During the final show at the Splash Theater at the Rivera Hotel in Las Vegas at the World Magic Seminar, January 14^{th.} David Sandy, International President of the International Brotherhood of Magicians, presented a first-time-ever I.B.M. Lifetime Achievement Award to the Super Stars of Magic, Siegfried & Roy.

Siegfried & Roy have entertained millions of people during their 40-year career. They have presented 5,750 shows in Las Vegas alone. Their show was closed at the Mirage Hotel & Casino on the famous Las Vegas strip following an accident during a performance October 3, 2003, when Roy suffered a stroke and was dragged off stage by a 700-pound white tiger. Roy Horn was not present for the presentation. He is recovering from the effects of multiple strokes and being caught in the jaws of the huge white tiger.

The magic-duo pioneered integrating wild animals into their spectacular magic act. They turned a featured 12-minute act into a full evening production featuring music, dance, illusion and the beauty of the graceful white tigers, white lions, and other animals, which included cheetahs, panthers, a snake, and an elephant.

For their performing efforts, David Sandy and the IBM presented the magic-team with a one-of-a-kind crystal art work designed by master craftsman and IBM member Victor Trabucco of Buffalo, New York.

The Miss-Adventures of a working Magician

(Editor's note) Michael E. Johnson is joining the pages of MagiCurrents with what I believe is a unique and funny monthly column. He will be talking about the misadventures of performing. While the first few columns will be devoted to things that have happened to Michael, he would like to hear from you about some of the misadventures you have encountered with your magic shows. I think you will you will probably be able to identify with some of the things he will be writing about.

Magic might be the art of surprise, but sometimes, no one is more surprised than the magician. Things happen during a live performance that can't be explained by Einstein or Tarbell. Accidents occur. Mistakes are made. Miracles even manifest themselves. Here is an example.

One evening at the Del Mar Hilton, I performed close-up magic for a company party. After warming up a table of four adults, I asked everyone to imagine a single playing card. This was my way of distracting the audience from attempting to examine a trick deck of cards.

Choosing one volunteer, I set the unopened pack of cards in her hand. I asked her to focus on one card, mentally, and I asked the others to think of their cards as well. "Wouldn't it be amazing if everyone was thinking of the same card?" I joked.

When the volunteer finally named her card, two people at the table gasped in shock. They, too, thought of the same card, randomly. The result was

too overwhelming for coincidence. It had to be magic!

Sensing the miracle, I took back the unopened deck of cards from the woman's hand. There was no need to perform the Invisible Deck at that point.

"Forgetting my pants"

When it comes to magic shows, I usually remember everything I need. There are times I forget a prop or two, like a thumb tip, a Sharpie or fresh piece of rope. But only once did I forget my pants.

It happened when I worked for a radio station based in San Diego. Two or three times a month, they hired me to perform around the county at listener appreciation events. One day, I arrived at my destination in National City ready to rock and roll. I had my magic suitcase, my tuxedo coat, and even a fresh-pressed shirt.

Unfortunately, I had forgotten my tuxedo pants and shoes. All I had were beat-up jeans and tennis shoes. With no time to spare, I dressed up half-and-half, and walked into the medical office ready to perform.

Nobody seemed to notice the contrast. The performance went great. Everyone just assumed I was "California Casual."

Micro Cups & Balls

In the December 2003 column I mentioned Micro Cups & Balls that I had placed into the Tiny Magic Bag. I have had great fun with these props, and I hope that you will, too. Recently I was looking around in one of those stores in which every item costs \$1. In the cooking section, I discovered individual Stainless Steel Sauce Dipping Tubs, in packages of four for \$1! I greedily grabbed a package and went home to experiment with them as miniature cups & balls. These cups are approximately 2" across the mouth and 1.5" interior depth, with a flat base of 1.5". They have no recess, but they are otherwise very usable, and I have dubbed them Micro Cups & Balls. Because they have no recess, some one-ahead prior set up is impossible, but this minor drawback is offset by the tight nesting and light weight of the cups. A set of the three cups and all of the props shown in the list below will easily fit into one's jacket or pants pockets.

The first thing that you will need to do is make or secure some basic balls for the effect. Since the cups have no recess, you will need to make sure that your balls will not roll away during parts of the routine. I present two options below for the basic balls.

Option #1: Hand-cut Sponge Balls
Buy a set of regular (not supersoft) 1.5" sponge balls
at your favorite dealer. Keep three of them as final
loads for the micro cups. Take the fourth one and
cut it into quarters with a sharp pair of scissors.
Then keep trimming off corners until the four pieces
are very roughly round, making no attempt
whatsoever to make them smooth. The resultant
multiple flat-ish sides will keep the balls from rolling
away. Your four finished balls should be
approximately .5" each, and should look as much
alike as possible.

Option #2 — Small Sponge Balls (round)

As I was writing this article, I discovered that Al Goshman Sponge Magic makes .5" sponge balls in polybags of 10 for approximately \$2.50 per bag. The balls look neat, and are certainly worth a try if you like your gear to look crisp and professional. The downside is that they will tend to roll off the cups with the slightest breeze.

For the record, I chose to make the rough-cut sponge balls, and the handling of them is a snap. However, I did purchase the round Goshman balls, and they do work fine with a bit of care, so you might have a different point-of-view. *Vive la difference!*

The routine as I have devised it requires sponge balls. If you omit some of the moves to come in parts 2 and 3, then you can use cork balls, cotton pom-pons, or other small balls of your choice.

