

They each presented an outstanding group of tricks, and members walked out of the meeting having learned something new. The room was set up with five large round tables and the instructors moved from table, to table giving each group their own session.

Terry Lunceford, a very busy pro, taught one of the

built into the bag a little different than other bags. In recent years this has become the bag of choice by many magicians. A company out of Las Vegas is once again making this egg bag with the right weight material, and it is again available to performers. When he was finished with his egg bag presentation, Terry taught his students a very clever card routine.

Kenny Shelton, who has emerged as a hard working

performer, taught his students a series of impromptu self-working card tricks. Kenny's work with the pasteboards is quite good and one of the moves he taught during his 15-minute session was a quick peek at a selected card that

is so natural it is almost impossible to catch him doing it. If you follow Kenny's brief examples you

will have some great new card tricks to add to your repertoire.

Joe Mystic is another hard workina professional magician in San Diego and this time of year his talents are in high demand, but he found time to put together a clever series of tricks with string and rope. He made up a very clever penetration effect with a short piece of string and two beads. It cost

him a dollar to make up the string, and he sold them for that price. It's one of those little bits of business that you carry around in your pocket and always have a good trick to show people. He also taught his audience a very visual silk off of rope. The instant beauty of the effect left his audience with their mouths open. Another great trick to add to your collection.

Bob Pozner who has worked close-up in bars,

I restaurants, clubs, and partys for nearly 40 years gave his students a real treat by teaching his routine of the color changing pocket knives. Bob has a great finish to his routine. He also took the time to teach a quick 4 ace routine, and he taught those who wanted to know some excellent card palming. Bob is one of those guys who will

always take the time to teach a fellow magician how to do a sleight or move whenever he is asked. He is a warehouse of knowledge about close-up magic, and we are lucky to have him as a member of our Ring.

Michael E. Johnson is another magician that is busy working shows in San

**Diego County** and outside of the state, as well. Michael is much in demand these days and we are always thankful when he has the time to take part in one of our programs. Michael opened his session with a coin roll across his fingers and he told his audience why

that move is so important. He says this is one of the fastest ways of letting your audience know you are a magician with dexterity. He gave some quick hints on how to quickly get the coin roll down pat. He also presented his routine on a trick that is sometimes called a kids' trick but with Michael's presentation, it is a great mystery and super entertainment-the "Multiplying Rabbits." Michael brought with him a huge plastic bag of sponge rabbits so that everyone could practice the routine and learn how to palm the bits of sponge. He also talked about how to routine this wonderful trick to get the most out of it. Someone once told me that the Multiplying Rabbits should sell for \$100 because it is such an effective trick when performed properly. Michael gave his students a great lecture on the handling and presentation of this trick.

Jeff Marcus rounded out our team of magicians with a very clever "Ring on String" routine. Jeff is another performer who has worked every venue you can think of in magic and is well versed in close-up performing. These days Jeff has expanded his stage work to hypnotism and mentalism, but he can also do a good job of entertaining a large audience with just a deck of cards.

What makes these teach-in sessions so great is that

everyone can get personal attention and instruction. This was perhaps the most diverse in effects taught and included a stellar group of instructors. The Ring members are all indebted to each of the instructors for the time and dedication they put into these special programs.

# Michael Ammar lecture brings out large crowd and offers unique magic experience

More than 60 Ring members and guests attended the Michael Ammar lecture on Monday, November 15<sup>th</sup>. This was one of the "free" magic lectures put on annually by Ring 76 for its members.

The evening began at 5:30 with a pre-lecture


workshop that was attended by 12 members. This workshop had a fee involved and each attendee was given personal instruction in a variety of effects

For the lecturer Michael opened with his production of a wine bottle, and then went into one of the cleanest coin in bottle effects this writer has ever seen. In his explanation portion of the lecture he talked about the "Topit" a secret pocket in your coat, and how to make it and how to use it properly. Michael produced the bottle from the Topit and also got rid of the coin that everyone thought was in the bottle with the Topit.

Michael Ammar has a truly winning personality as he explains his tricks and tells stories about his magic and his performing. He told the audience that he began in magic with a stage act and doves. But one day in Columbus, Ohio, at the Columbus Magi-Fest when his entire act went bad, he gave the doves and all the props away. He decided the world did not need another dove act and that his talents were in close-up magic. So he has made a name for himself in producing books, videos, and lecturing and teaching magic. He is of course in much demand as a performer, as well.

