Free Lecture by David Regal

Our June 9th meeting is shaping up to be a real treat for Ring 76 members. David Regal, the highly respected card worker, magician and author of dozens of articles on magic, will present his latest highly acclaimed lecture for our Ring. David has just returned to Southern California after a nationwide lecture tour. His lecture is FREE to all Ring 76 members; there will be a \$10 dollar charge to nonmembers and guests.

If you read MAGIC Magazine or Genii, you have no doubt read one of David's recent articles about magic. His thoughts on misdirection and clean commercial magic are well respected in the magic community. This will be David's second trip to San Diego and Jack's Magic Place for his lecture. He was here about four years ago. It's Dues & Election Time Again

Ring 76 members will be asked to pay dues in June. Again we will not ask for an increase; dues stand firm at \$25 for each member. This year your dues are payable at the June 9th meeting. You may, however, send a check at anytime during the month of June to Richard Ustick, the Ring 76 Treasurer, 251 Thrasher Way, El Cajon, CA, 92020 for \$25.

If you do not pay by July first you will be sent a dues reminder and you will also find that after June 30th a \$5 dollar surcharge will have been added to your dues bill and you will, therefore, be charged \$30. There is a specific reason for this change in policy. As late as last November, we had members renewing their dues that were supposed to have been paid in June and that made a nightmare out of keeping the books, not to mention an accurate roster of paid members.

Every year the Ring 76 Board of Directors attempts to have several special events for the membership and a variety of other activities that require fees and paychecks to put together. When members wait for a long period of time to pay their dues it makes budgeting difficult and determining what events our Ring can afford to sponsor. So, it has become necessary to create some sort of program to get our members to pay their dues on time.

Also at this month's meeting our annual election will take place. At our May general membership meeting, nominations for the one open office on the board, the office of Secretary, was opened and nominations were taken from the floor. Don Soul was nominated for that position and he accepted the nomination. Bob Ingalls then announced he would be stepping down after 10 years of service as an officer and past president so that would then leave one more open position on the board, that of member-at-large.

The slate of proposed officers for the coming year is as follows: President - Terry Lunceford, 1st Vice President -Kenny Shelton, 2nd Vice President - Michael E. Johnson, Secretary - Don Soul, Treasurer - Richard Ustick, Sgt-atarms & librarian Donna Greenbaum with Members-at-large Diane Lane and Belinda Kaesler.

Stage Competition Brings Out The Best

The May 12th meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. sharp by President Terry Lunceford. After introductions of guests and visitors - and their were many for this meeting - Terry opened the floor to nominations for the office of Ring 76 Secretary. Jack White, the current secretary, is leaving that position and Don Soul was nominated to replace Jack. Bob Ingalls announced that after serving for 10 years on the Ring 76 board and as a past president he would be stepping down. That leaves an opening for a member at large on the board. That position was opened to nominations however no one was nominated and, therefore, that job will remain open.

With the business portion of the meeting out of the way, normally Kenny Shelton, our 1st vice president in charge of entertainment, would take over the duties of master of ceremonies for our Stage Competition. However, for this program Kenny was busy running the spotlight and Richard Ustick took care of making sure the music for the various acts was played at the proper time. Terry Lunceford assumed the duties of M.C.

First up was a very professional performer José Sanchez. Dressed in a tux, he thrilled the audience with a very polished dove act. José works to music and has a smile that puts the audience at ease and makes him their friend immediately. Working with a number of colored doves his act is designed to have each effect complement the next effect. There was an audible gasp from the audience as José seemingly split one dove into two. José builds most of his props and they filled the small space he had to work in for this show. His act set some high standards for the rest of the acts that followed.

Toni Perrine was next with a very colorful and unique act. It was a departure for her working to music with no patter. Toni has created an act that magic books remind performers to think about when routining their program. Do something that is different and is you. Toni included an exotic dance routine with the production of colored silks from two large fans that she uses in the opening portion of her act. The stage for this performance was small and filled with props and made it difficult for the dance number to be fully appreciated. Her magic effects were visual and well rehearsed. There were one or two technical problems because her tables were not placed in the correct position on stage. Toni closed her presentation with a very nice floating table routine. Toni is not a young woman and must be very much admired to attempt such an ambitious act.

While the stage was being set for the next act, Bob Ingalls attempted to do a "Snake Basket" routine as filler

between acts. When Jack White heard Bob was working with a snake he appeared with a large gun in case the snake escaped from the basket. When Bob could not find the snake, Jack fired the gun and two huge spring snakes flew out towards the audience.

Next up was Loch David Crane who always appears on stage in very unique costumes. In the past he has appeared as a Wizard in medieval costume and as Bafflin' Bill Cody in a very real western get up. This evening he was dressed as "Karnack", the all-seeing, all knowing mind reader. His turban was delightful; his flowing cape was perfect for his character. His material was well above anything he has used before and much of it was very funny. There was no real magic to his routine but there was good comedy and a joy to behold.

Sydney Franklin was next and presented a combination of mental magic and hypnosis and scored well with his first effort at this act. Sydney is new to Ring 76 and is just becoming established as a performer. The stage environment as a magic performer is somewhat new and he says he learned a great deal from this first time out as a mentalist. He has a sparkling personality and is not afraid to be bold in his performing techniques. He knows he has to refine his act and smooth some of the rough corners. He is excited about working with other members to create something that is both mystifying and entertaining.

