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April 11, magic swap meet, things to know

Monday, April 11^{th,} is one of the most talked about and anticipated meetings of the year for many members of Ring 76; it is our annual magic swap meet. This meeting is an opportunity for members to sell their unwanted magic and buy someone else's magic treasures. If you are a buyer, this is a time to dig through a lot of other people's magic videotapes, DVDs, books, tricks, seldom seen apparatus and props of all kinds.

If you have some magic and would like to sell it at the swap meet here are some things you should know. Tables are available for \$10 for a 6-foot-long table or you can share half a table with someone else for \$5. Sellers are the only people allowed into the hall until we officially open for business at 6:30 p.m. on April 11th. The room will be open to sellers from 4 p.m. to unload and set up for the swap meet. Buyers will not be allowed in until 6:30 p.m. There are no exceptions.

Ring 76 treasurer Richard Ustick is in charge of assigning tables to our sellers. Do not wait until the last minute to make your reservation for a table. Contact Richard early because there is always more demand for tables than there is space available. If you are a seller we urge you to get in early and set up for the opening buyers. We remind everyone that the swap meet does not include an auction; the magic auction will be held in June. This is just a swap meet and you will not be competing with an auction of magic props and books. You keep all of the proceeds from your sales; your only cost, as a seller is the ten or five dollar fee for a table or half table.

New magic stamp now available from England

Royal Mail (the British Post Office) began issuing five interactive stamps on March 15th with the theme of magic. The stamps celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Magic Circle, a society, not unlike the IBM, dedicated to promoting and advancing the art of magic. The Magic Circle was founded in 1905 by John Nevil Maskelyne, who is regarded as the father of modern British conjuring.

Each stamp includes words of instruction to explain its interactive, or magic, feature.

The first of the issue bears a design that depicts a spinning coin that is blank in the center. The words "Heads or Tails" are written on the edge of the coin. The blank center area of the coin can be rubbed off to reveal if it is heads or tails.

On a second version of the stamp, an optical illusion is featured by a magician's hand holding a rabbit in the upper portion; in the lower half of the stamp is a

Not knowing what to say, Mike Stilwell just stood by as Michael Johnson read a portion of a group of letters of congratulations from elected officials that

California State Senator Dennis Hollingsworth praised Stilwell, saying, "You demonstrated care and concern for everyone you meet. That is probably the greatest magic any single person can perform." Adding to the festivities was a letter of congratulations from Tony Wilson, President of the International Brotherhood of Magicians.

Then, veteran performer and close-up magic legend J.C. Wagner stepped forward and with Michael E. Johnson they presented Mike Stilwell with a giant trophy honoring him with the Fellowship of Honorable Magicians award for 2005. There were speeches by J.C. Wagner and Bernie Kay. Then a surprised Mike Stilwell thanked everyone for being such good friends and for helping him with his magic.

Bob Ingalls then took over the meeting that was to be devoted to silk magic. But before we began with

A look inside the Columbus MagiFest 2005

In February, I attended the Columbus Magi-Fest in Ohio. I was there one time before but only for one day. This time I was able to attend the entire threeday event. It is very well planned, thanks to Jep Hostetler and his crew. As a result there were no apparent problems for the nearly one-thousand guests. It also had a different feel from the west coast

conventions that most of us usually attend. First of all, it is in the winter and in Ohio, so there is snow and it gets very cold. One of the unique things is that the dealer's room is in a big dome

tent! It is a permanent facility and is climate controlled, plus you can access it through a hallway from the [Marriott] hotel so the cold was not a problem but a surprise if you are not expecting it.

They have a good variety of dealers (about 30) and, of course, many were different from the dealers we usually see out this way.

Abbotts and Twin City Magic were two examples but there were also some familiar faces. As usual,

there was a large amount of close-up and parlor props but, as is the case in a mid-sized convention, there was not much in the way of grand illusions.

There was a bunch of round tables in the hotel lobby for people to sit around and do impromptu stuff for each other. One very cool thing that happened to me was when someone asked me to do something, I asked to borrow a deck. When I opened it up, I realized it was a marked deck. Of course no one at

the table knew it and, after a while, I realized the guy who lent me the deck didn't realize it either. I was doing miracles. Some magicians wait their whole life for that kind of a situation. It was a beautiful thing.

I missed the contest (it too early in the morning and I was too tired to get out of bed). But there were lots of other great things at the convention, too many to report them all, so I'll generalize with a few of my favorite highlights. One interesting thing was that there were five past Intentional I.B.M. presidents attending including June Horowitz.

