gasp from the audience. Again working with music, three sponge balls appear one by one under the glasses. They change places, appear and disappear. At no time are the tumblers lifted just slid from place to place on the table.

After what can only be called a series of truly

magical appearances and disappearances, Jason lifts two of the tumblers to reveal two solid glass spheres each about three inches in diameter. Then comes the final shocker of this routine; the three tumblers are stacked on

top of each other with the mouth up, showing that each tumbler is solid and not empty as we had been led to believe.

It is close up magic at its best and most deserving of the awards given. Jason is a very almost shy kind of guy and reluctantly rose and took his bow to a standing ovation. He then answered questions from the audience. We learned that his mother was a movie actress, and that he had been around show

business all of his life. Jason told the audience he would work the Magic Castle the rest of that week, then head out on a European tour that would take him to the IBM Convention in England, on to China, then to return to California where he will appear in several of the Milt Larsen produced "It's Magic" shows in Southern California.

We had the youngest and the oldest performing at

the September meeting. Jim Swoger 85 presented a trick with pocket watches that he invented and manufactured in 1930. Jim says when he first started producing the watch effect he could buy the fake pocket watches for 15 cents a piece. Today this prop is a collector's item.

View from the Cheap Seats

Hello in this "spookiest" time of the year! At the request of your erstwhile editor, Jack White, I have chosen to make this VFCS a bit of background on myself for those who have been inquiring of both Jack and Richard Ustick at the Ring 76 monthly meetings. I have chosen to writer, magician, write in third person to retain musician some semblance of detachment.

Jon A. Hand was born in Nashville, Tennessee, on Halloween, 1952. He became interested in magic at the tender age of eight, when he saw a live evening magic show at his local high school auditorium. The magician's finale was vanishing a live pony from high in the air (using the same techniques now employed to vanish tigers by some of the great magicians in Las Vegas). Jon was too close to the illusion, sitting front center, and saw the working part of the illusion fall into place. On the way home, he knew that he had to learn more about magic.

The next year, Mark Wilson's seminal Magic Land of Allakazam began a five year television run, and Jon was hooked.

Finding Joseph Leeming's Fun With Magic in his local library, Jon studied it intently, and staged his first backyard magic show for neighborhood friends in the summer of 1961. The show was a resounding success, and Jon began a lifelong love of magic as a hobbyist.

Jon took up the saxophone in the fall of 1965, a development that was to shape his entire future life. After five years of school band, Jon's abilities on sax landed him a major scholarship to Tennessee Technological University, whose music department is among the best in the southeast. Majoring in Music Education, Jon graduated with honors in 1974, and began a teaching career in music that continues unabated today. A return to graduate studies garnered him a Master of Arts in Music Theory and Composition in 1982. Jon has taught all grades from Kindergarten through University, and he is also active as a musical performer and composer. His first work for symphony orchestra, Fanfare, Dance, & Celebration, has been performed by orchestras in both Tennessee and Florida.

Jon married his high school sweetheart in 1972, and the couple celebrates their 31st anniversary this December. Their only child, a son, was born to them only seven years ago, and he has already been levitated in a public show!

Jon pursued magic as a solo hobbyist for almost forty years before discovering bulletin board Web sites such as Conjuror and MagicTalk. In these sites he found a whole new world of communicating with others who shared his hobby and passion. After several months of posting in MagicTalk, Jon was approached via email

by Richard Ustick, then editor of the Ring 76 newsletter, about writing a guest article for the newsletter. After a few such guest spots, Richard asked Jon about a permanent spot in the publication, and the articles have been in place for almost four years.

Jon gives magic shows for school festivals, church festivals, and the

occasional birthday party. Although he remains a dedicated amateur, Jon has performed for audiences of 350 on five separate occasions. He loves to write about both music and magic, and his wife claims that he missed his calling,

insisting that he should have been a writer. His original articles on Magic for Beginners repose online at the Conjuror site and on Michael Ammar's magic site.

Jon lives in a small town

approximately 85 miles south of Nashville, Tennessee, which is why he never comes to Ring meetings! <grin> He loves to communicate with Ring 76 members by email, and he has come to know several members very well through that electronic medium. He is currently finishing a book of original routines for Cups & Balls, and he has a book-in-progress of his other original magic, some of which has appeared in these pages. He is grateful for the opportunity to write for this publication, and the monthly deadline has spurred some of his best writing.

