"Stew" McKinley Dead at 75

The always jovial and entertaining, Stewart "Stew" McKinley 75, died Tuesday evening, November 22nd at the Lake Ellsinore hospital of complications brought on by lung cancer. McKinley was diagnosed with lung cancer three and a half years ago. At that time doctors gave him six months to live, however the cancer went into remission and he out lived the doctor's prediction by three years. McKinley never smoked; however, over the years he was exposed to second hand smoke from members of his family and his co-workers.

Though he had slowed down in his activities in recent years, McKinley continued to attend magic meetings and do shows. He had many shows booked for the month of December in the Riverside

County area where he lived. On Tuesday the 22nd of November he experienced a shortness of breath during the afternoon hours and was taken to the hospital where he died that evening.

McKinley was a member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians and called Ring 292 in San Marcos his home Ring; he was also a member of the Society of American Magicians, a member of Toastmasters International and held membership in

Our November meeting brought out 68 members and their guests, and Tom Jones presented his magic lecture titled "Kiddies to Korporate" and featured both close-up and platform magic. Tom's wife Rachel Wild was not able to make the Southern California portion of the tour because of a family crisis at home.

We had many guests at this meeting, including one of the comedy stars of Circus Tihany Spectacular, which was appearing across the border in Tijuana. Eduardo Akopian, the famous clown, had the night

Ring 76 President Bob Ingalls called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. sharp and thanked everyone for taking part in the October Blood Bank Magic Day event. He welcomed the many guests who were attending our meeting. There was a brief announcement about the close-up contest set for February, and some important changes in the rules for that contest. You will find a story about those changes in this newletter. Alfonso Vasquez had an

announcement about an event at the Marine Recruit Depot and asked for volunteer performers for November 22nd. Richard Ustick had members who plan to attend the December Holiday Party draw slips of paper telling them what to bring to the potluck dinner. The Ring 76 board of directors tries to never schedule a lecture on a meeting night because we want our members to be able to perform at as many meetings as possible each year. But this month was an exception to the rule; our regular meeting night was the only evening that Tom Jones and Rachel Wild could appear in San Diego, so we booked their lecture for this evening. Terry Lunceford our 1st Vice President, was performing at the Magic Castle in Hollywood, so Bob Ingalls introduced Tom Jones, who quickly got things off to a colorful start with a very different style "Blendo" that used only one single 36 inch silk. After he taught our members how to fold the silk, he told them how to use the effect for a kids show or how they could use it to sell a product in a corporate performance. Tom presented a lot of good useful information.

During a session with playing cards, Tom gave the audience a quick look at the "force" that was often used by Harry Blackstone Sr., when he wanted a member of the audience to pick a specific card. The force is very easy and very clever, Don Soul has been working on it, and if you ask him, I am sure he will show it to you if you could not attend or have forgotten that part of the lecture.

There were many very different routines presented, and the audience responded by purchasing a vast amount of material from the dealer's table. The Tom Jones lecture was a big success. I wonder what it would have been if Rachel Wild would have been on hand?

After the lecture, many members worked the bar with new routines they wanted to try out and Mr. Alex brought along the best-trained little dog you have ever seen. The dog is part of his act and can seemingly walk on its hind legs like a man for long periods of time. It was an exciting evening of magic.

the Magic Castle. He did not become interested in magic until he was in his early 60s. He wanted to do a few simple magic tricks in conjunction with a speech he was going to present for a Toastmasters meeting. He went to North County magician Jack Evans and asked for help in selecting effects for his talk. The two men became good friends, and Jack Evans helped him polish his magic skills.

After being introduced to magic, McKinley was bitten

by the bug and became an eager hobbyist and then a semi-professional doing six to eight paid performances a month the last seven years of his life. Attending the IBM Convention of 1993, in Quebec City, Canada, he registered to be a contestant in the stage competition. A member of the IBM told McKinley he was too old to take part in such competitions, that the majority of

the contestants were in their teens or early 20s. McKinley went ahead with his plans to compete and walked away with a first place medal for his efforts. In his acceptance speech he told the audience of mostly middle-aged magicians: "This proves you are never to old to learn new tricks and perform magic, I; am proof positive of that claim."

Ring 76 members best remember Stew McKinley as a performer in two of our recent exchange programs

with Ring 292. He always carried his act in a big brown paper shopping bag. He would reach into the bag and pull out props, silk scarves, and an occasional rubber dove. He did his entire act with a straight face, an outrageous costume, and tricks that often times had an

amusing, sucker ending.