Another very visual effect he presented was the "Floating Dollar Bill," a trick that has been around for years but, after he performed it on the Johnny Carson Show on television many years ago, it became a classic. Michael spent a great deal of time explaining some of his moves in making this trick a true miracle. In his lecture notes he spends two illustrated pages talking about this one effect.

Michael talked about the importance of having a good business card and doing a trick with it when you give it to someone. He gave his listeners several different methods of doing a quick trick with your business card.

His Xeroxed Deck effect is a simple card routine but one of those stunners that will make you remembered. It's one of those effects than can be reset right under the spectators nose and ready for the next show. The effect features a piece of paper with the fronts of a deck of cards and right in the middle of the page is the back of a card. When the

page is turned over it features all card backs and the chosen card face up. All you need are some cards and a Xerox machine.

As he presented his lecture he introduced his wife,, Hannah, who has actually been around magic longer than Michael, she is the grand daughter of Willard the Wizard a grand old tent show magician and the daughter of Francis Willard, who lectured to Ring 76

in 2000.

The lecture closed with a borrowed torn dollar bill in peanut. The first half of the trick is U.F. Grants Million Dollar Bill Mystery; the second half of finding the torn bill in the peanut is Michael Ammar at his best. He features this trick in his video series Easy to Master Money Miracles.

### View from the Cheap Seats

Looking for the Ghost of Christmas Present, Part Two...

Last month we examined the surfeit of classic magic material now in print that would make wonderful Christmas presents for your magical friends, relatives, or spouse. However, most of the items discussed last month ran from \$35 to \$150. This month might be a great time to look at the budget material that is available for, say, under \$15. Yes, a quality magical gift for under \$15 is quite common just now.

L & L Publishing is closing out its VHS video magic collection as it shifts its output to the more versatile and easier to use DVD format. The result is a huge collection of magic instruction videos at half price! The highest price for any of these closeout tapes is \$15, and most of them are only \$10! Virtually the entire video catalog from this most prolific of video publishers is being closed out, so jump on these if you are looking for a bargain. Examples of available volumes include five from the great Johnny Thompson, five from Aldo Colombini, multiple volumes from Daryl (including the Card Revelations series and the Card Sleight Encyclopedia series), multiple coin volumes from Dr. Michael Rubinstein (including his three-volume Coin Sleight Encyclopedia and three-volume Knockout Coin Magic ), the whole Michael Ammar Easy-to-Master series for coins, cards, and invisible thread, and dozens of other volumes by performing pros covering stage, parlor, and close-up. The list is almost a "who's who" of magic: Lorayne, Sankey, MacBride, Burger, Wilson, Close, Jennings, Malone, Wonder, and many, many more. Check out the VHS video holdings at http://www.llpub.com/.

Dover Publications continues to reprint classic magic books at under \$15 each, as well as keeping their original magic publications in print. The few Dover books I mentioned last month are within this month's stated budget. Many of the books aimed at beginners can be sources of fine tricks to which an experienced magician can add strong presentations and a bit of sleight work to make miracles. Last month I mentioned without titles the large Karl Fulves Self-Working series, in which there are six volumes of the Card Tricks, plus similar volumes on Coin Magic, Rope Magic, Table Magic, Paper Magic, Handkerchief Magic, Mental Magic, and more. Also desirable is the Fulves Big Book of Magic Tricks, which contains some powerful gambling con demonstrations and some interesting mentalism slumbering in its pages. Martin Gardner's **Table Magic**, although long pre-dating the Fulves books, is in much the same spirit. The reprints of John Scarne's Card Tricks and Magic Tricks are welcome additions of highly effective magic for anyone's library, and are treasured by magicians who prefer to put their energies into presentation rather than execution.

Among Dover reprints which are essentials for the advancing magician are the Erdnase Expert at the Card Table, Annemann's classic mentalism volume Practical Mental (Effects) Magic, Bobo's original Modern Coin Magic, and Paul Curry's Magician's Magic. The prolific Jean Hugard's books are cornerstones of a magic library, and Dover has many of them: Royal Road to Card Magic, Card Manipulations, More Card Manipulations, Handkerchief Magic, and the highly useful (Modern) Magic Manual. Historical books containing tricks to update with fresh presentations include the Hatton & Plate Magic Tricks, Downs's"Art of Magic, and Sach's Sleight of Hand. More Fulves books distilling and updating the card work of two early twentieth century masters are Charles Jordan's Best Card Tricks and Ellis Stanyon's Best Card Tricks. A fun and valuable addition to one's library is the Dover original by Milbourne Christopher, Magic: A Picture History, formerly known as Panorama of Magic.

