





# Magic Book Review by Dr. Joel Moskowitz



#### This "Street" is not the "Road" to Magic


A friend of mine commented that "street magic," aka David Blaine, which astonishes the wayfarer, was beneficial to the magical arts. His meaning was that bringing seemingly extemporaneous conjuring to the passerby (not actually what we know to have occurred) served to introduce magic to those who might never have occasioned to have the funds to experience David Copperfield. While magical deceptions are often classified by the venue in which the performer exerts his/her wonders, i.e., stage, school auditorium, Chuckee Cheese birthday celebration, trade show, cruise ship. We have yet to hear about magic performed in a satellite (other than the outstanding science) or aboard a 747 or the like.

Having recently affirmatively reviewed another book (Tom Ogden's Idiots Guide to Street Magic), I was impelled to buy and read what purported to be the infinite source for knowledge of this specialized area of magic. The title, "Ultimate Street Magic," I was soon to find, out was more superlative than substance. It might be appropriate to remember that the adjective use of the word "ultimate" refers to a final destination and also a fundamental something, an underlying reality when all other things are disregarded. In no way is this book 'ultimate' in those senses. "Ultimate" is also utilized as an alternative to "greatest" and this book doesn't fit that definition either.

Author Gary Sumpter, in his introduction, offers that magic has grown more than he has. In this I am ready to concur. Blame (for this Blaine aficionado) cannot be foisted on Mr. Sumpter alone. His publisher, New Holland Publishers, titled another book "Every Magic Secret in the World Revealed" which I have not read, but may simply be the editor's inclination toward grandiosity and hyperbole.

One hundred twenty-eight slick pages hard bound exaggeration glamorously presented are yours for circa \$25.00. AMAZING card magic, UNBELIEVABLE coin magic, MIND STRETCHING rubber band magic, street magic RED HOT, SURREAL mind magic, STREET FREAK (think Chris Angel?), and street-smart FANCY CARD FLOURISHES constitute the chapters.

Admittedly, many books on magic are constructed like many cook books. Recipes are "borrowed" without any effort to attribute origins. Like cookbooks, such syntheses carelessly fail to include some of the appropriate ingredients. Mr. Sumpter doesn't disappoint. He refers his reader to additional sources, e.g., Magic Clubs wherein he includes: The Magic Circle (he is British as is his publisher); Society of American Magicians, but notably no mention of The International Brotherhood of Magicians (IBM).



Gary Sumpter, who lists himself as a dealer (Creative Magic), has a secondary title to his creation: "Amazing Tricks for the Urban Magician." Would a magician who performs in a suburban environment not find much of worth? He writes, "All of the effects included in this book are relatively easy to perform, leaving you plenty of time to work on your performance." This oxymoronic promise might be offered to author Sumpter himself. He would benefit from having devoted more time creating a truly valuable contribution to the literature of street magic. Borrowing another title from a truly entertaining TV show, you should "Curb Your Enthusiasm" with regards to purchasing this book....
