

Election of new officers and dues are payable

At the June meeting there will be one more call for nominations. If there are no further nominations, the Executive Committee of Ring 76 will be accepted and all of the officers will be sworn in at the July Awards and Installation Banquet.

The slate of officers is as follows: President, Bob Ingalls; 1st Vice President, Terry Lunceford; 2nd Vice President, Kenny Shelton; Secretary, Jack White; Treasurer, Richard Ustick; Member at Large, Sal Barajas; Member at Large, Donna Greenbaum; Immediate Past President, Diane Lane. Leaving the board will be Jacques Lord.


Those becoming members of the board are asked to make a commitment of attending 23 meetings a year. Along with the 12 regular general meetings and the 11 board meetings, board members are also asked to attend special events and business meetings as well. The I.B.M. and Ring 76 are both volunteer organizations and there is no pay or remuneration for expenses incurred.

The June meeting also is the time to pay our dues, which remain at \$25. Those not paying at the June meeting will be billed in July and will be considered delinquent if not paid by August 1st. Annual dues pay for all Ring activities, our newsletter, and lecturers that are otherwise free to members.

Because of illness of our newsletter editor, Jack White there was no MagiCurrents in May. We are catching up on past events with this our June newsletter; we begin by recapping our events of the April meeting. The annual Ring 76 Swap Meet has been considered a success. 
Loch David Crane with a table full of good close-up magic at the swap meet.

would be freed up for another type of program for the membership.





A Slydini Classic for Standup Use — Part Two

Last month I began a routine adapting the late Tony Slydini's Paper Balls in the Hat for stage/platform use. I outlined the necessary props, and I detailed my changes to elevate the formerly seated/lapping routine to a standing platform routine. Finally, I described the opening of the routine through the vanish of the first ball. This month I complete the routine with the second and third ball vanishes, and wrap up the denouement.

Assume that the second ball is yellow. This time, pick it up with the *right* hand, holding it between your thumb and first two fingers. Display it briefly, and then turn your body slightly left as before. Approach the left hand with your right, and execute your favorite retention-of-vision vanish, apparently putting the ball into your left hand while actually retaining it in your right. You can use the ROV vanish detailed two months ago in this column for the **Benson Classic for Standup Use**, or try this one that I picked up from professional Patrick Page.

As the left fingers close in front of the ball, catch it between the right second and third fingers in a scissors/pinching move. Fold the right hand's second, third, and fourth fingers into their hand, forming a pointing fist and withdrawing the ball into the palm as you do so. This withdrawal coincides with a slight backward move of the right hand toward your right. Once the mythical ball is supposedly in the left fist, move the left hand away to the left, watching it with your eyes as the right hand points to the left hand. Don't forget to follow with your eyes. This is a quick and easy move, so don't labor over it. Timing is crucial, so practice by really putting the ball into the left hand a few times, and then closing the withdrawing right hand into a pointing fist to get the timing correct. Then, begin practicing the steal of the ball, watching for glitches or hesitations in a mirror. The two hands actually move apart at roughly the same instant.

Now, turn back toward the table (facing the audience straight on), Move both hands to your right, with the left hand going about a foot over the tube holding its mythical ball. The right hand simultaneously moves in an arc, downward and to the right, setting up the Slydini lapping move with the wrong hand (!) by bringing the right hand to the rear edge of the table. Follow the mythical ball in the left hand with your eyes as the right hand dumps the ball into the servante. Probably this dump is completely covered by the placement of the tube and the snifter, since you are dumping with the right hand. The important thing is that the dumping hand simply rests on the edge of the table in a natural manner with no movement made during the dump. Do a crumple vanish over the tube with the left hand, and open the fingers from pinky to thumb. Turn the left hand palm to the audience, and signal, "That's two," with your two first fingers and a winsome smile.

The vanish of the third ball is a bluff, but it follows my idea of making each vanish of a ball under more stringent conditions than the previous ball, thus keeping the audience interested and more puzzled as the effect builds. This time, the right hand never approaches the left. Instead, in appearance, the left hand merely picks up the ball, holds it over the tube, and crumple vanishes it into nothingness.