All of the close-up shows were great. Close-up demonstrations were presented with the performers moving from room to room. One highlight was a young guy named Rick Merrill--absolutely fantastic! His sleights were flawless and he had me in tears with his comedy. I missed a lecture to watch him again. Although there were only five lectures, they were all top-notch.

All of the shows except one, took place in the hotel's banquet rooms but the portable stage was really set

up well. The second night was called the "Headliner Show" and took place at a Veteran's War Memorial auditorium in downtown Columbus. It's a beautiful facility,

They had buses to take the attendees to and from the hotel for that one evening event. It did seem strange to me that the "Big Downtown Show" was not on the last night as kind of a finale, but I'm sure they had their reasons. Steve Bargatze was the M.C. at that show and did a fine job as usual. He did have a tough time with a volunteer that was acting like a total jerk, but Steve handled it professionally. I hate to admit this but it was kind of

neat to see someone else have to deal with an uncooperative layman and how he handled it.

The last night closing act was Tony Chapek, whose act is very unique. Basically, he had a big television on stage with a video taped program that is Tony as an alter ego which he interfaces with. It's hard to describe but very entertaining. If you have the chance to see Tony's act, don't miss it. You will enjoy it.



Reading a book and viewing a video can create a good magic routine

One of the many things I appreciate about Ring 76 is the library, thanks to the efforts of Bob Pozner and others. The library offers a convenient way to explore different avenues of magic and to get to know the magic of some performer you've heard of but never seen.

One of those magicians is Norway's Jared Leirpoll. I'd heard that his video "Pocket Power" has some creative ideas. And a few weeks ago when reading Eric Paul's book, "The Successful Family Entertainer," I came across a "can of Coke from shoe" idea which Eric learned from "Pocket Power." That really got my interest because I could immediately imagine how funny and entertaining that would be, especially to kids, and possibly during my own kid show. So I didn't have to think much about which video to check out of our library when I saw that one.


This video does have a lot of useful material on it. Jared divides his time on the video between proper techniques and finished routines. He does a very good job in showing the huge difference between performing sleight of hand improperly and then properly. The use of your pockets is actually a very small part of the tape, so I think the video title is a misnomer. Something more like "Improving Your Effectiveness as a Sleight of Hand Magician" would be more apt but not as catchy.

He references Juan Tamariz in his explanation of crossing the gaze, a deceptive method of switching two objects. Jared performs it

very smoothly and shows the proper offhanded way to execute it. He also demonstrates how attention to details makes the difference between accomplishing the dirty work unnoticed versus removing the wonder of the performance. A small point such as the position of your thumb when bringing a "dirty" hand out of your pocket can help ensure your hand won't catch on your pants and draw attention to the wrong place. I was surprised to see that Jared uses the can from shoe as nothing more than a throwaway bit to keep the audience's attention while a spectator is signing a playing card. His intent is to avoid dead time; performing magic, after all, is about keeping the audience entertained. I agree with him that paying attention to details like that makes the difference between a good and an excellent performance.

One of the highlights of this video for me is his very clean dollar bill switch using no thumb tip. This will fool the wise guys. Watching him perform this sleight from the magician's vantage point is very entertaining. So, you can do this effect and entertain both your audience and yourself! He performs and explains his four cards to pockets routine. Since I'm not a card man, this to me was only entertaining to watch; I have no desire to master it. But this routine also shows how effective a well-thought-out performance can be.

Another winner is a torn-and-restored newspaper effect. This was very fun to watch since it's a staple in Jared's act and he performs it on the video in Norwegian. It sure sounds like English being played backwards. Think of this paper tear as Gene Anderson's with two differences: you first pour a glass of water into the paper (and only the paper is used, no pouches) and then pour the water back into

supports
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the glass. Then you tear and restore the paper – and hand it out! This is a perfect response to an audience member who says, "Yeah, but can I have it?" The answer is yes he can. This effect is a winner.

In fact, the entire video is. Naturalness of your sleights and thinking through every aspect of your performance are key points to Jared Leirpoll. I can imagine Dai Vernon watching the video and applauding. You can't go wrong with this one. The video is also available as a DVD, and there is a companion book of the same name.



View from the Cheap Seats By Jon A. Hand

Hello to all my good friends at Ring 76! I apologize for not being part of your newsletter last month. My mother passed away in February, and I just couldn't "wrap my head" around writing for magic to get the March deadline. If you remember my January column, you know that those comments on "taking stock of what you have now, while you still have it," apply more than ever to me. I hope they had some impact upon you, as well.

