## Terry Lunceford Ring 76 board candidate for President

The Ring 76 Board of Directors has announced it is supporting Terry Lunceford as their candidate for President of the Ring for 2007 and 2008. Terry has been on the board for the past four years and is currently the first vice president in charge of entertainment. Elections for president and board members will be held in June.

Terry did not find magic until he was 25 years old. He was working as a salesman, selling a kitchen aid known as "the slicing and dicing tool." Terry worked as a pitchman at trade shows and fairs. Between pitches one day in Honolulu, Hawaii, he dropped into Jimmy Yoshida's Magic Shop, Mrs. Yoshida was pitching magic tricks behind the counter and Terry became fascinated with her work. She tried to sell him a set of cups and balls but Terry opted for the multiplying sponge ball trick.

Weeks later in San Diego, Terry found the Magic Lounge, a magic bar on University Avenue in East San Diego about eight blocks east of our current meeting place. J.C. Wagner and Mike Stilwell were working the bar. After watching them mystify the audience with their skills. Terry knew that magic was going to be his life. He began putting an act

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## A large turnout for the February Ring 76 close-up contest

Our February 12<sup>th</sup> meeting was the annual Ring 76 Close-up contest, and this year the popular event attracted six candidates and a huge crowd to cheer them on. Inspite of a cold and rainy evening 62 people made their way to Jack's Magic Place for the meeting. President Bob Ingalls reminded the membership of the Mark Wilson lecture the next evening at the same location. It was also announced that in late February Earl Chaney, the Ringling Bros., Barnum & Bailey Circus clown and magician, would be conducting a workshop for fellow clown performers in San Diego.

Our entertainment vice president Terry Lunceford, then took the stage and explained the rules of the close-up contest. Five large round tables had been set up with the membership gathered around each table. The six performers would each have 10 minutes to present their act. They would be graded on appearance, originality and skill. The contestants would move from table to table having presented their act five times by the end of the contest.

The contestants included: Our youngest member 16 year old Alex Greenbaum who was smartly dressed in a tuxedo with red necktie and red pocket-handkerchief. Alex did some nice coin effects that included coin through silk and then a very clever mental routine.

Our next contestant was Diane Lane, a veteran of restaurant table-hopping; she opened with some very fast and exciting coin effects and quickly moved into a card trick to complete her 10-minute time limit. Diane was outfitted in a set of black sequined tails with a sequined hat to match.

Loch David Crane, who has had many years of performing around the world, was contestant number three. Over the years Loch has developed many different characters for his various magic acts. For this contest he was Bafflin' Bill Cody, a takeoff on the Buffalo Bill image complete with cowboy hat and very colorful shirt all trimmed with Native American artifacts. Bafflin' Bill opened with a quick card trick that incorporated some trinkets from an Indian Medicine Man. That was followed by a very unique card stab and the act closed with a mental effect with cards that bore the photographs of famous hero's of the old west. All very original material.

Bob Pozner was contestant number four; Bob is hearing impaired but he does not let that stop him from performing and has tailored his act accordingly. Dressed in a black derby hat and a sports coat with pins and buttons from various magic organizations on both lapels he turns into an exciting performer when he sits down at the table. Bob does a quick coins across routine and several other mystical bits of business with coins. Then he presented a beautiful "Triumph" card effect. He closed with a clever Chop Cup routine that had a very startling finish of producing a turnip, which was put back in the cup and changed into a small peach.

Kenny Shelton was performer number five and was dressed in a sport coat and snappy cap that was turned backwards. Kenny has been experimenting with a new close-up act where he is the pit boss in a casino. He has stories about crazy things that happened at the card tables in the casino and uses that opportunity to demonstrate his skills with cards. He also does a very clever routine with poker chips that hop from one hand to the other - good visual magic.

Our sixth and last contestant is truly an international member of Ring 76, Mago Ruly, who comes from Tijuana, Mexico. Dressed in a very smart long pink coat with brass buttons Mago Ruly carries his entire close-up act in a small red mailbox with his name and logo on the side of the box. English is a second language for this performer so he works with an economy of words. He opens with a very nice effect with four dice that change places. Then comes a very different card trick with several people at the table helping out. Then two effects with business cards, ending with one of the business cards changing colors and everyone at the table receiving Mago Ruly's business card. He closes with a Ring on chain routine.

