Reserve Your Swap Meet Table Now!

The April 14th Ring 76 meeting will feature a Magic Swap Meet. At this writing 9 tables have been reserved as well as the bar section of Jack's Magic Place. There are still a few tables left for anyone wanting to sell their older or unused magic and make a few dollars. The Ring's annual swap meet draws many members we don't often see at our regular monthly meetings as well as members from the North County and as far away as Orange and Riverside Counties.

If you have not reserved a table you should contact Richard Ustick ASAP via e-mail at rustick@flash.net. He is keeping the table set-up records. The cost to use a 6-foot table is \$10, a half table or card table is \$5. So that everyone selling has the proper time to set-up their table, Jack White will open our meeting place at 3 p.m. on Monday, April 14th and have a two-wheeled dolly at the door to help move boxes from your car to the swap meet room.

If you are a member looking to do some shopping the doors will open at 6:30 p.m. and it is always the early birds that seem to get the good bargains in used magic, books and videos. In years past most of those having things to sell have pretty much sold everything or have run out of customers by 8 p.m. We do not have a closing time but, judging by years past, everyone is packed and on their way home or at Denny's Restaurant by 8:30 in the evening.

All funds raised by the rental of tables at the swap meet go to the Ring 76 treasury. This is one of the most anticipated meetings of the year. If you are a buyer, this is a time to dig through a lot of other people's magic videotapes, DVDs, books, tricks, and seldom seen apparatus, and props of all kinds. We advise those wanting to sell magic not to wait to reserve their tables. We've already had a larger than usual advance for reservations.

Last year one of the people selling some of his unused magic was so excited when a potential customer visiting his table picked up a prop that was for sale and performed it. The person selling the trick said, "I didn't know that was such a good trick," and he quickly put the prop away, deciding not to sell it.

Fields Bar has brought him shining reviews and accolades. He has operated his own magic shop and for many years was recognized as a creator of fine magic props and magic wholesaler. Recently, Terry has discovered new technology that can help him create some unique magic effects and he's exploring the possibility of reentering the magic wholesale and manufacturing business.

A lover of fast cars, Terry has become a well-known race-car enthusiast and has brought home top honors on the racing scene. He owns and races "F-mod" cars and has taken part in many championship races. In this razzle-dazzle schedule Terry assures the membership of Ring 76 he will continue to have time for them and the responsibility

March Teach-in Brings Many Rewards to Ring 76

The Ring 76 Teach-in meeting is one that members look forward to each year. Ring 76 brings five of our most advanced performers together annually as instructors for a special learning session. Five round tables are set up and the instructors are each given 10 minutes to teach a trick, sleight or routine those gathered at the tables.

This year our instructors included Brad Burt, Greg Wauson, Bob Elliott, Craig Stone, and Dr. Jeff Pearson. Each of these gentlemen expended a great deal of effort selecting their effects to make them easy for our members to understand.

Brad Burt has had three decades of teaching magic behind a magic store counter. For this session Brad gave his students a real gem: a very simple way to locate a selected card in a deck. Simple in operation, the technique for making it work smoothly requires a little knowledge of cards and how to hold the deck. Brad was generous in his explanation and instruction. Many of his students had a deck of cards with them and were quite proficient in the technique by the time the session ended. Some of the students received a bonus lesson from Brad with a very different "Vanishing Coin" effect using a thumb tip.

Greg Wauson has been interested in magic since he was a teenager and works hard at adding new material to his repertoire of magic skills and effects. He offered his students an opportunity to learn Dan Harlan's "Starkle" routine that includes a wonderful story and a most clever napkin tear. It was very clear that Greg has spent a lot of time with this routine and learning all of the little nuances of the napkin tear. Greg has the patience of a very good teacher and took the time to make sure each of his students was making the proper move.

For Bob Elliott, teaching magic is second nature. He spent more than 20 years at the Louis Tannen Magic Camp in New York. Bob has been a member or a guest at every magic club on the east coast and at one time or another has presented a show at hundreds of venues. Bob wanted to keep things simple for his students so he taught what is called "The World's Greatest Paper Tear". It is an impromptu effect that requires a little story telling, some simple knowledge of paper tearing and a lot of personality. Watching Bob go from table to table was to watch someone who truly enjoyed what he was doing.

Craig Stone is a professional magician and spends most of his time these days performing in restaurants. However, that has not always been the case. He has worked cruise ships, theaters and halls. He is another performer who has spent many hours behind a magic shop counter. Craig gave his students a routine with sugar packets that you might find in any restaurant. The effect included three switches, each move being a unique bit of magic business that are valuable tools in any magicians arsenal. This was personal, one-on-one instruction you don't get from a video or book.