Assume that the third ball is blue. The left hand reaches to the table to pick up this blue ball. In actuality, the ball is either scooped into a black art well under the cover of picking it up, or dumped into the servante under the cover of dragging it to the back of the table to pick it up. The right hand never moves. The left hand assumes the proportions of this mythical ball, and moves to the familiar position about a foot over the tube, eyes following. Perform the crumple vanish, and open the fingers from pinky to thumb as before. Smile, and signal, "That's three!" with your left hand's first three fingers. Wait a beat for this to "sink in." Reach to the tube, and lift it with the left hand. Allow the left hand to lower the tube behind the table to put all attention on the snifter. Grasp the snifter with your right hand, gracefully between the forefinger and thumb around the stem, and lift it to the audience in a gesture of toasting as an applause cue. Swirl, as if containing brandy, to show all three colors swimming together in the bowl.

Alternatively, you can try catching the bowl/ stem between two fingers of the palm-up right hand, and lift up with the flat hand. Try both in both close and distant mirrors and see which way looks the more graceful for you, and/or which way shows the three colored balls better for you.

Don't discount this bluff vanish. It is very

effective after seeing the dump vanish and the ROV vanish, building to an impossible-appearing climax for the third ball. You have built audience association when taking the ball from the table in the first two instances, and that association makes this vanish a total surprise. The simplest, cleanest way to achieve a result is to be desired, and the audience association works strongly in your favor.

This is a great routine to do without patter and with music. Find some elegant music that builds in intensity, as this will help build audience interest as well. Don't say anything about what you intend to do, just start the music, assemble the tube with the clips, and place it over the snifter. Produce the three balls magically (or simply bring them out and display before putting on the table). Proceed with the routine as outlined, and the slowly building music will help lead the audience through the routine. Don't omit the counting bits, as they signal that as-yet unseen magical events have taken place.

Did you determine why I chose a brandy snifter instead of the wineglass used in the modified Benson Bowl routine (February, 2006)? I wanted to use three different colored balls to increase visibility, as well as making this effect look different from the Benson routine. Since the "three ahead" loading of the balls in this effect would be difficult to load in a specific order, the snifter allows the balls to sit roughly alongside each other in random order. Additionally, the three different colors make it easy to see that all three balls have arrived at the end of the effect.

Try my Slydini adaptation and compare it to my Benson adaptation from February 2006. See which one you prefer, and offer me your suggestions or comments. One reader's commentary on the February Benson Routine suggested the use of a fan instead of a wand, adding yet another element to make the trick look so different in effect that it could be done in the same program with a cups & balls routine programmed much later in the show. Seaport Village Magic Shop closes

The members of Ring 76 want to thank Mary Coley for the many years of service her shop gave local magicians with the operation of her Seaport Village Magic Shop. The shop closed in late May; Mary Coley said the Port District which operates Seaport Village would not give them a lease they could live with and that forced them to close the store down. Over the years Mr. & Mrs. Coley special ordered magic and presented special dealer demonstrations for Ring 76 members.

The Gathering Restaurant closed by tragic fire in May

Dan Thomas, owner of the Gathering Restaurant and magician, was stunned when his manager called him on Sunday evening, May 7th, and told him the restaurant was on fire. The blaze began as a grease fire in the kitchen and quickly moved to a hallway, then the restaurant itself. Sunday evening is normally a light evening for business; there were about 16 people in the restaurant when a waiter urged customers to leave by the front door until the fire could be brought under control. Some of the customers at the bar took their drinks with them and stood on the curb and watched as fire fighters from just across the street converged on the restaurant.

Over the years, Dan Thomas has employed many local magicians at his restaurant to work the bar and do strolling magic at the tables. Recently Tom McCarthy and Craig Stone both were working the Gathering. When one of the regular magicians was not on duty and a customer wanted to see some magic, Dan would do a few tricks.

Dan Thomas says the fire and water used to battle the blaze did considerable damage to the restaurant and first estimates put the repair work at just under a million dollars. It is expected the popular restaurant will be open again in early summer. Dan reports he is taking this opportunity to make some changes to the kitchen and the restaurant itself that were needed. He will also be offering some menu changes when he reopens. But one thing will remain the same: the Gathering will still be a great place for magicians to hang out and for those who want to see good close-up magic.
