

### Ring 76 Swap Meet Monday, April 10th

Monday evening, April 10th, one of the most talked about and anticipated meetings of the year for many members of Ring 76 will take place; it is our annual magic swap meet. This meeting is an opportunity for members to sell their unwanted magic and buy someone else's magic treasures. If you are a buyer, this is a time to dig through a lot of other people's magic videotapes, DVDs, books, tricks, seldom seen apparatus, and props of all kinds.

If you have some magic and would like to sell it at the swap meet, here are some things you should know. Tables are available for \$10 for a 6-foot-long table or you can share half a table with someone else for \$5. Sellers are the only people allowed into the hall until we officially open for business at 7 p.m. The room will be open to sellers from 3:30 p.m. to unload and set up for the swap meet.

Ring 76 Treasurer Richard Ustick is in charge of assigning tables to our sellers. Do not wait until the last minute to make your reservation for a table. Contact Richard early because there is always more demand for tables than there is space available. If you are a seller, we urge you to get in early and set up for the opening buyers. Richard Ustick can be reached by phone at (619) 589-1913 or by e-mail at rustick@flash.net.

We remind everyone that the swap meet does not include an auction; the magic auction will be held in June. This is just a swap meet, and you will not be competing with an auction of magic props and books. You keep all of the proceeds from your sales; your only cost, as a seller, is the ten or five dollar fee for a table.

If you have a friend who is interested in magic and is not a member, this is the perfect evening to bring

## J.C. Wagner gives his magic lecture at the March Ring meeting

There was a very large turnout for our March meeting with some faces we have not seen at a Ring 76 meeting in a longtime. Many turned out for our special guest of the evening, former Ring 76 president and active member J.C. Wagner. Wagner gave a lecture and in his opening remarks told the members as a teenager he joined Ring 76, has attended many of their events but this was his first opportunity to give a lecture to his home Ring, and he was excited to be the featured entertainer for the evening.

President Bob Ingalls, who asked for volunteers to form a committee for our annual Installation and Awards Banquet to be held in July, called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.. Bob then asked for any announcements and there were several from the general membership.

President Ingalls then read the names of all the new members who have joined Ring 76 in the past year. They were invited to the stage where they all took an I.B.M. oath to preserve the art of magic. 



## A Slydini Classic for Standup Use — Part One

The late Tony Slydini had a reputation for mind-boggling magic with simple objects. Paper balls, cigarettes, sponge balls, rope, cards, and coins all fell under his disarmingly simple-appearing spell. His use of misdirection was legendary, and his effects appeared to be impossible miracles of legerdemain.

Few find Slydini a worthy study today, which is sad. There is much to be learned from masters like Slydini, but his magic was so ideally suited to his performance character that modern magicians often find the magic awkward. Also, Slydini's magic depended heavily upon a seated performing stance, which is not as available to the average magician as it once was. Seated close-up has been largely replaced by walk-around, table-hopping, and platform magic. The bulk of Slydini's material could not be performed under such circumstances, but his misdirection concepts are essential studies for the sleight-of-hand performer.

Slydini had an effect called Paper Balls in the Hat, in which four balled napkins vanished singly from his hands and were found all together at the end of the routine inside an upturned hat. Sometimes Slydini would use a square cardboard box with no top or bottom, but the effect would be the same. The original routine requires much lapping and some of Slydini's peculiar (and very effective) steals from the lap. Enjoying classic sleight-of-hand as I do, I often challenge myself to find ways to adapt seated magic to a wider platform audience. I do not call any of my ideas improvements, as Slydini was the master, and I am merely a lifelong hobbyist. I do feel that my ideas can adapt Slydini's classic seated plots for larger audiences who would otherwise never experience them, and so I humbly offer them for your examination and possible use or adaptation.

My primary motivator was to seek ways to make the routine more visible. This meant more color, more size, and more elevation. Of course, each deviation from the original routine potentially weakens the final effect, but I feel that the choices made to increase the visibility more than offset any weaknesses induced by alteration of the effect. Remember, the audience will not know the Slydini original, and so this routine will be taken on its own merits. The routine below encompasses these aspects in the choices made.