The winner's of the Ring 76 Close-up contest will be announced at our annual Ring awards banquet held in July, with cash prizes being handed out at that time. All was over and out by 9:15 p.m. Jack White/Secretary Ring 76.

# Magic Book Review by Dr. Joel Moskowitz



Playing cards are not meant to infer that decks of cards can be played musically. Sony/Legacy are the publishers of a museum quality collection of music whose theme is the game of poker. The choices have been selected by curator Ricky Jay. Accompanying the music is an illustrated libretto. The treasured picture reproductions of the poker diversion or compulsion are certain to be treasured. The libretto, is informatively annotated by Professor Jay. The release to stores date is February 13, 2007. It may be purchased online at www.SonyMusicStore.com for \$31.98.

DO NOT READ THIS! If you know about magic and have heard of Ricky Jay, the penultimate scholar/performer/philosopher. BUY IT NOW.

Alternatively, if you have little or no familiarity with the conjuring arts and not the slightest prurient interest in why audiences crave the weird, you need to be introduced to the elegance of Ricky Jay, actor/creative thinker/master of the devil's playthings: 52 pieces of cardboard.

STOP NOW! You can return to the review, if you like, but you would be better served to locate a source for immediate purchase of "Ricky Jay Plays Poker."

Of course, you will be deceived. You should expect that. Ricky Jay doesn't actually play poker or teach poker. If you permit that one who knows how to insert a CD into a CD player is capable of playing music (a play on words), even in this instance, Ricky Jay doesn't truly play poker. He has selected music where the theme is poker and which it might be entertaining to listen to as one plays a game of poker, then this is what he offers. Jay in self-revelation writes that in his earliest youth he practiced with cards while music such as these drifted in the background.

For this production, Jay studiously compiled twenty-one (again misleading his public.) This number is not associated with poker but another card dance with lady luck Twenty-One. Shouldn't Jay have chosen 5, or 4, selections which is the essential integer in games of Poker?

WHY ARE YOU STILL READING? Would I con or cheat you about how you will win in gratification by getting this boxed set? Do you want me to show my cards, first? OK. Here is what is included:

Ricky Jay has artfully stacked the deck by opting for a collection, which proves that poker has been portrayed musically in virtually every genre and throughout the ages.

REJOICE! Historian Jay (and the kind publishers Sony/Legacy) embraces the CD renditions with an art adorned booklet - pp. 66,- with descriptive commentary on each of the musical offerings.

Blending with the ear candy is eye candy: The reader is exposed to front pieces of the antiquated sheet music. To accompany the historical narrative Jay provides thumbnail (no, not thumb tips) illustrations. For example, he includes the most improbable first description of the game of poker which appeared in Dragoons Campaigns of the Rocky Mountains (1836). Another choice treatise front piece is: Thirty

Years Passed Among the Players in England and America "Theatrical Life of Joe Cowell, Comedian written by himself (1844) price twenty-five cents. Note: Poker today is a multibillion-dollar industry. There are many others equally to be cherished.

How lucky are we current residents of earth who can access poker courtesy of satellites and Internet everywhere. Author (or shouldn't he be called Professor which more aptly describes his learning than one Dai Vernon) riffle shuffles anecdotes about the history of this game with illustrations entitled Drawings from Life. Remember, the theme of the collection is draw poker.

If clever trivia is your passion, read this book.

Mr. Jay is no stranger to being photographed at work. He has appeared in numerous Hollywood and TV productions. Generally his role consists of amazing audiences with graceful unbelievable cavorting of his 52 friends, the pasteboards.

Watching the DVD of "Ricky Jay plays Poker" reveals his impact. The widened eyes of his mesmerized witnesses suggests they are a micrometer away from kissing his ring and bowing in supplication and calling Ricky Jay their new religious profit. Such is the wonderment that he evokes in audiences.

If you have already taken this writer's advice and interrupted reading this review and are only returning to it as you are tearing off the wrapping of this classy boxed copy of the deluxe edition, you are now urged to insert the DVD into the appropriate drive and watch Jay challenge your senses. Following the advice of his grandfather, his mentor, who unlike Jay was once President of the Society of American Magicians (Jay eschews organized magic or conventions.) Jay explains, he plays no poker. "If I win, that would assume I was cheating." If I would lose, they would say I was a bad magician.

