The Intersection between Mathematics and Magic

e to the x, dy/dx, e to the x dx cosine, secant, tangent, sine, three point one four one five nine square root, cube root, log of pi, dis-integrate them RPI.

The cheer of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute is much to be envied by those who love mathematics. But what of those who love magic and mathematics? The connection between math and magic is the subject of "Magical Mathematics" by Persi Diaconis and Ron Graham, published by Princeton University Press. The authors, both professors, have written a scholarly treatise which will enchant, mesmerize and baffle conjurers. This is not a tome for the number phobics. Most learned prestidigitators have at least

heard of The Gilbraith Principal but not that it is related the 'famous Mandelbrot set'? Nor that it also applies to the 'theory of Penrose tiles'? You should avoid this book if your only interest is knuckle bending maneuvers which when presented to a lay audience astounds. But are thirsting for expanding your 'know how' in the world of Alex Emsley, Bob Neale, Henry Christ, Stewart James, Charles Thornton Jordon, Bob Hummer, and Martin Gardner the reader will be richly rewarded by

The average instructional guide for nascent magicians will have 'self working' 'easy' math based which will be sure to bore, evoke yawns as the instructions are to 'deal these cards into piles etc etc'. But the first chapter explains the working of Hummer's 'Face-up Face-down Mysteries' in minute detail from the mathematical premise. If you ever wanted to know the mechanism of 'Royal Hummer' this is for you.

If you have the perseverance to continue there are de Bruijn sequences which are not only applications for card tricks but for rhyming patterns in East Indian music, for robotic vision and for making secret codes. Industrial espionage, decoding DNA are linked to a card trick. Graham and Diaconis with tongue in cheek ask "This De Bruijn stuff is cool but get you a job?" Clearly it has worked for them.

Shuffles have fascinated crooked gamblers, Dai Vernon and Ed Marlo and how they can be manipulated is described



in Chapter 6. The Monge suffle and milk shuffles and down under shuffles are all 'related'.

Chapter 7 begins with a description of a first encounter by a 13 year old boy first visit to Louis Tannen's magic emporium (likely this is Persi Diaconis' own story) and his purchase of John Northern Hilliard's "Greater Magic". In that instructional set (still in print) is a trick "The Miracle

Divination". Required are twenty-four pennies, nickel, a dime and a quarter. The patter involves loaning the spectators some change. With kindness for the less mathematically endowed, the authors have created a variation that allows the magician to unravel the information in one's head, without consulting a chart or memorizing anything. The magician can divine the choices.

Graham and Diaconis pose the question "How Many Magic Tricks are There?" They refer back to the first two serious books about magic: "Discoverie of Witchcraft" by Reginald Scot which contained about 52 tricks and J Prevost's La Premiere Partie des Subtiles et Plaisantes Inventions" containing some 84 tricks. Prevost's book contains some mathematical tricks but Scot's none. Their hypothesis is that most magic tricks can be traced back to these early works.

Pages from 153 to 219 (the book is hard bound and is 244 pages), are likely to be most appealing to

magicians. They illustrate this chapter with selections of Marlo's actual notes and notes from Henry Christ, letter from Stewart James, tables, diagrams, photos of the great magicians of yesteryear. Chapter 12 leads with a descriptive quote: "A mathematician is a conjurer who gives away his secrets" John Horton Conway and that's the name of that game.

You might want to know something about the authors who have combined avocation and vocation: Persi Diaconis dropped out of high school (age 14) to travel with Dai Vernon. He returned to City College of New York (this reviewer's alma mater) and earned a PhD from Harvard (Mathematical Statistics). Martin Gardner tells that Persi, while in school, played poker on ships for income. "He had a fantastic second deal and bottom deal." He was admonished that in his professorial duties he should describe himself first as a mathematician lest his students think of him as a conjurer primarily. He is on the faculty at Stanford University and is married to a statistics professor at that school, Susan Holmes.

Graham, an award winning juggler, has a section devoted to getting started in juggling and is ex-President of the International Jugglers Association. He is cited in the Guiness Book of Records for elucidating the biggest number in the universe, he speaks Chinese, and exercises daily on his trampoline During his early years, he was part of a circus act and also performed in Cirque de Soliel. For his day job, he answers to being the Irwin and Joan Jacobs Professor at the Department of Computer Science and Engineering of UCSD.

This unique book Princeton University Press is to be taken in small doses. But it is highly recommended for uniting the pursuits which are so much a part of our universe through the centuries: magic and mathematics. Dr. Moskowitz prescribes this for inquisitive students of either or both pursuits. Rx Rx Rx Rx Rx Rx (5/5)


