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### Ring 76 Close-up Contest set for February 11th

The Monday evening, February 11<sup>th</sup> Ring 76 Close-up Contest is one of the most anticipated events of the year. It gives Ring members an opportunity to perform close-up and personal their favorite routines and an opportunity to win prize money and honors at a future Ring event. The contest is limited to members in good standing only; that means they must have their dues with the I.B.M. and Ring 76 paid currently and be registered for the contest.

All contestants must register with Kenny Shelton before 6 p.m., on Sunday, February 10<sup>th</sup>. Kenny's phone number is: (619) 417-5741 or you can e-mail him at <a href="mailto:vettesbro@aol.com">vettesbro@aol.com</a>. The contest is limited to 10 contestants so it is very important that you contact Kenny Shelton and get your name on the program as soon as possible. This year a ballot will be made up with each performer's name on it and members of Ring 76 will be invited to vote for the performer you think is the "best."

Each contestant will present their close-up act five times, moving to five different tables and performing for a different audience at each table. This procedure gives each contestant the feeling he or she is truly working for a real close-up audience. Some performers choose to stand at the table while others feel more comfortable sitting at the table. Contestants may do either or both during their 10-minute presentation. We do expect each performer to adhere to the time limits; a whistle will sound when each 10-minute block of time has ended.

Ring 76 members are encouraged to bring a guest or other people interested in magic to this meeting; however, only Ring members are eligible to vote on the contestants. You can vote for only one contestant, then from the ballots collected the one receiving the most votes will be our first place winner, the contestant with the second highest number of votes will be second and so on. We have only once had a tie for first place in this contest, and top honors were presented to both contestants.

The Ring 76 Board of Trustees has again voted to present a gold medal to the top three winners and a cash prize of \$50. for first place, \$25. for second place and \$15. for third place. The winners will be announced and presented with their honors at the Ring 76 Installation and Awards Banquet at the Cottonwood Country Club, July 13<sup>th</sup>.

Our audience at this event is very important: we ask that

all of our voting members take the time to carefully evaluate the presentation, skill, appearance, and entertainment value of each performer. We would hope to keep this contest from becoming a

popularity event; give our top prizes to the best performers of the evening. In respect for each contestant, we ask our audience to select one table and stay at that table throughout the evening.

Because the format of this evening is a little different from our other programs, we ask that you try to arrive a little early and get a seat at one of the five tables. Ring President Lunceford will call the meeting to order at 7 p.m. sharp and make a few announcements and then begin the contest. If you are going to fill out a ballot it is important that you see all of the contestants perform, so plan to arrive at the beginning and stay until the end.

First Vice President Kenny Shelton then took over the meeting and acted as master of ceremonies in introducing the various performers for the evening. The one person you never want to follow on a magic program is Craig Stone, and he started the evening off with one of his stand-up card routines that had everyone laughing during the trick and mystified when it ended, and that we suppose is the best way to start off any magic show with comedy and amazement. It was now up to the rest of the performers to keep up with the example set by Craig. Michael Feldman was next and was in very good form. He presented an original coin effect that included some very fancy sleights with three coins and a coin purse. It would be good if our members could see this effect on a

close-up basis like the February Close-up Contest rather than on a stage. This routine required a lot of skill and good showmanship and Michael displayed all of that with great flourish.

Joe Mystic, always a thoughtful kind of guy, told the audience it was Michael E. Johnson's birthday, we all sang Happy Birthday and Joe proceeded to produce a Rabbit in a hat for Michael, by drawing a top hat on a sketch pad, Joe then magically had the rabbit pop up out of the quickly sketched hat. Then Joe tore the page off of the large drawing pad and gave it to Michael as a souvenir of the evening. It was a seemingly impromptu moment and magic effect made to look like an off-the-cuff, last minute thought. It looked that way because it was presented by a real pro who knows how to make his magic entertaining and look like it just happened. We can all take a lesson or two from Joe's performance skills.

We were all happy to see John London again after being away for a while. John did a nice mental effect supported by some original comedy material. Jeff Marcus returned with a very nice routine for the "Zig Zag Coke Can." In Jeff's hands this effect played big and left everyone in the audience asking themselves, how did he do that?

