

round performer and lover of magic, last summer he produced the now much acclaimed Australia magic convention.




Everyone who was visiting the Pumpkin Station that evening went home entertained, and the members of Ring 76 all had a good time performing before a lay audience,

# Magic Book Review by Dr. Joel Moskowitz



## "The Complete Idiots Guide to Street Magic"

"Idiot" was originally created to refer to "layman, person lacking professional skill," "person so mentally deficient as to be incapable of ordinary ..." So says Wikipedia, the Internet resource. If that is so, The Complete Idiots Guide to Street Magic by Tom Ogden, Alpha Books, 2007, pp 379, \$18.95 promises an impossibility. Surprisingly, it delivers! Even the most magically uninformed, dexterously impaired, and audience phobic will be able to find something which he or she can perform in The Street.

Some magicians have blessed the wanderings of David Blaine, whose antics on the byways of the barrio and elsewhere have stimulated a renaissance of conjuring fascination. Chris Angel is equally known to the public of the future, our younger generation, most of whom would not know Blackstone from Cardini. Author Tom Ogden does more than provide a cookbook of effects, most of which can be performed without a stage. With a humorous pen, he educates the mentally limited reader about the history of the art, the maxims for proper performance, and offers many routes to expanding one's knowledge about the entire art of magic.

Magic in the street is an ancient pursuit. (Often the pursuit would be from the local gendarmes chasing these tricksters who were suspected of fleecing the crowd of onlookers). Historically referred to as "buskers," these performers were limited by using apparatus which was such that they could carry it with them but large enough to be readily seen by a small, immediate crowd.

Tom Ogden offers engravings of 18th century Mountebanks, the ancestors of such as Jeff Sheridan, who in the 90s became the singular street magician. Mountebank, translated from the Italian, describes the trickster who would stand up on a bench and often would entice passeersby with deceptions and humorous tales with the intention of selling quack nostrums.

Critics of Blaine's blandishments and Chris Angel's mystifications would prefer to refer to them as "video illusionists." To be sure, attempting to create amazement out in front of a mixture of disinterested, suspicious pedestrians who may be inclined to surround you and unafraid to challenge your behavior takes especial self-confidence and skill. Chris Angel and Blaine are alleged to have the benefit of artful video editors who delete unsuccessful audience interactions and magnify extraordinary results.

The essentials advocated by author Odgen for optimum Street Magician success include: Avoid being an unwashed, smelly, annoying intrusive person. Remember, the book is for Idiots who wouldn't know these things. Know who you are and what you wish to do. You might be surprised to learn that even professionals in established careers are hard pressed when they are asked, "Just what do you do?" An understanding of the identity which you wish to communicate is more important than knowing how to do a double lift. Congruent with your clothing is what emits from your mouth. "Wanna see a trick" simply doesn't cut it. Most successful conjurers adhere to Dai Vernon's referred to as "The Professor" axiom, "Confusion is not magic." Magic must be entertaining. Telling a story (trade term 'patter') converts an exercise in finger flicking to a theatrical presentation.

Ogden's assortment of suggested "street appropriate" effects includes, among many others, Karate Kard; Piercing effects (in vogue these days); Matrix with bottle caps; Voodoo theme mental business and many more. Basic maneuvers are taught, as well as full routines. In our techno ponderous times, shuffling in electronic gadgets such as the Ipod makes street magic described in the 16th century very contemporary. Ogden gives you several options for your audience's entertainment using the Ipod.

The Appendix (not a useless piece of your anatomy) is one of these fine book's best features. With the realization that you can't really enroll at Hogwarts, there are schools for magicians, clubs to join, magazines to which you may subscribe, an extensive bibliography that you may consult. Even if you consider yourself a learned conjurer, you might just be an idiot if you don't buy and read, "The Complete Idiots Guide to Street Magic." Highly recommended.

The above advertising is from 1907, 100 years ago and one year before Harry Kellar turned his mantle of "The World's Greatest Magician" over to Howard Thurston. Below is Howard Thurston's obituary as it appeared in Billboard, the show business newspaper, in April 1936. In honor of Magic History month we thought you might find this interesting.

### HOWARD THURSTON

Howard Thurston, internationally known magician and for more than a quarter of a century the leading mystifier and illusionist on the American stage, died April 13 at Miami Beach, Fla., of pneumonia, following a cerebral hemorrhage suffered March 30. He was 66. Thurston was forced to quit the stage when he suffered a stroke in a restaurant while showing at Charleston, W. Va., December 13 last. He went to Miami Beach early in the winter in an attempt to regain his health.


Born at Columbus, O., July 20, 1869, Thurston spent five years of his early youth studying for the ministry. His imagination fired by the then famous Herrmann the Great, he soon abandoned his religious studies to dabble in magic. He received his first magical experience as an assistant to a magician appearing at a fair in Portland, Ore., more than 45 years ago. Three months later he went out on his own, working theaters, halls, museums and similar engagements. Thurston also worked for a time as a pitchman, using his magic tricks to draw the crowds.

After a tour of the West and Middle West, Thurston headed eastward and made his New York debut at Tony Pastor's theater. In 1905 he returned to San Francisco and started out on a world-tour, which proved a huge success. In 1908 he succeeded Harry Keliar, who at that time was the top-ranking American magician and with whom he had appeared for about a year before. From that time on Thurston played practically all of the leading cities of the country with his mammoth magic show, carrying 25 assistants. He was always regarded as a master showman. In recent years, with the roadshow business at a low ebb, Thurston played with his company in the country's major vaudeville houses. It was Thurston's boast that his was the last big time, full-length magic show traveling on the road.

Thurston was past president of the Society of American Magicians and a member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians, the Kiwanis and Lions. He was also a 32d degree Mason and an Elk.

His body was shipped to Columbus, O., for burial. Funeral services were conducted Friday night, April 17, with the Howard Thurston Ring No. 9, International Brotherhood of Magicians, holding the special and symbolic wand-breaking services, with S. W. Reilly, president of the group, officiating. The Parent Assembly of the American Society of Magicians conducted a similar wand-breaking ceremony in New York earlier in the week. Burial was made in Columbus April 18.

Surviving are his widow, Paula; a daughter, Jane, by a previous marriage; two brothers, William, of Columbus, and Harry, of Chicago, and a sister, Mrs. Myrtle O'Hagen, of Brooklyn.
