Ring 76 Turns 60 This Year

This being the 60th anniversary of Ring 76, it's important to know a little bit about the history of our Ring and the man for whom the Ring is named.

After World War II, Navy veteran Cecil "Sid" Gerhart and his new wife settled in San Diego where he opened a neon sign business but magic occupied all his spare time, collecting, teaching and performing. "Honest" Sid's comedy magic act was that of a traveling medicine show pitchman. Many of the props he used are on display at Jack's Magic Place.

In 2003, Ring member Ed Estrin presented then-president Don Soul with a long lost document of historic significance. Among a pile of papers containing magic instructions and illusion blueprints he had collected was a typwritten sheet titled "Temporary Authority to operate as an affiliated Ring of the International Brotherhood of Magicians." It is dated December 6, 1948. The paper grants authority to operate as I.B.M. Ring 76 and is signed by C. James McLemore, Supervisor of Rings, I.B.M.

The Ring was active from 1948 until 1951. It is believed that deactivation was most likely a result of events related to the U.S. involvement in the Korean War. In November, 1958 the Ring was recharted, being active ever since.

Installation Banquet Bestows Honors & A Great Show

July 13th marked the changing of the guard as the new board of directors was installed at the annual banquet, held once again at the Cottonwood Country Club. Territorial Vice President and Ring 76 member Jeff Marcus formally presented the new board for 2008-2009: Terry Lunceford president, Kenny Shelton – 1st vice president/entertainment director, Michael E. Johnson - 2nd vice president/ membership director, Don Soul - secretary/newsletter editor, Richard Ustick - treasurer, Donna Greenbaum - sgt-atarms/librarian and three members-at-large - Diane Lane, Belinda Kaesler and Bob Meigs.

Our previous secretary, international vice president Jack White, then had the ring recognize two new Order of Merlin Shield inductees Gary Dismukes and Jeff Marcus, honoring them for 35 years of continuous membership in the I.B.M. This was followed by a special presentation of lifetime membership in Ring 76 awarded to Len Cardoza who, in 1950 as a working professional, joined the ring and has attended meetings over the years as often as his schedule allows.

After that, performance awards were issued to members as voted upon by the entire Ring throughout the year. There

was a tie for second place in the Stage competition and that award went to Toni Perrine and Michael E. Johnson. First place was captured by José Sanchez for his brilliant dove act. In the Close-Up competition there was, again, a tie for second place and the honors went to Mago Ruly and Michael E. Johnson. The first place prize was taken home by Craig Stone. Our Performer of the Year, as established by numerous presentations throughout the year, went to Michael E. Johnson and he also walked off with the Member of the Year award as the Ring 76 member who had contributed the most to the ring in the past year as acknowledged by its members.

With official business concluded, Ring 76 was treated to a really special evening of magic as our Stage winner José Sanchez reprised his now-famous dove act. That paved the way for the spectacular Steve Spellman illusion show. It was a first-class performance featuring his full cast and crew. With an attendance of approximately 90 people including about eight kids, this family-oriented show featured ducks, doves, a dog, a rabbit and even a gorilla... well, maybe it was one of his cast in the costume but who cares. The dazzling show seemed to end too soon because of its energy and we all appreciated Steve's appearance.

Magic Book Rev

SUCOP SUCOH Thru the Mirror of Time by Paul Kieve A review, by Joel A, Moskowitz M D July 01. 2008

Not to be confused with the book of the same name published in 1634, this Hocus Pocus authored by Paul Kieve is a Scholastic Press publication (2007) targeted for the nine to eleven years old, which is when many magic obsessions begin. Daniel Radcliffe, in his introduction, praises Kieve as one who taught him some tricks. Kieve may be less widely known than the stage name of Radcliffe, Harry Potter. Now that is impressive credentials! Kieve also assisted with the special effects wonders in the Potter movie Prisoner of Azkaban and has provided magical effect support for myriad theaters world wide.

Norm Nielsen, famous for his magic poster collection and source, receives Kieve's gratitude. Some of the Nielsen collection of famous magicians adorn the outside cover, as well as the inside front and back cover. A bonus packet of three postcards each are reproductions of a few of the posters of the great magicians of the past, and three illusions. Beyond this 'gravy' there is the romantic tale where Kieve writing as a young enthusiast is mesmerized as a poster of Alexander, morphs into life.

Kieve muses "What might it be if the posters on his walls mutated into such as The Great Lafayette performing with his menagerie of animals; What joy to see Robert-Houdin demonstrating his famous mechanical man? Houdini, manacled and handcuffed suspended upside down in a tank of water escaping. Ching Ling Soo astounding audiences with his bullet catching effect. And for the purposes of this story, they do!" And much more!


Paul Kieve loves magic and you, the reader, forever young, will smile at the refreshing verbal illustrations and pictorial representations (Peter Bailey, Artist) which enchant and educate the student wishing to become a magician him/herself. The interchanges while fictional reminds those who are of sufficient vintage of the TV show, "You Are There". The theme of that much watched show was that viewers were presented with notable interchanges between luminaries of yesteryear. Kieve does it in this book.

Professor Hoffman, famed authority of early magical texts, disputes with Alexander, the mentalist who represented himself as "He Who Knows". David Devant enters the fray. As the novice who tells the story (and you the reader) trav-


el though the pages you learn that Alexander, a mentalist with a turban, might these days have been dismissed as simply a fellow with a concealed Blue Tooth in his head wrapping from which he was able to 'divine' messages. The Great Lafayette, described by some contemporaries as 'unsociable to the point of rudeness', we learn, poured his affection on his dog, Beauty, in whom he invested some superstitious attachment. These personal anecdotes and descriptive accounts of performances satisfy Kieve's childhood wish that he could have seen and known the master magicians of the past. Within the narrative are some revelations of the methods (Ooooo).

Also included are simple time honored tricks similar to those which litter the pages of beginners books found in most public libraries. These add little but presumably the author/editor felt an obligation to teach some magic along with the historical fictional albeit fascinating tales. Most of these bonus tricks have been much repeated and might well have been 'old' at the time of publication of the original Hocus Pocus. But that they persist may be some evidence of their appeal.

Would you believe that this hardback tale, published by Scholastic Press (2007) 301 pp, is a mere \$14.99. This is not simply a recipe first book for wanabee magicos. It is a loving fascinating story of the personalities who delighted the public. The reader is promised to be delighted as well. It is not only for 9 to 11 years old.