Just when you thought you had seen every "Three Card Monte" routine in the world, Tom McCarthy presented his very funny stand-up version of this effect that "killed." Tom really works to make his magic entertaining and all of that hard work has paid off. His timing, facial expressions, patter and his misdirection are all blended together in one flawless bit of business that is just good magic. Thanks for sharing, Tom!

Sometimes cartoonist Jim Whiting is a character right out of one of his own cartoons. Jim presented one of his routines that appeared to be straight out of a MagiToon cartoon; it was funny, flashy, and no one has figured out yet what it was that he did. But as usual we enjoyed the baffling way it was presented. Dr. Jeff Pearson did his version of Tom Vorgahan's miniature wallet and then for the end, added yet another effect. It was still a work in progress, though entertining.

Loch David Crane invited people up from the audience for his card stabbing routine that Loch has turned into a very interesting little mystery. Closing the show was Michael E. Johnson with a nice bit of business out of his full evening show with a deck of cards. A lot of entertaining magic was presented.

# Magic Book Review by Dr. Joel Moskowitz



Magic/Conjuring is an addiction but in the words of the psychiatrist who was called to evaluate Kris Kringle in "Miracle on 34<sup>th</sup> Street," the actor Edmund Glenn was suffering from a "delusion for good." We can take comfort that our compulsion regarding things magical are not pathologic. But a compulsion it is.

How many of us aficionados of the magical arts do not have our antennae ever out for any reference to the word magic or its equivalents. Very few, I suspect. It was in this state that I wandering in the gift shop of The Maritime Museum in Sydney, Australia, spied a book: "The Queen's Conjurer," "Buy it," my inner voice commanded.


But this is not a magic text, but rather a historical recitation of a Dr. John Dee, advisor to Queen Elizabeth I. Yet it is a tale of the interface between science (he was a navigator,) wonderment, and the tug of war between the mysterious and the known. In those days, his ability to amaze others earned him the appellation of being a magician. In those times, a less than positive reference. Throughout the Western worlds, the ability to seemingly act in opposition to the era's beliefs in the expected fascinates and frightens. Being called a magician was not a compliment. It inferred an affiliation with the dark side.

In the course of my professional career as a forensic psychiatrist, I was taking a history from an older gentleman. He couldn't remember some details and asked permission to check with his wife who was sitting in my waiting room. After a perplexing pause, he returned. Face red, he exclaimed that he could not proceed with the interview. His wife had noticed a painting of me where the word "Necromancy" appeared. They were, he said, church going people and would not have any truck with black magic. Surprised, I clarified that the painting, done by a former patient, was in appreciation of my conjuring performances. Not that I was in league with the devil. Relieved, the interview proceeded.

Michael Mangan ("Performing Dark Arts" A Cultural History of Conjuring, 252 pp, Intellect Books) has written one of the most stimulating, learned, well-researched books addressing the role of magic in our lives. It is not a book of magic, but it is a book about magic. Readers who are seeking a book about tricks begone! If you are a thinking magician; curious about our craft and how

mystifiers were and are essential in our mental wiring, in virtually all cultures, read this.

Many years ago, I wrote: "The Sorcerer's Apprentice" or "The Use of Magic in the Psychotherapy of Children." My information is that magic begins in childhood when the infant experiences the power of



controlling events by thought alone (Mother bringing nourishment when he/she is hungry). Author Mangan turns to Freud (as, in part, did I) to illustrate the child at play throwing some toy away and having it return. It is uncanny and this unsettling feeling is both desired and feared by audiences who watch wizards perform. Professor Mangan is not a magician. He holds the Chair in Drama at Execter University.

If you have a thirst for the origins of magic, myths, biblical miracles, back to the time of the first magic exhibition, almost five thousand years ago when Cheops, the pharaoh, who presided over the building of the Great Pyramid, summoned a magician named Dedi to palace this will mesmerize you. He decapitated and restored him. The interface of jugglers, Gypsies, Christian Orthodoxy, fraudulents, Barnum and Houdin and Houdini and Conan Doyle all riffled shuffled together with philosophy, reason, stagecraft, life and death itself all emerge from the erudite pen of Michael Mangan. Witches, wizards, warlocks, devotees of legerdemain, prestidigitation, quick mount your broomstick, flying carpet, all purpose levitation device and if you can't enroll in Exeter University, do the next best thing, buy and read this fine, readable work.