For April I am going to suggest that you go back to basics. Re-read your first beginner books, or read some classic beginner books. I'll tell you why in just a moment, but here are some suggestions: Harry Lorayne's The Magic Book, Henry Hay's Learn Magic, Jon Tremaine's Amazing Book of Magic and Card Tricks, Henry Gross's Pure Magic, Nicholas Einhorn's Practical Encyclopedia of Magic, Henry Baron's Magic for Beginners and Close-up Magic for Beginners, John Scarne's On Magic and On Card Tricks, Blackstone's Secrets of Magic or 400 Tricks You Can Do, any of Karl Fulves's Self-Working series from Dover, or even Joseph Leeming's Fun With Magic and More Fun With Magic.

Now, start thinking about what you can do to combine two or more tricks from these beginner tomes into a larger routine. The combination of two or more ideas, with a suitable presentation to tie them all together, has a *gestalt* principle in which the sum of the ideas has more spectator impact than the individual parts. I'll toss a couple of ideas into the ring for you.

1. The Haunted Key Card Location, version 1
— This is a combination of the \$100 Kick Location card trick and the Haunted Key. Starting with the Kick Location, have a card selected (Secrets of Alkazar, aka Book of Magic for Young Magicians, one of my favorite books to teach beginners the importance of presentation, includes a chart of 15 different ways to have a card selected, so check it out). If you are a plotted patter story performer, force one of the Queens as a woman locked into a tower a la classic fairy tales (Shrek?), or concoct a kidnapping story of your own. Control the card to the

top. Get some salt from a pocket under your index fingernail as you patter. Tap on the deck for emphasis, leaving some salt from your fingernail on the top card. Cut the deck and complete the cut, leaving the salted card somewhere in the middle of the deck. In the original trick, you lay the deck on the floor, and kick it to cut the cards, the salt enabling the deck to split at the chosen card. However, in this combination routine, you now table the deck.

The Haunted Key comes into play here. Reach into the pocket for an old skeleton key from the early part of the 20th century (if you do not have one, go to a local flea market and buy one for almost nothing). Lay the key across your palm perpendicularly, or across your middle two fingers if you wish, with the circular key head hanging off the hand, key teeth pointing toward your face. With a slight adjustment of the hand, or a tiny drop of the two fingers in the alternate approach, the key will slowly turn over in your hand without any other help from you. It looks very spooky once you get it down correctly. With an appropriate patter story, the spooky key turn lends a nice air to the card trick. After the key finishes its slow turn, thus "unlocking the woman from her prison," hold the key by its head and slap the key teeth against the long side of the cards on the table top. The salt will cause the deck to cut at the selected card. Lift away the top section of the deck (use the tip of the key to toss it aside if you can), and have the spectator turn over the top card of the bottom portion. Just remember, since the mechanics are a snap, work out a presentation that makes the combination idea shine.

2. Haunted Key Card Location, version 2 — This is a combination of Card Through Hank Penetration and Haunted Key. Have the card chosen (or forced), and have it signed if you plan to leave it with the spectator as a souvenir. Control it to the top. Palm off the top card, and wrap the rest of the deck into a handkerchief or bandanna a la Card Through Hank Penetration (there is a palmless version in the Mark Wilson Complete Course in Magic and a palming version in Jon Tremaine's Amazing Book of Card Tricks, to name a couple of references, but you know this classic trick). Hold up the hanky with the deck in it and the chosen card ready to penetrate. With your free hand, remove the Haunted Key from the pocket and perform it. After the key turns, or while the key turns if you can manage it, the card penetrates through the handkerchief, freeing the queen from her prison. Toss the card to its signed owner, and toss the hanky with the deck within to the audience if you wish to have them check for holes. Again, a good patter story will make this combination trick special.

Why not produce the Haunted Key to start the routine? Reach into the pockets looking for the deck of

cards. The right hand goes in first, doesn't find the deck, and the left hand enters its pocket. The right hand emerges while your mind and eyes are on the left pocket, with the key put into a thumb palm by its head (cigarette palm position). The left hand emerges with the deck in dealing position, and the right hand goes into rest position as you begin the patter with the deck. Reach into the air with the right hand to produce the key, pulling it from the thumb palm with the middle two fingers and pushing it up and forward with the freed thumb. Pluck it from the air in a definite spot, turning the hand palm forward as you pluck. Patter about the old key, and table it or allow a spectator to hold it as you begin the card trick.