Dr. Jeff Pearson has been a student of Bob Elliott and a devoted magic enthusiast for many years. He often uses a magic trick to relax his patients and get their minds off their pain or illness. He says, "A magic trick is the perfect ice breaker for a good doctor-patient relationship." Dr. Jeff began with a spectator freely cutting the deck into four piles of cards. Despite the fair conditions, the top card of each pile turns out to be an ace. His second trick, also with the aces, was called "Color-Changing Aces" by Harry Lorayne; a little more difficult to learn but a beautiful finish to the first trick.

The lessons presented in these sessions are what a real magic club is about: learning how to do a magic trick properly and in an entertaining manner. Even the beginner was able to come away from this session with new insight into the workings of good magic. A big "thank you" to all of our teacher-performers for going out of their way to make this a very special evening.

Tony Clark Lecture Provided Extra Entertainment

On March 20th Tony Clark - stage magician, show producer and movie actor - presented his lecture for Ring 76 and guests. Ring members Jose Sanchez and Syd Segal brought Tony to San Diego.

Because of an accident on our local freeways, some of the people attending the lecture were delayed. Tony did not want those who had arrived for the lecture early to just sit in their seats so he began doing a few tricks that were not part of the lecture until the rest of the people arrived. Magic Book

THE MAGIC CIRCLE BY MICHAEL BAILEY Reviewed by Joel A. Moskowitz M D March 22, 2008

"INDOCILIS PRIVATA LOQUI" is not what this book demands. "The Magic Circle: Performing Magic Through The Ages" by Michael Bailey is not to keep "mum" about. The Latin injunction emblazoned on the signature shield of Britain's most secret club translates "keep mum"; quite the contrary. The English language is bereft of superlatives with which to praise this excellent book, Michael Bailey, ex-President (shouldn't it be Prime Minister?) (1998-2003) invites the reader of this 288 pp hard backed book into the sanctum of magicdom's most intriguing organization. Together with photos (some in color) of the premises, an assortment of artful poster reproductions of magical greats, and well-crafted text, the grateful reader will enjoy reveling in magical history.

The fly leaf incorrectly advises that this book will be an invaluable addition to any would-be magician's bookshelf. This is too narrow an audience. Learned conjurers, practiced performers, lovers of the history of stage craft and just plain folk will be delighted to read about those who through the ages have amazed and challenged the beliefs of audiences worldwide.

In the spring of 1905 Neil Weaver (who?) and friends were finalizing their plans for The Magic Circle.


Contemporaneously Londoners were being introduced to a new illusion invented by Nevil Maskelyne and Charles Morritt appropriately entitled simply "Oh!" Banquets of the fledgling society were magical events where the soveriegns that the waiters received as tips turned into tadpoles in their pockets and guests were startled to find a white rabbit on every plate waiving the Union Jack.

Neil Weaver earned his living selling shoes. The son of an amateur conjurer, he himself was a keen hobbyist. Perhaps such trivial details will not be of interest to the sophisticated but other hobbyists will take some pride that arguably this most elite magic society was begun by such as they. Author/Magician Bailey carefully details the origins of diabolical means to create wonder: Did you know that The Discoverie of Witchcraft actually originated from a Frenchman who was living in London called John Cautaures, whom Scot described as the finest sleight-ofhand performer he'd ever seen. The roots of 'honest deception' trace back to Dedi of early Egyptian history. The production of a rabbit from a hat competes with the cups and balls as the trick most associated with magic. Included in the art and from the archives of The Magic Circle is a photo of the cups and balls used by His Royal Highness

Prince Charles; a graphic of Robert-Houdin performing "Second Sight" and "La Suspension Etherene" (broom suspension); Bautier de Kolta and his Vanishing Lady and much, much more.

Extensive commentary ranges from Erich Weiss in England (Houdini) to Robert Harbin (inventor of the Zig Zag Girl illusion). Hardly anyone who is/was anyone in magic does not receive attention in Bailey's highly researched tomb: David Copperfield, Doug Henning, Blackstone Sr. and Jr., Penn and Teller, Paul Daniels and Alan Shaxon, Dell-O-Dell and Lesley and Sydney Piddington, etc. After all, one would not be surprised that all these luminaries of wizardry would want to be members of this highest exclusive society, The Magic Circle. "The House of 10,000 Secrets" is yours for the small price of admission, US \$39.95. Published by Tempus Publishing Ltd, Cirencester Road, Chalford, Stroud, Gloucestershire GL6 8PE in 2007, with the price of £18.88 it is more easily procured from Independant Publishers Group, 814 North Franklin Street, Chicago, Illinois 60610 (Phone 312 337 0747) www.igpbook.com.

You will not be surprised that it is highly recommended.