All of these Dover books range from \$6 to \$15, and they are available from Dover online, or at your nearest chain bookstore or favorite magic dealer. For a full list of Dover holdings in magic, go to <a href="http://store.doverpublications.com/">http://store.doverpublications.com/</a> and use the site's search engine to look for magic, legerdemain.

Magic Inc. in Chicago is also having a half-price VHS closeout sale, with most of the titles running from \$5 to \$15 each. Magic Inc. also features more than 400 publications in the under-\$15 range, in every sub-genre available: mentalism, kid magic, card magic, money magic, act building, sets and

costuming, close-up magic, table and illusion building, stage magic, livestock magic, manipulation, ballooning, and much, much more. Go to <a href="http://www.magicinc.net">http://www.magicinc.net</a> and click upon the link for Videos to get the half-price listings. For the books, click upon the link for Books and then choose the small list box for Price Ascending to see them from least expensive to most expensive.

Steven's Magic Emporium features Joe's Clearance Closet, a regularly updated area of books, tricks, and videos that are in overstock. A quick check showed that a good number of VHS videos are on sale for \$12.50 each. Go to <a href="http://www.stevensmagic.com/index.htm">http://www.stevensmagic.com/index.htm</a> and click upon the link to Clearance.

Finally, don't forget that you can often find under-\$15 books at used magic bookstores. H &R Books ('http://www.magicbookshop.com') shows 251 items in their On Sale link, many of them videos for \$10 to \$15 each, not to mention their usual 20% off list for all used books. Bradbury Books (http://bradburybooks.com') features a huge number of books under \$15 as well. Both H & R Books and Bradbury Books require some patience if you are browsing, as no sifting by price point is available. However, if you have specific items you are seeking, then the search engine at H & R and the alphabetized listings by categories at Bradbury should help you find your desired item quickly.

If you can't find a magical gift for your recipient in the myriad choices given in the November and December *View From the Cheap Seats* articles, then you haven't tried hard enough! There is something for everyone here, from \$2 to \$150. Match your recipients tastes and interests to the wide variety of material available, and make your favorite magician very happy this holiday season. Or, give something new to yourself!



### Ring library cards now available


Ring 76 librarian Bob Pozner will have the new library cards available to all members who have filled out and turned in their library form.

We begin with sad news that Marie Blood, the niece of Harry & Bess Houdini, has died; she was 87. As a young girl Marie lived with the Houdini,s and for many years she lectured and wrote about her adventures with her Aunt Bess and Uncle Harry, becoming one of the last living links to inside stories about the legendary magician and his wife. Marie Blood was a member of the IBM and as such, a broken wand service was performed at her funeral in early November at Paramus, a small community near her New Jersey home.

Dr. Joel Moskowitz is featured in the November issue of Linking Ring magazine with a story about the history of Mene Tekel, a name that dates back to biblical times and the trick deck of cards of the same name that we all as young magicians had or at least had read about. The article is titled: "Mene Tekel, a Rose by Any Other Name." It is on page 52 in case you missed it. Joel put a lot of research into that article. Moskowitz spent much of the month of November traveling in Tibet.

The November 15th issue of the National Enquirer carries a cover story that Roy Horn attempted suicide several times following his stroke and dramatic battle to return to a productive life following his tragic ordeal. The article goes on to say the famous Las Vegas performers have written a new tell-all book, and they are currently shopping around for a publisher. The Siegfried Fischbacher and Roy Horn memoir will tell the dark side of the magicians lives as well as the show biz glitz. No word on when the book will be published.

Bill Bennett longtime San Diego Radio-Television personality and ventriloquist, died November 4th; he was 80. Bennett lived in Del Mar and for several years in the late 1980s and early '90s was part of a group known as "Three from TV." Bennett opened the show with his vent act followed by Jack White and his magic; then Doug Oliver closed the show on the piano. The show was booked and produced by an agency and it played many dates in San Diego, Orange and Riverside counties under several sponsorships. Bennett spent the last ten years working in real estate.
