March meeting brings out a wide variety of magic effects with some surprising explaniations of how they work

Our March 12th meeting was the first during the new daylight saving time and was very well attended with 52 members and guests taking part in the festivities. President Bob Ingalls called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. sharp and there were a number of announcements. Following the announcements Terry Lunceford, the first vice president in charge of entertainment, took over the program.

The theme of the evening was a "Trick Parade." Our members were asked to do one of their favorite routines and then explain how the effect works. First up was Jacques Lord, who presented a trick he does at weddings. A torn and restored 2-dollar bill that includes some very clever and cute patter. Charlie Gott was next; he does Gospel Magic and his routine with the "A.B.C. Block" effect was very different. First he made all of the props himself out of wood and the blocks were "man, sin and life." After doing his routine he gave instruction on how to build the props and create the patter. This was a very complete presentation.

Dr. J. Pearson was our next presenter with a stand up coin routine. Dr. Pearson does magic for his patients everyday, and he gave our audience a lesson in how to get people you are interacting with to relax. Longtime professional performer Bob Elliott, who did an excellent routine of putting a coin under a spectator's wristwatch, followed Dr. Pearson. Bob has been doing this for years and has perfected a most unique and simple way to load the coin with out the spectator ever knowing what is happening. He gave a detailed lesson to our members, many of who asked him for more information after the meeting.

Craig Stone, another of our pros, gave us a great lesson in showmanship with cards by showing our members a great stand-up effect with pasteboards that is quick and very effective. Craig has a booming voice and commanding presence that added to his demonstration and explanation. Dr. Robert Allen, who offered one of the most original effects of the evening using two cottage cheese containers, followed Craig. They were the quart size container; a second pint size container is also used as a liner in the larger container, which conceals milk that fills a glass for a funny and surprising ending to the trick. Dr. Allen presented the trick and then explained how it was constructed. It is an effect that fits nicely into any kind of a show or routine.

Tom McCarthy is one of San Diego's busiest restaurant

workers and knows how to get the maximum entertainment out of very few props. He used three playing cards and turned his few minutes into an exciting miracle. Then in very simple terms explained his routine; it was another winner. Terry Godfrey was next,

another hard working professional who has a long list of fair dates scheduled for the summer ahead up and down the Pacific coast. Terry was wearing a Panama straw hat and used it in his routine with three little balls that fly from one hand to another and then into his hat. Terry explained his routine with pure sleight-of-hand to our members and while few will ever attempt doing the trick, they do have new appreciation for the work a real pro like Terry puts into his show. Both his routine and his explanation were very entertaining to watch.

Toni Perrine, who as a young woman worked in British Music Hall as a singer and dancer and today works as a magic clown, walked onto the stage with the confidence of an old pro, she balanced a tennis ball on ruler. Toni had a lot of good patter about balancing her checkbook and playing tennis and then knocked the audience dead with her balancing feat. She built the prop herself and showed us how to construct one for our own use. Joe Mystic followed with his Miser's Dream. Joe showed us a new coin dropper device he recently purchased at the World Magic Seminar in Las Vegas. It has a magnet attached to it so he can move it inside and outside the coin bucket. Joe gave everyone some good food for thought on doing a Miser's Dream.

Alex Greenbaum, one of our youngest performers at 16 years of age, presented a spelling effect that was very clever and mystifying. Alex gave his audience a few tips on how to make sure the trick works every time by being sure you know how to spell a spectator's name properly. It was a good effect. Closing the show was Ring 76 President Bob Ingalls, who did a super prediction involving a chosen card with the prediction being hidden under a spectator's chair. Bob said he figured the trick out on the drive to the Magic Castle in Hollywood.





Magic Book Review by Dr. Joel Moskowitz



Who Was That Masked Man? By Joel A. Moskowitz, M.D.
Thoughts on Mentalism
Originally published in "Vibrations" the Journal of the Psychic Entertainers
Association

June 1998, when Dr. Moskowitz was a member of that august body.

Conjure this? This shall be a story of elucidation. What is it that you do? What do those who watch what you do think or feel about what you do? What follows are some thoughts designed to provoke interested readers (cold or hot) to consider their identity, purpose, mission, and vision. All in the hopes of expanding their self-awareness in the service of enhancing their effectiveness, marketing, presentation, and help them lose weight, as well.

In a voluminous tomb entitled, "Dictionary," no heading for "mentalism" exists. Rather you find "mental telepathist" (not pathetic mentalist) from which you are directed to see "mind reader," If you were a mind reader, you would already have known that. "Mind Reader" is defined as "one who professes or is held to have ability in mind reading." Notice that the ability is either alleged by the person him/herself or others. There is an absence of inference that the quality is real.

Small wonder (more about wonder later) that in a random survey of unselected men and women in an ATM line elicited their free association to the couplet "mind reader" as "performer" "entertainer," "vaudeville," "magician," "fraud," "deception," "charlatan," "provocative," and "amusing." This sequential trend was obtained in a statistically challenged set of responses (I will not burden the reader with the actual data).

(Note: This concern for the reader wherein substantiating conclusions is respectfully omitted has been the approach in a recent book on Houdini, but we shall not digress. Nor is any deduction to be made from the reactions of those surveyed, nor their order of appearance. Instead, I suggest that the reader poll their own diverse group for baseline definitions. For the purpose of this essay, I shall assume that what I found is a widely met set of responses.)

What is your purpose in practicing the art of mentalism and how might you best get there?