In 1996, Stew was one of the featured acts in a big fund raising event at the Avo Theater in Vista; also on the bill was the late Frank Herman and Jack White. Herman produced the show, as well as doing his own comedy act. He was was especially complimentry after the show, Jack White remembers, about the work of Stew McKinley; it was high praise from a real pro, said White.

In the mid-1990s McKinley formed a club for magic enthusiasts in the Lake Ellsinore area; the membership grew each year. Under his leadership the group continued to thrive until 2001, when he was diagnosed with cancer. When Stew was no longer able to take charge of the club activities, it quickly disbanded. McKinley did continue to take part in Ring 292 meetings and activities during this period, having attended a meeting as recently as November 3rd. A special "Broken Wand" ceremony will be held in his memory in January at the regular Ring 292 meeting.

He leaves a wife, Carol, and a daughter both living in the Lake Elsinore area.

Stew McKinley's longtime friend Jack Evans summed things up best when he said: "Stew will be greatly missed, but we will never forget him."

Kenny also did strolling magic and caught the eye of a very excited 11-year-old boy who happened to be the son of former Charger kicker Rolf Benirschke, for whom the Charger Blood Drive was founded. The young Benirschke told Kenny he was a magician and wanted to know more about Kenny's card work. Of course that was Kenny's cue to show the excited young man some fancy moves.

Diane Lane also did her stage act and was a great success. There was a huge round of applause

when Cassi her big white macaw made her

appearance. Diane did several turns on the stage. At each of her performances Diane talked about the importance of donating blood and told the audience

Ring 76 members visit the Circus Tihany Spectacular Show in Tijuana

Since early September, the Tihany Circus Spectacular has been playing to full houses under their bright yellow and blue tents that were set up in the parking lot of the Callente Race Track in downtown Tijuana. This is the first time this super show has been in Tijuana in several years. By the time you read this article the show will have packed up and moved to Ensenada where it will be appearing during the coming holidays.

On a Tuesday afternoon in mid-November, Saloman Barajas and Jose Sanchez drove across the border to see the show. As they were getting out of their car, another Ring 76 member, Armando Torres, who knew his way around the circus grounds, greeted them. Armando escorted his fellow Magi to the backyard of the show and introduced Sal and Jose to the star clown of the show, Eduardo Akopian. Eduardo was no stranger to these men, as he had visited our Ring meeting earlier in the month and Sal and Jose had met him there.

The Tihany show is a huge operation that travels on 47 show owned semi-trucks. This operation is truly a traveling city unto itself. It takes a crew of 110 people to keep the show moving and operating smoothly. The Tihany (pronounced "Tee-on-ee") show almost never crosses the border and appears in the United States, and for that reason the Tijuana dates are important because this is the one location that allows Southern California circus fans and

people who love the Tihany programs to have a chance to see this famous traveling extravaganza.

Eduardo Akopian invited the three San Diego magicians to his home and dressing room on wheels, all the while regaling us with exciting stories of being a famous clown with the Tihany Company of performers. While his life has been one big adventure we found it is also very regimented and his work as a clown very precise.

Eduardo was born and raised in Erevan, Armania. Then at the age of 15, he fell in love with the art of comedy and ran away with a traveling show. When he decided that he wanted to make a career out of this kind of work, he knew he had to go to school. So he studied his art at the world famous Moscow Circus College; after graduation, he won many major awards for his work. Now at 40 he looks back over the plaques, statuettes, and other awards in his mobile home. He has received the coveted award from the late Prince Rainer of Monaco and the famous circus competition in Monaco. Other awards for Eduardo's clowning around come from France and Germany where they take their circus and the art of comedy very seriously.

We also found that in addition to being a wonderful host, Eduardo is a superb performer. We took our seats in the elegant tent that is more like a theater. The show is presented on a stage instead of the traditional circus ring. The Tihany show was the first to incorporate the famous dancing



waters program into their show many years ago and still use this effect of light, water, and music to great advantage. The lights dimmed and a giant hologram of Tihany's head spoke to the audience. Tihany is now 90 years old and no longer performs in the show except for this opening sequence that is on tape, but he still oversees every element of the performance.

Suddenly the stage came alive with an explosion of dancing girls and acrobats; it was in the style of a large Las Vegas review. This show offered the most

sensational jugglers I have ever seen. There is a section of the program dedicated to magic with beautiful illusions that take a large cast of people to present. There are highflying daredevils, an amazing display of human strength and endurance. Sandwiched in



between all of the specialty acts the audience is entertained by the antics of Eduardo, who is a very good juggler, who makes a toy dog do tricks, and presents one of the cleanest and best "Misers Dream" coin acts I have ever seen. Eduardo also assists the magician with the vanishing duck trick. He is a talented and very funny man, and now I know how he received all of those awards that are

on display his mobile home.