The small size of this trick definitely makes it a "close-up and personal" effect for one to four spectators. However, it will have the same strong impact as one of the pocket chop cups that are so popular now, or perhaps even more impact due to the added possibilities of three cups.

Routine: Version 1.0 for Micro Cups & Balls
Props: Four basic balls, as above

Three 1.5" sponge balls for final loads, perhaps in differing colors

5' length of rope rolled into a tight ball, ends tucked in

Option #1: dollar bill with memorized serial number, rolled into ball

Option #2: shorten rope to 4' and wrap around balled dollar

Routine Phase One:

Lay out the three cups in a line in front of you. Cup 1 is on your left, and cup 3 is on your right as the performer. Place a basic ball in front of each cup, keeping the 4th one in the right hand 3/4 fingerpalm.

Lift each cup with the left hand and slide/rake a ball under each as you patter, moving from cup one to three in sequence. Using a Ramsay subtlety to call attention, hold up the right hand pointing upward and say, "Watch." Pick up cup 1 with your left hand, and transfer to the right hand, inserting the finger palmed ball. Keeping your eyes on the newly

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Magic Book Review

"The most beautiful experience we can have is the mysterious. It is the fundamental emotion, which stands at the cradle of true art and true science. Whoever does not know it and can no longer wonder, no longer marvel is as good as dead and his eyes are dimmed."

Thus begins the Overture to a well-orchestrated fictional concert of Carter the Great. Illuminated internally by collector copies of posters depicting masters of magic: Keller, Nelson Downs, and Chung Ling Soo, this novel is encased in the dust jacket, an embossed high color poster entitled "Carter Beats the Devil" which also happens to be the title of his seductive literature. (Hyperion Books, pp 496)

Glen David Gold, not himself a conjurer, casts a spell of words; in this, his first novel, Maestro Gold welcomes us to his stage with a reproduction of a poster inviting the public to the Curran Theater in San Francisco, where on August 2, 1923, Act III is only described as "Carter Beats the Devil." Because of its intense nature, the management asks that no patron reveal the nature of what occurs!



Aficionados of trickery, magicians in training, prestidigitating hobbyists will be misdirected by this text which is without diagrams of moves, gadgets, gimmicks, and devices. Many likely will not perceive its worth. For the layperson, this book is entertainment: fantastical, pseudohistorical, and voyeuristic. Audiences who see magicians perform want to peak under the curtain. The layperson will receive less than he/

she seeks. The magic devotee will be offered more. Neither will be short changed.

Gold does not reveal the secrets. He is an illusionist with words. The story of the evolution of a magician encountering an evil competitor is salted with themes of high murder (President Harding dies mysteriously), detection (Keystone Kops reminiscent of present day CIA blunderers). Carter is himself more like Watson, than Sherlock Holmes. The hybrid theme calls to mind "Nevermore," another novel, where real persons are staged to interact on the page with fictional identities, e.g., Sherlock Holmes and Houdini. In the movies we can think of Woody Allen's "Zelig." Mike Caveney, himself a pro's pro magician and intellect of magical history and the author of a real biography of Carter the Great, acknowledges the research of writer Gold.

"Beat the Devil" is an adventure in three acts similar to Carter's performance. The time is the Roaring 20s and before the Great Depression. The scandal in the background is the Teapot Dome fiasco. President Warren G. Harding's apparent guilt is eclipsed when shortly after participating in one of Carter's stunts, he dies. The Chief Executive had presumably confided in and trusted Carter. Carter, therefore, becomes a person of interest. The plot has the vector of a marble in a pinball machine. The casual reader, as contrasted with those of us who are obsessed with prestidigitation, will enjoy the ride and the connections. You will force a mental smile. The members of the magical fraternity who tread through the 500 pages will have the opportunity to extract valuable insights about the evolution of a master of magic. Reading this story, magicians can experience the satisfaction of living, through what was once the Golden Age of Vaudevillian Magic, and they can take silent pleasure at knowing how it is done.

Gold's scholarship enlightens, educates, and entertains. Oh yes, the quotation, which began this review, is alleged to be the words of Albert Einstein. Surprised?





The Loads of Fun Magic and Joke Shop in Palm Springs, owned by longtime San Diego magician and businessman Gary Vess, has been sold. Gary sold the shop last June; however, he continues to book magic shows for private parties and trade shows in the desert area. The shop is being operated under new management and the new owners have cut down on the magic inventory. Vess is the fellow who started the first magic shop in Seaport Village when that shopping attraction opened for business in the 1970s.

Magic Mike Stilwell was a big hit at an Escondido private party January 3rd. For six years Stilwell has been doing strolling magic at Nick and Kathy Monroe's "Delighting Party," an event that officially ends the holiday frenzy by turning off the 27-thousand-plus holiday lights that surround their home. Nearly 200 people attend the party each year and help the Monroe's turn off the lights. You can always find Mike in this crowd; all you have to do is listen for the gasps of disbelief from his audience watching him work. Nick Monroe says this was his last "Delighting Party," but he has plans for something new that will be held during the summer when it is warmer outdoors and of course Stilwell will be part of the new party event. What do the Monroes do for a living, you ask? They are professional party planners, of course.

The folks who run the International Clown Hall of Fame announced in late January that Earl Chaney is one of four



artists to be added to the roster of inductees into their hall of fame. Chaney is a 1972 graduate of Ringling Bros. Barnum & Bailey Clown College, who settled in Las Vegas some years ago and opened a magic, costume, clown shop, and school in an industrial park behind the Luxor Hotel & Casino.