First, I dropped the number of balls transported from four to three. Three is a magical number in religion, in music, in decor, in sports, and many other fields as well. View it this way: once is an anomaly, twice is a coincidence, but three is a deliberate event. Four is then boring, predictable, and anti-climactic (wow, I can hear the howling of the Slydini devotees way over here!). Secondly, I elevated the balls with a clear receptacle, increasing their visibility from the stage. Thirdly, I added a different color to each of the balls so that the final display was obvious to the distant viewer.

Materials needed: [1.] Six sponge balls in three different colors, either 1.5 or 2.0 inches in diameter. I chose red, yellow, and green, all of which will show up well against dark clothing. [2.] A clear glass brandy snifter. [3.] A piece of buff or tan card stock of sufficient size to be formed into a tube for covering the snifter when turned into "landscape" position (i.e., wider than it is tall). [4.] Two large paperclips, or small spring clips with folding handles (often called "bulldog clips"). Don't forget to purchase backups for the above items if you plan to do this routine on a regular basis. [5.] A stock magic table with a servante, and optional black art well.

Setup: Place one sponge ball of each color into your right jacket pocket. Place two paperclips or bulldog clips on top of the balls, or in the ticket pocket that is inside the jacket pocket. Place the snifter where it can be retrieved quickly and easily, and place the buff/tan card stock near that.

Routine: Place the brandy snifter on your table, to your right of a black art well if you have one, and slightly off center toward your right side of the servante. Produce the three sponge balls magically, or simply place them on your table to your left of the snifter (and to the audience side of the optional black art well). Reach into your case and bring forth the buff/tan card stock. Rotate it back and forth to show both sides, and then turn so that the longest sides are the top and bottom ("landscape" position). Form into a tube with short ends overlapping a bit on the audience side, and hold in this position with your left fingers. Reach into your right pocket and remove a paperclip or bulldog clip with the thumb and

forefinger. Emerge from the pocket with the last three fingers curled, and place the clip over the overlapped joint. If using a bulldog clip (more secure), fold the handles down over the paper, one outside the tube and one inside the tube.

Turn the tube upside down and hold the overlap with the left hand. Reach into the right pocket, and crush the three sponge balls between the last three fingers and the palm. Then grip the other clip between the thumb and forefinger and emerge from the pocket as before. Place the second clip over the overlapped ends. If using a bulldog clip, fold down the handles as before. Holding the tube by the second clip/overlap, place the tube over the brandy snifter. Lower the right hand a bit into the tube and release the three sponge balls, which fall into the snifter in necessarily random order. You are now three ahead, and the audience has seen mere introduction of the props.

I have opted for three different vanishes for the balls. I feel that this keeps the audience interest up, especially since no climax is seen until the end of the effect. For the first ball, a modified dump vanish with a Slydini lapping move will be used to ditch the ball in the servante. Pick up the red ball from the left of the table with the left hand. Display at the fingertips, and turn slightly left. Allow the ball to sit in the palm of the left hand, and approach with the right hand. Position the right hand below the left hand, and curl the right fingers to receive the ball. Turn over the left hand as if to dump the ball into the right hand, but curl the left fingers gently to retain the ball. The key to this dump vanish is the response of the right hand, which should dip slightly as it "receives" the ball, and then close. The left hand stays still, and the right hand curls loosely to simulate the girth of the mythical ball. Using the thumb as a hinge, rotate the right hand away from the left hand (outward and toward the audience, as you are facing somewhat left) to turn it face down. Don't just turn the wrist/forearm, but move the right elbow outward and to the audience as well. Look at the audience as you execute the dump, and they will meet your gaze, attaching even less importance to the dump. Turn back toward the table (facing the audience straight on), the right hand rising to a foot or so above the tube, holding its mythical ball in a fist. The left hand simultaneously moves in an arc, downward and to the right, setting up the Slydini lapping move by bringing the left hand to the rear edge of the table. Follow the mythical ball in the right hand with your eyes as the left hand dumps the ball into the servante. With some practice, you could even arrange the left hand to fall behind the snifter/ tube as it dumps, but this is not necessary if you execute a good dump vanish, follow correctly with

your eyes, and the hands move simultaneously to the right, one up and one down. Do a crumple vanish over the tube with the right hand, and open the fingers from pinky to thumb. Raise the left hand, and signal, "That's one," with your forefinger and a knowing smile.

Next month: The routine continues, with vanishes for the second and third balls. In the meantime, gather the materials needed and see if you can determine why I chose a brandy snifter instead of the wineglass used in the modified Benson Bowl routine (February, 2006).