If you naively believe that your only motive is a hope to convey your power of being able to bend men's minds or enchant women folk, then I respectfully suggest that you an experience of self-examination to understand your latent feelings of inferiority and/or powerlessness.

In the regrettable motive that by demonstrating your mastery of the mentally unspoken you will elicit the awe of the masses that will bow to your new religion and kiss your ring, it is advised that, with haste, you contact your local mental health agency for help.

Where your intent is to enlighten, beware that you stand astride the knife edge of disclosure. Few performing mentalists purposefully wish to reveal their methods. The guise of themselves and educators whose subject is the mind generally seeks only to attempt to cloak their mystery with a mantle of psychobabble and pseudo professorial authority.

It is my observation that the optimum demonstration of mental agility – including talents of uncommon mental functions – reading minds, the future, being able to use cerebral vibrations to move objects, to divine missing objects including bodies, expanded sensory perceptions – vis-a-vis being able to see through silver dollars and other dough (cooking I mean) – are most satisfying when the mentalist/

magician/actor and the audience agree to 'dance' together. Each plays a role – the performer will behave in an "as if" mode (as though he/she possesses wondrous powers) and the audience will react as though it were true/real/believable. "The play is the thing."

The audience willingly suspends disbelief. Ah, but where lies the optimum pleasure? I suggest that it is not in *amazement* or even *wonderment*. By dictionary definition, "to amaze" is to confuse, bewilder, excite to frenzy, madness, perplexity. Wonder encompasses "marvel, miracle, that which excites amazed admiration" or a "bewildered" curiosity aroused by the extraordinary and unaccountable." Do you, the mentalist, want to leave your audience confused and agitated? Wouldn't you prefer them to feel entertained, pleased?

The problem of much of magic, mentalism is that the production of a bowl of fruit, a canary, an undisclosed thought evokes wonder and this in turn triggers intellectual reaction of seeking an explanation, thereby muting the joy of surprise.

For me, the O'Henry ending is choice. The card effect, The Web does that. Slydini did it by having a series of balls vanish into a small box which, at the conclusion of his effect, was shown to be (a) empty (b) have no bottom. I recall with glee when a clown/magician/juggler tossing some plates into the air, upon dropping some whereupon they audibly smashed, evoked gasps from the audience, myself included, when without breaking his rhythm he skimmed some of the plates into the audience and from which we ducked, only to discover the ones he scaled into our midst were paper! The surprise admixed with pleasure was delightful.

The shock of the unexpected is the quintessential quality in producing a memorable psychologically emotionally satisfying experience. Accomplish this and you have impacted your audience in a way few will ever

forget. Therein, I submit, is the proper twist in the tale.

If you have some magic and would like to sell it at the swap meet, here are some things you should know. Seller's tables are available for \$10 for a 6-foot-long or you can share half a table with someone else for \$5. Sellers are the only people allowed into the hall until we officially open for business at 7 p.m. The room will be open to sellers from 3:30 p.m. to unload and set up for the swap meet.

Ring 76 Treasurer Richard Ustick is in charge of assigning tables to our sellers. Do not wait until the last minute to make your reservation for a table. Contact Richard early because there is always more demand for tables than there is space available. If you are a seller, we urge you to get in early and set up for the opening buyers. We remind everyone that the swap meet does not include an auction; the magic auction will be held in June. This is just a swap meet, and you will not be competing with an auction of magic props and books. You keep all of the proceeds from your sales; your only cost, as a seller, is the ten or five dollar fee for a table.

As a buyer, if you have a friend who is interested in magic and is not a member, this is the perfect evening to bring them along as a guest. The swap meet evening is open to all members and non-members with many attending from the North County and from Rings outside of San Diego County.

A word to the wise if you are a seller; keep your prices as low as you can without giving away your merchandise. Buyers are looking for bargains, and if you don't want to pack up the goods you bring to the swap meet, keep your prices low and everything will sell.

We have found that swap meet evenings usually end somewhat earlier than our regular meetings, so be on time because the early birds are the ones that get the great bargains and the hard-to-find magic. This year raffle tickets will be sold at the door with the proceeds going to the Ring treasury. Kenny Shelton will pick a new ticket every 15 minutes and raffle off a prize. All sellers are being asked to contribute an auction item as part of the privilege to sell at this event.


"The Surprise Miracle"

I am one of those people old enough to remember Hen Fetsch, a wonderful performer and prolific inventor of magic effects. It was an especially good day when I would walk into a magic shop and there was a new Hen Fetsch trick available. In March of this year a new book about the life of Hen Fetsch and his magic was released to the magical fraternity. It's called: "Fetching Magic" by Robert Kirkwood Spencer; I was eager to read it because when I was as a boy I was a great Hen Fetch fan.

I was not disappointed in what I read either and was particularly taken aback by a routine for the "Dove Pan." Taken aback because Hen Fetsch credits our Frank Herman for giving him the idea for the routine. On page 67 of the book the routine is called Hen Fetsch's "Surprise Miracle."


Effect: A white balloon is inflated, placed in a pan, covered with a lid, and "pop" goes the balloon, and it changes into a bunny. The needed props include a dove pan with a thumb tack affixed to the bottom of the load pan. Fetsch notes that for maximum effect it is necessary that the lid be placed over the pan and immediately removed with a single up and down. I have watched Frank Herman perform this routine many times. A very effective use of the old dove pan.



If you like this routine you will really enjoy the book, it is available online from most magic dealers if it is not available at the Grand Magic Shop in Escondido.