Have I whetted your appetite? Beginner books are full of good tricks you already know and have long since forgotten. Go back to them with an eye for combination, and you can quickly find new effects to add to your routines. Have fun constructing a routine that is unique to you by combining familiar materials into something fresh.

top hat. As you bring the stamp closer to your nose the rabbit goes in and out of the hat.

the Midway Post Office Philatelic store, you might want to contact friends in Britain or the Royal Mail Service directly and purchase a set of the stamps. Royal Mail is offering a first-day cover, a set of five postcards

There will be a lot of different and unusual magic and related items for sale at this event so plan to attend and look it all over. Please remember if you are going to bring things to sell, call Richard Ustick in advance and reserve a table. As usual at all of our meetings there will be hot popcorn and soft drinks available for everyone.

Trick Shop Broadcast on computer radio

Sam Blankenship, operator of the "Trick Shop" in the Old Town section of Temecula, has a live magic broadcast each Saturday night. You can listen in on your computer if you are connected to the Internet. Lee Asher, a two-time winner of the IBM close-up competition, is the co-host of the program with Sam Blankenship. They take questions from magicians and discuss new products for the performer.

You can tune in on your computer by going to magicbroadcast.com on Saturday evenings, and it is interactive so you can also ask questions of the guests. It is another exciting break through in technology for magic.

A report on the Ring 76 Library by outgoing Ring Librarian Bob Pozner

I am happy to say the Ring Library is complete and members are enjoying this service at this writing.

Using the library is simple:

- A Ring member fills out and signs a 'Ring 76 Library Card Agreement. This agreement, along with a current Ring membership card, is presented to the Ring Librarian.
- Upon approval, a library card number is written on the back of the Ring membership card.
- 3. The member selects library material of interest, a maximum of two (2) items in any combination books, tapes or DVD discs, from the library and removes the title cards from the selections. These title cards along with the current membership card are presented to the Ring Librarian. The membership card is retained by the Librarian until the borrowed items are returned.
- 4. Selections may be kept for thirty days or one meeting but a grace period of another thirty days or two meetings is allowed. After sixty days or three meetings a fine of five (5) dollars per borrowed item will be levied. This fine doubles every thirty days or single meeting up to forty (40) dollars per item and is due and payable to the Ring Treasurer immediately.
- In the event of lost or damaged library material, an assessment will be determined by the Ring Librarian and will not exceed forty (40) dollars which is payable to the Ring Treasurer.

It is expected that members will take exceptional care of all borrowed library material. Please re-wind VHS tapes before returning them.

About the library itself:

Our library consists of 272 items; 175 books, 85 VHS tapes, 12 DVD discs and it is growing. This material covers every aspect of magic and on every level from beginner to the professional magician.

The entire library, as well as members and loans are now in a computer database.

Donations to the Ring Library are graciously accepted. Please donate any book, tape or DVD that is in good condition and pertains to the magical arts.

The bulk of the library is printed books. Books are wonderful and are the mainstay of knowledge in our society. The use of magic books requires imagination. The reader must translate the writer's intention into a physical act.

Next we have the VHS tapes. The tapes show the exact intention of the author and are much easier to grasp.

The best method of learning magic is the DVD disc. Not only is it faster because any portion of the disc can be located instantaneously, it is a better learning tool because of the A-B Repeat function. Using the A-B Repeat, any part of the disc can be viewed repeatedly.

This means if a particular sleight or technique is not understood, it can be repeated until it is learned. The slow motion capability of the DVD is unsurpassed. Finally, discs are much more robust than tapes. If properly treated, they do not lose fidelity and last indefinitely.

One of the purposes of our Ring is to perpetuate the art of magic. What better way than to maintain a viable library so that our members can improve their understanding of our art and become better performers. Our library is most probably one of the better Ring libraries in existence. Be proud of it.

By the time you read this I will no longer be the Ring Librarian. Mr. Salomon Barajas will have replaced me and will assume the duties of Ring Librarian for our April meeting. I would like to thank our President, Diane Lane, and the Board of Directors – particularly Mr. Jack White for their assistance in making the library a reality.

Bottom Change: Diagonal Pivot Steal:

Ring Off Rope; Vanishing Handkerchief; Color Changing Knives; Marvel as he does the two paddle move with two knives, in the same hand, at the same time! Very cool.

Linking Rings: Learn how to switch the key ring in and out for examination.