The seasoned pro Michael E. Johnson closed our program with an act that is a little different for Michael. A student of Houdini history, Michael treated the audience to some very rare and very old Houdini memorabilia. His stories were filled with comedy and excitement. Then with the help of a committee from the audience, Michael was chained with a variety of items including handcuffs, locks of all size and design as well as a very heavy chain. He then played with his committee as he escaped and was quickly once again found to be securely locked up. It was an act where we laughed and learned something about another era in magic.

The show came to an end too quickly. There was a lot of good talent and it was clear that each act dressed for the occasion and put a lot of thought and work in their performance. The winners will be announced at the Installation and Awards Banquet on July 13th.





Magic Book Rev

"The Magical Life of Long Tack Sam" by Ann Marie Fleming, a review by Joel A. Moskowitz M.D.

For decades audiences were amazed by magic said to have originated in the mysterious Orient. Some Western conjurers faked being Chinese. Why then did a magician who was authentically Oriental fade into obscurity. How many know of "The Magical Life of Long Tack Sam"? A chance discovery of an old 16 mm film in her grandmother's basement piqued Ann Marie Fleming to track the history of this conjurer, acrobat, world traveled vaudevilian and contemporary of Houdini.

Fleming, herself an award winning filmmaker, author and artist, had a passion to understand why Long Tack Sam is mostly forgotten. Using her skills she reanimates his life with pictures, cartoons, and posters. Ms. Fleming, Long Tack Sam's great

grand daughter, combines archival photos with her own graphic 'sidebars' and commentaries. The beautiful result is a history lesson as well as glorification and understanding of the times and tribulations of this Northern Chinese magician's adventurous life.

Starting with a playbill from a theater in Germany where Long Tack Sam performed in 1933, a grant from the National Film Board in Canada, and while wandering through a magic collector's conference, Ms. Fleming chanced upon a poster of her beloved grandmother and her sister in full Chinese dress. They were Long Tack Sam's daughters! Quoting Ms. Fleming, "It was very emotional."

The romantic chance meeting between L.T.S. and an Austrian shopgirl attracted local attention. That a Buddhist Oriental who converted to Roman Catholicism to marry this European girl was news. At that time in his career, Sam was director of Tan Kwai Troupe reknown for their 'hair' tricks. Political changes with the ascension of the Republicans in an effort to eliminate the style of the Ching Dynasty made it obligatory to cut off the hair tails and along with this went Sam's career.


Paradoxically with the admiration for things Oriental there was prejudice against Chinese. An anecdote illustrates: A fellow, but Caucasian performer, incensed that L.T.S. appeared on the bill before him, came on stage during Sam's act and thrust some dirty shirts at

him demanding that "I want these back by Saturday night and go easy on the starch!"

Sam was a handsome, multi-lingual entertainer who traveled world wide, spoke, it is alleged, French, German, Yiddish and with an American accent at that. Sam was 'wildly popular in Australia, such that they thought he was Australian'. His act was international. Ms. Fleming's pursuit is cheerfully documented with commentary about the world events during the period when L.T.S. lived and performed.

"Freezing Ice in the Hand" was a contribution to The Sphinx in the October 1930 issue and is reproduced for the reader. Also included is The program of the Golden Anniversary celebration from the Society of American Magicians. This depicts Sam as the headliner of their show. Orson Welles is quoted as praising Sam as one of his teachers. Jacki Flosso remembered Sam doing a somersault effect where he produces a bowl of water...at age 73!

An editorial: Artistic Credibility Challenged In Balboa Park by Michael E. Johnson

When I started performing magic in Balboa Park, I was shocked to discover the dog-eat-dog world of street performers who intimidate and slander to make competition disappear.

Here's what I experienced. On the first Saturday of the month, I went to the Park Headquarters at 10:00 a.m., stood in a long line of entertainers, and by the luck of a lottery, I was issued a permit to perform. The Park staff were very helpful, giving me an exclusive permit to perform in one of five designated locations for magicians. I spent about five hours presenting my Elegant Mysteries show near the Museum of Natural History, passing the hat and busking for tips. It was hard work but fun.

On my second day in Balboa Park, the honeymoon was over, and a magician I'd never heard of tried to take over my space. He claimed I was supposed to share the space. I'm not against sharing my stage with a qualified professional who I respect, but this stranger was rude. I held my ground, even as he called me names, threatened me, and heckled me as I tried to make a living.

A few hours later, another Magician I'd never met tried another tactic. He set up his show in an unauthorized location directly adjacent to me, loudly blowing his whistle and yelling at people to "Come see the magic show in Balboa Park". I still held my ground, and a short while later he disappeared without saying a word to me.

By the next month, a juggler who I never met posted a hit-piece on me on the internet, accusing me of "The death of artistic courtesy". In his blog, he called me names, used quotes from my own website against me, and urged his readers to contact me to express their displeasure.

As soon as I discovered the internet smear campaign, I immediately e-mailed the juggler to explain my position. But he never had the courtesy to respond.

It's obvious that these performers have their own set of rules, independent of the rules established by the Balboa Park Department of Recreation. What makes their criticism so ridiculous, is the fact that none of the three even have City of San Diego business licenses. Any businessman knows that a City Business License is required to conduct business in San Diego. I have one.

Perhaps if I'd known these performers, I might have shared my space with them. But none of them are members of the magic club, nor have I seen them at the many charity events for which I volunteer.

Rather than scaring me off, this criticism has only strengthened my resolve to keep performing in Balboa Park. Those of us who care about magic must stand up to these bullies. Otherwise, the art of magic will be defined by the lowest common denominator. To all members of the International Brotherhood of Magicians, I welcome your support in this important cause.