The Circus Tihany Spectacular is a blend of traditional circus of the past and a peek into the future with exciting modern settings and family entertainment. It is a show that can easily rival any of the Cirque de Solie units that are currently touring the world. Of course, having the



opportunity to meet one of the stars of the show also makes it an even more exciting show to watch.

Some new rules for our close-up contest

Last February at our close-up competition 16 people entered the competition, each of them receiving 10-minutes to do their act. Some took longer and some took less but, all in all, the competition lasted for nearly three hours. The most regrettable part of the evening was that some of the last contestants had lost an audience and the potential of votes.

Our 2006 close-up contest will have some new rules to make it fair for everyone. Anyone wanting to take part in the contest will have to audition in advance of the competition itself. From those taking part in the audition, the field will be narrowed down to six contestants by a panel of judges whose names will be announced in the January newsletter. The auditions will take place at 7:30 on the evening of January 23rd, at Jack's Magic Place, 4275 University Avenue.

No one will be allowed to compete who has not taken part in the January auditions.

The Ring 76 close-up competition has taken on new importance in recent years and is a special part of our annual programs. We are, therefore, attempting to bring an even more prestigious look and feel to this event. We encourage all members to audition for the right to compete in this contest.

In addition to a good routine for a performer's act, we are also looking for personality and the over all look of the performer. The judges expect more than a T-shirt and blue jeans; that is not how most close-up workers present themselves in a restaurant or other performing atmosphere.

Because we are giving out cash awards and the close-up award is one of prestige, the Ring 76 board of directors believes they are just in increasing the awareness levels of this contest and is making those feelings known for the 2006 competition.

We hope to see a lot of candidates for this contest on January 23rd. You will have a 10 minute window to present your act for our judges.



Holiday scam for magic shows being worked on the Internet

The International Brotherhood of Magicians headquarters in St. Louis sent out the following warning about a new "scam" that is currently being used. I actually received the e-mail below and was about to forward it to a friend of mine in the Sacramento area as a possible after holiday gig. But before I sent him the e-mail, I received a warning from the IBM. Read this carefully.

GREETING,

I'M LARRY; MY WEDDING WILL BE COMING UP NEXT YEAR ON THE .29TH OF JANUARY 2006, AT THE ADDRESS BELOW. I WILL LIKE YOU TO BE THE MAGICIANS FOR MY WEDDIING RECEPTIONS,I LOOK FORWARD TO A VERY BIG,SOCIAL AND COLOURFULL WEDDING, SO I WANT THE BEST OF PROFESIONLA JOB. YOU WILL BE WORKING FOR 4 HRS

RECEPTIONS ONLY, LET ME
KNOW IF YOU WILL BE AVAILABLE
ON THE DAYS, ALSO WILL LIKE
YOU TO SEND YOUR TOTAL
COST PLUS YOUR AIR TICKET
FEES, MY PLANNER WILL BOOK
THE HOTEL FOR YOUR COMING
IF NEEDED. MY ASSOCIATE IN

The first tip-off that it was a con was the obvious hotmail address it came from. I did a little detective work and called the church to see if a wedding was booked under that name on the given date. They said "No". The church also said that they had received calls from DJ's, photographers, etc. I wondered how they could scam me if they were sending me a deposit check. Well here's the rub:

Say I quoted them \$1000. They would in turn send me a counterfeit cashier's check for \$1500. My bank, as most, would deposit it into my account, and most checks clear in 5 days at the latest. I would then be contacted again by Larry Mith who says mistakenly I was sent someone else's check- so I should send him a refund for \$500. I might even wait an extra week to make sure his check was good before sending him back \$500. Here's the deviously ingenious part: THE COUNTERFEIT NIGERIAN CASHIER'S CHECK **ACTUALLY TAKES 4 TO 5 WEEKS** TO DETERMINE THAT IT IS WORTHLESS. So the bad guys get your money and you're a little bit wiser. I wonder just how many people have fallen for this scam?

I actually wrote this Mith character back to firm up some details and to ask more questions to see just how far he would push this ruse. He surprisingly wrote me back,this time from a Yahoo email address. I guess hotmail has banned him. Apparently this con is happening with EBAY auctions as well. If someone overpays you on EBAY with a funny-looking cashier's check and then wants a refund, you are most likely their next target.




