




Johnson plans to keep the high standards of the magic newsletter in place, also

Bob Ingalls debuts at Fechter's On Friday, April 24, Bob Ingalls made San Diego history when he

On Friday, April 24, **Bob Ingalls** made San Diego history when he performed in New York at the prestigious 4-F Convention, also known as Fechter's Finger Flicking Frolics. This invitation-only event gathers some of the world's top close-up magicians.

Just days before the event, Bob was excited about his opportunity to perform. For safety purposes, he decided to pack magic in two bags, one trick in his luggage and one trick as carry-on. He ended up performing a Henry Evans effect, something he shared with Ring 76 members in meetings past.

Only this time, the trick's creator **Henry Evans** himself, was sitting in the front row. Bob said that Henry gave him positive feedback about his performance. "It made me feel good," said the former Ring 76 President.

Terry Lunceford is a Fechter's regular, and he was travelling with Bob. Terry said he tried for years to get into Fechter's, before organizer **Obie O'Brien** gave him the green light. He was planning to debut a new card

trick he's been working on, where one chosen card seems to bite the deck and spit out another chosen card. Terry has performed this a few times at the club, and everyone was stunned.

Bob and Happy Elliott of Oceanside have been 4-F regulars for years. Happy made her mark there when she was the first magician's spouse invited to attend the festivities.



Light reading for Magicians: Roberto Giobbi's "Card College Light" and "Card College Lighter"

Do not read these two volumes if you simply want to learn how to do card tricks without sleight of hand. Do not read these two volumes to discover new principles of deception. Do read these fine books if you wish to learn about the essential elements of performing professionally.

Even if you don't fit the characteristic definition of a 'professional' as with musicians being paid to play, the word professional brings to mind a higher level of proficiency. Roberto Giobbi is renown for his definitive "Card College," a testimony not only to his knowledge of conjuring with cards but his talents as a teacher as well.

The latter five volumes of card magic specializes in the sleights which enable miracles to happen before spectator's eyes. "Card College Light" and "Card College

Lighter" were both published in 1988 in Vienna (the city, incidentally, where J.N. Hofzinser's seminal work was the foundation for modern magic with cards). The recent English edition is brought to you by Hermetic Press.

Why are these two books different from most other books? They speak to the reader with the voice/words of Roberto who knows what makes card magic entertaining. It is not, as one might think, for beginners only. Neither is it for those who either have little finger flicking dexterity or have neither the patience nor ability to learn knuckle bending sleights.

What makes these volumes unique is the author's appreciation of the elements of presentation. Many cardicians don't appreciate how important it is for their audience to "like" them. The folks in the bleachers identify with the rapport you have with the person whom you ask to pick a card. Acrobatic pasteboards by themselves quickly dampen interest. Staging, communication and psychology are absent from most beginners instructional manuals on becoming a wizard. Don't believe when it is touted as "self-working". Absent sensitivity to the interpersonal, card tricks quickly become an annoyance.

"Card College Light" by Roberto Giobbi, 151 pages hardbound, illustrated by Barbara Giobbi-Ebnother, and translated by David Shephard, contains seven professional sleightless routines. The first routine has three effects: an impossible revelation of two cards; via 'intuition' two spectators are able to separate a shuffled deck into black and red cards.

Routine two: magician discovers two cards chosen fairly; with a royal flush, the magician triumphs in a poker demonstration; by pendulum divination the card is found.

Routine three: An under-the-table detection; purporting to have capacity to do muscle reading, a card is discovered; another ingenious lie detector effect.

Routine four: Although seemingly the magician fails, the wizard wins again, an estimation effect where the magician divines the number of cards taken from a deck.

Routine five: Employing only three questions, magician identifies the chosen card and produces the other three cards of the same value.

Routine six: An astonishing detection of two cards picked and shuffled by two spectators; a hands-off surprise finding of a card the spectator alone touched; a prediction (a particular favorite of mine) with dramatic story.

Routine seven: Another one I predict you will like - includes throwing the deck face-down in chaotic order, entitled Vernon's miracle - no magician will resist this. "Ask me no questions, I will tell you no lies" is the refrain. Yet while no inquiries are made, the magician supplies the answers and finds the thought-of card. Giobbi credits friend Richard Vollmer for modifying an 'old' mathematical stunt for the latter. Roberto is to be congratulated for supplying credits where

appropriate, sources in a bibliography, but he doesn't expect the reader/student to have access to the Magic Castle Library for references. The tricks are explained clearly, make sense and are destined to be entertaining.



Paul Potassy, a highly regarded magician, was asked to write a testimonial to the second volume "Card Magic Lighter". Potassy says it well when he describes Roberto's writing as calling for little memorization and a minimum of preparation. He was introduced on his DVD by Jeff McBride who said that Potassy performed magical minimalism and maximum impact.

This 155-page Hardbound book fits the bill precisely. Themes are extraordinary: mental-like poker where you might get kicked out of a Las Vegas casino, or three-card Monte where the magician could be blindfolded, or a prediction where the card is linked to a celebrity.

Roberto Giobbi constructs innovative, clever, entertaining magic with pasteboards. Because the mechanisms don't require long knuckle-blasting maneuvers in front of a mirror, the performer has ample time to learn how to perform, which is, after all, what a magical performance is all about. These two Giobbi masterpieces are highly recommended.