Magic Notes from Jack White

Meet the magicians behind "MagiToons"

For the past nine months MagiCurrents has featured some very humorous magic related cartoons in its pages. Several of our members have asked who is coming up with the gags and the art for

these cartoons? These sensational efforts are the work of Ring 76 member Jim Whiting and Ellen Friedman, the wife of Ring member Ted Dunning. Ellen is from Tyler, Texas, and has been drawing since she was three years old. She met her future husband, Ted Dunning, while she was working on a science project in New Mexico.

Ellen came to San Diego to do post doctoral research at U.C.S.D. in 1977, and fell in love with the community. Then she went to Las Cruces, New Mexico, to work on a research project. When that project was finished,

Ted, with whom she worked, moved to San Diego and Ellen followed him back to the city by the bay.

Her first experience with magic was one evening when Ted got out his set of cups and balls and did a routine for her. She was impressed and decided right then and there she never wanted to know how Ted did his magic tricks. Ellen says it's much more fun to just enjoy the illusion.

After attending a few Ring meetings, Ellen found there was also a cartoonists club in San Diego and one of the magicians in Ring 76, Jim Whiting, was a member of both groups. She loved drawing so she joined the cartoonists society. It was during one of the cartoonist meetings that Ellen came up with an idea for a gag for a magic cartoon. She told Jim Whiting about her idea and he drew it. A few weeks later that cartoon was published in the pages of MagiCurrents.

Jim Whiting is a respected cartoonist having relocated to San Diego's North County in 1984, after living in New York and having his work published in Colliers, Look, Saturday Evening Post, American Legion Magazine, and the New Yorker. Before coming to Southern California, Jim lived in Watkins Glen, New York, and was a long-time member of the New York, Finger Lakes Ring 140 in Ithaca. He served as president of that Ring in the 1970s. He also drew "Vincent the Magician," a comic strip in the Linking Ring Magazine from 1962 to 63. That series was republished in MagiCurrents in 1986.

Jim works at the drawing table that belonged to longtime New York artist Sam Cobean, who was Jim's mentor and helped him get his first cartoon published in the New Yorker Magazine. When Sam died, his widow gave the drawing table to

Jim who has used it ever since.

When Jim Whiting is not working on one of Ellen Friedman's gags for a MagiCurrents cartoon, he is illustrating children's books and other commercial projects. The walls of his office and study are lined with the work of artists past and present and often times featuring magic themes and magicians.

The process of creating a cartoon for MagiCurrents begins with Ellen who comes up with an idea that she later turns into a gag. She will do a rough drawing or sketch of how she sees the gag. Then

spotlight suddenly shifted to Las Vegas and the attack by a white tiger on Roy Horn, magic superstar and advocate of saving endangerd species.

According to insiders in Las Vegas, Roy Horn, has had many minor scrapes with the big cats in his four decades of working with exotic animals. The worst was when Siegfried and Roy were working at the old MGM Grand Hotel now Bally's in 1975. Roy was asked to bring one of his large male lions to the "Hallelujah Hollywood" stage to pose with a live lamb in a special set made to look like a March calendar page. "In like a lion out like a lamb" was the theme.

As Roy was putting the lion's head through a hole in the calendar it caught sight of the lamb and lunged after the wooly creature, dragging Roy behind him. The woman who was holding the lamb grabbed the animal and ran for their lives, a quick thinking stage hand shoved them into a closet and slammed the door. Meanwhile, the rampaging lion was dragging Roy on the end of a leather leash through the audience area of the theater.

One of the trainers had the presence of mind to run to the kitchen and grab a tray of meat balls that had just come out of the oven and ran back to the stage and fed them to the lion. Roy was able to calm the savage beast. But he suffered several serious scrapes, bruses, and cuts in the ordeal of trying to control the powerful lion.

As Roy himself once said, "When you work with wild animals, you never know what might happen."

I'm happy to say that "Magical Moments" has helped another few local magic enthusiasts find their way to the club!