Buy two copies: One to be displayed under hermetically sealed glass. The other for use, study and appreciation and to share (which is not an invitation to copy). Sony/Legacy and Ricky Jay have included a full deck of cards, U.S. Playing Card Company, whose back is illustrated with a cheating gambling scene. They also have included a GUARANTEE - See the Bee/Joker "Guarantee - Look at the players in your game. If you can,t find: The Pigeon; The Coney; The Mark; The Bates; The Flat or The Guppy. Guaranteed. It's gotta be you. Oh yes, the deck of cards includes one blank faced card. I can't imagine what you would need that for. Can you?

went to J.C. Wagner and told him that Terry had potential, but he was the worst performer he had ever seen and he needed some help if he was going to work in public.

For the next four months Terry would stay up half the night with J.C. Wagner learning sleight-of-hand with cards, coins and dice. Years later J.C. Wagner would tell fellow magicians that Terry Lunceford was one of the best students he ever had. Terry was a fast learner and he practiced his moves with cards for hours.

It was about this time that Terry decided he would quit smoking. Every time he felt the urge to reach for a cigarette he would grab a deck of cards instead and begin to practice his card magic. The channeling of interest to something other than smoking paid off and in a matter of weeks the desire to smoke a cigarette was disappearing. Terry has always said he did not quit smoking for health reasons; it was because he could not afford the cost of cigarettes during this period. Years later thinking back on this process he noted that a deck of cards cost a lot more than a pack of cigarettes and he was going through a lot of decks of cards every week. But, he kicked the smoking habit with magic and says he has felt good about it ever since.

Terry's magic began to payoff when he became a full time

performer at the Magic Lounge; later, he worked at the Magic Island in Newport Beach, was invited to do a lecture tour to Japan, then to the South Pacific Islands and on to England. In London, Terry presented a lecture at the prestigious Magic Circle and 300 people attended.

There were more lectures in Europe and the United States. He returned to California and opened and operated a magic shop in Upland, California, for two years. He began working the Magic Castle as a performer and experimenting with a new style snake basket of his own design in his stand-up act. Next came Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas.

He came back to San Diego in the late 1980s; the Magic Lounge was gone, so he worked various restaurants and became the "house mechanic" at the Gathering Restaurant in Mission Hills for several years. During this period Terry was going from job to job on his motorcycle, to him speed was the name of the game. It was about this time that he met a young professional woman by the name of Lynn; she is a psychologist and currently the Dean of two colleges with in the University of Phoenix system, they fell in love and were married at the Magic Castle by the Reverend John Booth, who is also a magician. Terry says he credits all of his success with magic to his wife; she has had faith in him and has motivated him to aspire to greater heights in his career and personal life.

Terry opened a magic company that creates top of the line professional magic; one of his most successful effects was the marketing of his Snake Basket. There are a variety of other items that he wholesales to magic dealers throughout the world.

Terry has in recent years become very involved in "F-mod" auto racing. Recently he purchased a sleek little car that had not run a race in 45 years. With his crew of mechanics he rebuilt the car and put the engine in tiptop racing condition. It recently won the last three races it took part in and has given Terry the Southern Pacific Regional Championship, which assures him a place in the Grand Nationals in Topeka, Kansas, in August of this year. Terry has had a passion for auto racing since he was a boy.

Terry continues his interest in magic as a performer, having just completed his 60<sup>th</sup> appearance at the Magic Castle in Hollywood. He looks forward to working with magicians throughout Southern California and Ring 76. He is excited about the possibility of becoming the leader of San Diego's magic community as President of Ring 76.

photographs of Nani as a young entertainer in San Diego. With the information he gleaned in the telephone interview and the photographs he put together a 12-page booklet on Nani Darnell Wilson and her San Diego history.

Michael then contacted various local political leaders and asked for their help in welcoming Nani Darnell Wilson back to San Diego. The County Board of Supervisors made February 13th Nani Darnell Wilson Day in San Diego and issued a special proclamation. Five members of Congress from San Diego County including Congressmen, Brian Bilbray, Susan A. Davis, Bob Filner, Duncan Hunter, and Darrel Issa issued certificates of recognition, and California State Senator Christine Kehoe

issued a proclamation from the state capital in honor of

Nani Darnell Wilson. Nani and Mark both were made honorary lifetime members of I.B.M. Ring 76.

When Michael E. Johnson presented the awards and the booklet to Nani before the lecture began she said she was speechless and totally surprised. Later Nani told Ring 76 members this was something new for her, she usually stands in




